

Top stories of the year in Newport Beach

Like other cities in Orange County and around the world, Newport Beach is not alone in its experiences in a year shaped largely by the ongoing pandemic and sweeping shutdown orders.

The city saw beach closures, tragedy, new members of its City Council, a presidential visit, an agreement for a homeless shelter and the cancellation of a time-honored Christmas tradition as part of a number of events that rocked 2020.

Here are some of the top stories of Newport Beach in 2020:

KOBE BRYANT, NEWPORT BEACH RESIDENTS DIE IN HELICOPTER CRASH

In January, Kobe Bryant, 41; his 13-yearold daughter, Gianna; John, Keri and Alyssa Altobelli; Sarah and Payton Chester; Christina Mauser and Ara Zobayan died in a helicopter crash in Calabasas in late January.

The helicopter had been en route to a game at Bryant's Mamba Sports Academy in Thousand Oaks.

But as Los Angeles and the world mourned the loss of the Lakers superstar, so too did Orange County, who, along with Bryant who residents said they knew as the father of four that lived just up the street, and Gianna, a strong leader who looked out for the underdog, lost also the young athletes and their parents aboard the aircraft.

Seven of the victims lived in Newport Beach and two lived in neighboring Huntington Beach.

Newport Beach fire gets first dose of vaccine

About 45 employees were vaccinated over Christmas week on a voluntary and first-come, first-serve basis.

The first doses of the Moderna vaccine against the coronavirus have arrived as another singleday case count has been broken in Orange County.

The city of Newport Beach announced Tuesday that about 45 Newport Beach Fire Department employees received the first dose of the Moderna vaccine, which was approved by the Food and Drug Administration on Dec. 18. The vaccine requires two doses, administered intramuscularly 28 days apart.

Officials said that they expect the number of vaccinated staff to increase to 65 by the end of Wednesday.

There are about 115 full-time employees in the Newport Beach Fire Department, according to Newport Beach Fire Chief Jeff Boyles.

The vaccinations were administered at the Central Net Joint Powers Training Center in Huntington Beach, which is one of the sites authorized by the Orange County Health Care Agency to distribute the vaccines to the fire agencies in Fountain Valley, Huntington Beach, Newport Beach, Costa Mesa and Laguna Beach. Two other such sites exist in Irvine and Anaheim

The arrival of the Moderna vaccine comes as part of the state's first wave of distribution, which health officials said would go to healthcare workers, residents of long-term care facilities and first responders.

Some healthcare workers were vaccinated earlier this month with the arrival of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine.

Jim Trenton to ride his radio morning show wave into the New Year

If you wanted to go somewhere you had never gone before, 2020 might not have been the year to do so.

The coronavirus pandemic is unlike anything most of us have seen in our lives, and one local radio personality is set to embark on what might be a once-in-alifetime broadcast.

Jim "Poorman" Trenton of KOCI 101.5 FM Radio has plans to put on a 28-hour show to ring in the new year.

The show will begin at 7 a.m. on New Year's Eve and concludes at 11 a.m. on New Year's Day.

Trenton said he has had a fascination with being on the air for an extended period of time, and with traditions like watching the ball drop in front of a sea of revelers in Times Square scrapped, this is a year to be different.

"I just thought, 'OK, if I do something like this during the pandemic year and get some charities in there and stuff, I thought this could be really kind of cool to do and it would be kind of a once-in-a-lifetime thing," Trenton said. "I honestly don't even think I'm going to want to ever do this again."

Some of the charities that Trenton is expected to highlight with public service announcements to his listeners include Working Wardrobes, the Illumination Foundation, Someone Cares Soup Kitchen, Friends of Newport Beach Animal Shelter and Newport Beach Arts Foundation.

Listeners are also invited to call in and share their favorite charity on the air, and of course, make song requests.

Often, Trenton enjoys walking into the studio with a word of the day or a theme in mind. Listeners then call in with a request that contains the word in the title or lyrics of the song or in the name of the artist.

It can also be a nexus, so if the word is "rain," one might call in

the stormy AC/DC single "Thunderstruck."

"There's no music playlist when I walk in," Trenton said. "I just give them the theme, and people every day are like mini music directors. They call in or they text me or social media, all these different songs that relate to the theme, and it works because everything is related to the theme, even though the music is different and diverse."

The audience will hear from Newport Beach Councilman Will O'Neill twice during the 28-hour show, as the city's former mayor is a regular on the morning show. His segment debuted as "The Mayor's Minute" in April.

"It usually lasts about 10 minutes, but the general idea here is to provide information to his listeners about what is going on in both the state and county and local levels — rarely at the national level — but it's an opportunity to provide more transparency to issues that people care about,"

O'Neill is a fan of country music, but he said he makes such a song request once per week to ac-

commodate a wider audience. Asked what song he might select

4 suspects charged with allegedly stealing motor vehicle parts in F.V.

Four people have been charged after allegedly being involved in the grand theft of auto parts in Fountain Valley early Saturday morning, authorities said.

Miguel Rodriguez, 39, Lorena Castillo, 39, and Marcelle Coleman, 30, all of Los Angeles, and Felipe Batalla, 50, a transient of Fountain Valley, have been charged with conspiracy to commit a crime, receiving stolen property and grand theft. Each also faces misdemeanor counts for possession of burglary tools and possession of methamphetamine.

Coleman and Rodriguez also face misdemeanor counts of suspicion of resisting an officer, and Coleman and Batalla face one count of possession of controlled substance paraphernalia.

Officers had responded to a call reporting the potential theft of motor vehicle parts in the 18000 block of Mt. Langley at 3:20 a.m. on Saturday, Farmer said. A containment area was set up and police stopped a dark blue Chrysler 300 as it was leaving the area.

The four suspects were arrested after searched their vehicle and found various motor vehicle parts. The items found included five cut catalytic converters and one cut muffler, police said. Officers also found three reciprocating saws and additional tools used for burglary, as well as methamphetamine and narcotics.

Officers conducted an inspection of vehicles in the area and found two

cars that had allegedly had their catalytic converters stolen, one with a catalytic converter that had been partially cut off, and another car that had been

broken into. Coleman is on probation for robbery in Los Angeles County, Farmer said. Orange County jail records show that Coleman is being held on \$20,000 bail.

A video from late November shared by a member of the public on the Fountain Valley Police Department Facebook page on Monday appears to show four suspects stealing catalytic converters in the area. It it is unclear whether the suspects charged Saturday were involved.

RESTRICTIONS ON VACATION RENTALS IMPLEMENTED

Newport Beach placed a six-week moratorium on vacation rentals in the city in an effort to tamp down on visitors early on in the pandemic.

Councilwoman Diane Dixon said in April that market forces drove down about 95% of local shortterm rental business in the city, but that Newport remained an "attractive nuisance."

The moratorium was unanimously, approved with Muldoon absent, and was to run through May 20 or through the duration of the city's local emergency.

More than 1,500 homes in Newport Beach held short-term lodging permits, concentrated on the Balboa Peninsula and Balboa Island and in Corona del Mar neighborhoods.

Restrictions were eventually relaxed in May. Rentals resumed May 20, provided that visitors remained for at least three days.

On Newport Island, the moratorium was rescinded in June and required four-night stays.

The minimum-stay requirement will lift when the city rescinds its locally declared emergency.

NEWPORT, ORANGE COUNTY TARGETED IN BEACH CLOSURES

After an April heatwave brought tens of thousands of people to Orange County beaches, Gov. Gavin Newsom targeted them for a "hard closure," which he argued threatened state efforts to mitigate the spread of the coronavirus.

Cities complied with the order but weren't happy about it.

Newport Beach and Huntington Beach had already implemented crowd control measures such as closures of their respective boardwalks, piers and parking restrictions.

Some city and county officials considered the beach closures an overreach of Newsom's power as governor.

Newport filed a court brief in support of neighboring Huntington Beach. Newport Beach Councilman Kevin Muldoon — now mayor pro tem filed his own lawsuit against Newsom's order.

BLM PROTESTERS DEMONSTRATE IN NEWPORT BEACH

Demonstrations against institutional racism and police brutality emerged across the nation during the summer after George Floyd, an unarmed Black man, died in Minneapolis while being restrained by white police Officer Derek Chauvin.

These demonstrations also appeared in Newport Beach, where hundreds of protesters chanted the names of Floyd, Breonna Taylor and Ahmaud Arberv.

On June 3, four protests were organized in Newport Beach.

protests The were peaceful with the exception of an aggressive driver who allegedly grazed several marchers as he sped down Balboa Boulevard and another man who allegedly pulled a handgun from his backpack following a verbal altercation with protesters.

ROBICHEAUX CASE HEADS TO STATE ATTORNEY GENERAL

Orange County District Atty. Todd Spitzer announced in February that he intended to drop all charges made in 2018 against a Newport Beach surgeon and his girlfriend, whom then-District Attorney Tony Rackauckas had portrayed as a predatory team who lured, drugged and raped multiple wom-

When the charges were filed against orthopedic surgeon and one-time reality TV personality Grant Robicheaux and girlfriend Cerissa Riley, Rackauckas claimed investigators had "thousands of videos" in evidence that showed there could be "hundreds" or "more than a thou-

sand" victims. Citing a thorough review of evidence since he took office last year, Spitzer said there were no photos or videos that depict women being sexually violated.

Robicheaux and Riley have denied all allegations of nonconsensual sex. The decision on whether or not the case would head to trial or be dismissed was delayed to April.

Orange County Superior Court Judge Gregory Jones declined to dismiss the charges in June, but attorneys for Robicheaux and Riley argued that Jones should step down from the case because of a bias for an alleged victim's

attorney. The case was later handed off to the state attorney general's office for prosecution in August.

PRESIDENT TRUMP VISITS NEWPORT FOR PRIVATE FUNDRAISER

President Donald Trump visited Newport Beach in October to attend a private fundraiser at the Lido Isle mansion of tech mogul Palmer Luckey.

The fundraiser managed to raise \$10 million for Trump's reelection efforts. Thousands of people both in support of and against Trump lined the streets of Newport Beach that weekend. There were no arrests related to the president's visit, police said.

The fundraiser was initially scheduled for Oct. 6, but was delayed after Trump contracted COVID-19. Trump later lost in his bid for reelection to President-elect Joe Biden.

AVERY, O'NEILL REELECTED, BLOM WINS COUNCIL SEAT

In what was a turbulent presidential election season, Councilman Brad Avery and Will O'Neill were reelected to the

to have played during the special New Year's broadcast, O'Neill said he would go with "New Slang" by Brave Squirrels.

Trenton said he does not get political on the air, but he once ran in California's gubernatorial race following the Gray Davis recall in

"I got [three] votes," Trenton chuckled. "I know my parents were two of them. I didn't finish in last place."

Only in his second year with the classic rock station, which can be heard in Costa Mesa and Newport Beach, Trenton ended up at KOCI when he contacted Brent Kahlen, the station's director and CEO, with whom he had only spoken a couple of times on the phone.

"We both went to different high schools together," Kahlen said of Trenton. "What I mean by that is that I worked at KROQ, and then I left, and he came into KROQ after I was gone, so we knew of each other but had never met.

"He calls me up and says, 'I would like to do a surf report,' and so he comes in, we have a meeting, he comes in wanting to do a surf report and then ends up leaving with a morning show. That's what transpired in our meeting."

The broadcast can be enjoyed on the radio station itself or at *kociradio.com*. It can also be streamed live on Trenton's Facebook page, on Alexa or via the Smart Radio app.

Can Trenton make it through all 28 hours? That is just the next question about a man who has made a habit of keeping his listeners on the edge of their seat.

"What we've found out," Kahlen said, "is that when people start listening to the Poorman, they can't stop because they listen thinking, 'What's he going to do next?'"

Newport Beach City Council in November. Newcomer and restaurateur Noah Blom edged out incumbent Jeff Herdman to represent District 5, which encompasses Balboa Island. O'Neill ran unopposed in District 7, which represents Newport Coast, and Avery ran against newcomer Nancy Scarbrough.

The recently elected council members were sworn in in December. Avery was appointed the mayor and Councilman Kevin Muldoon was appointed the mayor pro tempore.

NEWPORT BEACH CHRISTMAS BOAT PARADE CANCELED

The 112th annual Newport Beach Christmas Parade was canceled this year in response to concerns about the COVID-19 pandemic.

The parade was initially set to be livestreamed during its run, but organizers said that there was no way to ensure visitors were wearing masks or face coverings and respecting social distancing in places where people could possibly gather. Current Mayor Pro Tem Kevin Muldoon tried to save the parade and discuss the possibility of having city staff assist.

Residents later took the parade into their own hands and organized "Let Freedom Ring" in Newport

NEWPORT PARTNERS WITH COSTA MESA FOR BRIDGE SHELTER

The city unanimously approved a memorandum of understanding with Costa Mesa in late November to partner on a 70-bed homeless bridge shelter at 3175 Airway Ave.

The agreement provides 20 beds to Newport Beach for an initial term of five years. In exchange, the city will provide \$1.6 million in one-time funds to finance construction of the shelter and an additional initial \$1 million annually for operation costs.

A 12,285-square-foot portion of an industrial warehouse building on Airway Avenue is being retrofitted by the Cerritos-based Cal-City Construction, Inc. to accommodate the shelter with a full-service kitchen with office and intake space.

NEWPORT FILES AMICUS BRIEF IN SUPPORT OF THE COUNTY SHERIFF

Newport Beach recently filed an amicus brief in support of the Orange County Sheriff's Department after a court ruling from Orange County Superior Court Judge Peter Wilson was handed down on a lawsuit filed by the Ameri-

can Civil Liberties Union.
Wilson ruled that Orange
County Sheriff Don Barnes
had shown "deliberate indifference" to the substantial risk that the coronavirus can pose to
medically vulnerable people in custody, which he
ruled in turn violates their
constitutional rights.

Twenty other cities joined the brief filed Dec. 24.

Boyles said that vaccinations in his department have been voluntary and on a first-come, first-serve basis. Boyles received the vaccine on Saturday and said that aside from some soreness at the injection site on Sunday, he hasn't felt any side effects. He was even able to go surfing.

"We had some [staff] that were eager to get it and some that really don't want it and a lot in the middle. 'I just want to wait and see.' Those are the ones we're trying to reach out to," said Boyles, adding that he was among the first to get vaccinated. "We anticipate people starting to move from the 'maybe' to the 'yes'

group.' Boyles said paramedics are also being trained at the administration sites on how to deliver the vaccine. The training, Boyles said, would help scale up and prepare for a more effective distribution once the vaccine is available in larger quantities. City officials also announced Tuesday that the city received authorization to host community clinics

to administer the vaccine, a process that will begin with those most at risk of severe cases of COVID-19 — the elderly and immunocompromised. The community clinics will complement other distribution efforts at hospitals, doctor's offices and pharmacies.

"Providing opportunities for our residents to receive safe, effective vaccines is the top city priority," Newport Beach Mayor Brad Avery said in a statement.

City officials said that the city would be collaborating with Hoag Memorial Hospital Presbyterian and the county to provide clear and accurate information over the next few months about the importance and effectiveness of getting the vaccine.

Cases in Orange County climbed another 4,514 cases recorded by the Orange County Health Care Agency on Wednesday. The agency also reported 27 additional deaths, including one skilled nursing facility resident and 26 residents not living in a facility. About 2,145 patients are currently hospitalized, with 479 in intensive care units throughout the region. Capacities have lowered to 0%, and

just 40% of ventilators are available.

"From what I've seen, whether they're going to receive it or not personally, [fire department staff] are excited to be part of the vaccination rollout in general because it's another way of adapting and changing with the environment," Boyles said.

"I know with my dad's fire service some 30 to 40 years ago that they'd never have thought they'd be holding needles and giving vaccinations. They fought fires. It's kind of neat," he added. "I think we're evolving with the changing environment."
