Clinton, McCain Face Obstacles On the Road to Nomination

ost national polls show Hillary Rodham Clinton and John McCain to be the early frontrunners for the 2008 presidential election, as well as in the races for their respective primaries. McCain has said he will declare his candidacy in January, and while Clinton has not yet announced, she has been actively pursuing support for such a candidacy. Both potential candidates have high approval ratings among members of their own parties, as well as those who tend to vote with those parties, but there are still obstacles to overcome, according to the latest Los Angeles Times/Bloomberg poll.

The survey asked for Democrat and Republican impressions of the field of possible candidates for president in the upcoming 2008 election year. It found that the candidates who have made the biggest and most positive impressions on their own pool of voters so far are the ones who have been most in the media spotlight.

At this early date, there are obstacles in the paths of the frontrunners of course. While voters overall said they prefer to see a Democrat win in 2008, by eight points, Clinton trails McCain in a two-way matchup among all voters by 14 points, and she leads Massachusetts Governor Mitt Romney, who is largely still an unknown to voters, by only six points, which may cast some doubt on her electability. There is also the issue of Barack Obama, a first term senator from Illinois who has caught the imagination of many Democrats. McCain has been courting the right wing of the Republican party, but is less popular among that group than among more moderate voters.

A Gallup poll released on December 5th asked respondents an open-ended question about who they would most like to see elected president in 2008 and 15% of adults nationwide picked Clinton. She was followed by John McCain at 11% and Barack Obama at 6%. One third had no opinion.

So far, two of the top three most recognizable names to Democrats are previous presidential nominees. Former Vice President Al Gore, who ran in 2000 and has said he is not going to run again, and Massachusetts Senator John Kerry who ran in 2004, are recognizable to more than 90% of voters.

New York Senator Hillary Clinton has the highest approval rating at 79%, as well as highest name recognition among this group. Clinton is especially popular with self-identified Democrats and women, who each give her a positive 82% to 15% rating. Among those who identify as independents, her negatives are somewhat higher but she still garners an impressive 70% to 28% positive approval rating among that group.

John Kerry, who as 2004 Democratic presidential nominee has arguably been under the brightest national spotlight of any of the possible candidates, has the highest negative ratings, at 34%. Even so, his positive rating is still a respectable 58%. Kerry is also more popular among those who identify with Democratshis negative rating goes up to 44% among independents and his approval drops to 52%.

Kerry's running mate in 2004, North Carolina Senator John Edwards, came away less damaged by the contentious election process and was given a 65% positive to only 11% negative rating, and was recognized by about three out of four voters.

The rising star of the Democratic party –Illinois Senator Barack Obama – is catching up, however. Obama broke into national consciousness while giving an impassioned speech at the 2004 Democratic convention and has said he will make up his mind whether to run for the presidential nomination by January. Despite his relative newcomer status – he has served only two years in the Senate – three out of five Democrats knew enough about him to have an opinion, including 54% who rated him positively and only 5% who aren't impressed. He is particularly appealing to women in the party – they gave him a 61% positive rating compared to 44% among men.

Race and gender may or may not be an issue for Obama, who is African-American, and Clinton, who is female. Questions trying to get at an underlying racial or gender bias in elections are notoriously difficult to phrase and interpret because respondents may not even be aware of their own biases or willing to admit them when they are, but when asked directly, only 4% of voters overall said they could not vote for a woman and a similarly small proportion said they could not vote for an African-American candidate. As a comparison, 14% said they could not vote for a candidate who is Mormon and the same proportion said they couldn't vote for a 72 year old.

Other potential Democratic candidates – Delaware Senator Joe Biden, New Mexico Governor Bill Richardson, Connecticut Senator Chris Dodd, Indiana Senator Evan Bayh, and Iowa Governor Tom Vilsack were not yet recognizable to a majority of Democrats.

The two highest favorability ratings of all the Republican candidates surveyed were for New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani at 86% and Secretary of State Condoleeza Rice at 84%. Rice has said that she will not run. Fewer than one in ten registered Republicans and those who vote Republican rated either of them negatively. Giuliani, who is pro-choice and in favor of gay rights, was rated just as highly by conservatives as moderates, showing that his high visibility and popularity are probably mainly due to his leadership during the crisis of 9/11. If he were to launch a candidacy and conservative voters began to scrutinize his record, that could change.

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Early Republican front-runner John McCain has an overall approval rating of 65% to 20% who disapprove, with 15% who haven't heard enough about him or aren't sure. McCain has generally been viewed as a moderate in the past because of his breaks with the party line, but has been looking to the right in advance of his run for the Republican nomination by lobbying for the support of the powerful conservative wing of the party. The survey found that he still has some way to go in that quest. Only former House Speaker Newt Gingrich has a higher overall negative rating than McCain. Nearly one out of four self-identified conservative Republicans gave McCain a negative approval rating, compared to 12% of moderates and 9% of those who identify as independents. Moderates gave McCain a 74% approval rating, compared to 64% among conservatives.

Gingrich is especially popular with conservatives, garnering a 62% positive to 26% negative among that group, but dropped to only 49% positive among moderates, nearly a third of whom rated him negatively. He is even less popular among independents, only 36% gave him a positive rating, compared to 38% negative. Just under one out of four independents hadn't heard enough about him to hazard an opinion.

Other potential Republican candidates were not recognizable to a majority of voters – they included Massachusetts Governor Mitt Romney, New York Governor George Pataki, Former Wisconsin Governor Tommy Thompson, Nebraska Senator Chuck Hagel, Kansas Senator Sam Brownback, and California Congressman Duncan Hunter.

Methodology

The Los Angeles Times / Bloomberg Poll contacted 1,489 adults, including 1,342 registered voters, 585 who vote Democrat, and 473 who vote Republican nationwide by telephone December 8 through 11, 2006. Telephone numbers were chosen from a list of all exchanges in the nation, and random digit dialing techniques allowed listed and unlisted numbers to be contacted. Multiple attempts were made to contact each number. Adults were weighted slightly to conform with their respective census figures for sex, race, age, education and region. The margin of sampling error for all adults, and registered voters, is plus or minus 3 percentage points. For Democratic voters it is four percentage points and for Republican voters it is five. For certain subgroups, the error margin may be somewhat higher. Poll results may also be affected by factors such as question wording and the order in which questions are presented.
