Field of Honor returns

n time for Armed Forces Day, Field of Honor has returned to Castaways Park in Newport Beach to recognize U.S. service members as well as first responders for their sacrifices in the line of duty.

It's the 15th year the Exchange Club of Newport Harbor has organized the display of 1,776 American flags — a number that represents the year the Declaration of Independence was signed. The flags, which were set up Friday, will be on display daily through Memorial Day.

Some of the flags were dedicated in honor of a specific individual, and half the net proceeds from those dedications will go toward supporting military families.

The remainder will be put toward programs promoting the prevention of child abuse, programs within the Newport-Mesa Unified School District, scholarships and charitable organizations.

A special celebration will be held on Saturday from noon to 1 p.m. at Castaways Park, located at 700 Dover Drive, for Armed Forces Day. The keynote speaker will be Maj. Billy Hall, who, according to the club, is believed to be the last living veteran enlisted before WWII who saw combat in that war as well as in Korea and Vietnam. A Memorial Day celebration will be held on May 27 from noon to 1 p.m. at the park.

The keynote speaker for that event is expected to be Elaine Brattain, a national chaplain for American Gold Star Mothers from 2019 to 2022.

Lawsuit blames N.B. for flooding of home

Couple sues the city after the same water main breaks twice and destroys the Corona del Mar home both times.

The trial dates for two related lawsuits filed against the city of Newport Beach accusing it of negligence in the maintenance of a water main that burst and flooded a local home twice has been set for this fall, according to attorney Jesse Creed.

Amy and Marshall Senk have owned their home on Evening Canyon Road in Corona del Mar since 2002 and, after remodeling it, began living there in August 2006.

In October 2020, a water main owned and operated by the city failed and burst, which led to "catastrophic" flooding of the property with 500,000 gallons of water, according to a complaint filed in Orange County Superior Court in April 2023 by the Senks'

Fliers in Costa Mesa are unofficial

Notices placed on cars near Lions Park warning drivers not to park in neighborhood are not valid, city officials say.

Costa Mesa officials this week warned residents to disregard paper fliers appearing to come from City Hall that were placed on vehicles parked on the city's west side in an apparent attempt to scare drivers away from parking

Bearing a replica of the city's seal, the notice warns recipients they have 24 hours to remove their cars or be towed at the owner's expense.

The notice, which contains typos, incorrect punctuation and a misspelling purports to have been signed off on by "Costa Mesa City" and "Costa Mesa Police":

"The City of Costa Mesa Highway Department; notifies the

Charm House Tour in Laguna Canyon set for tomorrow

Randy Bader, an elder statesman of Laguna Beach's art festivals, found it somewhat amusing when he was approached about including his home on the Charm House Tour.

The woodworking artist has shown his work for 45 years at the Sawdust Art Festival and for 48 years at the Festival of Arts. Throughout that time, Bader insists that he has only taken on art projects that he wanted to do. He has encouraged young artists to do the same.

"I have never made anything to sell," Bader said. "I only make what I want to make, and I'm very fortunate in that, for some reason, my design sense, people really like. I can't explain it, to be honest with you.

"I'll look in the mirror sometimes and go, 'How the hell did I get here?' Yes, you have to sell. When I started doing cutting boards, which is what I did for the first nine years at the Sawdust, I didn't do them for the money. . . . I did them so that I would never have to make a piece of furniture that somebody wanted out of a book, or out of a magazine, or something like that."

Bader's personal connection to his own artwork seeped over into his house, making it an ideal candidate to be featured on the tour.

Interestingly, the inspiration for Bader's home came from the past owner of another house included on this year's slate of homes.

Jerry Rothman, who was a ceramics artist and a professor at Cal State Fullerton when Bader went to school there, held an annual Halloween party. When Bader attended one, he discovered that everything in the house was a work of art. He made note of the house being free of decorations and store-bought products.

"I saw that and I said, 'This is exactly what I want my house to be,'" Bader said. "That was when I was a young art student, and I didn't have any art. That was my inspiration. ... Jerry's house is on the tour.

"A lot of art, I don't think is as personal. It's beautiful. People buy it because of the name of the person, or because it was expensive, or because of something. But the way we collected art, I can walk through the house and tell you a story about almost every single piece on the wall, every single piece on the counter."

The Charm House Tour is put on annually by Village Laguna the Sunday after Mother's Day. It returned from a coronavirus-induced hiatus last May, and this will be its 49th iteration.

Buses will leave tomorrow between noon and 3 p.m. from the Festival of Arts, 650 Laguna Canyon Road. Tickets are \$70 presale or today, the day of

the tour, at *villagelaguna* .*org*. The houses will close for viewing at 5 p.m.

Johanna Felder, a past president of Village Laguna, said the tour has viewed all sorts of neighborhoods in Laguna Beach. Several go by their own names, from Bluebird Canyon to Top of the World. The most recent tour took place exclusively in North Laguna.

"We have had castles and cottages because people like to see some of the larger homes that have been built," Felder said. "We've had some of the wonderful homes on the oceanfront, so they haven't all been cottages. We usually try to give people a variety to show what Laguna has, but this is very unique in the fact that we're in the canyon."

Tour organizers believe it will deliver on that promise of variety again. In addition to its nod to Laguna Beach's artistic culture, a visit to the Blue Bell Foundation for Cats will show the kind of outside-the-box thinking that

has been present in town. The Blue Bell property is a cottage home. Bertha Yergat opened her door to new feline friends that had lost their way. She founded the organization, and to this day, senior cats continue to enjoy a comfortable living.

The former residence of artist Robert Young, known for a nine-year undertaking called, "The Big One," is also on the tour. The 9-foot-by-15-foot painting was on display during Laguna Art Museum's Art and Nature Festival in 2022.

Those who take the tour will also visit the Pearl, a wellness retreat that has operated in the canyon for 15 years.

"I think this tour is a little different from our others," said Rosemary Boyd, who contributed to the summaries of the sites in a brochure for the tour. "We have two properties that aren't essentially somebody's personal dwelling. There's the Blue Bell Foundation, and then there's the Pearl, which is essentially a business."

owners of vehicles that are not registeres on Park Street. Road ordinance 241b says that owners have to park their cars near their homes and not near others houses or apartments."

City spokesman Tony Dodero confirmed an unnamed resident, having found a flier on the windshield of his vehicle, took it to City Clerk Brenda Green. The resident said he'd legally parked on Park Drive and walked from there to his residence on nearby James Street.

Dodero issued a warning on social media outlets Wednesday.

"We wanted to get the word out for people to dis-regard it," Dodero said, clarifying that the ordinance referenced in the flier, like the notice itself, is bogus. "It's illegal to actually take a city seal and pretend you have the full weight of the city behind you."

Actual city law, as stated in Chapter 1 of Title 2 of the Costa Mesa Municipal Code, Section 2-15, states it is a misdemeanor crime to reproduce or use the city's seal for any unofficial, unsanctioned use.

"No person shall place

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any imitation of the city seal on any written or printed material that is designed, calculated, intended or likely to confuse, deceive or mislead the public or cause the reader of such written or printed material to believe it to be an official city publication," it reads. "[And] no person shall circulate or distribute any such written or printed material in the city of Costa Mesa."

This week's incident is not the only time Costa Mesa denizens have taken the law into their own hands by replicating an official act. Last July, pedestrians near Wilson Park found a hastily painted crosswalk across Wilson Street, where a real one had been planned but not yet installed.

In that incident, Public Works employees acted quickly to cover up the marks on the street and then oversaw the installation of a real crosswalk with a high-intensity activated crosswalk (HAWK) signal with flashing lights.

Costa Mesa Police Department spokeswoman Roxi Fyad reported Thursday no calls had come into the station regarding the discovery of additional fliers on or near Park Drive.

Corona tops H.B. in Division 1 semifinals

CORONA — Corona High junior Seth Hernandez is known as the top two-way baseball player in the class of 2025.

Huntington Beach hit decently against Hernandez on Tuesday in the semifinals of the CIF Southern Section Division 1 playoffs.

But then he turned to his bat to

Hernandez launched a two-run home run in the bottom of the sixth inning as the Panthers beat the Oilers, 3-1, to book their spot in the Division 1 title game.

Top-seeded Corona (29-3) will play No. 2-seeded Studio City Harvard-Westlake for the championship on Saturday at 7:30 p.m. at Diamond Stadium in Lake Elsinore.

After losing in the Division 1 semifinals for the second time in three years, Huntington Beach will try to regroup for next week's CIF State Southern California Regional playoffs. Coach Benji Medure and his team know what happened the last time this scenario occurred, as Huntington Beach claimed the regional title in 2022.

"We've got a second chance," Medure said. "We know it's not the CIF championship game, but we don't care. We get to play together and play for something, and that means something to us, so we'll do it."

Huntington Beach (23-9) lost to National High School Invitational tournament champion Corona for the third time this season, by a total of five runs. Oilers junior right-hander Tyler Bellerose was certainly up to the challenge Tuesday, allowing just one earned

run in his five innings of work.

Corona still struck first in the bottom of the fourth inning on a two-out rally. Hernandez singled to right, and took third on another single by Josh Springer. Hernandez then scored on a wild pitch, the third straight pitch in the dirt by Bellerose, with junior catcher Trent Grindlinger blocking the first two.

"We were just trying to miss down, you know, but it was just too down," Medure said. "It caught the front of the plate and it shot up over the top of our catcher. Just one of those things."

Huntington Beach tied the score in the sixth, on a towering solo home run to right by sophomore CJ Weinstein on a 2-0 pitch. It was the third homer of the year for Weinstein. He was two for three to account for half of the visitors' hits — Ethan Porter hit a leadoff double in the first and Travis Curry singled in the fifth.

"When you fall behind, it's tough to get it back, especially good hitters like CJ," said Hernandez, who allowed the one earned run in six innings and is now 9-0 this season with a 0.50 ERA. "He's a great hitter. He's gotten me every time we've played. Falling behind hurt me there, but I just adjusted after that, got it back."

Medure brought in freshman phenom right-hander Jared Grindlinger in the bottom of the inning. With one out, Brady Ebel reached on a high pop-up that landed in fair territory just in front of home plate.

"You teach your pitcher not to catch fly balls or pop-ups," Medure said. "But in that case, that's the time to catch it, right? He's an outfielder — he's a good

athlete — but his brother called him off and the ball dropped. Then it's a two-run home run. It's a tricky play, and it happens right at the worst time for us."

Indeed, Hernandez followed with a homer to left — his eighth of the season — on a 2-1 change-up over the middle.

Billy Carlson pitched a 1-2-3 scoreless seventh inning to earn

the save for Corona, which has advanced to its first CIF title game since 2017.

Huntington Beach was vying for its third CIF Southern Section title game appearance, the first since the program's lone championship in 2015.

"It's tough, especially when you play a team so much and see them more and more," Hernandez said of his team's close games with the Oilers this year. "I don't think it gets easier, I think it gets harder. They're a great team, great organization. I know a lot of the guys over there, and they're all dogs, so it felt good to get the win for sure."

attorneys from Panish|S-hea|Ravipudi LLP. The damage left in the wake of the failure made the house uninhabitable.

Because the damage made it necessary to demolish and rebuild their home, the Senks lived in temporary quarters for the two years the work was underway. They were preparing to move back into their home in November 2022 when the same water main broke and flooded the home a second time.

Construction on the second rebuild was completed earlier this year, but the Senks are fearful of returning because the house remains subject to the same risks, according to Creed.

"Imagine if the water main breaks again and floods. If you're on the stairs and you're rushing down, there's a health and safety risk. If you had people over, if their kids were there or if they invited friends and family over and a flood were to happen, there's a health and safety risk," Creed said.

The complaint contends the city knew of the risks and dangers but failed to take any corrective action that would keep a water main break from happening again, forcing the Senks to have to vacate their home twice. Attorneys are seeking general and special damages, including the repair and replacement of their home; relocation costs and expenses; emotional damages; increased operating expenses; development, engineering, architectural and litigation costs.

The Senks are also asking for injunctive relief for the abatement of continuing trespass and nuisance, attorneys' fees, experts' fees, prejudgment interest and any other relief deemed appropriate by the court.


The same law firm also filed a suit on behalf of the Senks in December 2022, also for inverse condemnation, in which they are also seeking all general and special damages relating to the repair and replacement of their home. Both suits are expected to go to trial in October.

the City Council on Jan. 12, the Senks said they felt the city had "abandoned" them

as they requested the city help pay for relocation costs. Insurers paid for them to live elsewhere during the reconstruction for about a year, but that year ran out and the family's been paying out of pocket to live in temporary hous-

ing ever since. The home recently received a certificate of occupancy allowing us to move back in. But as of this date, the city has done absolutely nothing to prevent the water main from breaking again," the Senks wrote. "While we understand the city has plans at different phases to make public improvements, the improvements have not been complete nor do we believe the city has even started making those improvements."

City Atty. Aaron Harp declined to comment on specifics of the active litigation but pointed to a new amendment to an engineering consultation contract first approved in 2022 that addresses Evening

Canyon Road specifically.

The amendment, approved May 14 during the

Newport Beach City Council's regular meeting, requests Stantec Consulting Services, Inc. for additional professional engineering and construction services to modify the storm drain design and extend the water main on Evening Canyon Road and Shorecliff Road.

Two construction contracts, with T.E. Roberts and All American Asphalt, were approved in October 2023 and January 2024 respectively.

In a report prepared for the City Council, city staff said recent water main breaks in the area necessitate the additional work on Evening Canyon Road. Senk said the family requested the city aid in paying for that relocation until that work has been completed.

Harp confirmed that the city entered a settlement with State Farm for \$2.3 million, which he said was to cover insurer payments for the water loss at the

Senks' property in 2020.

Creed said he felt the payment to State Farm was a sign of the city "abandoning" the Senks, saying the city prioritized a corporation over its residents.

"Our lives have been devastated twice by the city of Newport — first in 2020 and again in 2022. This isn't a natural disaster. This is a city-made disaster that has not only interrupted our lives, but stolen time and experiences from our family that we will never be able to get back or replicate," the Senks said in a statement to the Daily Pilot on May 15. "We haven't been home, together as a family, since 2020. We've had to do things like call our son to tell him not to come home for Christmas.

"Our daughter, who is graduating from college this year, has never been able to go 'home' her entire college career."
