The parade was part of the Surf City Soul festival which started June 30 and also included Tuesday night's fireworks show, the 5K Surf City Run and a new cornhole tournament.


Organizers estimated the Surf City Soul events over the long holiday weekend drew more than 500,000 visitors to Huntington Beach.

Thousands flock to Newport Dunes for Independence Day

CMPD arrest suspect in shooting

Ryan Rojas, 20, a Costa Mesa resident, is accused of shooting a 38-year-old man who died from his injuries.

A 20-year-old Costa Mesa man was arrested Tuesday and is being held on \$1-million bail following the fatal shooting of another man Monday night in a residential alleyway, officials reported.

Costa Mesa Police Department spokeswoman Roxi Fyad said the station received multiple calls shortly before 10:45 p.m. Monday regarding the sound of gunshots near the 2000 block of Sterling Alley, between Pomona and Wallace avenues.

Officers arrived on scene to find a man on the sidewalk who had sustained several gunshot

After 10 months apart, cat reunites with family

Ten months had passed without a whisper of their whisker-faced friend.

Alfonso and Sherrie Meletiche, a couple from Fort Myers, Fla., had lost their family pet, Baby, while making a long haul truck delivery in Southern California.

When they pulled over to make a delivery at a commercial district near Rancho Santa Margarita, they were going to let their outdoor-air-loving feline take a walk. At the sound of a loud noise, the Maine Coon mix broke loose of her harness.

A search team could not find her, and weeks turned into months. Hope turned into despair.

And then a phone call came in
— an unexpected one, but certainly one that Alfonso and Sherrie's daughter Alonna knew was not a prank. Gail Landau, the founder of Catmosphere Laguna Foundation, had reached out, compliments of microchipping technology that was extending a lifeline for family and pet to be reunited.

"I was shocked," Alfonso said of Landau's call. "I couldn't be-

lieve it because I, myself, gave up. I said, 'There's no way. There's no way that we're ever going to get her back,' but when Gail called, I was overwhelmed, and I was also shocked. ...

"Booked a ticket, I believe that very same day, and then I had to cancel it because she said she got away again. I said, 'Oh my god.' It's like feeling this empti-

wounds. They administered CPR and used an automated external defibrillator in an attempt to resuscitate the victim — later identified as Jonathan Ray Valdez, 38, of Costa Mesa.

Costa Mesa Fire & Rescue arrived on scene and transported Valdez to Orange County Global Medical Center in Santa Ana, where he succumbed to his injuries.

In their investigation into the incident, CMPD detectives identified a possible suspect, 20-year-old Costa Mesa resident Ryan Rojas. Fyad confirmed Tuesday detectives were able to contact Rojas, who agreed to speak with officers at the station. He was detained and

booked on one charge of murder. Police later retrieved what they believe to be the weapon used in the homicide, which Fyad described as a 9-millimeter

Rojas is currently being held at Orange County's Theo Lacy facility, a maximum security jail. He was scheduled to appear in court Thursday.

following her second flight. "The big mystery is how did the cat get down from Mission Viejo to Laguna," said Welch, who commented that Baby was living her best life at the luxury resort. "What I keep laughing about is I keep saying it's like a marketing ad for the Montage, that the cat got herself back to the Montage after being at

Gail's house. "She was there. Then Gail had her, was trying to basically foster her until Sherrie and Alfonso could get there, and the cat escaped from her place. She is ... two communities north of the Montage, so the cat had to get from her community back down to the resort.'

The Meletiche family received the good news, and Alfonso flew into John Wayne Airport, nervous as a cat in hopes that Baby would still remember him. She did.

Alfonso and Baby were on a plane headed home on Monday. In keeping with her recent resort lifestyle, Baby had cabin accommodations - albeit in

a carrier — on the flight to Florida. "I must have shared that

story with the whole airport," Alfonso said. "Everyone that can hear me, I told them, and they were in awe. They were shocked. They said, 'What? 10 months?' I said, 'Yes, 10 months.

"I sort of gave up a little bit, but my wife never gave up, and as soon as she heard news, she demanded that I book a flight and go over there and pick her up."

Just a year before Baby's great escape in Southern California, Alonna had taken her in for shots. She made the decision at that time to have her microchipped.

Susan Hamil, a founding director of the Blue Bell Foundation for Cats, a sanctuary for senior cats in Laguna Beach, said all Blue Bell cats are microchipped. A native of Baton Rouge, Hamil looked back on her experience providing aid after Hurricane Katrina in discussing the importance of the technology.

"Hurricane Katrina was a life-changing moment in this country for a lot of things, and one was lost pets," Hamil said. "I went back and worked in Katrina and worked at the LSU vet school for a few weeks, and if those pets had been microchipped, they could have gotten back, they could have been reunited with their owners in a matter of days or weeks, once everything settled in.

"But because the vast majority of the pets didn't have chips, then there was no way to reunite them with their owners, and so they just got dispersed all over the Southeast and up in the Northeast and everywhere else. The majority of those pets were never reunited with their owners."

Hamil added that there was an early barrier to acceptance for microchipping, but stories like Baby's are proof to her of how integral pets have become

in the lives of their families. 'Pets have moved from the backyard, outside, feeding the stray cat, to now sharing the table, sharing the bed, and people willing to drop every-



U.S. OPEN OF SURFING

U.S. Open returns to H.B. with new title sponsor

The turning of the calendar to July means it's not long until hundreds of thousands of people converge on the south side of the Huntington Beach Pier.

The U.S. Open of Surfing returns in 2023 with a new title sponsor — Wallex and new attractions for attendees like a freestyle motocross competition. This year's event dates are July 29 through Aug. 6.

Officials announced last week that the digital asset provider service has stepped in for Costa Mesabased Vans, which had been the title sponsor of the event since 2013. The full name for this year's competition is the 2023 Wallex U.S. Open of Surfing Presented by Pacifico.

"Wallex is an interna-tional company," Cherie Cohen, World Surf League chief revenue officer, said in a phone interview. "We have been working with them and other acts that they've launched around the world ... and they came to us with a relationship they had with our athlete. Leo Fioravanti. We were ready to move forward based on the timetable with their launch here in the United States."

The U.S. Open is the fourth stop on the 2023 World Surf League Challenger Series, with surfers hoping to rack up points to qualify for the elite Champioship Tour (CT) the following year. As part of the event, Surf City will also host the Huntington Beach Longboard Classic, which is the first of four stops on the WSL Longboard Tour.

Two Hawaiians are the defending champions of the U.S. Open, Zeke Lau on the men's side and Bettylou Sakara Johnson on the women's side. Huntington Beach native Kanoa Igarashi, currently ranked

No. 16 on the CT, is a typical fan favorite at the U.S. Open as a two-time champion in 2017 and 2018.

The U.S. Open of Surfing was rebranded to that name in 1994 after previously being called the West Coast Surfing Championships, United States Surfing Championships and OP Pro. It has been held since 1959.

Cohen said it is the event that has the highest onsite attendance on the entire World Surf League calen-

dar for the year. "I take the legacy of this event very seriously," Cohen said. "Huntington Beach has been celebrating surf for 100 years, right, so we're talking about the capital of surfing in the mainland U.S. We've had talented champions, Olympians even, most recently a guy like Kanoa Igarashi. İt's also a sort of headquarters for all of the great California surf culture and surfers on tour, many of which are down in San Clemente or

up the coast in Ventura. "The culture is really, really rich. Jack's Surfboards has been around since 1957, and they're one of our sponsors ... It's an

opportunity for nine days to celebrate what Califor-

nia surf culture is." One new event at the U.S. Open this year will be Nitro Circus "Full Throttle FMX," a freestyle motocross competition at the beach. Some of the riders expected to compete include Jeremy "Twitch" Stenberg, Jarryd McNeil, Beau Bamburg, Keith Sayers and Brian McCarty.

"We're really excited to partner with Nitro Circus," Cohen said. "We think they're going to bring a lot of energy to the beach. Moto has been a part of the event in the past, so we're bringing it back.'

Fans can expect live music, plenty of brand activations, free games and food trucks among the activities during the U.S. Open, Cohen said.

"Even some professional sports like Teqball will be out there demo-ing and playing with fans," she said. "There's something for everyone on the beach."

The event is free and open to the public.

BATTLE AT THE BEACH PASSING TOURNAMENT

Edison, CdM football teams test the waters

The return of high school football is inching closer, so passing tournaments like the Battle at the Beach provide valuable repetitions for those about to be thrown into the fire.

Corona del Mar and Edison will open the upcoming season on Aug. 11, each preparing to go into battle with a new starting quarter-

Edison, the host for Saturday's passing tournament, fared well with Savelio Niumata flinging the ball around the yard. The Chargers went undefeated in pool play, before falling to finalist Rancho Cucamonga in Gold Bracket

Niumata, a 6-foot-3, 200-pound junior, worked largely with senior Mason York and juniors Aidan Brown and Jake Minter. The Chargers posted wins against Bellflower St. John Bosco, Temecula Chaparral, Poulsbo (Wash.) North Kitsap and Ventura St. Bonaven-

After transferring from Mission Viejo prior to his sophomore year, Niumata watched an explosive offense put up 37.5 points per game with Parker Awad, last season's Daily Pilot Football Dream Team Player of the Year, running the show.

"Parker is a very, very, very intelligent quarterback, and I feel like I really got a lot of help from him, really breaking down the mental part of the game," Niumata said. "Coach [Jeff] Grady is a genius, in my eyes. I think Edison is a great home for me, and he's teaching me a lot of things.'

Edison has had a penchant for playing receivers on both sides of the ball. Minter came away with an interception on North Kitsap's first possession. York, who made a toe-tapping catch in the left corner of the end zone against North

Kitsap, also registered an interception against St. Bonaventure.

The unforgiving secondary of the Chargers limited the opposition to 26 total points through its first four games of the tournament, including a 7-0 shutout of

Roughly five weeks from the opener, Edison will play its first two games in Hawaii against Wailuku Baldwin and Lahaina Lahainaluna.

"We got our first two games in Hawaii," Niumata said when asked about the Chargers' nonleague schedule. "We're on Maui, which is pretty exciting.'

Edison will also take on Lawn-

dale Leuzinger, Palos Verdes and San Clemente before the start of Sunset League play.

Corona del Mar experienced mixed results, albeit a day that new head coach Kevin Hettig felt had his team "on the right trajectory." The Sea Kings went 2-2 in their pool, before being doubled up 28-14 by Mission Viejo in the Gold Bracket.

The Sea Kings' offseason also included a runner-up showing in the Dana Hills Air Strike, in which Oxnard Pacifica edged CdM in overtime in the championship

Kaleb Annett, a 6-foot-3, 185pound senior who saw some starts with David Rasor missing time due to injury last season, took the majority of the snaps. He is drawing interest from colleges, having been offered by Boise State and Princeton.

"He performed well," Hettig said, who added the tournament brought a high level of speed to contend with. "He led the offense. He was getting everybody kind of right. His eyes, he's seeing some funky coverages and some different things out here. His eyes weren't always in the right spot, but that's all fixable stuff with him. He's such a great kid. He's going to be good. He's going to have a good year."

Corona del Mar started the day against eventual tournament champion Mater Dei, before bouncing back with wins against Inglewood and Downey Warren. Annett had familiar targets in senior tight end Zach Giuliano and senior wide receiver Russell Weir. Giuliano, who stands at 6-foot-5, 225 pounds, has a handful of Division 1 offers, including five from Pac-12 schools.

Annett showed trust in his receivers to take shots down the field on Saturday, even if a couple of the contested throws went for turnovers.

Also among his targets were sophomore Dorsett Stecker in the slot, as well as juniors Emori Davis and Cordell Cook.

"It was really good to get all of our guys, offense [and] defense, myself included, to play some teams like that," Annett said. "Some teams that we normally wouldn't see in the season, which is always good and compare yourself and always try to get better. It's always really good.

"It was just good to see different speeds of things and different corners that we won't always see on the offensive side of the ball, and receivers that the defense won't always see. It was definitely a big day for us today."

Senior linebacker Christian Brooks, who was the second-leading tackler for CdM last season, impressed Hettig in coverage.

"He's got a pulse on our team," Hettig said of Brooks. "He's a leader in every sense of that word, and yes, he is a phenomenal cover [line]backer. That's not even supposed to be what he does. He comes up and bangs, but he had a great day today."

Corona del Mar opens at home against Tesoro on Aug. 11.
