Costa Mesa man in standoff could face felony charges

A Costa Mesa man who barricaded himself and two minors inside a residence for nearly 10 hours following a domestic disturbance Wednesday has been arrested on suspicion of attempted homicide, felony domestic violence and child endangerment, and threatening an officer.

Tyler Nathan Thornton, 37, of Costa Mesa was safely taken into custody at 10:13 a.m. after he allegedly assaulted his wife during an altercation that took place after midnight on the 3200 block of Dakota Avenue, the Costa Mesa Police Department reported.

While the victim fled the scene, the couple's two children remained inside the home during the hours-long standoff. Police said

Thornton was a registered gun owner who was believed to have firearms inside the residence and, at one point, threatened officers at the scene.

CMPD officers established a perimeter around the residence and evacuated adjacent residents as a precaution, the department stated in a Wednesday morning news release. Pedestrian and vehicle traffic were rerouted by traffic officers for several hours Wednesday morning.

A SWAT team and the department's K9 Unit were deployed to the scene, where a crisis negotiation team engaged in communications with Thornton to get him to peacefully exit the home.

Two nearby schools — Newport-Mesa Unified's California Elementary School and

TeWinkle Middle School — were notified of the standoff but were not placed on lockdown. District spokeswoman Annette Franco said parents were notified of the incident.

After Thornton was taken into custody and the children had been safely returned to their mother, officers searched the Dakota Avenue residence and recovered one handgun, two long guns and one airsoft replica gun inside, according to the release.

The case has been turned over to the Orange County district attorney's office for review. Information on the victims, including the two minors, was not being released to the public to protect their identities.

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Care facilities panel formed

The committee will advise Newport Beach council members on current city regulations.

The Newport Beach City Council adopted a resolution late last month to establish an ad hoc committee to examine and provide recommendations to council members on current city regulations surrounding residential care facilities.

According to a city staff report, the issue stems from a community meeting held in October by Councilwomen Joy Brenner and Diane Dixon and Councilman Duffy Duffield about sober living homes, group homes and state-licensed residential communities.

They heard from residents concerned about the number of such facilities and how they were run.

Dixon brought up the matter at the Oct. 11 council meeting, describing the community meeting as "powerful" as local and state officials, city staff and residents discussed the impacts of sober living homes on the quality of life in their neighborhoods.

"We must seek action now. That's what the residents are asking and that's what we, as the council, must listen to," Dixon said at the meeting. "... a person lost his life in our city in August a few weeks ago because of the inadequate management of the state-licensed drug alcohol residential facility in [Santa Ana Heights]."

The man in question was identified by authorities as 33-year-old Henry Lehr, a Tuscon, Ariz., resident.

Lehr left a residential detox center in the early hours of Aug. 26 after having told staff that he was hearing and seeing "demons," according to the Orange County district attorney's office.

Shortly afterward, Lehr entered the backyard of a home a few doors away in the area of Indus Street and Redlands Drive before approaching the front door of another home.

At the second house, he banged on the door and demanded to be let in. Eventually, Lehr broke down the door and proceeded up the

Ex-Costa Mesa resident extradited to O.C. on suspicion of \$1.4M workers' comp fraud

A former Costa Mesa resident who allegedly defrauded businesses of more than \$1.4 million by collecting insurance premiums on nonexistent policies pleaded not guilty last week to a slate of felony charges, including embezzlement, grand theft and forgery, officials reported.

Karyl Lynn Reed, 57, was arrested Oct. 7 in Seabreeze, Texas, and extradited to Orange County, where she faces 20 felony charges and enhancements for alleged criminal acts that took place between 2012 and 2019, according to an Oct. 27 release issued by the California Department of Insurance.

Officials say Reed, acting as an unlicensed insurance agent, collected premiums for workers' compensation insurance through two businesses, Envoy Business Partners and Allenn Specialty Group, both run out of a Huntington Beach office suite. A third business, Cultivate HR,

Inc., is listed as operating from a residence on Costa Mesa's Monte Vista Avenue.

Reed allegedly offered victims fraudulent certificates of insurance, causing them to believe they had valid coverage when they did not.

Newport police Sgt. Randy Parker, who died Oct. 25, called 'top-level'

People who worked with the late Newport Beach Police Department Sgt. Randy Parker Jr., who died of natural causes on Oct. 25, recalled him fondly and remarked on his professionalism this week.

"Randy was a remarkably respected, admired and effective detective sergeant," said Tom Gazsi, a former Newport Beach police officer of 32 years. "More importantly, he was an exceptional father, husband and dear friend to all who knew him. He will be missed by all who know and love him."

Parker's death was announced "with profound sadness" by Newport Beach Police Chief Jon Lewis, who in his statement said, "Randy was a third generation NBPD officer and served the Newport Beach community as a patrol officer, detective and supervisor for over 20 years. Randy's sense of humor and unwavering dedication to duty will never be forgotten."

Parker, a resident of Mission Viejo, was 44 at the time of his death, which was caused by bilateral pulmonary thromboemboli and other conditions, according to Orange County Sheriff's Department Public Information Officer, Sgt. Todd Hylton.

Jim Kaminsky, a retired captain with the NBPD, said this week he'd worked not only with Parker, but with family members who pre-

ceded him on the job.

"I not only knew 'Junior,' as we refer to him, but I knew his grandfather Jim Parker [a former NBPD captain and later chief of police in Reno] and worked in several specialized units within the NBPD with Junior's father Randy [Sr.]," Kaminsky said. "I had the honor of working with Junior over the years and found him to be a top-level police officer."

"When our job gets tough, some shy away," Kaminsky continued.

RH announces new four-story furniture gallery at Fashion Island, slated for 2024

Come the spring of 2024, the Forever 21 at Fashion Island will be a long-forgotten memory when RH — previously known as Restoration Hardware — opens the doors of its new four-story, 80,000-square-foot furniture gallery.

The Irvine Co. announced Tuesday the luxury furniture brand would be welcoming the business to Newport Beach. The building is expected to be situated on the ocean-facing side of the outdoor shopping mall. Some existing merchants will be relocated within the center to

make room for the new building.

Construction is expected to begin mid-2022.

The company declined to state the cost of renovation and construction, but did confirm that it has received all the approvals necessary for the project from the city.

This is the first RH furniture gallery location in Orange County, though the Corte Madera company has two locations in West Hollywood.

The Newport Beach location is expected to be larger than both West Hollywood locations, according to information listed

on the company's website. The location on Melrose Avenue is three stories and encompasses 40,000 square feet and the location on Beverly Boulevard is two stories and 21,000-square-foot in size.

Neither of those two locations have a restaurant as the Fashion Island location is expected to include. The furniture gallery will have entire floors dedicated to the brand's furnishings in addition to a rooftop restaurant and wine bar enclosed by glass.

Additionally, the gallery will have its own in-house interior

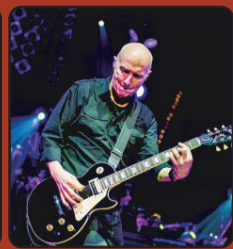

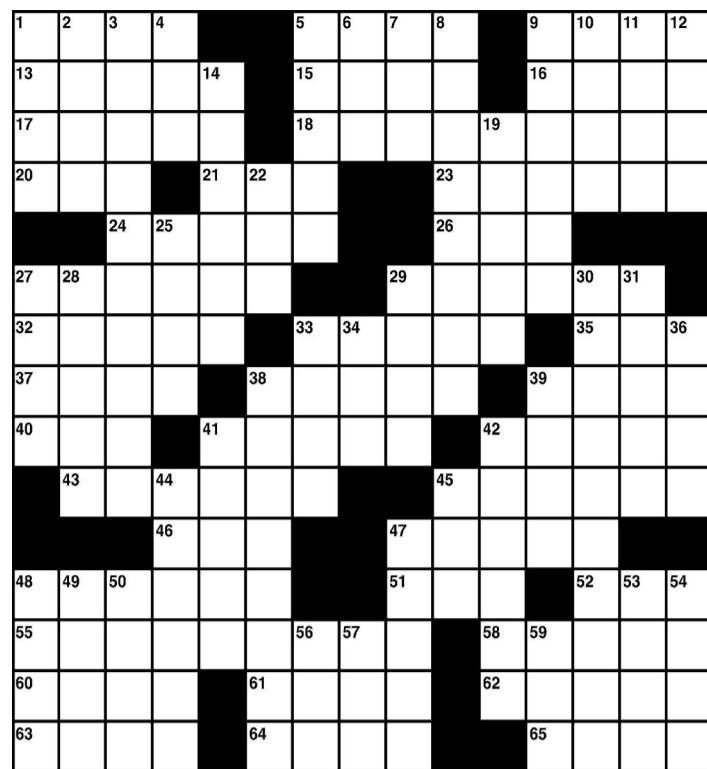

staircase. The homeowner, who was cleared of wrongdoing by the district attorney in October, fired once on Lehr with his pistol when Lehr did not identify himself and continued up the staircase.

Lehr died at the scene. "The safety of our residents is our number one priority, no less in this and other neighborhoods with state-licensed as well as the city-permitted facilities," Dixon said.

City staff said the last comprehensive update to the city's residential care facilities standards was in 2008.

Currently, there are about 32 residential care facilities that are licensed or state-licensed throughout Newport Beach. The formation of the ad hoc committee, which will include Duffield, Dixon and Brenner, was approved unanimously as part of the City Council's consent calendar.

The committee is expected to look at whether or not city practices are compliant with state and federal law; recommend legislative policies or positions regarding state or federal laws related to the regulation thereof; and, if necessary, recommend changes to the city's regulatory processes in relationship to residential care facilities.

On Oct. 26 the department honored Parker with a procession to Pacific View Mortuary & Memorial Park.

He is survived by his wife, Heidi, and by their young daughter and son, who are twins.

The Peace Officer Research Assn. of California has established a "Fund A Hero: In Memory of Sgt. Randy Parker Jr. Fund to help with funeral costs and other immediate needs. As of late Wednesday afternoon, \$61,761 had been raised toward its \$250,000 goal.

"The kids that we help are at risk are homeless or housing insecure aging from 12- to 24-years-old. They live in cars or streets, motels and some live on their own," Henkels said. "We help them navigate through the system and eligible county services, like Cal Fresh. We arrange their study program, bus pass, school, tutoring, job placement, sober living services, clothing, mentoring services, a place to live and every Friday we provide grocery delivery to their house."

Destin Judy, communications representative for the Southern California Honda Dealers Assn., said that because Stand Up for Kids is an inspiration and has a positive impact on youth, they were honored to bring them

random acts of helpfulness this Halloween, with costumes, face masks and their very own pumpkin.

Investigators learned Reed also operated a staffing company without providing workers' compensation coverage and personally administered employee injury claims. She collected premiums and payroll, employer and employee taxes and provided forged certificates of insurance, according to the release.

Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara said his department was dedicated to investigating and stopping unlicensed agents like Reed to better protect consumers and businesses.

"Local businesses are the lifeblood of our recovering economy," he said in the release. "Ms. Reed's alleged actions put these business owners' livelihoods at risk by stealing their money and leaving them uninsured."

Reed's case is being prosecuted by the Major Fraud Unit of the Orange County district attorney's office, which identified in a June 22 criminal complaint at least five businesses reportedly victimized by her fraudulent acts.

They included a property management company and autism therapy business in Los Angeles as well as a Santa Ana wholesale bakery and an assisted living facility in Long Beach.

Department of Insurance officials reported one victim learned something was wrong after attempting to verify certificates of insurance.

Another victim learned, only after an employee was injured, the business had no valid workers' compensation coverage. A third, the release indicated, discovered funds paid to Reed's staffing business were never remitted to the insurance company.

The three victims reportedly lost more than \$1.4 million. Because Reed is believed to have taken more than \$500,000, prosecutors charged her with a felony enhancement of aggravated white-collar crime that could prolong any prison sentence she would receive if convicted.

Reed is being held in an Orange County jail, according to an online inmate locator maintained by the Sheriff's Department.

Edison turns back Costa Mesa in CIF Division 2 opener

Edison High's depth, experience and attacking aggressiveness was more than Costa Mesa could handle in Tuesday's CIF Southern Section Division 2 boys' water polo playoff opener, and the Chargers used two dominant runs to pull away to an emphatic victory.

Everett Rowden scored five goals, Tommy Kelly put three away and Colin Ryder led a superb defensive effort as senior-heavy Edison cruised to a 13-7 triumph in the Mustangs' pool.

Edison (16-10), which finished the season ranked No. 8 in the Division 2 poll, advances to play at El Dorado (24-5) in the second round on Thursday. The Golden Hawks defeated El Segundo 16-12 in their first-round game.

The Chargers denied Costa Mesa (12-12) early penetration and used a pair of three-goal sprees to put the home side away.

"It's Costa Mesa's last home game of the season," Edison coach Nick Graffis said. "You know they're going to come out and

play really hard. They're going to give it 110 [percent], so we just had to match that intensity, and I think we did. ... The biggest thing is that we kept our calm. No hero-ball. We didn't get too amped up, too, when they started to come back. Just a good, all-around team effort."

The Mustangs, starting four freshmen and two sophomores, wilted early under defensive pressure, then strained to keep up when Edison countered. All three of their first-half goals came on 6-on-5 advantages, and they didn't find their best gear until the fourth quarter, the result already determined.

"It wasn't our best performance, but it wasn't our worst ...," said Costa Mesa co-coach Dustin Serrano, whose team dropped a 14-5 decision to the Chargers in Newport Harbor's tournament in September. "We were just inches away from getting that one extra goal we needed to get our confidence and momentum swing. It was disappointing, but we see the future is very bright with this team."

Edison went ahead

about a minute and a half in through Dennis Marcin. Wes Brazda pulled the Mustangs even on a power play four minutes later.

Then the Chargers pulled away to a 4-1 advantage, with Ryder scoring from distance off the crossbar late in the first period, then Joshua Winn and Rowden taking advan-

tage of Costa Mesa goalkeeper Omar Babovic's inexperience to start the second.

Two penalty shots, the second by Kelly with five seconds to go in the half, provided a 6-3 advantage at the break, and two quick power-play goals by Kelly to start the second half made it a five-goal difference. The Orange Coast League champions got no closer than a four-goal margin the rest of the way.

"We came in really hyped up," Rowden said. "We knew how they were going to play, and we knew

what we needed to do, and we went out and did it. ... We're a team that's, like, steal and counter. We have four or five high-tier varsity swimmers, and we all like to steal, play super-good defense, press out, make them tired and just swim."

Edison has CIF aspirations. "These guys basically had a year and a half of something weird going on, and they thought last year was going to be a big year for them," Graffis said. "Our goal from the beginning of the year was win
