'End of COVID-19 is in sighť

O.C. officials express optimism at the new Disneyland vaccine distribution center, which may soon be able to give out 7,000 doses daily.

Ten grueling months into the coronavirus pandemic — which has so far infected nearly 200,000 Orange County residents and claimed 2,179 lives county leaders on Wednesday dared to dream an end to the devastation may finally be in sight.

County supervisors joined with health and public safety agency representatives on the Disnevland lot in Anaheim, where a COVID-19 vaccine distribution center began earlier that day dosing first responders, healthcare professionals and residents 65 and older.

Officials anticipate the "super POD" (point of distribution) will soon be able to distribute 7,000 doses of the vaccine per day with the ability to ramp up as more supplies become available.

'Today marks an important step in combating COVID-19 and reclaiming our lives and livelihoods from the grip of the pandemic," Orange County Board of Supervisors Chair Andrew Do said in a news conference. "With these vaccines, we will triumph and overcome the biggest challenge of our generation."

Officials have teamed with the Orange County Fire Authority to oversee the administration of COVID-19 vaccinations in an effort dubbed "Operation Independence," as the goal is to see most county residents vaccinated by the Fourth of July.

"That means businesses can open. That means children go back to school and get the education they need and the experience they're lacking," Fourth Dis-trict Supervisor Doug Chaffee said Wednesday.

Smaller sites in Anaheim and Irvine that had been vaccinating first responders and eligible residents prior to the opening of the super POD were closed

'Age does not define you'

When she turned 65 in October, Laguna Beach resident Karen Pierce decided to enter the Sports Illustrated swimsuit competition.

Karen Pierce woke up on Oct. 19, 2020, and went on Instagram.

The day was not unique, except it was the day after the Laguna Beach resident's 65th birthday. Not that any of her friends knew that.

Pierce said she had always "flat-out lied" about her age, claiming that she was years younger. Nobody's hurt by a little fib, right?

While on social media that October day, Pierce saw that Sports Illustrated had started its annual Swimsuit Search competition.

"I was laying in bed," Pierce said. "I thought, 'That's what I'm going to do for my birthday. I'm going to enter the Sports Illustrated swimsuit competition, and I'm

going to have to tell the world that I'm 65.' "It was really empowering. It was like I

carried this burden for so many years, being ashamed of my age and hiding from it."

Pierce, a single mother of two originally from England (her first name is pronounced "Caw-ren"), has lived in Orange County since 1985. Like most people, 2020 had been a tough year.

Her business selling high-end luxury items and women's accessories wasn't doing well.

"The only thing I was selling was slip-pers," she said with a laugh. "I did a roaring trade in slippers."

Her teenagers Alexandra, now 19, and Nico, 17, were forced home from school,

Newport Beach council approves revisions in harbor code for marine activities permits

All new commercial activities in Newport Harbor will now be required to obtain a marine activities permit. No exemptions.

Newport Beach City Council members approved in a 5-1 the recommended vote changes and additional revisions that cropped up during discussion of the permits, which are required of businesses that operate or partially operate on the water.

Mayor Pro Tem Kevin Muldoon cast the lone dissenting vote. Councilman Marshall "Duffy" Duffield recused himself.

Assistant City Manager Carol Jacobs said during a study

Laguna Beach extends life of Promenade on Forest

The Promenade on Forest in Laguna Beach opened to the public nearly seven months ago, born out of the struggles of local businesses desperate from the hardship and restrictions brought on because of the coronavirus pandemic.

It started as an experiment to see how a pedestrian plaza would provide a boost to the downtown area of Laguna Beach for both restaurants and retail.

Initially scheduled to go through last summer, the City Council eventually extended it through January.

Back in session for the first time in 2021 on Tuesday night, the Laguna Beach City Council considered making the Promenade on Forest a permanent fixture.

Discussion led to the council unanimously voting to continue the Promenade on Forest in its current state through January 2024.

A citywide outdoor dining and retail display program is also be-ing extended through the end of this year. The temporary use permits for the program were set to expire at the end of April, Assistant City Manager Shohreh Dupuis said.

Laguna Beach Mayor Bob Whalen amended a recommendation by city staff that called for the approval of the conversion of lower Forest Avenue to a permanent pedestrian plaza.

"I think ... what I want to do is start the process, gather the information, understand the cost,' Whalen said.

Speak Up Newport's annual Mayor's Dinner postponed

The 40th annual Mayor's Dinner is officially postponed.

Initially scheduled for Feb. 5, Speak Up Newport announced Wednesday that the event will have to be postponed due to restrictions resultant of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Data from the Orange County Health Care Agency showed Wednesday that the number of cases in Orange County has now reached 199,532.

In Newport Beach, there have been 2,834 cases and 36 deaths since the county agency began tracking cases regionally in March.

Speak Up Newport Beach President Ed Selich said the

postponement is a "big disappointment" and that the organization had big plans to celebrate the event's 40th anniversary this year. Organizers still aim to hold the dinner later this summer depending on what the restrictions and situation are at the time.

Mayor Brad Avery's state of the city address will go on as planned through Zoom on Feb. 10 at 4 p.m. during what would be the organization's normally scheduled program date.

Selich said that, on average, about 450 people at-tend the dinner. Ticket prices have not been set for this year but in the past have been anywhere between \$75 and \$80 per person. Ticket sales and table

register with the city and meet all requirements to obtain a permit save for the parking requirement for continued operation.

Recommendations also require all new commercial businesses to obtain a marine activities permit and eliminates all business exemptions, according to city staff.

Other changes include requiring all businesses to maintain adequate insurance and name the city as an additional insured.

Businesses will also be required to load and unload passengers at a private dock and limit outdoor lighting to minimize skyglow or glare onto adjacent properties, the shoreline, coastal waters or bluffs.

Fines were also raised. First-time violators may see a fine of up to \$1,000. Second-time violators of the same ordinance or permit within one year of the first violation may see

fines up to \$2,000 and third-time violators will see fines of up to \$3,000.

City staff said the increase will provide a more effective tool for code enforcement officers to bring businesses into compliance.

The additional changes by the City Council allow risk managers to decide the level of insurance required of businesses and that "grandfathered" businesses — those that would fall out of compliance due to changes in regulations — would not be required to have a marine activities permit unless the harbormaster determines that there is a substantial change in its commercial activities.

That decision can also be appealed to the Harbor Commission.

City staff was also directed to bring the applications for the four new types of permits for commercial fishing vessels for review by council. The section of the Har-

bor Code that was under review Tuesday dealt explicitly with marine activities permits as part of an overall effort to update the city's Harbor Code.

Čity staff said the section needed to be dealt with separately from other revisions as it relates to businesses on the harbor specifically.

The Harbor Commission's ad hoc committee held two meetings in October 2019 to hear public testimony on the issue.

'The Harbor Commission felt this impacted a very different stakeholder group and wanted to work with the business community separately," said city staff in a report prepared for the meeting.

The item will be passed to a second reading, scheduled for Jan. 26.

The council directed staff to seek proposals from consultant teams to design, conduct project impact analysis, and complete the entitlement for the conversion of the downtown street to a permanent plaza, Dupuis added.

"These are the first steps

"The money that we spent there, I think, we got a real nugget. There's not very many good things that have come out of COVID, and this is one of them."

The Promenade on Forest has supplied six dining decks, 41 dining tables and outdoor retail displays since it opened on June 15. Prior to the stay-at-home order, artist demonstrations and musical performances were also seen in the downtown area. Public comments went on for more than an hour. Business owners shared their gratitude and residents showed their appreciation for the Promenade as a place to gather for the community. Concerns were expressed by some as to whether it would be appropriate to commit to making the Promenade permanent given the uncertain financial situation presented by the ongoing pandemic. Others quibbled with the loss of parking that would occur if lower Forest Avenue were closed for good. City staff said that if the project were to move forward, it would result in the loss of 47 parking spaces, although the construction of a parking structure could be one possible solution. Councilwoman Toni Iseman addressed both issues when the discussion was brought back to council, indicating that she would like to have "a better understanding of the city's financial situation" before bringing a permanent pedestrian plaza to a vote. As for the matter of parking, Iseman added, "We did not experience a traditional traffic summer, so I just think that needs to be part of the consideration, that people did stay home. Maybe they were at the beach, but it was always easy to find a parking place this summer." Councilman George Weiss was also reluctant to move toward a permanent project during the meeting. "I don't want to make it permanent tonight," Weiss said. "I want to approve its extension for a year, so we get out of COVID and we have the designs, we get the public involved, and we proceed in that manner."

in designing a permanent plaza and this work will include design of a drainage system," Dupuis wrote in an email. "We plan to bring the award of the contract to the most qualified consultant team for this work to the City Council in April 2021."

Councilman Peter Blake is in favor of making the Promenade a lasting part of downtown, comparing it to a town square.

"The Promenade has been so much better than anything I even envisioned," Blake said.

30 years, "For I've thought, 'What would it take to make the downtown a better place?' I've been working in the downtown for 30 years now, and I couldn't imagine a more successful experiment than the one we just went through."

Mayor Pro Tem Sue Kempf also voiced staunch support for the Promenade on Forest.

"We all know it's popular, and sometimes you spend money because you want it for the enjoyment of the town," Kempf said.

and Alexandra missed out on many of her typical senior year activities at St. Margaret's Episcopal School.

So Pierce became determined to compete in the swimsuit contest, partially inspired by Kathy Jacobs. At age 56, Jacobs was one of two winners in 2020.

Pierce went to the beach at Emerald Bay the next day and filmed a short video, posting it on her Facebook and Instagram pages to announce her intentions.

"I wanted to be accountable," Pierce said. "I didn't want to have this idea and talk myself out of it. People started asking me if I was serious, or if I was doing it as a joke."

More than 10,000 women entered last year's competition, so the odds are against her. But Pierce has worked hard at it, upping her workout plan with her trainer, Ryah Arthur, and joining a pilates class.

She modified her diet, giving up carbohydrates and alcohol, and even started surfing lessons with Arthur.

Sports Illustrated re-

cently featured her 60-second entry video on its Instagram page, @si_swim search.

Though the rules are somewhat vague as the contest switched to online-only during the pandemic, Pierce said she believes the voting is winding down.

People can support her by liking the Sports Illustrated post and commenting. She also is documenting the journey on her personal Instagram page, @karenavpierce.

"She's an absolutely inspirational and fabulous woman," said Pierce's friend Jennifer Arundale, a comedian and actor who lives in San Clemente.

"She's incredibly disciplined and dedicated to anything that she does, which I find so impressive. We're kind of polar opposites. She's very organized and quite proper, and I'm a little bit more seat of my pants. We're a really good balance for one another as friends."

Pierce said the competition has pushed her out of her comfort zone and made her feel comfortable in her own skin. She was used to posting pictures of her dogs, her kids or the sunset on social media, not herself, and particularly not herself in a swimsuit. But her 65th year of life has been one of growth.

She said her new mantra is "Age does not define you."

"In my life, I've been the type of person where the default answer is always no," Pierce said. "This year has turned into my year of yes."

Another friend, Darcy Bouzeos, recently moved from Chicago to Newport Beach. She called Pierce's story "fun" and said she has been supportive each step of the way.

"Karen has such a great spirit and zest for life, and I think this is reflective of that," Bouzeos said.

Pierce, whose sister Cathie Lawler also lives in Laguna Beach, has now finally revealed that she's older than Lawler, who celebrates her 60th birthday in February.

"I have to say I was quite pleased," Lawler said with a chuckle. "She always tells everybody she's my younger sister, so I was very happy that she was finally coming clean about her age."

distributions Vaccine cannot come quickly Örange enough. The County Health Care Agency on Wednesday reported 3.847 new cases of coronavirus and 31 deaths, bringing the countywide case count to 199,532 and pushing the fatality rate to 2,179.

Area hospitals reported treating 2,280 individuals for COVID-19, 25% of which — or 544 individuals were being cared for in intensive care units, the agency reported.

The county's seven-day average of new cases stands at 78.8 per 100,000 residents. Another 20,812 tests were issued Wednesday, bringing the cumulative number to 2,320,876 and accounting for a seven-day average testing positivity rate of 19.5%.

Despite the continuing high numbers, OCHA Director Dr. Clayton Chau adopted a positive tone at Wednesday's news conference.

"The end of COVID-19 is in sight," he said.
