

Fans celebrate Kobe Bryant Day with memorabilia, memories

Like many, Alexander Kolosow and his son, Alex II, celebrated Kobe Bryant Day in Orange County surrounded by images of the late Lakers star.

Walking inside of the Kolosow family's two-story house in Huntington Beach on Monday, it resembled a Kobe Bryant museum.

Bryant memorabilia covered the walls, tables, countertops and floors. In the kitchen and Kolosow and his 44-year-old son, Alex II, paid tribute to Bryant on Kobe Bryant Day in Orange County.

The county Board of Supervisors declared Aug. 24 as Kobe Bryant Day. The day before, Bryant would have turned 42.

Orange County residents on Monday honored the basketball



Caution the rule as virus declines in O.C.

As students log on to learn, Newport-Mesa officials say there's much to consider before campuses can reopen.

Tuesday Orange County marked its third day of being off a statewide coronavirus monitoring list, showing a decline in infections and hospitalizations as health officials reported 335 new cases and 15 deaths - a fraction of records hit in recent months.

Hospitalizations dropped to 385 patients, with 113 in intensive care, the lowest rates recorded in the past two months and nearly half of peak levels seen in mid-July.

That trend could spell good news for schools that will technically be allowed to resume inperson instruction once the county has remained off the list for 14 consecutive days, according to state reopening guidelines.

But at Newport-Mesa Unified - where 1,650 students logged on Monday for a 100% virtual Cloud Academy and another 17,350 began the new school year under a distance-learning model — officials say there's still much work to be done before physical campuses reopen.

In a release sent out Tuesday to the school community, Supt. Russel Lee-Sung clarified no date has been set for the resumption of in-person learning. He assured the district would provide advance notice of any changes in the instructional model.

"This is expected to be a year of continuous adjustment to changing conditions," Lee-Sung said in a separate statement Tuesday. "Adjusting what and how we teach in a remote setting or switching to modified in-person instruction will also be a significant challenge." District officials are working out the calculus of how students enrolled in a flexible, three-level learning plan might return to class under a hybrid model complete with facial coverings, social distancing and smaller class cohorts operating on a limitedhour schedule. They must also solve the logistics of arranging bus transportation and meal distribution, while reaching agreements with Newport-Mesa's employee unions about a possible return to physical campuses. "It's like a giant Rubik's Cube," said Newport-Mesa Board President Martha Fluor of the work that remains. "I know parents want our kids to go back. But

Locals who received fist bumps and coaching advice from Kobe Brvant will never forget the basketball legend and Newport Beach resident.

Ryan Broccolo's 2-year-old son Brayden never got to see Los Angeles Lakers superstar and Newport Beach resident Kobe Bryant play basketball. But he did get to meet him.

The "Black Mamba" met Brayden Broccolo at a children's book fair at Orange Coast College last October. He signed a book for Brayden, and they exchanged fist bumps.

"I was first a fan of the athlete he was, then more so a fan of the person he was with the

whole Mamba Mentality," said Rvan Broccolo, 41, a Fountain Valley resident. Broccolo attended Bryant's last game in April 2016, in which he scored 60 points in a win over Utah, as well as his memorial service at Staples Center last February.

"After he retired, he showed that no matter how busy you are, no matter how much you have going on, you always have time to be a great father," Broccolo said. "He inspired me on and off the court."

Huntington Beach school district rolls out sports reopening plan

The Huntington Beach Union High School District has provided a framework for the resumption of athletics and performing arts programs that had been shut down due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Monday marked the first day that district schools could resume sports workouts, albeit with a litany of protocols in place.

"First day was a feeling that is hard to put into words," Ocean View High School football coach Luis Nunez said. "I had goosebumps of joy to see all the kids on the field together again. I know a lot of districts started and shut down and started up again, but in [the Huntington Beach Union High School District], we never got the opportunity to ever start since March. This is the first summer I did not have football since ninth grade, as I have always had practice as a player or coach since 1995.

The school district's reopening guidelines provide for a phased rollout with three parts. Currently

in Phase I, all sports can resume workouts. People must spread out into groups of 10 or fewer outdoors. There will be a limit of 50 people per outdoor facility throughout the reopening phases. Sports were categorized as

listed below: Low risk: running sports, swimming sports, sideline cheer and song, noncontact dance, golf, choir choreography, and string and percussion instruments.

Moderate risk: baseball, volleyball, tennis, badminton, girls' lacrosse, soccer, baseball, softball, water polo and field hockey.

High risk: wrestling, football, boys' lacrosse, competitive cheer and song, and contact dance.

Marina football coach Jeff Turley said that he had about 47 kids between varsity and junior varsity show up on Monday. He added that a number of athletes opted out of coming out this week with the workouts being optional.

Turley said the workouts at this point have primarily consisted of agility drills and conditioning using body weight.



Orange County came off the state's coronavirus monitoring list on Sunday, starting a 14-day countdown before schools could be allowed to physically reopen. Turley is hopeful that timeline might also be the basis for moving into Phase II of the resumption of athletics.

There's a wishful one," Turley

said regarding a timeline for moving into Phase II. "They took Orange County off the watch list, so I sit there and go, 'OK, 14 days from now, we should be able to go to Phase II.' I'm hoping and praying that everything just keeps settling down and we can move into Phase II in a couple of weeks."

A social distance of 6 feet will be

Phase II does provide for 10 people to be indoors, and equipment can be shared on a limited basis for moderate- and high-risk sports. At that point, low-risk

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

strong stepped on the moon.

"People will remember where they were when Kobe Bryant died," the 70year-old said.

On Monday, the father and son wanted to celebrate Bryant and reminisce about their favorite Bryant accomplishments, games and moments. There were so many. Fivetime NBA champion. Eighteen-time NBA All-Star. Two-time Olympic gold medalist. Eighty-one-point game. Twenty-six gamewinning shots.

Looking at the back of Bryant's cards helped them relive those memories.

"It's like picking up a good book today," Alexan-der Kolosow said. "I need a magnifying glass to read the back of the cards. My son just reads them with his eyes."

Kolosow's son went to the same Huntington Beach high school as Bryant's widow, Vanessa. While they attended Marina High School at different times, he said he still thinks about the helicopter crash and how Bryant's

family is doing. "Every single day," he said. "We've had so many things go bad this year, with COVID-19, politics, and the beginning of the year started with Kobe dying. It's just so sad and tragic."

Orange County fans choices we make can change our world overnight.

"Kobe had to go through his own hell, and he had to climb out of it. He knew he had to change and there would be no looking back.'

There's also a new mural of Bryant up in Santa Ana. Tony Concep, Mikala Taylor and Michael Ziobrowski are the artists behind the 11-by-90-foot mural at the ASHE Society cannabis dispensary on 3601 W. Garry Ave.

The mural, completed just in time for Kobe Bryant Day, includes Bryant holding Gianna after he led the Lakers to the NBA title in 2009. It was the fourth championship Bryant helped the Lakers win.

Like many fans, Rey Villarreal planned to wear his No. 24 Bryant jersey and be the best version of himself. The 30-year-old Aliso Viejo resident wants to teach his 6-month-old son, Braxton, to live the same way.



Bryant and eight other people, including his daughter, Gianna, and longtime OCC baseball coach John Altobelli, were killed in a helicopter crash in Calabasas on Jan. 26.

Sunday would have been Bryant's 42nd birthday, and Monday offered another chance to re-member the five-time NBA champion. It was designated as Kobe Bryant Day in Los Angeles and Orange counties, since the date "8/24" has both the numbers that Bryant wore during his 20-year career with the Lakers.

The Lakers wore "Black Mamba" City Edition jersevs for Monday night's Game 4 of the first round of the Western Conference playoffs against Portland.

Corona del Mar High School junior Nia Halafuka will remember being coached by Bryant at times. Gianna's Mamba team and the Riptide, which Halafuka played for, shared gym time at the Newport Coast Community Center and would scrimmage sometimes each against other. Though Nia's team was older, Bryant liked for Gianna's team to play tough competition to get better, Nia's mom, Angela Bradford, said.

Then, there was the time that Bradford's older daughter, Malia, was shooting in the CdM gym following a basketball camp.

"Malia was practicing shooting foul shots, and I kept yelling 'Brick!' at her

and she kept missing," Nia Halafuka said. "Kobe said, 'With all those bricks, you could build a house.' That was pretty funny ... He was just really chill, super calm all the time."

Huntington Beach resident Matthew Crooks is a lifelong Lakers fan who painted his garage in the team colors, purple and gold, more than a decade ago. A championship banner and various plaques reside in the garage.

The whole family, including longtime Edison High School girls' soccer coach Kerry Crooks and their three kids, roots for the Lakers. It was a sad day for the household when Bryant passed away and when the NBA season was suspended in March due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"I don't how many times, with the shutdown and no sports going on, that I watched different programs on Spectrum

with old games of the Lakers," said Matthew Crooks, 50. "Kerry, she's probably had to sit through Game 7 [of the Western Conference Finals] against Portland in 2000 about 20 times. That's the epitome of that Kobe era, right? The lob [to Shaquille O'Neal] to seal it. I'm happy that basketball is back, but I think that Kerry is probably happier, because she doesn't have to watch the replays with me."

As for Bryant's legacy, one recent addition to the Crooks garage is an image of Bryant shooting a jump shot. It's printed on the wall next to the weights that children Trey, Ethan and Riley have been using during the pandemic.

"That's to try to get them to work hard," Matthew Crooks said. "He did."

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County expands mobile police fingerprinting despite objections from anti-racism activists

Orange County The Board of Supervisors approved a mobile police fingerprinting system Tuesday over the objections of anti-racism activists who said the tool would disproportionately impact people of color and people living in the margins.

One commenter at the supervisors meeting, Kelly, said the prospect of field fingerprinting "terrifies" her. She asked if peaceful protesters — like the ones at dozens of demonstrations locally and innumerable protests nationwide this summer against recent police shootings of Black and other nonwhite people — would be printed.

"This has the emotional

and psychological and literal effect of adding to a

sense that we live in a police state," she said.

After hearing from about

half a dozen commenters, the supervisors unanimously approved the item without discussion.

With \$3 million in state

funds drawn from vehicle registration fees, InCadence Strategic Solutions Corp. will provide equipment to the Orange County Sheriff's Office to digitally capture and transmit finger and palm prints from the field for three years, with the option for up to seven additional one-year extensions.

Another woman told the supervisors this is an intimidation tool.

"We know who this targets — that famous line of, 'You fit the description.' That person," she said.

A man named Chris said activists like himself want to meet the supervisors halfway to stop criminalizing homelessness. He said he knows firsthand about criminalizing people of color without further enforcement tools.

"I don't need any more problems trying to go to work," he said.

A woman named T.K. said the community doesn't need biometric information on the street for police to abuse.

"There's a misuse of policing and they abuse their authority, and for you to disregard that doesn't negate the fact that it's still happening," she told the supervisors. "You know it and you're a part of it."

Thousands of protesters just in Orange County, from Newport Beach to Yorba Linda, Laguna Niguel to Anaheim, have marched in the names of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor, Black Americans killed this year in Minnestota and Ken-

tucky, the former during an arrest and the latter by police executing a "no knock" warrant. The most recent police shooting to garner reaction nationwide is the Sunday shooting of Jacob Blake, a Black man in Kenosha, Wisc., who was paralyzed by police bullets.

"To use this money for funding this right now in the midst of a civil rights movement and a protest of police brutality is a massive statement about awareness of these incidents, or lack thereof, systemic racism and a move for the further oppression of BIPOC [Black, indigenous and people of color] human beings," Kelly said.

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Simultaneous collisions in Laguna lead to one arrest, one in critical condition

A rollover traffic collision in Laguna Beach on Sunday resulted in the arrest of Chula Vista resident Stephanie Berkell Montoya, 28, on suspicion of a felony DUI causing injury, child endangerment, a felony hit and run, driving with a suspended license and DUI while on probation for a DUI.

Laguna Beach police and fire officials were dispatched to Pearl Street and South Coast Highway at around 4:59 p.m.

Montoya, the driver of the vehicle, allegedly hit

two parked vehicles on the west side of the road while driving southbound. The vehicle collided with the second parked vehicle at an angle that caused the moving vehicle to flip over onto its roof and stop in the middle of two southbound lanes.

Police said the driver then fled on foot and was found near Ruby Street and Coast Highway South where officers detained her. Montoya admitted to the collision.

Laguna Beach Sgt. Jim Cota said Montoya was intoxicated and found to have a suspended driver's license for a prior DUI arrest.

Two passengers were inside the car. An adult female was in the front passenger seat, and her 5-yearold daughter was in the backseat. Both passengers and the driver were transported to Mission Hospital in Mission Viejo. The child was in a car seat.

Laguna Beach police and fire were also dispatched to another traffic collision at around 4:58 p.m. at Solana Way and South Coast Highway.

A motorcyclist crashed into a vehicle, was ejected from his seat and thrown across three lanes of traffic. The vehicle he struck was pushed into the Casa Laguna Hotel and caused damage to a pillar next to the main building. A building inspector from the city responded to check the structural integrity of the pillar and is working with the owner.

Neither the vehicle's driver or passenger were injured. An Orange County Sheriff's Department helicopter transported the motorcyclist to Mission Hospital in Mission Viejo in critical condition.

we're going to need some additional time. All of these things have to fall into place.

Officials and administrators were cautiously optimistic about the year ahead, with most schools reporting relatively smooth sailing two days into the 2020-21 academic year, NMUSD spokeswoman Annette Franco confirmed Tuesday.

"No concerns have been brought up as far as we know," she said. "Now that

we've started with district learning we're making plans to finalize the reopening plans we made in July.'

At Estancia High School, more than 1,000 students began distance learning under a new 4x4 learning model proposed for all Newport-Mesa schools in July but later withdrawn, after some stakeholders protested it departed too significantly from the traditional model. Estancia alone supported the plan.

Students there will report to odd-numbered periods fall semester, then switch to even-numbered

periods in the spring. Principal Mike Halt said the modified schedule will help reduce the risk of exposure if and when in-person classes do resume.

"Our first day went really well. We had great attendance," Halt said Tuesday. "Our plan here is very simple - we're going to master distance learning and be ready to transition when the conditions are safe to do so."

The recent decline in the number of coronavirus cases has drawn down Orange County's average infection rate to 83.3 cases per 100,000 residents, below the state benchmark of 100 cases, although rates are exceedingly higher in the cities of Santa Ana and Anaheim.

The county's testing pos-itivity rate also dipped slightly to 5.3%, a figure below the state threshold of 8%.

The total number of cases stands at 46,642, while 912 Orange County deaths have been reported.

Fluor acknowledged the county's removal last weekend from the watch list was one piece of good news in a year otherwise marked by challenges.

But, she cautioned, with

Orange County's hypothetical 14th day off the list (Sept. 6) coinciding with Labor Day weekend, families will have to practice vigilance so positive trends do not reverse course.

"We have to make sure there's not an uptick. Because if there is, the clock starts all over again," Fluor said.
