Purple tier has some schools on hold

Laguna Beach Unified School District offers update on school year as pandemic lingers, cases continue to rise.

Laguna Beach Unified School District officials provided an update on the coronavirus-impacted school year during the district's board of education meeting Thursday night.

Students attending secondary school in the district have remained in distance learning throughout the school year. The district had targeted a reopening date during the week of Thanksgiving.

When Orange County received a purple tier designation on Nov. 16, it delayed the return of students to the district's secondary school campuses of Thurston Middle School and Laguna Beach High School.

District Supt. Jason Viloria said during a presentation at the meeting that current guidelines state the county would have to be in the red tier for a period of five consecutive days for secondary schools to reopen.

"We were ready in November, so we're ready now, and we'll continue to do what we need to do to ensure it's a safe place for students," Viloria said.

Orange County currently has

Huntington Beach resident Savannah Larson paused for just a second before naming her favorite Girl Scout cookie.

"My favorite is the Peanut Butter Sandwich," she said.

Why?

"Because it's good."

Savannah, a seventh-grader at Talbert Middle School, knows that many people have a go-to Girl Scout cookie. Some swear by Thin Mints that have been frozen. Others are quickly becoming fans of the Girl Scouts of Orange County's new offering for 2021, the French toast-inspired Toast-Yay.

A Cadette in Girl Scout Troop 3345, Savannah is an elite cookie seller. She's sold more

than 1,000 boxes in each of the last two years, earning her membership into the "1,000-plus club." Her tally this year is already more than 600 boxes, though she's set her goal at a more modest total of 750.

Cookie-selling season is here again, but COVID-19 has definitely affected the way Girl Scouts have operated their fundraising efforts. This year, cookie sales have been extended through March 28 due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"The really cool thing that we've done this year is that we've made QR codes," Savannah said. "We put that on a sign that's outside of our house, so anyone who's driving by or walking outside of our house can take

3 of 5 candidates in race for Board of Supervisors face off in forum

Recovering from and responding to the ongoing pandemic was the crux of discussion for some of the candidates running in the special election to replace Rep. Michelle Steel (R-Seal Beach) during a candidates forum for the Board of

Supervisors Friday morning.
Steel previously served as chair on the Orange County Board of Supervisors and represented the 2nd Supervisorial

District, which includes Costa Mesa, Cypress, Huntington Beach, La Palma, Los Alamitos, Newport Beach, Seal Beach, Stanton, Fountain Valley, the unincorporated area of Rossmoor and portions of Buena

She ousted incumbent Rep. Harley Rouda (D-Laguna Beach) in the November election with 51.06% of the votes.

The forum — sponsored by several chambers of commerce — was attended by just three of

the five candidates in line to replace Steel in this March's special election, with Costa Mesa Mayor Katrina Foley and Fountain Valley Mayor Michael Vo absent. Foley said in a call Thursday that she would be unable to attend because she had a scheduling conflict and would be in a COVID-19 briefing at the time of the forum. Vo was originally slated to attend, but campaign manager Aaron



The Huntington Beach City Council on Tuesday night will consider extending the closure of the second block of Main Street through Labor Day

Street through Labor Day.

The second block downtown has been closed since last summer to encourage outdoor dining, and Tuesday's agenda item would extend that closure through Sept. 6. It is currently closed through the end of Feb-

ruary.

Huntington Beach City Council members voted 4-3 on Dec. 21, 2020 to keep the second block of Main Street closed to traffic through February but reopen the third block, which drew opposition from some business owners affected by the decision. The motion by Councilman Erik Peterson was also supported by Mayor Kim Carr,

Virtual 'Cool Art Auction' draws 100 collectors, more than \$440,000

The 39th annual California Cool Art Auction produced more than \$440,000 in sales during the Laguna Art Museum's benefit event.

Over \$240,000 in net unrestricted income was raised from the virtual auction, for which California artists provided 125 pieces of artwork to be sold. The funds raised will go toward the museum's educational programs and its exhibits.

The auction, which took place on Feb. 6, had winning bids placed by more than 100 art collectors from eight countries and 10 states.

'Till,' a roughly 1,300-year-old word, predates its more popular cousin and is no less formal

don't see the contraction 'til much anymore. I used to see it a lot, but I suspect that ever-more-advance spell-checkers on our computers, phones and social media platforms have learned to flag or correct 'til.

Don't see a problem with 'til? Technically, there isn't one. In general usage, 'til is not an error. But in professionally edited writing and other formal situations, the correct single-syllable alternative to "until" has no apostrophe and takes two Ls: till.

Here's the widely influential Associated Press Stylebook: "till. Or until. But not 'til."

And here's the equally influential Chicago Manual of Style: "till. This is a perfectly good preposition and conjunction (open till 10 p.m.). It is not a contraction of until and should not be written

That bit about contractions is key. One might naturally assume that someone is just using a shortened form of "until" when he says "till." But till doesn't come from until at all.

"The notion that till is a short form of until is erroneous," writes Merriam-Webster's Dictionary of English Usage. "Till is actually the older word, dating back to at least



the 9th century." The longer "until" didn't show up until a few centuries later and was first recorded around 1200.

Because "till" isn't a contraction or shortened form, it's no less formal or proper than "until."

'Until is often said to have a somewhat more formal quality than till and to be the more likely choice at the beginning of a sentence or clause," Merriam's notes. "In general, our evidence supports those observations. Note, however, that till, although less common than until, can still be perfectly at home in highly serious writing and at the beginning

So to do as the pros do, use till or until. But style guides like AP and Chicago don't apply to everyone. If you prefer 'til, it's still an option. If you want to make a contraction out of until by dropping the "un" and replacing it with an apostrophe, that's a privilege enjoyed by every English speaker. You can contract anything you want. Heck, you can replace the first letter of my last name with an apostrophe if you're so inclined, though my husband might want a word if

you do.

But there's still a way to make a mistake with 'til. When you type an apostrophe before 'til, autocorrect software programs may change your apostrophe to a single quotation mark, assuming that's what you wanted. It's not. You want a proper apostrophe, which is either straight or shaped a little like a backwards letter C, with the opening to the left. A single quotation mark curves the other way, like the letter C. So if you type 'til your software might change it to 'til, which is wrong. To fix this, you can either change

your autocorrect settings or use my lazier method of just typing two apostrophes then deleting the first one.

I notice this problem less and less because I notice 'til less and less. That's a good thing because it suggests people are writing better. But it's also a bad thing because my job is to fix writing mistakes, and every time a computer gets better at fixing writing errors, I move one step closer to obsolescence.

But if a recent experience is any indication, I won't be out of work anytime soon. While editing a document in the Google Docs word processing program recently, I ran spell-checker. It stopped on the word till and offered a suggestion I have never heard in all my years of reading about language: til. One L, no apostrophe.

So it looks like my job is safe at least till computers get a little smarter.

Laguna Beach hires firm for city manager search

Laguna Beach has begun the recruiting process in search of the seaside community's next city manager.

John Pietig, the presiding city manager of Laguna Beach, announced the first week of January that he plans to retire in June. His service to the city has spanned 20 years.

The Laguna Beach City Council, which makes the appointment for the position of city manager, has

hired the recruiting firm Bob Murray & Associates to carry out a search for candidates to serve as the city's top executive. City officials said the estimated cost for the executive recruiting firm's services is less than \$30,000.

"This is one of the most important positions in the city, and hiring the recruiting firm will allow us to thoroughly evaluate both internal and external candidates for the City Manager position," Laguna Beach Mayor Bob Whalen said in a statement.

Pietig began his run with Laguna as assistant city manager, and he has served as city manager for the last decade. According Whalen, the City Council aims to name his replacement in May.

Rental assistance program taking applications

The County of Orange is accepting applications through the month of February for an Emergency Rental Assistance program for eligible renters struggling with unpaid rent or utilities bills during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Launched this week and funded by a \$65.5-million allocation from the U.S. Department of Treasury, the program aims to provide financial assistance to those whose combined household income is at or below 80% of the county's average median income.

In Orange County, the median income is approximately \$71,750 for an individual, \$82,000 for a twomember household, \$92,250 for three people and \$102,450 for a four-person household. For more information on household size, visit era.211oc.org.

Residents of Anaheim, Santa Ana and Irvine may not participate in Orange County's assistance program, as those cities have population sizes 200,000 and maintain their own local city programs, according to a release issued last week by the Orange County Health Care

The Emergency Rental Assistance program does not apply to homeowners with past-due mortgage payments, utilities or energy costs. Funds may only be granted to renters.

Applicants will need to provide a photo ID, a copy of their lease agreement, proof of income affected by COVID-19, such as an unemployment letter or a letter from an employment detailing reduced hours or pay and proof of unpaid rent or utilities, such as documentation from a landlord or utility company stating an amount owed or overdue.




The hourlong forum was moderated by Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce president and chief executive officer Steven Rosansky.

seven-day averages of 29.7 daily new cases per 100,000 residents, a testing positivity rate of 9.4%, and a health equity quartile positivity rate of 12.4%. Those numbers come with

a seven-day lag.

The county would have to show an adjusted daily case rate average between four and seven cases per 100,000 residents, a testing positivity rate of 5% to 8%, and a health equity quartile of 5.3% to 8% to advance to the red tier.

The school district has been providing voluntary testing for the virus. Over four testing opportunities for students, there have been 1,198 tests administered with a total of 25 positive tests, data presented by Assistant Supt. Michael Conlon showed. The next testing opportunity for students in the district will be Feb. 23.

There have been seven testing opportunities for district staff, resulting in 908 tests being administered with five positive tests reported.

Board clerk Kelly Osborne asked how student participation in the optional testing could be increased. Conlon said the district is exploring the possibility of providing a saliva test in addition to offering PCR swabs.

High school sports have returned to a point, dependent on their tier designation.

The only fall sport under the CIF's revised two-season schedule that can currently hold contests in the most restrictive, purple tier is crosscountry, while other sports can hold modified workouts.

Board member Dee Perry inquired about whether

students involved in the arts could also be brought back to school. 

a picture and scan it. They can order cookies from me,

and we can go and deliver them and stay socially distanced. We don't even have to interact."

County has become creative during the pandemic, Communications Director Caron Berkley said. Their familiar booths are not allowed outside of grocery stores right now due to state health restrictions.

Door hangers with the QR codes and a personalized link are another new touch. The organization has also introduced the Great Girl Scout Cookie Buy-Out, which allows businesses to buy out a virtual booth, starting at 50 packages of cookies or \$250.

Girl Scouts of Orange County, which includes about 18,000 girls, has also partnered with Grubhub for cookie deliveries at certain hours. Girl Scout troops staff the three locations, including sites in Mission Viejo, Yorba Linda and at the county headquarters in Irvine, and receive app orders on a tablet. They then place the cookies on a table from which a Grubhub driver picks them up and delivers them to the buyer.

The money raised from the deliveries goes to benefit the volunteering troop.

"It's not in your face as much as it usually is, with girls out in front of stores or being able to go doorto-door in neighborhoods," Berkley said. "Not unlike small businesses, who are stressed these days in the pandemic to come up with new and creative business models, Girl Scouts are doing the same

thing.' Marriana Alfano, an 8year-old from Huntington Beach, has already sold more than 600 boxes this year for Troop 7332, though she has a way to go to match her total of 1,379 boxes from last year. She said cookie sales have been

harder this year — "my legs hurt more because I have to go around and drop off door hangers" — but she is still enjoying the work.

Devon Hills, who lives in Costa Mesa, also is learning as a troop leader for Troop 8480, which includes her 6-year-old daughter, Lucy. As a kindergartner Lucy is in the Girl Scouts' Daisy program. The family has been using social media for many of their sales.

"She loves it," Hills said of Lucy's involvement. "She's more focused on selling cookies, making the phone calls to friends and family so that she can earn money for activities in the future. Even at this age, they really are learning how to manage money and kind of getting the idea of the value of the dollar [and] what they might be

able to buy with this money that they've earned."

Berkley, whose own daughter, Tess, is a Junior Girl Scout, said online sales have been strong. The proceeds from the cookies stays local and fund many of a troop's activities for the year.

She said she drives around each Saturday with her daughter to deliver orders placed online.

"Cookie sales, as challenging as it is, it's still a bright light for these girls," Berkley said. "The success of each sale really gives them a boost of self-confidence. We want to do everything we can to help with that.

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CALIFORNIA TO OPEN COVID-19 VACCINE TO PEOPLE UNDER 65 WITH HIGH-RISK HEALTH CONDITIONS

California officials on Friday said that people between the ages of 16 and 64 who are disabled or at high risk for morbidity and mortality from COVID-19 will be eligible to be vaccinated beginning next month.

The move comes after weeks of debate over who will get to the front of the line for precious doses, which remain in short supply. Officials estimate the move will make 4 million to 6 million more people eligible for the vaccine, bringing the total number of Californians eligible to between 17 million and 20 million, or about half the state.

But supplies remain very limited. Based on current allocation projections, California won't come close to meeting demand for some time. It will ultimately be up to local providers to decide who gets the vaccine immediately, with medical workers, first responders, people 65 and older, teachers and essential workers all vying for shots.

The underlying conditions explicitly stated include cancer; chronic kidney disease of stage four or above; chronic pulmonary disease; Down syndrome; immunocompromised immune system from solid organ transplant; pregnancy; sickle cell disease; heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease or cardiomyopathies (excluding hypertension); severe obesity; and Type 2 diabetes mellitus.

The state also broadly defined eligible individuals as those who are likely to develop a severe lifethreatening illness or death from a COVID-19 infection or are limited in their ability to receive ongoing care or services vital to their survival.

These groups can begin getting the vaccine March 15.

State Health and Human Services Secretary Mark Ghaly did not provide details on what verification individuals would need to provide in order to receive the vaccine.

The news follows a meeting last week set by a high-level task force with members from the depart-

ments of Aging, Disability Services and Health and Human Services that hashed out details of a proposal raised by a vaccine advisory committee.

Gov. Gavin Newsom's previous announcement last month that the state would shift vaccine priority to an age-based eligibility structure sparked concerns from groups representing the disability community who may now have to wait longer to get vaccinated, with hundreds sharing their frustrations on social media.

Friday's announcement was welcomed by advocates.

"There's no question that there's going to be a lot of challenges, but there's also no question that this new policy is dramatically better," said Andy Imparato of Disability Rights California, who also serves on the state's vaccine advisory committee. "This creates a safety valve for people under 65" who may still face significant risk.

Imparato said he hoped the new rule would ease the disparities that have plagued the vaccine rollout so far. Many of the same factors that have made the pandemic more deadly in Black, Latino and Native American communities also create or intensify disabilities, so extending the current tier to include those with significant comorbidities would mean more doses reached hard-hit communities than in an agebased system, he said.

"We can look on a map and say which ZIP Code has the most COVID cases — these are often the same communities that have higher rates of diabetes and other comorbid conditions," said Dr. Kirsten Bibbins-Domingo, an epidemiologist and co-founder of the UCSF Center for Vulnerable Populations. "But that type of language [around severe risk] is hard to implement, and programs that are hard to implement create problems with efficiency and problems with equity."

In particular, she and others worried that the documentation requirement could gum up the works of California's already sluggish vaccination program.

"We need to be careful about

not splitting hairs about who's disabled enough to get vaccinated," said Dr. Alyssa Burgart, a bioethicist at Stanford. "It's so easy to show what your age is. But there is immense variety in the type of disability that can place you at higher risk from COVID."

Alice Wong, 46, a disabled activist in San Francisco who created the hashtag #HighRiskCA in response to the change, agreed.

"There are lots of people who don't have a primary care provider [to provide documentation]," she said. "We don't need more hurdles."
