# COMEBACK KIDS

Newport Harbor High rallies from a three-touchdown deficit to defeat host Temecula Valley 42-35 in the CIF Southern Section Division 6 final on Saturday night.

TEMECULA — The way that the Newport Harbor High School football team looked at it, adversity had been par for the course.

Newport Harbor had also shown with its playoff run that it was capable of a proper response, so when the Sailors fell behind by three scores in the first half, they did not panic.

Sophomore running back Henry Slater ran in the go-ahead touchdown with 3:23 remaining, as Newport Harbor rallied to defeat host Temecula Valley 42-35 on Saturday night in the CIF Southern Section Division 6 championship game.

"This team has not lacked talent," Newport Harbor coach Peter Lofthouse said. "This team lacked the understanding of how to win football games, and when you've got 16 or 17

## H.B. set to name Parra police chief

He leaves the same post in Alhambra. The City Council will vote on his appointment at a special meeting Wednesday.

Huntington Beach is on the verge of hiring a new police chief, Eric Parra, who currently holds the top law enforcement job in Alhambra.

The City Council plans to finalize the selection when it meets at 2 p.m. Wednesday.

Parra has more than 33 years of experience, much of it with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, where he reached the rank of division chief before leaving in 2019 to become an assistant chief in Alhambra and then police chief in March of this year.

"I am beyond grateful to have this opportunity to serve as chief of police here in my hometown of Huntington Beach," Parra said in a statement. "I am looking forward to partnering with the mayor, City Council and staff as we work to ensure the safety and well-being of Surf City."

He follows Julian Harvey, who became interim police chief in November 2020, when Robert Handy retired.

Parra holds a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Cal State Long Beach and a law degree

## O.C. could see trash pile up after vote for strike

Republic Services sanitation workers allege harassment, too-long hours and the hiring of subcontractors.

Some Orange County residents could see a disruption in trash service during the holiday season, after hundreds of sanitation workers employed by Republic Services voted last week to authorize a strike as contract negotiations with the Arizona-based waste hauler stall.

Members of Teamsters Local 396 — which represents more than 3,000 Southern California sanitation employees, including about 420 working at Republic facilities in Huntington Beach and Anaheim — have been bargaining since the workers' contract expired Sept. 30.

During a Nov. 23 vote, more than 80% of employees authorized a strike, according to Adan Alvarez, communications director for the local chapter based in Covina. That doesn't mean local waste haulers will walk off the job, but it could be a possibility.

"It's been going very slowly," Alvarez said of negotiations Tuesday. "The company hasn't even addressed some basic issues. More than anything, the workers don't feel respected."

Among the top issues union leaders are trying to address are allegations of harassment of em-





ployees by supervisors, too-long hours and the use of nonunionized temporary workers to fill staffing shortages.

Fullerton resident Michael Dominguez has worked for 14 years as a parts technician, keeping trucks running smoothly at Republic Services' Anaheim facility. In that time, he says, working conditions and morale have been on the decline.

During the pandemic, for example, several employees became infected with the coronavirus, creating staffing shortages that led to long hours, and faced exposure to the virus on their routes.

One employee died from COVID-19, he said, while another was hospitalized and is relearning how to walk.

Dominguez got the coronavirus last December and suspects he may have been infected at work, since his wife is a stay-at-home mom and his kids were on break from school at the time.

"We've had so many calls out from various

things that transpired through that surge of COVID," he added. "And it's still happening today." Meanwhile, employees who claim working additional hours may be reprimanded or retaliated against when they submit formal grievances through the union, said Dominguez, a shop steward. It's not uncommon for drivers to end shifts late in the evening and report back to work at 6 a.m.

"I love working for my company, that's the way I support my family, but enough is enough," he said. "We don't want to go

on strike, but if pushed, we will."

In an Oct. 28 third-quarter earnings report, Republic Chief Executive Jon Vander Ark reported the company experienced 14% growth in revenue and earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization and had invested \$900 million year-to-date in acquisitions.

When asked Tuesday for an interview regarding the progress of negotiations, an unnamed representative from Republic Services' corporate office in Phoenix provided an email statement, confirming negotiations were ongoing for some Teamsters-represented employees in the Orange County area.

"Republic respects the rights of our employees to engage in the collective bargaining process, and we continue to negotiate in good faith to achieve fair and competitive labor contracts," the statement read.

Alvarez said a strike during the holidays would not be pretty.

"If it did come to a strike and trash didn't get picked up — that means at commercial, residential [properties] and major resorts during the holidays, there'd be an excess of waste materials," he said. "There's a potentially significant impact."

December 5, 1934 - November 25, 2021

On a crisp, sun-shiny, winter day in early December, 1934, a young mother walked herself to the hospital in Brooklyn, NY to give birth to her fifth child, a son named Vincent. The boy spent summer days playing sports and visiting Brooklyn Dodger games. Before school each day he would be the first one on the basketball court at the parish school. As a son of Irish immigrant parents, his childhood in Brooklyn during the depression, grounded him in hard work, family, and faith.

Vincent James McGuinness, son of Michael and Agnes, was the youngest of 5 and little brother to Michael, Alice, Edward and Hugh. Following graduation from Brooklyn Preparatory Academy in 1952, Vince entered Brooklyn College. In a hurry, impatient to learn, and always looking to move ahead, Vince worked as a fashion model and as runner on the New York Stock Exchange. Halfway through college, Vince found the Marine Corp Platoon Leadership Candidate program (PLC) which funded his remaining education.

Commissioned as an officer and a gentleman, Vince transferred to Southern California with the Marine Corp in 1958. One late-winter afternoon in '59, during a visit to the Sandpiper Lounge in Laguna Beach, Vince (a true romantic) first spotted Joy and she became the love of his life. Less than a year later, Vince and Joy married on February 6th, 1960, at St. Benedict Catholic Church and settled in Orange County; blessed with four children, Kelly, Vince, Kara, and Kim.

Still moving fast, but not in a hurry, Vince jump started his professional career at Dean Witter and found his calling in the investment management industry. Before age 35 he became National Sales Manager for Shareholders Capital. A man of action and endless energy, Vince was recognized for his character, integrity, and timeless sense of style. With a wink and smile, Vince began his entrepreneurial endeavors. The ingenuity and creativity that followed led to the creation of McGuinness & Associates/Endeavor Group, a national business that successfully grew for a quarter of a century.

# Breakers win third World Team Tennis title

Members of championship teams often talk about peaking at the right time.

That's important, whether it's at the end of a months-long season or a two-week sprint.

The Orange County Breakers ended the 2021 World Team Tennis season playing some of their best tennis, and the King Trophy was their ultimate reward.

The Breakers beat the Springfield Lasers 21-13 in the league's championship match Sunday afternoon at Indian Wells Tennis Garden.

Steve Johnson, the former Orange High and USC men's tennis standout who has become a veteran on both the professional tour and in World Team Tennis for the Breakers, earned league MVP honors.

It's the third league title for the Breakers, who also won titles in 2004 and 2017. The Breakers usually play their home matches at Palisades Tennis Club in Newport Beach, but all of the five-team league's matches were played at a single site for the second straight year due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The Breakers (9-4), who had lost two of three regular season matches to the Lasers (8-5), came up big when it mattered the most.

"To be honest with you, it was a little unexpected, the way we turned the season around," Breakers coach Rick Leach said in a phone interview.

"I think we really didn't reach our peak until the end. We started playing our best tennis the last couple of matches."

Austin Krajicek, Tatjana Maria and Desirae Krawczyk were the other players who contributed Sunday for the Breakers, owned by Laguna Beach resident Eric Davidson.

Johnson and Leach were also part of the 2017 championship squad.

Leach said that though Saturday's regular season-ending 23-14 win over Springfield didn't matter as both teams had already clinched a finals berth, it gave Orange County some confidence.

"Everybody on the team played well at the same time, and that's what it takes in Team Tennis," Leach said. "We reached our potential. It was amazing to see how well everybody played."

Johnson and Maria got Orange County off to a great start in the finals, in men's singles and women's singles, respectively.

Johnson topped Springfield's Denis Kudla 5-2, before Maria got past Asia Muhammad 5-2.

After Johnson and Krajicek beat Springfield's Kudla and Marcelo Arevalo 5-1 in men's doubles, the Breakers had a commanding 15-5 halftime lead.

"Stevie was just unbelievable this year in both sin-

gles and doubles," said Breakers general manager Allen Hardison, also the league's chief operating officer, in a phone interview.

"It's the best I think I've probably seen him play since he was playing the Olympics in 2016 and the top-ranked American. He brought his 'A' game. He was focused, definitely the leader of the team."

Springfield's Arevalo and Giuliana Olmos defeated Krajicek and Krawczyk 5-1 in mixed doubles, but the Breakers finished strong in women's doubles. Maria and Krawczyk earned a 5-3 victory over Muhammad and Olmos.

Johnson joked around with his team during the post-match trophy ceremony.

"I wish I could say my team helped me, but I was the MVP," he said facetiously as his teammates laughed. "It's all on me, quite frankly, no thanks to 'Des' tonight. She didn't think I'd actually say it, but I did."

"In all seriousness, what

a great event. This is my seventh year of World Team Tennis, all of them playing for Orange County. I've loved every minute of it."

All kidding aside, Orange County was able to come out on top. This year's Breakers also featured Amanda Anisimova — who spent much of the season as the team's women's singles player — and Nate Lammons.

"Rick did a phenomenal job of making sure the team was invested," Hardison said. "I think we did a great job of finding four or five players that really bought in. They just really enjoyed playing together ... it's super-exciting to get back on top here in 2021."

As for when the team might play another match back in Orange County, that remains to be seen. The Breakers haven't done so since the summer of 2019, months before the pandemic begins.

The league played its 2020 matches at The Greenbrier in West Virginia. "It was another phenomenal season," Hardison

said. "We appreciate all the fans that came out, and the sponsorship was good. I think definitely something that we're lacking right now at this neutral site that we've done the past two years is that home field, that home crowd environment, if you will."

"I don't know what the format is going to be moving forward ... with COVID, and the impact that it's going to have on the travel and the player safety portion of it. But we've definitely got to figure out a way to have some more rooting interests."

"We know we came into league, and we didn't do as good as we expected, but that was just that," Henjum said.

"That was over. The second we got the invite to the playoffs, we knew it was a new season, that we were the best team in this division, and we just proved that."

The Sailors defense made a goal-line stand with the score tied at 28-28 in the third quarter. Nathan Peters and Trace Werner were among those in pursuit of Valencia on the fourth-down run.

"We feed off each other," Peters said. "When the offense is working, the defense feeds off it, and when the defense is working, the offense feeds off that."
