

Council majority presses for 'Right to Know'

Agenda item in H.B. asks staff, city attorney to look into challenging state on bill regarding disclosure of students' gender identity.

Huntington Beach is again doing battle with a policy of the state of California.

On Tuesday night, the conservative majority on the City Council voted to declare Huntington Beach a "Parents' Right to Know" city in relationship to a child's gender identity or expression.

The vote was 4-3 to direct the city manager to work with the city attorney to prepare an ordinance for introduction in September. Mayor Gracey Van Der Mark, Mayor Pro Tem Pat Burns and Council members Casey McKeon and Tony Strickland voted for the item, while minority council members Dan Kalmick, Natalie Moser Rhonda Bolton voted against.

The vote goes against Assembly Bill 1955, passed in June by the Cal-

Costa Mesa's thin blue line gets thicker

City officials approve police staffing and pay hikes, adding \$211K to the \$62M CMPD budget adopted in June.

Costa Mesa's thin blue line will get a little bit thicker, as city officials Tuesday supported staffing enhancements and salary increases for police academy cadets and reserve officers — adding another \$211,000 to the department's nearly \$62-million budget.

The City Council unanimously approved increasing the hourly pay rate of new recruits in the Costa Mesa Police Department's police academy, from \$30 to \$40, and paying reserve officers who help fill staffing shortages \$42.50 per hour, up from \$38.

Additionally, 10 part-time cadet positions will be transitioned to full time, while five reserve officers who

Devoted supporter of N.B. police raises funds to make sure officers are well fed

Dotty McDonald's focus for past six years has been running a Feed the Cops drive, collecting funds and gift cards to ensure the rank-and-file members of the Newport Beach Police Department have plenty to eat.

The local officers had reason to cheer on a recent day when she presented the police association with a large symbolic check representing the \$40,000 she'd raised on their behalf this

"I get gift cards from Sgt. Pepperoni's, In- N- Out, Chick- Fil-A and Chipotle," said the Newport Beach resident and longtime NBPD volunteer. "The men and women work 12-hour shifts, and men are always hungry."

McDonald thought the four casual dining eateries would be a good fit, as they would make it easy for the cops to do a quick graband-run while on duty. She explained that an additional incentive is a 50% discount on their meals given by the restaurants when officers come in wearing their uniforms.

"I could not be more proud of Dotty and the incredible generosity of the Newport Beach community," said NBPD Chief Joe Cartwright. "These gift cards are a reflection of the amazing support the men and women of this department receive from our Newport Beach neighbors. These gifts do more to enhance the well-being and morale of our officers than they could ever know. We are truly grateful and proud to work in such a supportive and remarkable community.'

McDonald volunteered with the NBPD between 2015 and 2019, logging in over 2,000 hours before she was sideline following back surgery.

"I will be 95 in two weeks and I'm just doing my little of philanthropy,' McDonald said. "I just ask people, 'How would you like to donate to the Newport Beach Police Department so we can feed our cops?' Sometimes I have to remind them."

She doesn't have to remind her friends Andrew and Karen Littlefair.

"We help her get her [donation request] letter out," explained Karen Littlefair. Clean Energy Fuels in Newport Beach, where Andrew is president and chief executive, has been an added support system.

McDonald said mostly relies on her friends and acquaintances, but there have been occasions when strangers have donated after overhearing her talking about her cause in public places.

"So many residents in our community don't think twice about donating to our police department," said McDonald. "This is who the cops protect [and] I think they realize how safe we are in this community. We're so lucky to be living in Newport Beach and we have the greatest police force.'

Lt. Brad Miller said he sometimes uses one of the gift cards McDonald has collected to treat other emplovees.

"Ît's just awesome what she does," Miller said. "I've been out in public where people who contribute will come up to her and she'll introduce me as a police officer and people always thank us. The love and support of the community is unbelievable."

When McDonald isn't out collecting money for the police, she's up for ridealongs every other week.

"For me, it's a whole new life I have just riding around with them," said McDonald, who used to trade day shifts for the night shift when she was nurse. "I like nights, from 3 p.m. to 3 a.m." Technically her "shift" ends after 11 hours and she's dropped off so the officers can do their paperwork.

"I appreciate them so much and have grown to know them and to love them," McDonald said. "I become so incensed at the way police are treated in so many other communities."

up to meet public safety officials at Fountain Valley Sports Park, where everyone from Love Bradley, currently serving as Miss Fountain Valley, to the city's interim police chief, Mike Ishii, were in attendance.

Ishii, who retired as the police chief of Hawthorne in December 2022, was seen making the rounds to introduce himself to community members and staff. He began working in his new post on Monday, city officials said.

The crowd formed a wide circle for a canine demonstration, where a crimefighting dog sniffed out contraband and took a bite out of a heavily padded officer playing the part of an uncooperative suspect.

Fountain Valley Police Sgt. Bill Hughes said that canines help bridge the gap between law enforcement and the community, but they also provide another layer of safety.

"I would submit to you that it is safer for us to use a canine when searching for outstanding suspects in serious crimes because there

is only one use of force option," Hughes said. "A dog can't be deadly force, so it's safer for the public, it's safer for the officers, it's a safer environment because we're not putting ourselves in harm's way, and ultimately, it's safer for the suspect too."

Officer Anthony Clements, among the first two pilots for the drone program for Fountain Valley, said four additional officers have been selected to begin training to fly the unmanned aircraft systems. A couple of drones were being flown over the demonstration by Sgt. Brian Mosher and Clements.

Across the events, police and fire departments were joined by other responders such as homeless outreach services and community emergency response teams.

Costa Mesa held its National Night Out festivities at Lions Park.

"It's just fun to see little kids light up," Costa Mesa Dept. Police Chief Joyce La-Pointe said. "We had several kids that were dressed up in police uniforms, little boys and little girls who aspire to be, maybe, caretak-

Additional costs generated by the salary increases for police recruits and reserve officers can be assumed within the already approved 2024-25 budget, city staff reports indicate, particularly due to the fact that several positions funded in the plan remain vacant. While funded for 142 employees, the department currently has 16 vacancies.

Councilman Don Harper said while he supports Lawrence, he'd prefer to see where \$211,000 might be cut from other parts of CMPD's budget, rather than adding more funding shortly after a budget adoption.

"Î like you and have a lot of faith in you. [But] I kind of default to — you've got \$60 million, make it work, and if you need to get rid of X, Y and Z to get that extra \$200,000, that would be my requirement for you."

Residents who spoke in public comments questioned why the proposed additions and amendments were not included

in the budgeting process. "We're 37 days into the new budget year. So much could happen over the next 11 months," said Ralph Taboada, a member

of the city's Finance and Pension Advisory Committee, suggesting allocations could be made during a midyear budget review. "At least wait six months before taking any action on this requested increase."

Councilman Loren Gameros made a motion to approve all the recommended changes, expressconfidence ing Lawrence's decision-making abilities.

The chief is responsible for a retirement plan, filling vacancies and, most importantly, a successor plan," he said. "We're going to tie his hands if we don't give him the tools he needs to do that for his team."

Mayor John Stephens agreed, attesting to the fact that Lawrence is always willing to do whatever city officials may ask of him and the department.

"He asked us for this budget adjustment — it's budget dust, \$211,0000, when you think about the importance of the department, of the size of their budget and the critical nature of the work that they do," he said. "This is an easy vote."

ifornia Senate. Also known as the Support Academic Futures and Educators for Today's Youth (SAFETY) Act, it prevents educators from being required to disclose information related to students' sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression without the student's consent, unless otherwise required by law.

Though they are not required to do so, AB 1955 does not prevent educators from communicating this information to families when deemed appropriate or necessary.

Van Der Mark believes parents should alwavs know. She introduced the agenda item, saying she's been fighting for parental rights for nearly a decade.

tion of our Constitutional rights to raise our own children," she said. "It is deeply disturbing that the state of California believes that strangers are better suited to make life-changing decisions for our children than we, as the parents, are."

The public comments on Van Der Mark's item were fairly evenly mixed, though several of the more prominent speakers who were in favor of the item were not from Huntington Beach. They included Manuk Grigorian of North Hollywood,

one of several right-wing parental rights activists who made the trip to Surf City. Often engaging with other members of the crowd, he wore a hat that read "Fk Nwsom" in the style of a car license plate and a shirt that read "Leave Our Kids Alone."

The meeting veered unruly at times.

"You guys are so obsessed with children's sexuality, and it's weird and embarrassing," one male speaker against Van Der Mark's item said, as a woman in the crowd shouted out, "You're a pervert!"

"Stop wasting taxpayers" time and money with this crap," the speaker continued.

Van Der Mark then called for a five-minute recess just half an hour into the meeting — before Huntington Beach Police Lt. Thoby addressed Archer crowd.

It was ultimately unclear what would happen to teachers in Huntington Beach who violated the proposed ordinance. Multiple elementary school districts have campuses in Huntington Beach, including Huntington Beach City School District and Ocean View School District.

"The ordinance piece of this is weird," Kalmick said. "A violation of the municipal code is a misdemeanor. as far as I understand it. How are we going to enforce a misdemeanor against an educator?'

Moser directly asked Van Der Mark that question.

"We're at the exploratory phase, and when the item comes back Sept. 3, we'll know what it looks like,' Van Der Mark responded.

Moser followed up by asking if it was possible that educators may face prosecution, penalties or potential misdemeanors for non-

compliance with the potential city ordinance.

"Anything is possible," Van Der Mark said, before Strickland quickly stepped

"No, anything's not possible," he said. "We're directing the city attorney, and the city attorney is going to insure that we're protecting ourselves as he drafts all of this language. That's a better question for when we bring an ordinance back. We'll see what the ordinance looks like. Quite frankly, I hope the city attorney will run the traps on this and bring it back in a form that is worthy of the council's support."

Moser paused for a second before responding sar-

students receive all the benefits of a traditional workout — flexibility, heart health, endurance and stress release — with none of the impacts associated with a gravity-based re-

gimen. But in recent years the class has also become a regular rendezvous for a group of water-fitness devotees who call themselves the Mermaids and who've formed a special bond that reaches far beyond the parameters of any YMCA pool.

Newport Beach resident

Robin Sinclair became a mermaid about eight years ago and describes the class as a giant play date, where friends keep in touch, share stories and support one another through life's happy, and not so happy, moments.

"It's really hard to make friends when you're older, unless it's around children or animals," says Sinclair, 66. "But I've made friends in that pool that I would never have gotten an opportunity to meet otherwise. Now it's like I've got friends for life."

She recalled how the Mermaids rallied around a class instructor, a woman already well into her senior

years, who'd had a fall. They brought her meals and transported her to doctors appointments. When she had to go to a rehab facility, mermaids visited her regularly.

In addition to holding monthly potlucks, the Mermaids always make a point to mark the holidays together or to celebrate birthdays, weddings or honor someone's passing.

"It's definitely more than an exercise class, that's for sure," Sinclair attests.

Class members in February held a "Mermaid-A-Thon" during the YMCA's Annual Campaign fundraiser to pay for scholarships for residents who can't afford their own memberships. Participants paid \$40 and made merry for two hours straight, enjoying snacks and mermaid-themed party favors while raising \$800.

It was such a hit, the Mermaids recreated the event on Friday as more of a get-together than anything else, although modest donations for pool equipment and other needed items may have

crossed fins. Once in the pool, mem-
