# **Edison Park Skate Spot open for business in Huntington Beach**

Charlie Molinari sat in the shade with his skateboard, enjoying the moment.

The city of Huntington Beach officially opened the Edison Park Skate Spot on Thursday morning. Moments after Mayor Kim Carr made her remarks and the red ribbon was cut, Charlie was one of many skateboarders to break in the new park.

"I've been waiting for this my whole life," said Charlie, 15, an incoming sophomore at Edison High School. "I'm so stoked. This is awesome. It's a nice place to get out and interact with your friends, get out of the house. I feel like it introduces more skaters to start skating and see how fun it is."

The Edison Park Skate Spot is a bit basic, with no bowls or ramps. But it's also temporary, said Chris Slama, Huntington Beach's di-

# Officials to give vaccines a shot at the fair

County healthcare workers will dispense free inoculations against coronavirus each of the remaining days.

At the O.C. Fair, it's time for fun — and COVID-19 vaccinations.

With just 58% of Orange County residents having been fully inoculated against the coronavirus as of Thursday, health officials are seeking new ways to reach the vaccine hesitant and resistant, including hosting a vaccine clinic at the popular annual festival.

Starting this week, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. every Wednesday through Sunday until the fair ends Aug. 15, the Orange County Health Care Agency will offer free vaccinations on a walk-in basis inside the fairground's Costa Mesa Building.

OC Fair & Event Center Executive Director Michele Richards said throughout the pandemic, the site has held food distributions, COVID-19 testing and, for a time, served as one of five countyrun vaccination super PODs (points of dispensing). So, it just made sense to volun-

So, it just made sense to volunteer some prime fair real estate to the cause.

"We've been with people since the very beginning on the forefront of the fight against COVID-19," Richards said Thursday. "We're thrilled we can continue that effort with the vaccine clinic."

Staffed by a handful of healthcare workers, the small set-up will be able to dispense up to 100 doses of either the Pfizer or Johnson & Johnson vaccine each day, with the capability of ramping up to more if the demand is there. "The partnership with the OC Fair & Event Center allows us an opportunity to make sure that people are aware that vaccine clinics are available at various locations throughout the county seven days a week," Anza Vang, OCHA's chief of strategy and development, said by email Thursday.

Slama said the city is in the middle of a total redesign of Edison Park, and is engaging in community outreach for feedback. Reno-

# Laguna to launch rideshare service in fall

Laguna Beach plans to launch a new on-demand neighborhood transportation program for the Arch Beach Heights, Bluebird Canyon and Top of the World communities in the fall.

The Laguna Beach City Council directed city staff to implement the pilot program, which will take the place of a fixedroute, hourly trolley service that had served those neighborhoods in the past.

Prior to the shutdown of the

city's public transportation fleet due to the coronavirus pandemic, city staff had been fielding community input for why the neighborhood trolley service was not being put to greater use.

Along all three neighborhood routes, the trolleys were seeing less than 10 boardings per hour.

"It wasn't a lack of marketing, it wasn't that people didn't know that there was a trolley that served the neighborhoods," Deputy Director of Public Works Michael Litschi said.

"It was that for one reason or

another, the service and the service design did not work for them, so we heard from residents that they wanted more frequent service, more reliable service, and service that operated extended hours later into the evening, so that they could go from the residential neighborhoods to downtown and back again."

Hours of operation for the free on-demand neighborhood service will be 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Friday, and from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Sat-

• urday.

The council opted not to have the neighborhood rideshare service run on Sundays initially.

The intention of the program is to bring residents of the associated neighborhoods to the downtown area. If a passenger of the on-demand service wishes to get to a destination farther north or south within the city, they will be able to hop on a trolley along the Coastal Route.

The on-demand rideshare

"People are gathering and we want to be where they are to provide them with information about how to protect themselves."

In addition to opening the small on-site vaccine clinic, Richards said fair officials offered 750 free tickets to HCA to distribute as incentives to attract residents to clinics outside the fairgrounds.

Those tickets are now being offered on certain days at a clinic at Huntington Beach's Golden West College, one of 30 clinics weekly

## Alta Laguna Park tennis court to be converted for pickleball

## The Laguna Beach City Council voted to expand the city's capacity for the sport at Tuesday's meeting.

After calls from pickleball players to have the growth of the sport in the community recognized, the city of Laguna Beach will increase the number of courts on which the paddle sport can be played.

The Laguna Beach City Council unanimously approved a plan to have one of six tennis courts at Alta Laguna Park converted into permanent pickleball courts.

There could be two or three pickleball courts produced from the repurposed tennis court, depending on the configuration.

"It really is in response to an overwhelming number of requests we've been receiving from local residents looking for additional pickleball capacity in the city because it is a very fastgrowing sport, and it has a lot of residents who are participating in it," Deputy Director of Public Works Michael Litschi said in introducing the item at Tuesday's council meeting.

There will be \$17,000 set aside from the Park in Lieu fund to cover the costs of converting the Alta Laguna courts.

The recommendation to expand pickleball capacity in Laguna Beach came via a vote of the city's recreation committee on July 12.

Pickleball play is currently allowed at Lang Park from 8 a.m. to noon on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, as well as from 9 a.m. to noon on Sundays.

A second tennis court at Alta Laguna Park will also have two temporary pickleball courts, the hours for which will mirror those during which the sport is permitted at Lang Park.

About 10 residents spoke at the meeting, most of whom

vations also were completed on the entire interior of the adjacent Edison Community Center earlier this year, the first improvement project at the center since it was dedicated in 1973.

A stone's throw north of the skate spot, there are pickleball temporary courts, which the city hopes will take some of the weight off the four impacted pickleball courts at Worthy Park near Huntington Beach High School. "We're thinking about the

next generation, because things change," Carr said. "What was really hot a couple of decades ago may have been racquetball, but now it's pickleball. You've got to modernize and keep up with the times." Slama said he would

often get emails about putting a skate park at the Edison Community Center, and he's also seen petitions online. A small skate park was opened in the early 1990s at Murdy Park, and remains operational there, but that's on the other side of town

Vans has its Off the Wall Skate Park near Bella Terra mall, but the new skate spot in southeast Huntington Beach represents a more basic introduction into the sport. It was built in an area that formerly held picnic shelters.

"They were dilapidated," Slama said. "It was just a blighted spot ... There's a lot of concrete, so naturally it made sense to lay something down here. It's tem-



porary, but it'll be a good trial to see how well it's used and what the community is looking to put over here.

The redesigning of Edi-

son Park is part of the city's Parks and Recreation Master Plan update, which started in May. The Edison Park Skate Spot specifically was built by project devel-

operating throughout Orange County.

"Golden West College was selected on several factors including its location among the areas with higher testing positivity percentage, lower vaccination rates and case rates above other cities," Vang said Thursday.

Getting younger crowds interested in vaccination is an important step if Orange County is to ever reach herd immunity. Currently, people under the age of 35 are the least likely to be vaccinated — about 60% of those aged 25 to 34 have been fully inoculated, compared to 88.6% of residents aged 65 to 74, according to OCHA figures.

Meanwhile, new infections are rising more rapidly among people under 35. The agency reported Thursday 522 new coronavirus cases, with nearly 68% of infections occurring in those under 35, compared to nearly 8% among residents over 65.

The availability of vaccines at the O.C. Fair, on par to attract hundreds of thousands of visitors even



it's worth a shot.

"We strongly believe in vaccination — that's the key to ultimately fighting the virus," she said. "And there's no better way to make it easy for people to get vaccinated. Come to the O.C. Fair, get your shot and then have fun."

opers RJM Design Group and Newline Skateparks.

Kanten Russell, a San Diego-based professional skateboarder who is a project manager for Newline Skateparks, was at Thursday's ribbon-cutting ceremony. Russell said the Edison Park Skate Spot contains elements like doublesided curbs, a manual pad and a grind bench.

He predicted that the flat bar in the front will also be an asset to local skateboarders.

"It's a variety of stuff, and most importantly, there's room for flat ground," Russell said.

"If kids want to learn how to jump up and down off the curb like that, it's there for them. And if they want to get technical with these crazy flip tricks, they can do that. It's open for beginners and advanced users, if they want to.

"We really wanted to make this feel almost like a schoolyard. That was the inspiration.'

City employees had a good time at the ceremony.

Even City Manager Oliver Chi laughed as he tried his luck on a skateboard. He stayed upright, even if he wasn't quite as steady as Slama.

Carr did not partake, but she watched with appreciation as teenagers descended on the skate spot.

"My hope is that this temporary skate park will lead to a more permanent, international-style competition type of park," she said.

"That's my hope, because skateboarding is huge in Huntington Beach. It has been for decades. As you can see, it took them all of five seconds to start. These kids have been waiting; they've been eager to get out here."

service will be accessible via a mobile app or by calling the city's transit dispatch line: (949) 497-0766. The expected wait time will be 15 to 20 minutes.

Children under the age of 13 will have to ride with an adult, and parents will have to provide a child seat for children who require one to use the on-demand service, for which smaller vehicles will be put to use to navigate the narrower neighborhood streets.

The drivers who operate the neighborhood rideshare service will be contracted through LAZ Parking, which is currently operating the city's trolleys.

Litschi added that the city expects to have four vehicles in total for the service, including one that will provide ADA accessibility. The council also requested that bike racks be added to vehicles that service the on-demand neighborhood pilot program.

The on-demand neighborhood transit program came up for discussion in March, and there was \$753,000 set aside for neighborhood transit services, including this project, in the 2021-22 fiscal year budget.

Mayor Pro Tem Sue Kempf asked about the possibility of having electric vehicles service the neighbor routes.

Mark McAvoy, the director of public works for the city, said that while that is a goal, city staff anticipates having hybrid vehicles at first.

Resident Judie Mancuso urged the city to be selec-
