# Mall's art exhibit invites openness to possibilities

A collection of sculptures spelling out the word "Hope" is on display at South Coast Plaza through Sunday and was inspired by the stories of four cancer survivors.



When Cindy Brown learned in the spring of 2014 that she had multiple myeloma, a currently incurable form of cancer, she decided she didn't want to be defined by her illness. But it became difficult to ignore over the next few months as her hair began to fall out and she found herself spending weeks at a time in treatment.

"I just didn't want to walk around the world with people looking at me saying, "Oh, that poor lady is dealing with cancer," the 56-year-old Coto de Caza resident said. "So, when you lose your hair, it's obvious, y'know, even if you put a wig on. Because you lose your eyebrows and your eyelashes, and you can only do so much," she added, chuckling. But she persevered.

Her story became part of the inspiration for "Hope is a Masterpiece," a collection of illustrated sculptures spelling out the word hope on display at South Coast Plaza through Sunday, Aug. 28. Abstract artist Kamila Kowalke applied layers of white over vibrant shades of pink and yellow on the upper portion of the letter O and painted the bottom quarter of it with rich green tones. The composition was meant to evoke sensations of a morning sunrise, representing the openness Brown exudes in the face of uncertainty and her own mortality, the artist said.

# FVPD shares results from stop

Officials: 967 vehicles rolled through the checkpoint carried out near Brookhurst Street and Talbert Avenue.

The Fountain Valley Police Department carried out a checkpoint operation near the intersection of Brookhurst Street and Talbert Avenue last Friday night, with officers checking for driver's licenses and performing some sobriety evaluations.

According to department officials, there were 967 vehicles that went through the checkpoint between 8 p.m. and 2 a.m., with nine drivers being evaluated for driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Authorities made three DUI arrests during the operation, police said in a news release reporting the results of the checkpoint. Six drivers received citations for driving without a license, while two individuals were also cited for driving with a suspended license.

"Whether traveling locally or taking a longer road trip to see friends and family, please have a game plan for how to get home safely," Fountain Valley Police Sgt. Brian Mosher said in a statement. "There is never a good excuse for driving after drinking or using drugs that impair."

Fountain Valley police plan to allocate additional officers for patrolling the community through Labor Day, as the campaign to combat impaired driving continues.

# Newport Beach council race underway

The candidates' forum was held by the Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce on Aug. 18.

With the papers filed and the candidates qualified, campaign season is now in full swing in

Newport Beach.

A candidates' forum was held by the Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce earlier this month. It was moderated by Lucy Dunn, former chief executive officer for the Orange County Business Council, and was divided into four parts. Each candidate was given two minutes to deliver an opening statement and why they were running for City Council.

The forum closed with statements from each of the eight candidates: Joe Stapleton, Tom Miller, incumbent Joy Brenner, Lauren Kleiman, Jim Mosher, Amy Peters, Erik Weigand and Robyn Grant.

In his introductory remarks, Miller described himself as not a politician but as an "independent voice." Miller acknowledged that he did not spend time on city boards and commissions, having been occupied with his business, Dynamic Auto Images, which he sold last year.

"The knowledge, experience and wisdom I gained and the leadership skills I gained in those 36 years is what I feel equips me

# Laguna Beach doctor appointed state surgeon general

Dr. Diana Ramos, a Laguna Beach resident and adjunct professor at the USC Keck School of Medicine, was appointed by Gov. Gavin Newsom today as California's next surgent general.

geon general.
Ramos, 55, currently serves as a public health administrator at the California Department of Public Health's Center for Healthy Communities, a post she has held since last year.

"Dr. Ramos is a distinguished leader in medicine

and a trusted public health expert who brings a lifetime of experience protecting and promoting the health of vulnerable communities," Newsom said in a statement. "I look forward to her partnership in advancing urgent priorities for the state on women's health, mental health, addressing the gun violence epidemic and more as we continue our work to lift up the health and well-being of all Californians."

Ramos previously served as director of reproductive health at the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health's Maternal, Child and Adolescent Health Division, chief medical officer at Alpha Medical Center, senior research specialist at Pfizer and a staff obstetrician at Clinica Humanitaria.

She has a master's degree in public health from UCLA, an MBA from UC Irvine, and a medical degree from USC.

"I am acutely aware that while we are all Californians, our experiences differ greatly," Ramos said in a statement. "Many of us are facing economic hardship, mental health conditions, trauma, grief, homelessness, addiction, racism, attacks on our bodies, our choices, and more.

"My hope for every Californian is a healthier, more equitable future," she said.

Newsom established the role of state surgeon general after his election in 2019 to address the public and serve as an advisor to the governor on health issues, according to a press release from his office. The appointment requires approval of the state Senate.

# O.C. health officials report child infected with monkeypox

Orange County health officials this week confirmed the county's first case of monkeypox in a child, a rare circumstance even as the virus continues to spread statewide.

"Please remember that monkeypox is very uncommon in children," said Dr. Regina Chinsio-Kwong, Orange County's health officer. "It is important to note that many childhood illnesses can cause rashes. If you or your children have a new or unusual rash, please follow preventive

guidance and seek medical attention from a qualified healthcare professional for further recommendations."

There have been at least five other juvenile monkey-pox cases in California. Still, the youth illnesses make up only about .2% of the state's total cases of monkeypox, which have now surpassed 3,000, state data show. In Orange County, officials had confirmed 126 cases as of Wednesday.

The majority of cases across California and globally continue to be in men or transgender people who have sex with men. The virus spreads primarily through intimate, skin-to-skin contact, such as intercourse. However, monkey-pox also can be spread through items that have come in contact with infectious lesions, such as bedding or towels, and through respiratory droplets during close face-to-face contact, such as kissing.

No one has died of monkeypox in the U.S., and most people recover without treatment, but the skin lesions that can develop can be extremely painful. A small percentage of infected people have ended up in the hospital for additional care, the California Department of Public Health has reported.

The first two cases of someone younger than 18 becoming infected with monkeypox were reported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in late July, and included a toddler in California. At the time, CDC officials said that the two youth cases were linked to household members who were infected and that the children had received the investigational Tpoxx treatment drug, which has shown promise for lessening the severity of monkeypox symptoms.

The first pediatric monkeypox case in Los Angeles County also was linked to household members, Long Beach health officials said when that case was reported earlier this month. That child has since recov-

Chinsio-Kwong, with the Orange County Health Care Agency, declined to comment on specifics of the county's first pediatric case, citing privacy. But she said the child "has been receiving appropriate care from their health provider and is improving."

"It is very important for all potential cases to seek medical attention for appropriate assessment and treatment," Chinsio-Kwong said. She said a full contact investigation is underway.

In a statement, the Orange County Health Care

Agency said vaccines are being offered to those who may have been exposed to the child.

Vaccines for monkeypox are still in limited supply, so widespread vaccination is not being recommended. The two-dose series is being offered to those most at risk, primarily men or transgender people who have sex with men and meet certain health or risk factors.

Orange County residents can check their eligibility and sign up for shots online or by calling the Health Care Agency's referral line at (800) 564-9448 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

to represent you on City Council," said Miller.

Stapleton, who is also running for District 1, which represents the Balboa Peninsula and West Newport, touched on his own public service at the Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce, the Harbor Commission and the Finance Committee.

"I tell you all of this because experience matters and especially in an election like this," Stapleton

Stapleton described himself as an independent thinker and said he was not running a platform about "rebuilding Newport Beach," but on maintaining the quality of life that residents have come to expect in the city and to

"keep Newport Newport."
Mosher, a longtime community watchdog, said he's been attending City Council meetings for over a decade. He added he felt it was "slightly wrong having to do that for I strongly believe that everyone in Newport Beach should be able to trust those we elect to be doing that questioning for us and to be doing it well."

Mosher said he felt thoughtful council oversight was lacking, whether it was about things as large as measure approval or as small as trash charges and that he was running for office to take on that work.

Peters said she's lived in

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Licensed & Bonded C-33-#967860 Newport Beach since 1979, where she's since married and raised her children. Peters said homelessness is one of her leading concerns and that she wants to continue strong public policies and support the community.

"We need to keep Newport Newport and not be funded by outside organizations that want to change the look of Newport Beach," Peters said. "I want my kids to want to come back here and raise their grandchildren here ... it's just such a beautiful city and I want to maintain that."

Weigand, a planning commissioner, said he's a lifelong resident of the city and felt that serving on the City Council would be a way for him to give back to the community that raised him. His biggest campaign issues are housing, public safety, sober living homes, quality of life and homelessness.

Grant is running unopposed in her district and said she cares deeply about the city and wants to be a part of keeping Newport Beach the "best place to live, work and raise a family."

She said her No. 1 goal was to be available to residents.

Councilwoman Joy Brenner was elected in 2018 and is running for reelection in District 6, which represents Corona del Mar.

"The issues that we deal with are critically important. Being involved for 60 years, I thought I knew a lot when I got elected to council but the last four years have been eye-opening because everything is more complex than you re-

alize," said Brenner.

Kleiman, chair of the Planning Commission,

said she has been investing in Newport Beach since her son was born and was a founding member of the Newport Beach Foundation. She said she prioritizes public safety and giving support to local po-

lice.

The lightning round, a series of yes or no questions, focused on whether or not prospective council members would support electric bike regulations, extending the peninsula boardwalk to the Santa Ana River jetty and if they'd support changing the currently at-large system of electing to a dis-

trict-only format. Candidates were also asked if they felt the city's overall response to the pandemic was appropriate and if they believed the City Council's action to limit short-term lodging permits was appropriate. They were also asked their opinions on town hall meetings or if they believed rising sea levels would be a threat to lowlying areas throughout Newport.

Long-form questions focused on the expansion of John Wayne Airport, group homes, homelessness, crime, housing, staff union contracts and retention. Grant did not respond to any questions, as she is running unopposed in her district.

Members of the City Council represent districts but are voted in at-large. The next candidates' forum will be hosted by Speak Up Newport on Sept. 14. The election is Nov. 8.

"Cindy was open to possibilities," Kowalke said. "She was open to a new day. She was open to anything that would appear before her ... in spite of these challenges that people would find daunting and extremely stressful, because it's uncertain."

tain."
Brown was 48, and immediately thought of her family when she was diagnosed with cancer and doctors told her she had about five years left. Everything "was on pause" for her in the first few months that followed; she had to stop working and chemotherapy had compromised her immune system, meaning she couldn't attend most social gatherings.

Brown and her doctors at City of Hope initially struggled to find the most effective care for her. She would respond well to new treatments at first, but later have her optimism grounded when test results showed the number of cancer cells in her body creeping back up.

Today, she is enrolled in a phase-one clinical trial, and no detectable cancer markers could be found in her body as of Thursday, according to her most recent test results. She reports no noticeable side effects from her current treatment.

Brown, who describes herself as an independent person, said it might have been impossible to maintain her optimism if she hadn't been willing to accept the support of her family, doctors, nurses, friends and even concerned acquaintances. She added that works of art on display at the facilities where she was undergoing chemotherapy could help her gain new perspective on her position in life or just take her mind off of "being a patient.'

The sculptures on display at the South Coast Plaza were commissioned, in part, to celebrate the opening of the City of Hope Orange County Lennar Foundation Cancer Center, which opened its doors to patients on Monday, Aug. 22.

"We know that art can help heal, and we have filled City of Hope Orange County Lennar Foundation Cancer Center with stunning works of art," Annette Walker, president of City of Hope Orange County, said in a statement. "This heartfelt exhibit is a continuation of our commitment to treating the whole person, mind, body and spirit, and recognizing the remarkable courage of our grateful patients."

Brown and Kowalke said they want their contribution to "Hope is a Masterpiece" to inspire those who see it to face their day-to-day struggles and unforeseen challenges in positive and productive ways.

Even though Brown still visits regularly with doctors to manage her condition, "I don't think of myself as a cancer patient," she said. In between her career in the medical field and time spent with her family, she has become an outspoken advocate for those diagnosed with the disease, especially those who are early in their treatment who may not be aware of the support and resources available to them.

"I love to help people find perspective and be able to help them deal with [their diagnosis], because it's a lot," Brown said.

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
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
