NMUSD cancels in-person graduation events

The school district's board of trustees decides in favor of virtual commencements at its six high schools.

The Newport-Mesa Unified School District board of trustees, in conjunction with principals, decided this week to cancel in-person graduations at all of its six high schools in favor of a broadcast.

In a statement to community members Wednesday, the district said that the graduation ceremony would include a live broadcast of the master of ceremonies, guest speakers, a personalized photo and video montage of graduating seniors in addition to the presentation of diplomas.

This will affect Corona del Mar, Newport Harbor, Costa Mesa, Early College, Estancia and Back Bay/Monte Vista high schools.

"High school graduation is one of the most memorable moments in life and we know how hard our students and families have worked to get to this point," the statement reads. "The end of the 2020 school year has been quite different than what we all imagined, but we are committed to celebrate our Class of 2020 with a high quality, purposeful and memorable graduation."

The graduation will be broadcast by Van Wagner Sports and Entertainment the week of June 15, but the district said that it plans to celebrate seniors with an informal, in-person event later in the summer once state orders and social distancing requirements allow for gatherings to occur.

But, families and students have called on the district to reconsider its plans including Riley DeCinces, a graduating senior at Newport Harbor High School.

"Recently, we've been doing a lot of Zooms and online, which we're still learning and doing all the same assignments, but a big part of our issue is I've talked a bunch of my friends and there's a lot of people we go to school with," DeCinces said, "but, that we wouldn't really see again other than in

Laguna unveils \$11.3-M Village Entrance project

As cars rumble down Laguna Canyon Road, visitors and residents alike will at last be greeted by an entrance to the city of Laguna Beach three decades in the making — construction on the Village Entrance project is over.

The \$11.3-million revitalization project of the city's primary inland thoroughfare was dedicated on Friday in a virtual ribbon-cutting event physically attended only by City Council members and city staff.

"The city has succeeded in delivering a safe, beautiful area for our community to enjoy while delivering the project on time and on budget," Laguna Beach City Manager John Pietig said in a statement Thursder.

The project focused on enhancing pedestrian safety and circulation and improving traffic flow along the stretch of Laguna Canyon Road between Forest Avenue and the Art-A-Fair grounds. It also provides new public open space.

"After nearly 30 years of planning and public input, this project took only two years to complete the construction phase,"

Coronavirus continues to claim O.C. nursing home patients

Five of the six new coronavirusrelated deaths announced in Orange County Friday were among nursing home patients, the county Health Care Agency said, further skewing the harshest impact of COVID-19 on the vulnerable population.

The death toll from the disease caused by the coronavirus is now 45 in skilled nursing facilities and 118 overall.

The healthcare agency also reported 108 new infections Friday and 1,052 additional tests over Thursday.

This brings Orange County to 4,941 known cases of COVID-19 and 93,906 total tests given. Daily updates are preliminary and subject to change as the county receives new information.

Reported hospitalizations were at 230 with 95 in intensive care across all 25 hospitals eligible to report coronavirus cases.

The overall positivity rate has hovered steadily around 5% since the county greatly expanded its network of public testing clinics in mid-April, according to health

care agency data.

But with 30 deaths reported in the last three days, the COVID-19 toll has spiked by 34% in 72 hours.

At skilled nursing facilities, known COVID-19 deaths have increased by 23, doubling over the

Protesters gather outside Newport Beach's Irvine Co. office, seek rent cancellations

Protesters took to the lawn outside of the Irvine Co. office building in Newport Beach on Friday to express their concerns about economic struggles they face regarding affordable housing.

The novel coronavirus pandemic has resulted in a loss of wages for many people not deemed to be part of the essential workforce.

A group called the Alliance of Californians for Community Empowerment organized a caravan of about 15 cars that made several trips around the building, honking horns and displaying signs that focused on two messages: "Cancel Rent" and "Make Them Pay."

About a dozen demonstrators took to the lawn in front of the building, some equipped with megaphones. Several read prepared statements, speaking to the hardship faced by low-income and middleclass families who do not feel financially secure.

Ivan Pulpolibri, an artist from the east side of Los Angeles, said the location of the protest was symbolic because the Irvine Co. is one of the

Laguna looks to implement plan to aid local businesses

Recommendations implement the economic recovery and business development plan are coming before the Laguna Beach City Council on Tuesday, following swiftly on the heels of the plan's approval at their last meeting on May 12.

Up for the council's consideration Tuesday night are the waiving of temporary use permit fees and the delegation of authority to Community Development Director Marc Weiner to approve those permits for outdoor dining, displays and minor deviations on sign and banner standards through Sept. 7.

Council members will also consider postponing the conversion of Ocean Avenue to a one-way street until fall and approving and adopting a resolution that will allow for the proposed outdoor dining and entertainment on lower Forest Avenue.

Members will be looking at whether or not to adopt a \$145,703 contract with organizers Coachella Choura Events to implement "Promenade on Forest," the outdoor dining and entertainment pro-

gram, by June 15.

The program is part of the business regulatory relief package the city approved to provide a space where residents can eat and interact safely while allowing restaurants available space to operate at sustainable levels.

Also up for discussion Tuesday night are additional recommendations from Mayor Pro Tem Steve Dicterow to city staff, which include development of a program that would allow for restaurants and businesses adjacent to public properties to utilize space for additional seating or merchandise.

> Other recommenda-

tions Dicterow made to to city staff were to adopt a sliding scale for available exterior spaces that would be available to restaurants and businesses for additional exterior seating or displays, with the intent of reducing that space with each successive reopening stage; for businesses not adjacent to public property to use private properties if arrangements can be made; the relaxation of existing sign code for additional signage opportunities; and the allowance of outdoor displays of merchandise if they do not block sidewalks.

"This is one of the companies that is in the process of displacing people," Pulpolibri said.

Protesters called on Gov. Gavin Newsom and Nancy Pelosi, Speaker of the House of Representatives, by name to create legislation that would put a halt to the collection of rent and mortgage payments, as well as utility fees, until the end of the pandemic.

Sergio Vargas, 28, of Los Angeles, a lead organizer for the alliance, said the group named key members of the Democratic Party in its call action because "the Democrats are supposed to be the party of the workingclass people.'

"We're calling on politicians, Nancy Pelosi, we're calling on Gov. Gavin Newsom, on our council members, supervisors for them to implement laws to make these corporations pay for the cancellation of rent and mortgages during the crisis of COVID-19," Vargas added.

Vargas noted the high unemployment rate among Los Angeles residents. He said he was passionate about the cause because he has seen families decimated by their inability to find affordable housing.

Maria Morales, 28, of south Los Angeles, Vargas' girlfriend and a mother to a 2-month-old son, is on maternity leave, but the coronavirus has hit close to home for her.

"I have immediate family that's being affected by this Morales "They're not able to pay their rent. They don't receive unemployment. They don't qualify for unemployment, so they're scrambling for these resources.

'They're [choosing] between, 'Do I pay my rent?' or 'Do I buy food for my children?' I'm here to support them in solidarity. I've been fortunate enough to have my job still, to have my partner who is helping me, but there's other people like my family, friends who [do not] have that choice."

Guadalupe Ortiz is a homeowner and landlord. Those she rents to have lost their jobs, and with her husband out of work for six weeks, she cannot make her mortgage payment.

"We understand this crisis is not just now," Ortiz said with Vargas acting as interpreter. "As soon as the shelter-in-place [order] is lifted, there's going to be a lot of foreclosures, there's going to be a lot of wealthy corporations like [the] Irvine [Co.]

who are going to come in and try to buy every single house they can. We cannot

let this happen." The Irvine Co. declined to comment on the protest. In a statement released by

the California Apartment Assn. on May 1, Tom Bannon, the chief executive officer of the CAA, condemned threatened rent strikes that tenant-advocacy groups were attempting to organize in the state.

"Choosing not to pay the rent causes a serious chain reaction that goes well bevond the renter and landlord," Bannon said in the release. "When rent is not paid, rental property owners may find themselves unable to cover their own bills, including their mortgage, utilities, property upkeep, and if they have employees, their payroll. If a landlord's employees aren't paid, how are those workers going to feed their families or pay their own rent?"

Bannon made a distinction between rent strikers and those who could not pay rent due to financial hardships brought on by COVID-19. The statement said that renters who fall into the latter category should explain their situation to their landlord, and the CAA also urged property owners to have patience and compassion when dealing with tenants impacted by the pandemic.

The CAA does have safeat-home guidelines in place, which Bannon said will be extended through June 30. They include freezing rent, halting the eviction of renters affected by COVID-19 and waiving late fees for renters who pay rent after the due date because the pandemic has affected their ability to do so.

Laguna Beach Mayor Bob Whalen said Friday. "The Village Entrance project will be a project that lives in our community and is enjoyed by generations for decades to come."

Discussion on the project often grew contentious, with residents, local organizations and council members hotly debating what the Village Entrance should look like, if the sewer digester should be preserved, what public art should be displayed there

whether or not there should be a parking structure.

In 2013, the Daily Pilot reported that \$1 million had been spent over 18 years on studies and designs as it related to the Village Entrance project.

Included in the updates were renovations to parking lots, installation of decorative fencing along the drainage channel, the addition of electric vehicle charging stations, demolition of the aging marine safety and police support buildings and subsequent construction of replacement buildings.

project's "The new

bridges, wider multi-use trails and paved access roads improve pedestrian, bicyclist and driver safety at one of the busiest and most visible intersections in town," Assistant City Manager Shohreh Dupuis said.

Wide multi-use trails were also added to create a pedestrian-friendly environment that includes bicycle racks and seating. Extensive landscaping was also done in the area, which included the planting of 75 new trees, 3,250 shrubs and placement of 50 flats of ground cover.

"The Village Entrance project's new pedestrian walkways, benches, bike racks and beautifully landscaped green spaces create a first impression to the city of Laguna Beach that we can all be proud of," Whalen said in a statement.

"And at a time when outdoor activity is so important to our community, this project's completion comes at the perfect moment," he added.



class."

"I think graduation's super important. It's one final place that we can all be together," DeCinces said.

DeCinces said she had spoken with 10 other seniors and that the group had initially planned on holding a celebration of their own but felt that it wasn't the same as having the physical graduation ceremony.

She added that she felt current plans excluded actual participation from the senior class.

"It sounded like a link to the video they were sending us, which is even worse if we were all on Zoom," she said.

Corona del Mar senior Nik Darrough said he understood why couldn't have an in-person graduation, but that it "sucks not to ... [but] it's important that we do what's best for everyone."

Sunny Beeker, a parent of a graduating senior at Newport Harbor, said she sent two letters to district Supt. Fred Navarro raising concerns about why the decision was made a month before the actual graduation ceremony and why commencement could not be delayed until later in the summer.

"We are making a last ditch, Hail Mary, appeal for [the district] to reconsider your decision in the name of keeping it safer for our children, while making them feel that everything was truly considered. We have a month," Beeker wrote.

"A lot can change in a month," she said.

"We have come too far to not be celebrated in a way where I can graduate on the field with my buddies, classmates and peers," Braham Duncan, a senior at Newport Harbor, said.

"Us 2020 graduates care more about just having the memory of tossing our caps up in the air with those we grew up with than we do about making sure the parents [and] grandparents are in the stadium," Duncan said. "We don't care how spread out we are on the field or even

onto the track, we just want that experience of truly graduating."

Kristen Hatfield, another parent at Newport Harbor, said she was disappointed to hear about the graduation going online because she and other parents had heard it was the last option.

"More than anything, I wanted [my son] and his friends — and all of the seniors — to be able to set foot on campus, one last time, and celebrate with their friends, on a sunny day wearing their caps and gowns. Not at home watching it on their phones," Hatfield said.

But, Hatfield said, she felt her son and his friends would be able to find a way to still celebrate their graduation and "make it one of the most memorable and defining moments of their teenage years."

"We realize that not having traditional commencement ceremonies is disappointing — it would be all of our first choice — but know that this decision is based on protecting the safety and well-being of students, staff and families," said Annette Franco, a spokeswoman for the district.

"We must abide by state orders and social distancing guidelines," Franco added. "We have a moral imperative to provide the safest environment for our school community, which is why our principals, in collaboration with the district, selected a graduation broadcast.'

The Laguna Beach Unified School District has also made a shift to holding an online graduation ceremony on June 11 and is working on confirming a date or dates for a modified in-person ceremony for the week of July 27, dependent on the lifting of current statewide stay-athome orders.

The Huntington Beach Union High School District did not announce its plans for graduation as of Friday afternoon and local private schools have not responded to requests for comment on their plans for commencement.
