Surf City faces airshow lawsuit

OVSD board's vice president calls for city attorney to share details of settlement with Pacific Airshow operator.

Ocean View School District Board of Trustees vice president Gina Clayton-Tarvin is suing to try to get Huntington Beach to release the full settlement with Pacific Airshow operator Code Four.

Clayton-Tarvin filed a lawsuit in Orange County Superior Court on June 7, demanding that City Atty. Michael Gates release the full settlement.

'That settlement document is a public document," Clayton-Tarvin said in an interview Monday. "There is no ifs, ands or buts about it. When you settle with a party and you go out and announce to the public that we've saved the airshow and we have come to an amazing settlement ... you can't then walk it back. California law stipulates that documents that are held by gov-ernment entities should, as practice, be released to the public. That's in the best interests of the public."

Gates announced the settlement last month, on the same day as a press conference at Pier Plaza

Newport attorney admits to scheme

Sara King pleads guilty to fraud and money laundering, convincing investors in 2022 to hand over about \$8M.

A Newport Beach attorney admitted in court documents filed Monday that she lied about providing loans to professional athletes and celebrities in order to get investors to hand over millions of dollars and then used that money to fund a lavish lifestyle and gambling spree in Las Vegas.

Sara Jacqueline King agreed to plead guilty to felony counts of wire fraud and money laundering in a deal signed with federal prosecutors on June 12.

King told investors their money was secured by jewelry, antique

Salute to veterans takes note of dark statistics

Anne Dunsmore knows the statistics, and they're staggering. Suicide is the leading cause of death in the United States militarv. And about one veteran an hour dies via suicide.

"Since 9/11, more than 30,000 veterans have died by suicide, compared to 7,000 in combat," Dunsmore said. "That's a big ratio and an unnecessary one. One is not OK."

Dunsmore is the founder and president of Angel Force USA, a nonprofit whose mission to raise awareness about veteran suicides and stop what it calls "suisilence" — the avoidance of discussion about suicide.

Angel Force USA and the city

of Huntington Beach co-hosted the inaugural Surf City Salute to the Flag and Women Veterans on Sunday at Pier Plaza.

The event also served as a welcome home tribute to Vietnam War veterans. This year marks the 50th anniversary of the end of the United States' involvement in the war, which claimed the lives of more than 58,000 U.S. military members.

Angel Force USA has encouraged supporters to wear a red Tshirt on Fridays, to observe Remember Everyone Deployed

We want to show not only the Vietnam veterans but future generations that we as Ameri-

O.C. will observe June as LGBTQ+ Pride Month

The decision was made one week after voting to ban the Pride flag from flying on county property.

One week after Orange County Supervisors effectively voted not to allow the Pride flag to fly over county-owned properties, an effort Tuesday to mark June as LGBTQ+ Pride Month ran a similar gauntlet but passed.

A 3-2 vote delivered during a June 6 meeting determined only U.S., state and county flags, along with the POW/MIA flag, would be

allowed to fly at the civic center and on county lands, including parks and libraries.

Backers of the move claimed the rainbow standard, embraced in the LGBTQ+ community as a symbol of inclusion, was divisive and not representative of the en-

tire Orange County constituency. "Today, flags in general have become symbols that invite con-

announcing that the airshow would be returning to Huntington Beach from Sept. 29 through Oct. 1 this year.

Per an executive summary provided by Gates, Huntington Beach will be paying Code Four at least \$5.4 million, as well as up to \$2 million that the city recovers in its ongoing lawsuit against Amplify Energy Corp.

Code Four chief executive Kevin Elliott had sued the city and former Mayor Kim Carr last October, claiming the decision to cancel the final day of the Pacific Airshow in 2021 after a massive oil spill cost the company millions of dol-

Clayton-Tarvin filed a California Public Records Act request for the full settlement with Gates on May 11. Six days later, she received an email back from city senior legal assistant Christina Kelemen denying the request.

The three reasons given why it was denied were the attorney-client exemption, pending litigation to which the city is party and a claim that the public interest in maintaining confidentiality outweighs the public interest in disclosing.

That answer did not satisfy Clayton-Tarvin, a Huntington Beach resident who finished fifth in the City Council race last fall. Her lawsuit argues there can't be an "attorney client" exemption because the settlement agreement is not an attorney-client communication, and also because an agreement signed with a third party can't be covered by attorney-client privilege.

"[Gates] has to be responsible and answer to the people who pay his salary, the taxpayers," she said. "He has to show us the agreements he is making behind closed doors. If you want to represent the people, you will answer to the people ... This entire settlement reeks of impropriety. We know the facts. The facts are that Mr. Gates and Mr. Elliott do business with each other, they are friends,

they have enriched each other."

Gates said he had yet to be served with Clayton-Tarvin's lawsuit as of Monday night.

He did not deny he was friends with Elliott, who supported Gates and the four conservative City Council candidates — Tony Strickland, Gracey Van Der Mark, Casey McKeon and Pat Burns — who all ended up getting elected last fall.

Code Four helped organize a "victory rally" for the candidates held on Oct. 28, 2022, days before the election. But Gates said that there was nothing improper with the settlement, calling the notion "pretty silly" in a phone interview Monday.

"That's a common refrain by people who want to cast baseless accusations, and it seems to be used conveniently at times, right?" Gates said. "If there's some basis to allege wrongdoing, then say it. What is it? As far as I know, people can be friends and still have disputes, and legitimately and honestly work through disputes. What I can tell you is that negotiations in this case were done at arm's length. They were very difficult negotiations that consumed a lot of time, and there was a lot of back and forth. If there was a cozy relationship, then the negotiations wouldn't have been as diffi-

cult as they were." Gates said that Huntington Beach is still a named defendant in the airshow lawsuit; former Mayor Kim Carr, who was also sued, has yet to have her day in court. Additionally,

city's lawsuit against Amplify is also still pending.

Citing those cases, he said he couldn't get into specific reasons why he couldn't release the full settlement.

"This was handled just like any other lawsuit or settlement," he said. "It's kind of a weird situation to have people insisting we disclose the full settlement when we have pending litigation. That's what the state law contemplates when it says we don't have to disclose. We're not compelled to disclose it ... I'm pretty confident about our reading of state law and our requirements under state law. If the judge disagrees with me and orders disclosure, then I'll abide by that, obvi-

ously." City Councilman Dan Kalmick agreed with Clayton-Tarvin that the settlement agreement is a public record and should be released as such. He added that he believed the city had limited exposure to the lawsuit, calling it "a bad Huntington deal" for Beach.

For the nearly \$8 million this settlement cost the city, the city should have put out a request for bids instead of just handing over taxpayer dollars behind closed doors," Kalmick said. "The residents and taxpayers deserve to know what this council majority agreed to in secret ... the entirety of the deal should be made public and as soon as possible."

CALIFORNIA The State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) is seeking written public comments on the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board's (Santa Ana Water Board) amendment to the Water Quality Control Plan for the Santa Ana River Basin to incorporate Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) for copper in Newport Bay (Copper TMDLs).

The largest source of copper to Newport Bay is discharges from copper antifouling paints (AFPs) on boats. Both Upper and Lower Newport Bay exceed the water quality standards for dissolved copper in salt water. The Copper TMDLs would require a 60% reduction in copper discharges from copper AFPs on boats, and the implementation plan includes recommended strategies to reduce discharges from boats in Newport Bay within 12 years. Parties responsible for implementing the proposed Copper TMDLs include the City of Newport Beach, County of Orange, marina owners/operators, underwater hull cleaners, and private and commercial boat owners/operators.

The Santa Ana Water Board approved the Copper TMDLs through Resolution R8-2022-0012 on December 2, 2022. The Copper TMDLs also require approval by the State Water Board. troversy and division within our community," said Vice Chair Andrew Do, who put forth the proposal.

However, after a heated debate Tuesday over the merits and interpretations of declaring a monthlong observance, which culminated in a shouting match between two supervisors, the panel unanimously voted in favor of drafting a resolution supporting the designation.

The vote on the proposal put forth by Supervisors Katrina Foley and Vicente Sarmiento marks the first time Orange County has ever added LGBTQ+ Pride Month as an official countyrecognized occasion.

Cities have made independent decisions about Pride Month and its associated flag, including Huntington Beach, which, earlier this year, voted not to fly the flag over city-owned property for a second year. The city of Newport Beach does not officially observe Pride Month.

By contrast, Laguna Beach has recognized the designation since 2017 and still flies the rainbow flag outside City Hall. Costa Mesa began the practice in 2019, with its City Council members refreshing the resolution on June 6.

Residents speaking in public comments before the Supervisors on Tuesday differed in their views. Kylie Jones, a UC Irvine student, expressed her disappointment in last week's flag decision and supported the resolution.

"At a time in which civil rights for sorely marginalized communities, especially those in the LGBTQ+ community, are being attacked nationwide, you all

now have a chance to show up for your community members," she said. "I urge you all to make the right decision."

Others opposed to the resolution leaned on the Bible, excoriating pride as a sin, accusing the LGBTQ+ community of lewd behavior and indoctrinating children.

"I'm really feeling a 'virtue signal' from all these months. It's becoming a very big distraction, and it's not what you're here to do," one female speaker told the supervisors. "You should go back to focusing on governmental and fiduciary responsibilities and not become a cultural poster board."

The three supervisors who voted on the flag restriction last week - conservatives Do and Chair Don Wagner, along with Doug Chaffee, a Democrat explained the difference between recognizing Pride Month and allowing pride flags to be flown on government property.

"At our last go-around, we decided that only the American flag, the county flag, the state flag and the POW/Missing in Action flag would be flown on our flagpoles. That was the right decision, and I make no apology for that," Chaffee

"I think it's appropriate, however, to recognize Pride Month in Orange County," he continued. "Because there are some things the LGBTQ+ community has done that are contributing to our society. Certainly, they are a part of our fabric, and the diversity they represent is important."

Do made a distinction between recognizing the contributions of a group in the wider community and condoning every action made under the mantle of

that group.

"Every symbol has its extremists, has people who, under that symbol, abuse [it] to further their own agenda," he said. "The Pride community has been hijacked by a few with a political agenda. But Pride Month itself is a different thing. It's showing acceptance and tolerance, and I support that."

Sarmiento who, along with Supervisor Katrina Foley, requested the flying of Pride flags be put to a vote at the June 6 meeting but were blocked after the proposal was filed 15 minutes too late, said declaring Pride Month is a gesture of solidarity with people who live in Orange County.

"There is nothing more important than to make sure we embrace people who come from different backgrounds here — we've done it for many communities," he said. "It's not meant to supersede anything else."

Foley cited figures from the O.C. Human Relations Council indicating while hate crimes declined 13% countywide, reported hate crimes upon the LGBTQ+ community rose 83%.

"It is a matter of personal safety that we bring this item forward," she added.

Prior to the vote, Foley and Wagner engaged in a heated discussion over what happened on June 6 and the too-late filing of the Pride flag proposal.

Foley accused the chairman of possibly colluding with Do's office to preempt the move with the flag restriction vote, while he accused her of using her time to spread lies. Ültimatelv. Foley made a motion to call the vote, ending the dispute.
