# Local outcry against human rights abuses in Iran grows as protesters rally in C.M.

The fight to raise awareness of human rights abuses in Iran is gaining momentum in Orange County, as a local demonstration united under the rallying cry, "Women, Life, Freedom" drew protesters Friday to

Costa Mesa City Hall. A crowd of more than 50 people assembled along Fair Drive Friday evening, as individuals waved red, white and green flags and held posters urging for a "Free Iran."

The events follow the Sept. 16 death of 22-year-old Mahsa Amini in the custody of Iranian authorities. Amini had been detained three days earlier by the nation's "morality police" for the alleged improper wearing of a hijab, or head covering, as required by law.

Her death has sparked an outbreak of anti-government demonstrations in Iran, during which at least 233 protesters

# Rancor sours Laguna Beach election

Acrimonious encounters often pit Councilman Peter Blake against members Toni Iseman and George Weiss.

With the midterm election rapidly approaching, Laguna Beach is seeing an ugly, continuing theme in its local government spill over into the political campaign.

The community is struggling to find any level of civility, as its City Council meetings are often rife with rancor. Council members have verbally sparred with one

Those acrimonious encounters most often feature Councilman Peter Blake on one side and Councilmembers Toni Iseman and George Weiss on the other.

Blake, who is running for reelection, and Weiss have both been censured by the council, for different reasons, since the latter

# Human remains possibly blocked drainpipe

The Orange County Sheriff's Department is assisting Caltrans and California Highway Patrol with an investigation into possible human remains discovered Monday inside a drainpipe near the 55 Freeway in Costa Mesa.

Sheriff's spokesman Sgt. Scott Steinle said deputies were contacted Monday by Caltrans, which had sent maintenance workers to the area to perform maintenance on a drainpipe just west of the freeway. The drainpipe runs eastward toward a connector pipe in the center me-

### L.B. man accused of fatally stabbing his mother found not guilty by way of insanity

A judge found a man who admitted to killing his mother at their home in Laguna Beach in 2019 not guilty by way of insanity

Monday. Matthew Bryson McDonald had initially pleaded not guilty to one count of murder with a sentencing enhancement for the use of a deadly weapon. He changed his plea and admitted to the charge filed against him during a hearing Tuesday, Orange County District Attorney's spokeswoman Kimberly Edds said. He was subsequently found to be insane by Judge Richard King.

McDonald had been diagnosed with catatonic schizophrenia and was legally deemed unable to provide or care for himself in 2007. He lived with his mother and court-appointed conservator, Megan Estes Hampton, in the Laguna Terrace Park mobile-home community on South Coast Highway. Friends described her as a caring woman who tried everything to help her son overcome his condition.

McDonald contested the conservatorship which gave Hampton the authority to require him to receive medical treatment — at several points between 2007 and 2014. But, he ultimately wound up withdrawing his objections each time.


Residents at the mobile-home community had reported hearing multiple arguments coming from their residence in the days leading up to her killing. They also heard screaming coming from there before McDonald was seen driving away in her car.

A neighbor who was supposed to accompany Hampton to church services found her stabbed to death at about 10:45 a.m. on Sunday, Oct. 18. Orange Sheriff's deputies stopped McDonald in Hampton's car less than 30 minutes later in San Clemente. Blood was on his clothing at the time.

McDonald remained in Orange County Sheriff's custody as of Tuesday, Edds said. He is scheduled to attend a mental health commitment hearing, which will determine whether he must be confined to a mental health institution, on Friday, Nov.

In less than a month, voters must fill three of Fountain Valley's five City Council seats, including one left vacant by outgoing Councilman Michael Vo. There are two incumbents, veterans, past and present public servants as well as professionals from the fields of education, medicine and the tech industry among the 13 people vying for a position on the governing

Fountain Valley is not divided into council districts. which means every candidate is pooled into the same race. Voters will be asked to select up to three candidates on their ballots.

vou believe are the most important facing the city and why:

• Protect city revenue to avoid tax increases while maximizing services received by residents, civil servants and business owners. It is critical that we enhance and develop alternative revenue streams, including attracting new businesses and supporting current businesses. I am opposed to increasing taxes or adding new debt via bond purchases. My starting point will be to assess current and past budget items to see what has been underutilized and transfer money from within.

 Enforcing regulations relating to the short-term rental ban, parking violations and zoning. Regional and local growth projections and housing unit allocations must be considered through a realistic framework. Aesthetic appeal and functionality, as well as residents'/business well-being and public safety, must be prioritized over government mandates.

• Enhancing resources for the homeless by collaborating with government officials and those affected to find solutions and resources. Keeping our neighborhoods, sidewalks, parks and businesses clean and safe is a must. I will advocate for police and emergency medical services to assist. I am committed to working with City Net, our police department, social work agencies, churches and outreach programs to ensure that the proper services are rendered. This may include mental health services, housing, addiction treatment, medical care or social services assistance.

Name the three issues you believe are the most important facing the city and why:

· Affordable housing -Fountain Valley has very limited land to build traditional single-family homes. The current home pricing averages \$950,000-plus. Even for an average professional household with double income today, it is difficult to qualify for a home loan and monthly payment. We must adopt multiplelevel housing units for small families and for individuals who want to scale

down and remain a part of this community. This will help accommodate smaller families and current residents, helping them stay close to their friends, family and community network.

• Generate revenue/cut taxes for businesses — We must entice large and small businesses to come by providing them with special tax programs. 

### Bus strike averted before shutdown

A strike that would have halted all bus service in Orange County on Monday morning was avoided late Sunday evening, thanks to a last-minute agreement between the Orange County Transportation Authority and the Teamsters Local 952.

Although the bus mechanics and the authority have not reached a deal on a new contract, negotiations will resume after Gov. Gavin Newsom's office intervened and asked for more talks, a labor leader said.

About 150 mechanics. service workers and machinists with the OCTA have been working under an expired contract since Sept. 30, according to Teamsters Local which represents the striking workers. Negotiations began May 25, and the union has met with OCTA more than 20 times.

"We remain committed to doing what it takes to avoid a labor action that would disrupt transportation services for thousands of daily Orange County riders," said Eric Jimenez, Local 952 Secretary-Treasurer. in a statement Wednesday. "However, we stand united with our members in the fight for a fair and equita-

ble agreement." The union said it voted to strike Wednesday, after the Orange County Transportation Authority "refused to address key health and welfare issues" and offered a "substandard final contract offer." Union members are

for improved hoping healthcare packages that would allow them to pay less out-of-pocket. Jimenez said some members pay \$350 a month for healthcare and that OCTA's proposal would increase their costs to \$400 to \$500 in the next two years or so.

In February, the union's bus operators reached a three-year contract with OCTA.

dian, near the Baker Street exit.

"During that maintenance, while they were surveilling one of the pipes, they found what they believed to be human remains," Steinle said Tuesday, indicating a robotic camera system was used to peer inside the structure. "The remains were deep inside of this drainpipe.

California Highway Patrol spokesman Officer Anselmo Templado confirmed Tuesday the rewere located shortly before 10 a.m. on Monday in a 26-inch diameter pipe just west of the freeway, near the Baker Street onramp to the 55-South.

Caltrans workers had been using a camera to investigate what appeared to be a blockage when they made a grim discovery about 120 feet east of the pipe's entry point, near the median of the freeway, Templado said.

"One of the things that caught the attention of the Caltrans operator operating the robot [camera] was that he first noticed a shoe," he added. "He, upon closer inspection by the camera, saw there were other features that appeared to be human."

CHP officers closed down the No. 1 southbound lane of the freeway to accommodate work crews, as Caltrans arranged Tuesday morning to begin flushing the system to try and expel the blockage. Initial efforts to push water through the infrastructure were stymied by a separate blockage, causing crews to use vacuum suction to remove the second clog so flushing could be initiated, Templado reported.

The Orange County coroner's office has been called to the scene along with an anthropologist to determine whether the material, once it's dislodged from the pipe, is human in nature.

Steinle said officials were standing by to retrieve the debris and determine next steps.

have been killed, according to the Human Rights Activists News Agency. Friday's event was or-

ganized by Costa Mesa resident Hengameh Abraham, who "Henny" came to the United States in 2000 at the age of 14. Abraham said she's been

reaching out to local city governments and elected officials to amass support for resolutions condemning the actions of the Islamic regime.

Her hope is that enough local interest will trickle up to higher levels of the U.S. government.

"We're trying to raise awareness as much as possible," she said Mon-

day, expressing a desire to hold a similar protest at every city hall in the county. "Whatever city you're from, talk to your city council and demand that they condemn the government of Iran.'

So far, the Costa Mesa mother of two has reached out to about 20 local cities. Her next step is to Orange contact the County Board of Supervisors and elected officials in the state Legislature and in Congress.

"Most people who are here, at this point, have either lost someone or know someone who has lost someone," she said of Iranian Americans trying to reach loved ones, despite rolling blackouts on Iranian internet networks. "We are feeling their pain.'

The crowd grew Friday as dozens of demonstrators came to Costa Mesa City Hall, including a group stationed earlier Friday outside Irvine Valley College, where President Joe Biden spoke during the final leg of a brief Southern California tour.

Car horns honked as motorists passed. Abraham, who said she shaved her head at age 12 in an attempt to circumvent head-covering laws and was issued stern warnings by the morality police, said she was heartened by the response.

"There were honking horns, people were joining in," she said. "It was beautiful."

# Ocean View secures share of league crown

Two days after fashioning a comeback that kept its Golden West League title hopes alive, Ocean View High leaned on its seniors to finish the job on Thursday.

Outside hitter Brooke Abascal had a match-high 18 kills, as the Seahawks defeated Katella 25-17, 25-19, 25-10 to earn a share of the league crown in a regular season finale at home.

Ocean View (14-12, 9-1) finished tied atop the league standings with Westminster (20-10, 9-1), which it rallied to beat in five sets on the road earlier in the week.

"I couldn't have asked for a better way to end the season," Abascal said of the comeback against the Lions. "It's just the energy. Our fans — even the fans on Westminster's side going at us — it just made us fight harder. So I thought it was a great experience."

Since both schools compete in Division 7 for the CIF Southern Section playoffs, Ocean View will enter the postseason with the second automatic bid from the Golden West League. Westminster won the first meeting between the teams in four sets, giv-

# UC Irvine to test new technology during earthquake drill

What do you do when there's an earthquake?

Drop, cover and hold on, says the Earthquake Country Alliance, a "public-private-grassroots" partnership made up of people, organizations and regional alliances geared around raising disaster preparedness in the face of earthquakes and tsunamis.

Orange County residents may receive text alerts Thursday morning, encouraging them to do just that and take cover as part of the statewide Great California Shakeout.

First staged in Southern California by the U.S. Geological Survey in 2008, it returns at 10:20 a.m. Thursday, when about 9.4 million people statewide will participate in the earthquake drill. Of that, an estimated 865,820 people in Orange County will take part.

That includes about 5,000

childcare and preschools, 510,000 schools, 47,000 local government bodies and 6,000 senior facilities.

And at one of those senior living facilities, administrators and a team of computer science researchers from UC Irvine will be working to put into practice a new technology alongside the drill that they say will provide critical information for care and locating senior patients in the event of an emergency and evacuation. "Over the years, I ... and

our team [have] been doing a lot of work with disaster response awareness and one of the things that we came across was, especially with the COVID-19 pandemic, that if you look at disasters of any kind older adults are disproportionately impacted," said Nalini Venkatasubramanian, a professor of computer science at UC Irvine.

Venkatasubramanian said the issue was often that

seniors tended to not get the care that they needed after evacuations, noting that people who were oxygen-tank dependent or required dialysis could not simply be evacuated to a school gym, for example, where power could potentially go off.

The idea for "CareDEX" was born. The technology was developed by Venkata-subramanian and Nikil Dutt, a distinguished professor of computer science, Sharad Mehrotra, a chancellor's professor of computer science, Lisa Gibbs, a clinical professor of geriatrics, and geriatrics project scientists.

"The idea was creating information preparedness, which allows us, senior care facilities, first responders, the government and other stakeholders to keep track of priorities and needs of the older adults. That includes conditions like dementia, oxygen-depend-

ence, [diabetes] — these are the kinds of conditions that need attention," Venkatasubramanian said. "You can't say come back a month later and take care of it."

Venkatasubramanian and her team have been collaborating with the city of Anaheim's emergency manager Jannine Wilmoth and the Walnut Creek retirement community to pilot CareDEX over the last year.

"From an operator's standpoint, ... these human beings are all ultimately my responsibility," Debbie Infield, executive director of Walnut Creek, said in an interview Tuesday. "Knowing where they are is half the battle."

Infield said the software, which can help provide information on patients' schedules and track where residents were last seen through WiFi-enabled tags or devices, can help her or first responders find the pa-

tients to get them the help that they might need. "Disaster preparedness is

as critical as response," Venkatasubramanian said. "If ... people do not know how to use the technology, they may not know how to use it during a disaster. Constantly embedding it in a dual-use process is a very useful thing to do because people are then used to it.

"The other thing is practice, practice, practice. These kinds of exercises are vital for people to understand what could go wrong and be able to anticipate and prepare for what might go wrong. I think it creates an awareness in the community. If I send out alerts and messages, it might not work for ... [the] blind. Saying, 'Hey, evacuate,' but maybe there is someone on the third floor or in a wheelchair."

Venkatasubramanian said having a "one size fits all" approach doesn't always work, especially for the elderly and disabled.

'Today, we have some technological ability to do this and the challenge is how do you make it accessible to everybody? ... I think there is a way to be prepared and we want to make citizens aware of that that disaster preparedness is critical because disasters are more frequent now. You want to know where your loved ones are; you want to know they're taken care of and people have information as to how to keep them safe.

"A lot of this can be done before the disaster," she said. If people are prepared and have plans for what they'll do in an emergency they can "develop the memory of what to do when a disaster occurs and that can help improve the outcomes," she said.

joined the panel in 2020.

The admonishment of Blake resulted from his unwillingness to adhere to the city's rules of decorum and civility policy, and his communications with some residents, whether in or

outside of public meetings,

have been known to cross

the line.

During an Oct. 4 meeting of the City Council, Blake, who claims property rights as a top issue for his campaign, again pushed the boundaries of civility on the dais when he questioned a resident about the specifics of the size of their home while they were providing testimony during the public hearing of an appeal for a single-family residence in the Three Arch Bay neighborhood.

During the exchange, he told the presenting resident, "You just humiliated yourself," drawing jeers from those in attendance. The aggressive rant carried on for more than a minute, prompting Mayor Sue Kempf to step in with the following comment: "We're talking about 44 La Senda, Peter. We're not talking about anything else — 44 La Senda. Nobody else's house is up for discussion here.

Weiss, who has made pitches for greater transparency within the city, was censured for the disclosure of information discussed in closed session. A first-term councilmember like Blake, Weiss has asked for further enforcement of the rules of decorum and civility.

lecorum and civility.
"In the case of Mr. Blake

and the City Council, I think this has been something that has really disturbed the fabric of our council and has diminished its usefulness as an institution in the city," Weiss said Tuesday's during City meeting. Council "And that's a shame, because it's driven people away from civic engagement and diminished the council.'

Three seats will be up for grabs on the council on Nov. 8. Kempf and Blake are running for re-election, while Iseman has chosen not to run for the office again after serving six terms.

There are seven candidates hoping to earn a spot on the dais, and a few of the challengers have named community consensus in decision-making among their priorities.

### CAMPAIGN MAILERS RILE RESIDENTS

Residents have also taken issue with recent mailers that arrived at their homes, the content appearing to brand candidate Ruben Flores as a partier who does not belong in city government. One depicts Flores' face photoshopped onto to a body in a toga with an alcoholic drink in his hand, and another showed a shirtless photo of the candidate.

"I never imagined that my desire to rejuvenate this town and build for its future in a thoughtful way with input from its own citizens would blow up in such a defamatory way against me personally," Flores said via text message

Tuesday.

Both mailers were paid for by a group calling itself

Supporting Blake and Opposing Flores for Laguna Beach City Council 2022.

"... I could talk about the fact that they've photoshopped my head onto someone else's toga body, and I could talk about all the other pains they're taking to discount me in a derogatory way," Flores added. "But the real story isn't about me. It's about wondering why these developers are so adamant that they push their agenda through in Laguna Beach. ... Shouldn't we be using our energy to make Laguna stronger and better, not tear each other down?"

tear each other down?"

Blake said he had nothing to do with the distribution of the controversial anti-Flores mailers, but he did not denounce them, either. He noted that he and others have been targeted in political cartoons, including one that depicted him in the pocket of developers

"There's no reach across the aisle with Village Laguna and Laguna Residents First," Blake said in a phone interview Tuesday. "There is no sit down and negotiate. [Mayor Pro Tem] Bob [Whalen] and Sue and all of them tried to negotiate with Laguna Residents First to remove that ballot [Measure Q, an initiative that would have Laguna Beach residents vote on the fate of certain development projects].

"They made concessions. Laguna Residents First made zero concessions, so anybody that thinks that there's going to be civility or reach across the aisle with Village Laguna and Laguna Residents First is nothing but a fool. I'm no fool. I will



continue to fight, and if I public suggested have to, it'll get 10 times ug-

lier in my next term."

Several residents, many of them regular speakers at meetings, addressed the council Tuesday, beginning their comments with references to October as bullying prevention month before sharing their own stories regarding Blake's be-

havior as an elected official. "The town of Laguna Beach has been subjected to a councilperson who has bullied, assaulted and name-called everyone who has dared to disagree with him," resident Johanna Felder said of Blake. "He has been an embarrassment to the council and to the entire town. He has proven time and time again that most 5-year-olds have more self-control than he has exhibited. ... His childish behavior is exhibited with his inability to allow speakers or fellow council

public suggested that some of Blake's critics had their own agenda to pursue in the election.

Input, whether it's from a member of the public or from a council colleague seems unwelcome, one member of the council said.

Iseman contended that while the panel is getting through its agenda items, it is doing so without valuing public or council input.

"There used to be negotiation," Iseman said in a phone interview Tuesday. "That's a thing of the past. Things come in and they go out, and if they get tweaked, it's a tiny one, but things don't really get that kind of discussion you hope [for] in a democracy.

"I don't think there's a town that has a better-informed electorate than Laguna. People are interested, they're smart, they come from positions of leadership in their work, and when they come to the city, they're ignored, they're dismissed, they're treated rudely, and sometimes they're humiliated, and it's

very painful to watch. Why would people bother to come to the council if their experience is it doesn't matter anyway?"

Whalen said the panel has been getting a lot done, but the acrimony has made conducting meetings "difficult" and "unpleasant." He added he wishes collaboration could be restored to the council.

"What I've always just tried to do is to stick to the merits of an issue and not get into personalities," Whalen said prior to Tuesday's council meeting. "People are going to have different viewpoints on things, but you just need to stick to the merits of an issue, make your case and hope that people will have an intelligent conversation about things, rather than name-calling. All I can do is model the behavior that I believe in, which I think is something I've always done, and hope that others will follow."
