# Art recognizing county's COVID-19 deaths unveiled

Adorning the entryway of the Orange County Museum of Art through Sunday is an art installation whose vibrancy takes on a poignant new meaning when viewers contemplate the message behind it.

A swath of vibrant red felt roses provides a sobering visual representation of the nearly 4,000 county residents who have lost their lives to COVID-19 and the countless individuals impacted by that loss. As of Tuesday, the county's death toll stood at 3,952.

Partially handcrafted by community volunteers, many of whom wish to memorialize loved ones lost, the Orange County display is one of several cropping up in Southern California near the one-year anniversary of the coronavirus pandemic in the United States. Each rose signifies a life lost to COVID-19, according to Los An-

geles-area artist Marcos Lutyens, who's created "Rose River" memorial projects in Santa Monica, East L.A. and the Hollywood Forever Cemetery.

"One rose represents one family that has lost someone and is grieving. Or work mates who were best buddies for life," Lutyens said Monday outside OCMA, where he and a handful of museum staff participated in a virtual nationwide "COVID-19 Memorial Day Vigil."

An artist interested in exploring consciousness through a variety of media, Lutyens, 56, began offering virtual hypnosis sessions last

# Campus reopening incentive studied

State officials announced an agreement to give \$2 billion to schools in transitional kindergarten through second grade by April 1.

Local school districts are evaluating new possibilities for state grants after news broke Monday that California officials would be giving \$2 billion to reopen campuses for students in transitional kindergarten through second grade by April 1.

"We are very encouraged to see our legislative leaders and Gov. Newsom reach an agreement on reopening schools, for all those schools throughout the state that have yet to reopen," said Ocean View School District Supt. Carol Hansen.

Hansen said the district is currently working with union officials on a plan to transition from the in-person hybrid schedule to have students in school five days a week.

## Laguna set to reopen secondary schools

#### BY ANDREW TURNER

The Laguna Beach Unified School District has yet to have its secondary school students return to in-person learning in the ongoing pandemic, but the district is keeping families apprised of news concerning that eventuality.

A Feb. 24 communication to parents said the district intends to reopen its secondary campuses — Thurston Middle School and Laguna Beach High School — as soon as Orange County advances to a less restrictive "red" tier as defined by the state's color-coded reopening guidelines.

District officials noted at the time it

# Trial delayed for man accused in 2015 killing of Newport man, 81

The retrial of Carson City man Anthony Thomas Garcia that got underway earlier this year is in recess until Monday because he has been exposed to the coronavirus in jail.

Garcia is charged with the 2015 murder of Newport Beach resident Abelardo "Abby" Estacion, 81.

Last July, Orange County Superior Court Judge Sheila Hanson declared a mistrial after jurors deadlocked over the guilt of Garcia, who is alleged to have asphyxiated Estacion in his Newport Beach home in April 2015.

Garcia is charged with a special circumstances allegation of murder for financial gain. If convicted, Garcia could face life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Hanson said Monday that Garcia is currently in quarantine, though Orange County Sheriff's Department spokeswoman Carrie Braun said the agency could not confirm on a by-name basis.

Braun said in an email Monday that there are six inmates that have positive cases in custody, and 107 are in medical quarantine.

If medically cleared, Garcia is expected to be present for trial at the Central Justice Center in Santa Ana next Monday.

### 'Hope lives' with street art in parts of O.C.

#### BY LILLY NGUYEN

City of Hope Orange County unveiled Tuesday its countywide campaign to decorate the region with images of hope as Californians pass the one-year mark of the first stay-at-home order issued in the state because of the coronavirus pandemic.

The campaign is done in part-

nership with the Orange County Health Care Agency and other community organizations and businesses. More than 70 artists were recruited for the effort.

The initiative is called "Hope Lives in OC."

"City of Hope was founded on hope and we want to share this powerful sentiment with our community," said Annette Walker, president of City of Hope Orange County, in a statement.

"It's been a difficult year but Orange County is resilient and strong. Our community members have stepped up and been there for one another," added Orange County Board of Supervisors Vice Chairman Doug Chaffee, who



was projected the county would meet the three health metrics required for shifting tiers this week, which would allow for schools to reopen March 17.

"We are optimistic and enthusiastic about our students' projected return to in-person instruction in the near future," district Supt. Dr. Jason Viloria said in the communication with parents. "In the event that any of the projected risk level status changes occur, we will communicate timely updates with parents and the community. We thank you for your ongoing support."

However, Orange County health officials announced Tuesday the adjusted rate of daily new coronavirus cases was still too high, meaning the county would remain in the most restrictive "purple" reopening tier at least for the next two weeks.

The district had previously planned to reopen its secondary schools the week of Thanksgiving, but when the county was assigned to the purple tier, it prevented the return of secondary students campus.

"We as a District, and both bargaining units, have been ready to reopen our secondary schools since November when we first planned to reopen," Assistant Supt. Michael

Conlon said in an email. "This has been a frustrating year in many ways for all stakeholders, and we want nothing more than to return our secondary students to some form of in-person instruction. The established phase two instructional plan will be implemented once we can reopen, which will have students on campus for in-person instruction two days per week following the two-class-per-trimester model."

Conlon added that students who want to return

to in-person learning will be able to do so once the secondary district's schools reopen, with the exception being those whose families chose to be in the yearlong virtual academy.

Select at-risk students will be able to attend learning centers Thurston Middle School and Laguna Beach High School five days a week for in-person learning, Conlon said.

Orange County currently has an adjusted daily case rate of 7.6 cases per 100,000 residents. That number needs to drop to seven cases or less to meet the standard for the red tier.

The county's testing positivity rate of 3.9% and health equity quartile positivity rate of 5% both fall within the orange tier (moderate transmission), but counties can only progress one tier at a time.

The Orange County Health Care Agency released data that showed that the county reported 31 coronavirus deaths and 186 new infections on Tuesday.

Since the onset of the pandemic, the county has had 3,952 deaths attributed to the virus and a cumulative case count of 246,820. There were 425 people in the county hospitalized because of the virus, with 116 of those patients being treated in intensive care units.

An additional 6,261 tests for the virus were reported Tuesday, which took the total number of tests administered to 3,055,106. The healthcare agency estimates that 233,106 people in the county have made a recovery after contracting the virus.

year for friends and others feeling overwhelmed by the pandemic.

"There was a lot of fear and anxiety and this kind of feeling Western civilization was collapsing," he recalled. "It started dawning on me that this wasn't going away and that we need to memorialize this."

He came up with the idea of using red roses, the national flower of the United States and a symbol of courage and valor, to stand in for the mothers, fathers, friends and other loved ones lost to the coronavirus.

Located in the county seat of Santa Ana, where residents have endured a disproportionate impact of coronavirus infections and COVID-19 deaths, the currently closed Orange County Museum of Art seemed a fitting place to house the outdoor Rose River Memorial installation.

OCMA senior curator Cassandra Coblentz said when the museum put out the call for volunteers to pick up some 400 rose assembly kits over two days in early February, the community response was overwhelming.

Ultimately, staff handed out more than 900 kits.

"We couldn't buy enough glue to meet the demands of all the people who wanted to make roses for us," Coblentz said Saturday. "People were so eager to come together and share their stories and

grieve. There haven't been enough opportunities to do that yet."

Some rose shapers inscribed or even stitched names among the felt petals, while others affixed tags or messages of support. "Rodolfo Andrade, November 15, 1950 – February 9, 2021, My Loving Husband," one tag reads.

Orange County resident Sarah

Sambolich created roses to honor her uncle, whom she could not be with in his final days due to the pandemic.

She shared her "COVID grief story" with Lutyens and Rose River Memorial organizers.

"He was a great support to me growing up and was there when I needed him — I wish I could have been there for him in his last days," she said of her uncle. "These roses are the most tangible way of saying goodbye and, at the same time, giving comfort to those who also lost loved ones."

The Rose River memorials are among hundreds of vigils and tributes being assembled nationwide to honor the pandemic's increasing death toll.

The effort to memorialize such losses is gaining national momentum as organizations beseech lawmakers to pass a resolution that would annually recognize the first Monday in March as "COVID-19 Victims and Survivors Memorial Day."

On Monday, San Franciscobased nonprofits Marked by COVID and Reimagine launched a COVID-19 Memorial Day virtual vigil that aimed to unite the individual efforts of politicians and organizers of memorial projects. Lutyens and Coblentz participated live from the OCMA installation.

Lutyens has a goal of joining the Orange County art piece with other regional Rose River Memorial tributes and recruiting even more volunteers to handcraft roses to represent the nationwide death toll during the pandemic which, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's online COVID Data Tracker, stood Tuesday at 513,122 individuals.

His plan is to take the giant installation to Washington, D.C., to mark a second annual COVID-19 Memorial Day. He acknowledges he will need a few more hands to bring that vision to life.

"We will really need people's help to make roses," he said.

"We are confident in the safety protocols we have in place and are pleased that educators now have access to vaccines," Hansen said. "As we move forward with plans to bring more children back to school, we will most certainly pursue funding and grant opportunities available to us."

In Orange County, the reopening of campuses has been staggered. The Newport-Mesa Unified School District reopened its elementary school campuses in September for a hybrid in-person program while the Laguna Beach Unified School District waited until October.

Some, such as the Ocean View School District, temporarily returned to distance learning in January as cases skyrocketed. Those schools reopened in February.

The proposed Assembly Bill 86 does not mandate that schools statewide reopen; instead it leaves that decision to the discretion of local officials. Parents will also still be allowed to keep their students in distance learning if that's their preference.

Gov. Gavin Newsom said in an event held Monday in Elk Grove the grants would help to provide in-person instruction and could be used to provide more personal protective equipment or allow for greater spacing between students for safety. Newsom also encouraged lawmakers to set aside an additional \$4.6 billion for students to receive help in the summer as the school year comes to an end.

The proposed bill will provide financial incentives to school districts that provide in-person instruction in counties where there are fewer than 25 new daily confirmed coronavirus cases per 100,000 residents. Orange County currently has an adjusted daily case rate of 7.6 cases for every 100,000 residents.

Those in the red tier, which would have case rates of about four to seven for every 100,000, would be required to extend classroom learning to all students in elementary schools and at least one grade of secondary school to access all available funds.

Officials in the Newport-Mesa Unified School District said they would also be looking into the details of the proposed incentives

"We welcome financial opportunities that assist us in our efforts to continue to offer in-person learning," said Annette Franco, a spokeswoman for the district, in an email.

As for the Huntington Beach City School District, Supt. Leisa Winston said that the district intends to apply for the grants and anticipates use of those resources to be directed to expanding inperson instruction beyond its current program.

In Laguna Beach, Assistant Supt. Michael Conlon said the information is too new to immediately determine his district's next

The Fountain Valley School District and Huntington Beach Union High School District did not respond to requests for comment.

Reopening schools in Orange County has not been without controversy between community members as some have pushed for reopening campuses while others have pushed back out of concern for safety. Safety has also been a chief concern of some teachers, but Newsom said last month the state would be allocating 10% of weekly vaccine doses for those in childcare and K-12 educators.


Orange County health officials confirmed Monday that vaccinations will be available to those individuals starting March 1 at the super point-of-dispensing sites operated by the county Department of Education.

The proposal is expected to receive passage in the state legislature Thursday.

"I look forward after that vote on Thursday to quickly signing this and moving forward to celebrating the reopening for in-person instruction of schools all up and down the state of California," Newsom said on Monday.
