## Activists from H.B. were at Capitol siege

Kristopher Dreww and Michelle Peterson each posted videos on social media that have since been deleted.

At least two Huntington Beach far-right activists were at the U.S. Capitol building last week when it was stormed by a pro-President Donald Trump mob protesting the election results.

Kristopher Dreww and Michelle Peterson each posted since-deleted videos on their social media on Jan. 6, the day that the Trump supporters stormed the U.S. Capitol building, delaying the counting of electoral votes and certification of the election in favor of President-elect Joe Biden.

Huntington Beach Police Department interim Chief Julian Harvey on Monday said the police are aware of the two activists and would help the FBI with information if necessary.

Orange County Dist. Atty. Todd Spitzer said in a statement that his office would be assisting in federal and state efforts to hold rioters accountable.

## 2 arrested after 333 pounds of meth seized off H.B. coast

The United States Coast Guard, U.S. Customs and Border Protection and U.S. Border Patrol worked jointly to intercept a vessel that contained 333 pounds of methamphetamine Monday off the coast of Huntington Beach, officials said.

The vessel had departed from Mexico and headed for the U.S., according to a news release. Officials said two male Mexican nationals on board were arrested and turned over to Homeland Security Investigations.

The vessel was inspected at the U.S. Coast Guard station in Long Beach after being interdicted by a Coast Guard cutter at about 7:30 a.m. Monday, the release said. A field test confirmed that the substance was methamphetamine.

According to the U.S. Border Patrol officers, the methamphetamine on board had an estimated street value of \$915,750.

The U.S. attorney's office in the Central District of California has accepted the case for federal prosecution, the release said.

## Sole-ful passion to help

Jessie Rose, who has starred as a cross-country runner and water polo player at Laguna Beach High School, is holding her third shoe drive through Soles4Souls.

Jessie Rose was in elementary school when she became familiar with a cause to participate in to fulfill her community service hours.

Her family lived in Colorado at the time when her mother, Kathy, had a chance encounter with a student at a gym. Kathy, a fitness instructor, saw that the student had a brochure for Soles4Souls.

Kathy got involved with the nonprofit organization, which collects new and gently used shoes and redistributes them to people in need, by holding a shoe

drive and asking school parents to donate their old shoes.

She estimates that she got started with Soles4Souls about eight years ago, before the family moved to Laguna Beach.

Back then, her daughter's involvement in the process amounted to helping with packing the shoes into boxes, but there was hope that the message of good deeds would catch on.

"You kind of try to build a story, and you hope that they're listening to that kind of thing," Kathy said of imparting the importance of helping others to her children. She said she would speculate

about where the shoes would go to assist those in need.

When it came time to do her community service hours, it was a no-brainer for Jessie how she wanted to complete them.

A multi-sport standout in cross-country and water polo at Laguna Beach High School, Jessie held her first shoe drive through Soles4Souls in her sophomore year.

Over the past two years, she said that she has been able to collect more than 1,000 pairs of shoes.

## Vaccination center to open at Disneyland this week

The period leading up to the development and distribution of the coronavirus vaccines was often referred to as the sprint toward the vaccine.

California and public health officials are now racing to make sure that vaccine doses are taken out of the freezer and administered to prioritized populations.

Gov. Gavin Newsom said that Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles would be among a short list of mass vaccination centers opening this week. The home of the San Diego Padres, Petco Park, is also among the large-scale vaccination sites.

"We want to get out vaccine as quickly as we can in California, starting with those who are going to be in charge of vaccinating the rest of us, making sure that they're protected and safe on the front lines of the surge, on the front lines of the vaccine sites, on the front lines of the testing centers, but then also that key focus on really driven by equity," California Health and Human Services Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly said.

Disneyland is also set to become a mass vaccination site this week, the first such location in Orange County. The county Board of Supervisors made the announcement on Monday.

The county also expanded the group of people eligible to be vaccinated against the virus to include residents of at least 65 years of age on Tuesday.

The list of those approved to administer the vaccine now includes dentists and pharmacy technicians.

Newsom added that the focus is on vaccinating the vaccinators and "making sure we're taking care of our most vulnerable and congregate facilities remains our top priority. We're not abandoning equity. We're not abandoning

exposure. We're not abandoning the issue of risk. We're not abandoning the issue of age."

The arrival of the vaccine has offered renewed hope, including for the University of California system, which announced on Monday that it plans to have students back on its 10 campuses, including UC Irvine, for mostly in-person classes for the fall 2021 term.

"As the University continues to monitor the evolution of the pandemic, we are also carefully planning a safe return to in-person

## H.B. city attorney's Twitter account cleaned

Michael Gates, who's come under fire for his social media activity, doesn't know if it was deleted or hacked.

Days after social media giant Twitter deleted tweets from President Donald Trump and suspended his @realDonaldTrump account following the riot at the U.S. Capitol, one Orange County elected official awoke on Monday to find his own page had been deleted.

Huntington Beach City Atty. Michael Gates took to Facebook to explain his bewilderment at reportedly having his Twitter account wiped clean earlier that day.

"I guess Twitter did me a favor," Gates wrote on his personal Facebook page, which is public. "It wiped my account of all posts — even though I rarely tweet. Sad state of society we live in. Sad."

A personal social media account the 45-year-old Huntington Beach resident said he uses only a few times a month was suddenly bare, save for a profile picture and a prompt inviting him to leave a first tweet.

"Six or seven years of activity was completely gone," Gates said Tuesday. "There was no warning, no notifications, nothing."

The city attorney said he hadn't recently posted anything inflammatory that would have justified an account deletion but had heard social media companies have been cleaning up accounts that convey controversial information.

"I never suspected mine would have gotten scrubbed. I've never posted anything controversial that I know of," he said.

Twitter's administrators on Friday announced Trump's account had been permanently suspended following a Jan. 6 riot in Washington, D.C., claiming the president violated a glorification of violence policy. Five people were killed at the

classes," UC President Michael V. Drake said in a statement. "Current forecasts give us hope that in the fall our students can enjoy a more normal on-campus experience."

Orange County reported 28 deaths due to COVID-19, the disease caused by the virus, in data provided Tuesday by the Orange County Health Care Agency.

The healthcare agency also reported 3,824 additional infections, bringing the total number

# Huntington Beach council meetings to go virtual

The Huntington Beach City Council will be moving to virtual meetings starting next week, the city announced Monday.

The move out of the council chambers is made in keeping with Gov. Gavin Newsom's mandate to limit in-person gatherings that can spread COVID-19, according to a release.

Orange County is currently experiencing a surge in cases and a shortage of intensive care unit beds, which has led many local school districts to return to distance learning.

Adjusted ICU bed capacity in Orange County currently sits at 0%, and the Orange County Health

Care Agency reported a single-day record 50 deaths due to COVID-19 on Sunday.

"The health and safety of our residents is our highest priority, and on-line council meetings are

just one of several steps we're taking to protect our community during this pandemic," Huntington Beach Mayor Kim Carr said in a statement.

"During this historic surge, we can't afford to disregard public health guidelines that can save lives and restore our local economy, and we plan to do our part."

Switching to virtual meetings should also relieve some of the tension on the current City Council regarding mask usage.

Mayor Pro Tem Tito Ortiz, who has declined to wear a mask during the pandemic, attended last week's strategic planning meeting from the parking lot of the Huntington

Beach Central Library after Carr told him he couldn't come into the meeting without one.

City Councilman Dan Kalmick also chided Ortiz and Councilman Erik Peterson for not wearing masks on the dais during the last regular City Council meeting on Dec. 21.

Kalmick said Tuesday that he's glad that Carr made the switch to virtual meetings, joining nearby cities like Costa Mesa, Irvine and Seal Beach.

"We're one of the few cities that's still meeting in person, and there's really no reason to meet in person if we have the technological means to do so," he said.

"I'm happy that we're

moving to remote, especially as hospital beds are few and far between. Anything we can do to help move that needle in a good direction and make sure that we don't get any staff sick, or endanger anybody else that would want to come to a meeting."

The next City Council meeting is Tuesday at 6 p.m., as Monday is a Martin Luther King Jr. Day, a federal holiday.

The public will still be able to watch the meetings on the city's website or HDTV Channel 3, and public comments will be allowed via Zoom.

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# UCI receives \$10.4-million donation for art history, computer center

UC Irvine announced Tuesday that it received a \$10.4-million gift from the Steckler Charitable Fund to be put toward art history students and establishing a center to make computing inclusive.

About \$5 million will be donated to the Center for Responsible, Ethical and Accessible Technologies in the Donald Bren School of Information & Computer Sciences. The remaining almost \$5.4 million will be allocated to endowed funds for the support of graduate and undergraduate students studying art history.

About 20% of the \$10.4-million gift is earmarked for graduate fellowships. That will be matched

for the first 10 years by the university's graduate division, university officials said.

Vincent Steckler — who formed the Steckler Charitable Fund with his wife, Amanda, and an alumnus of the university's class of 1980 — said in a statement that the center could "dramatically change some of the toxic tendencies within Silicon Valley."

"And if we change the way Silicon Valley operates, we can change the world," said Steckler, who graduated from UCI with a bachelor's of science in information and computer science and in mathematics. "At the same time, art is a crucial part of the human experience."

About \$2 million of the

funds allocated for the Donald Bren School of Information & Computer Sciences will go toward establishing a faculty chair who will be the first director for the Center for Responsible, Ethical and Accessible Technologies. The remainder of the gift will be finance endowments for activities and a graduate fellowship program. It will also pay for operations for four years.

This is not the first donation that the Stecklers have made to UCI, university officials said.

The Steckler Charitable Fund donated to UCI's art history department last year and helped finance paid internship opportunities and a student field trip to see artwork embedded in the environment. The infor-

mation and computer sciences school also received \$1 million from Steckler to

support women in computing. That gift created an en-

dowed fellowship for graduate students and an endowed scholarship for undergraduates that receives permanent matching funds, university officials said.

"I wouldn't be where I am today if it weren't for UCI, and I'm excited to leverage the funding match for the graduate fellowships because it offers such a high return on investment," Steckler said.

Amanda added in a statement, "I believe it's our responsibility to give back to the society and institutions that have helped us over the years. I am proud to recognize the importance of art and computer education to society."

of coronavirus cases countywide to 195,685. The county has also experienced a death toll of 2,148 during the pandemic.

Area hospitals are currently treating 2,200 cases of the virus, with 535 of those patients being cared for in intensive care units.

The county reported

16,401 tests for the virus within the last day, which takes the total number of tests administered to 2,300,064. The healthcare agency estimates that 121,434 people in the county have made a recovery after contracting the virus.

Concerning the county's virus transmission rates, Orange County has seven-day averages of 78.8 daily new cases per 100,000 resi-

dents and a testing positivity rate of 19.5%. Those statistics are being kept with a seven-day lag.

He encouraged members of the public to provide tips and information to [fbi.gov/USCapitol](http://fbi.gov/USCapitol).

Dreww, a stylist who owns Hair by Kristopher Dreww and calls himself the "Adorable Deplorable" online, posted a video to his YouTube page from his hotel room in Washington, D.C., on Jan. 6 that he had "just got back from storming the Capitol." It has since gone viral.

"We stormed it," he said in the deleted video, while denying claims that left-wing group Antifa was responsible for the attack.

"It was successful ... it was us. We proudly took back our Capitol ... We had the National Guard out for us and we had the [expletive] cops running ... because they're smart. We have had enough."

In another since-deleted video, Dreww stated that "We went there to attack people, and for once, I'm not ashamed of that ... That's what we want to do, that's what we're doing, and we will continue to attack people. What are you going to do to save your freedom?"

Dreww could not be reached for comment Monday. His cellphone number has been taken out of service, according to a record-

ing.

Since posting the deleted videos, he has said that he never actually went into the Capitol building on that day. In a question-and-answer video recorded Thursday, he said his previous videos had been misconstrued.

"I filmed a lot of the situation, which I'm not posting, but I will if I have to," Dreww said.

"It proves I was not in the building. To me, when I said storm the Capitol, I meant getting past the barriers that were set up against us ... We could stand on the lawn that we paid for, stand on those steps, and say, 'We're here.' That's what I thought we were doing, that's what I thought we did and that's what I thought it was all about."

Dreww told online personality Hogatha in a video released Sunday that he fought his way through the crowd for about an hour

before giving up and sitting on the lawn.

"I met this really awesome teacher, this really awesome nurse," he said. "One of them was from the left, one was a Democrat, and we sat there and made sandwiches, literally."

Ocean View School District Trustee Gina Clayton-Tarvin saved the deleted videos and said Monday that she has contacted the FBI about them.

Clayton-Tarvin said that Dreww, who lives in the Ocean View School District she serves, has been vocal in his opposition of her since 2019.

"He just kind of came out of nowhere and started attacking me online," Clayton-Tarvin said. "He was angry about Shayna Lathus, and he put out videos about me and her, these unhinged, ranting videos ... He started just harassing me nonstop, saying that I'm a member of Antifa, that Shayna is a member of Antifa."

Lathus was removed from the Huntington Beach Citizens Participation Advisory Board by now-Mayor Kim Carr in 2019, after she was photographed near members of Antifa during a rally in Huntington Beach.


Lathus said at the time that she was not engaging with Antifa and was there to support immigrants' rights.

Peterson's since-deleted video, which she posted to Facebook, was saved by Vern Nelson of political blog The Orange Juice Blog. The video appears to show protesters on the steps of the Capitol before entering the building.

Peterson, who has been vocal in her efforts to recall Gov. Gavin Newsom, took down her Facebook account before activating it again.

She refrained from comment when reached via phone on Monday.

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



# Did the definition of 'adverb' slip past renowned spy novelist?

David John Moore Cornwell, better known by his pen name John Le Carre, passed away in December.

The author of "Tinker, Tailor, Soldier, Spy" and "The Spy Who Came In From the Cold" leaves behind a legacy of treasures not just for readers but for any writer who would learn from a master.

Take, for example, this expert bit of writing wisdom attributed to Le Carre: "I don't use adjectives if I can possibly get away with it. I don't use adverbs. I try to make the verb do the work."

As someone who spends her days fixing bad writing, I can tell you there's gold in those words, especially the part about adverbs.

Novice writers use adverbs hoping they'll strengthen their writing, but their efforts usually boomerang. For example, which has greater impact? "The spy brutally and cruelly totally gunned down the traitor" or "The spy gunned down the traitor"?

Adverbs often weaken the information you're trying to strengthen. So whenever you notice one in your writing, try taking it out. If the passage is better, leave it out. If not, put it back in. Make this a habit and you'll become a better writer. Guaranteed.

But despite Le Carre's obvious wisdom, there's a problem with his advice: Le Carre, it seems, didn't know what adverbs are. Turns out he used them all the time. Take, for example, this sentence from "Tinker, Tailor, Soldier, Spy": "Yesterday, Jim had amazed Latzy."

Another: "The fire was quite dead."

Another: "With time, Jim seemed to respond to treat-

ment, however."

Another: "He dropped 'Bill' and called him 'Jumbo' instead."

Another: "He heard what sounded like a single note played on a flute: it came from a car, most likely, braking in the street outside."

If you don't see the adverbs, don't feel bad. Most of us are never taught that "yesterday," "quite," "however," "instead" and "outside" are adverbs.

Adverbs aren't just words that end in "ly," like "quickly." And they're not just words that modify actions, like "fast." Adverbs are a much broader word category of which "manner adverbs" — those that modify actions — are just a subset.

In the broader sense, adverbs have several jobs. They modify actions. These types are sometimes called manner adverbs. Others serve as connective tissue between sentences, like "however" and "therefore." Others answer the questions where? or when? That's why both "yesterday" and "outside" are adverbs.

This isn't just analysis or some overstretched interpretation of word categories. This is the dictionary talking. Look up all those words and you'll see that they're categorized as ad-

verbs depending on the job they're doing.

In "Yesterday, Jim amazed Latzy," the word "yesterday" is answering the question when? That makes it an adverb. But it can be a noun, too, for example when it functions as the subject of a verb: "Yesterday was rough." "Outside" usually answers the question where? In those cases it's an adverb: Put it outside. But it can do other jobs, too. For example, it can function adjectivally by modifying the noun "chance" in: "There's an outside chance we'll get rain."

So even if he never used an "ly" adverb (which we know he did from the word "possibly" in the above quotation), Le Carre used adverbs all the time. Like every English speaker, he had no choice.

Obviously, I'm busting him on a technicality. It's clear that when he said he didn't use adverbs he meant he avoided words like "cruelly" and "totally" and "hurriedly" — manner adverbs — whenever possible. That's good advice.

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riot, while a Capitol police officer later committed suicide.

They cited two tweets that day, in which Trump said rioters "will have a GIANT VOICE long into the future" and clarified he would not attend Biden's Jan. 20 inauguration ceremony.

"Our determination is that the two tweets above are likely to inspire others to replicate the violent acts that took place on Jan. 6, 2021, and that there are multiple indicators that they are being received and understood as encouragement to do so," they wrote.

While it is still unknown whether Twitter administrators may have deleted Gates' account, at least one user shared a series of messages the city attorney had posted on Nov. 12 regarding the U.S. presidential election results.

A verbatim posting still visible on Gates' Facebook page references claims made that same day by Trump via Twitter that bal-

lot-counting software operated by Dominion Voting Systems had changed votes in President-elect Joe Biden's favor. A second widely shared theory alleges a deep-state supercomputer, referred to as "Hammer," also skewed results.

The two ideas have been roundly debunked by fact-checking groups and have not been upheld by any court ruling.

Gates — a member of the Orange County Republican Party and the Huntington Beach Republican Assembly — briefly referenced the theories in his own post.

"Almost any [unknown] plaintiff can run to any federal district court and have an injunction [court order] issued within 24 hours against the President to put an immediate stop to a border policy or travel ban for suspect nations ... but the President of the United States isn't running to any federal district court of his choice for a Writ of Mandamus or Injunction to order all States to audit and hand recount the ballots without the Hammer and Dominion software to verify that the count was accurate,

or identify inaccuracies?" Gates wrote.

"Affidavits and computer forensics already show that software had problems — that's the evidence for the court. Court order for recount without the software — Simple fix. Where are these lawsuits? Software counting problems shouldn't be allowed — in any State. Voting is a civil right. The Government's primary function is to protect our rights — get the count right!"

Gates clarified Tuesday he was simply questioning why the Trump campaign had not sought a judicial ruling calling for an audit and by-hand recount of ballots. Though he stands behind his comment, he acknowledged he's drawn social media criticism before.

A post in June depicting Archangel Michael and asking followers to pray for the Huntington Beach businesses and police officers during the Black Lives Matter protests drew criticism. A practicing Catholic, Gates remained unfazed.

"If people want to be critical, they can be critical," he said. "I will continue to live

my life as I choose and express myself. I certainly don't think it would be right for others to shut down my free speech."

Although private social media companies have the right to impose their own community standards and terms of use, some free speech advocates expressed concern about the implications mass account deletions could have on the free exchange of ideas.

"There's been a kind of widening circle of activity by social media giants to disable expression," said David Snyder, executive director of the First Amendment Coalition, a San Francisco Bay Area nonprofit advocacy group. "They wield extraordinary power over the political discussion in this country. [And] the widening scope of the deletion of accounts is cause for concern."

Politicians, Snyder continued, are entitled to share sometimes controversial views in public with the understanding that consequences, good or bad, may be meted out at the ballot box. That some recent officeholders have fanned the flames of controversy and won their elections may be creating a model for others, he added.

Gates, who said he's historically enjoyed support in the Huntington Beach community, has not contacted Twitter to learn whether his account may have been deleted or hacked. Either way, he said, it doesn't matter.

"I don't know why I am the object of such scrutiny," he said. "I'm not the president of the United States or some high office — I'm just a city attorney. [But] I stand by what I've posted."
