CHARGERS STRIKE DOWN IN COSTA MESA

It might be toned down, but professional football is back in Costa Mesa this summer.

The Los Angeles Chargers opened their training camp Wednesday morning at Jack Hammett Sports Complex, the first of 16 open practices in the city over the next three-plus weeks.

Fans came from near and far. Lifelong Chargers fan Alberto Najera of Costa Mesa, 34, who stood in front of the bleachers watching the practice, said he could ride his bike to the field.

Jonathan Rodriguez of San Diego, meanwhile, said he drove up to the training camp with a friend after working a graveyard shift Tuesday night.

Rodriguez, 29, was dressed in Chargers gear from head to toe, including a face mask that had two Mexican flags sticking out of the top of it. His friend Jorge Santiesteban, 41, was also decked out in team gear, including a sombrero.

"We're representing the city they came from, man," Rodriguez said. "San Diego Chargers fans, we're still here ... We have Bolt Pride family everywhere, worldwide. We caught the game in Mexico, we caught the game in London, we went to France, Japan.

O.C. Ed Board forum stirs debate

Trustees said they wanted an open dialogue on ethnic studies, but passions ran high among opponents.

California's new ethnic studies curriculum — a set of guidelines for introducing concepts of racism, equity and justice in K-12 classrooms — has drawn fierce opposition by some in Orange County who fear such instruction will further divide students based on race.

A discussion Tuesday hosted by the county's Board of Education aimed to provide a forum for parents to express concerns and questions about the curriculum and hear from a panel of scholars and experts on the curriculum and whether it would incorporate tenets of critical race theory.

"In the Orange County community, interest and inquiries into the subject matter and its possible ties with critical race theory are growing exponentially," board President Mari Barke said in a news conference before the forum. "Our community members and taxpayers deserve an open, transparent dialogue on these two important topics."

The event created some controversy Monday, however, after one scheduled speaker, Cal State Northridge professor Theresa Montaño, resigned after discovering her fellow panelists mainly had anti-ethnic studies leanings.

"If I had felt that tonight was going to open the door to meaningful dialogue, and a meaningful exchange of how to implement ethnic studies ... I would have at-

Modified 'Concert in the Park' returns Saturday only

After a pandemic cancellation last year, Costa Mesa's Concerts in the Park series will come roaring back to life Saturday afternoon as a one-day-only event with free musical performances, food trucks, a beer and wine garden and more.

Presented by the city of Costa Mesa and the Costa Mesa Foundation, "Concert in the Park" at the city's Fairview Park kicks off at 1 p.m. and features three live bands whose musical stylings are a perfect pairing for an outdoor picnic or get-together.

Mayor John Stephens said city officials and staff were considering whether to reinstate a biennial Independence Day event when the idea came up to host a modified version of the concert series, traditionally held Tuesday evenings in July. A day-long celebration with multiple musical acts seemed like an ideal combination.

"I'm very excited about the event. There's going to be stuff for everybody — face painting, gift giveaways, crafts for kids, a beer and wine garden," Stephens said Tuesday, hinting he and other city officials might even take turns inside a dunk tank.

Preshow activities designed for families and children begin at

l p.m., just before Mariachi Juvenile Herencia Michocana takes the stage at 1:30 p.m. Local to Costa Mesa, the band's members range in age from 10 to 18 and regularly offer up Mexican folk favorites for community events. Then, at 3 p.m., Costa Mesa band Jasmine Fields will perform a mix of new country favorites with a sprinkling of classics, playing across the genre, from Miranda Lambert to Johnny Cash.

At 5 p.m., Huntington Beach rock/dance/party band Tijuana

Coalition comes out against board's forums

The group voices opposition to O.C. Board of Education's meetings on ethnic studies and critical race theory.

A community coalition held a news conference on Tuesday to voice opposition to the Orange County Board of Education's controversial forums on ethnic studies and critical race theory.

The event was held just a few hours before the first forum, but for weeks the heavily conservative board has faced criticism for organizing a one-sided panel of speakers for their two forums on Tuesday night and Aug. 24.

The gathering was organized by the Truth in Education coalition, which is made up of parents, students, religious leaders and educators from Orange County. The coalition organized the news conference with Cal State Northridge professor Theresa Montaño, who resigned from the panel earlier this week.

Each of the five board members invited one guest for the panel. The board's only Democrat, Beckie Gomez, invited Montaño.

Montaño said in an interview at the news conference that she considered that there wouldn't be a pro-ethnic studies voice at the forum without her appearance, but she ultimately chose to not at-

Everywhere there's Chargers fans."

Rodriguez and Santiesteban noticed a change from past years when they entered the complex. There was a minimal line to get in, even at 8:45 a.m., 15 minutes before the practice began.

The Chargers have been training at Jack Hammett Sports Complex since 2017, but last year's NFL training camps were closed to the public due to the coronavirus pandemic. This year's camp is scaled back, with a smaller team store and no interactive fan zones.

Fans have to preregister for the free tickets. As of Wednesday afternoon, five other practices no longer had tickets available, including the team's joint practices with the San Francisco 49ers on Aug. 19 and 20.

The team will also have a fan fest at its home stadium, SoFi Stadium in Inglewood, on Aug. 8.

Though fans weren't allowed to get up close to players for autographs due homes at a recent golf tournament. A fan told Mahomes to watch out for Herbert this year, to which Mahomes replied, "I'll see it when I believe it."

The Chiefs have been to two straight Super Bowls.

"I think it's pretty cool that Patrick Mahomes knows who I am," Herbert said with a smile. "I've got such great respect for what he's been able to do."

First-year head coach Brandon Staley, the defensive coordinator with the Los Angeles Rams last season, guides the Chargers in 2021. He brings a new staff including offensive coordinator Joe Lombardi, the grandson of late Packers coach Vince Lombardi.

The Chargers missed the playoffs and went a frustrating 7-9 in 2020, including six losses by a touchdown or less. But they won their last four games. The progression of Herbert should excite fans, as will the return of Pro Bowl safety Derwin James, who missed the entire season last year after undergoing surgery for a torn meniscus.

Staley said it wasn't an accident that Wednesday's practice went a brief 75 minutes. "I wanted our guys to get to the end of practice and say, 'Hey, I could have gone longer than that,' " he said. The time will come for that. Staley was just glad to be back in front of fans. "What makes it feel real is when you come into the parking lot and you see a bunch of kids getting ready to watch training camp, you see fans in the stands wearing our guys' jerseys and our colors," he said. "It's just a different atmosphere.'

tended," she said Tuesday. Inside the boardroom, passions ran high as parents expressed their concern at the notion of young children learning about white privilege, oppression and system racism. None of them defended ethnic studies in the classroom.

Linda Padilla-Smyth, mother of two biracial daughters, worried the curriculum would divide students by teaching them to cast white people as oppressors and people of color as victims.

"I do not want my children to hate either side of their heritage," she said. "Sacramento [officials have] taken it upon themselves to indoctrinate our children to areas that are sensitive and require deep thought and care."

Catherine DeCeglie, whose two children attend school in Huntington Beach, called critical race theory an "evil ideology" that would only wither kids' confidence and motivation to do well in school.

"But maybe that's the objective," she continued. 'You don't want our Black, brown and biracial students to succeed, and you want to kick the white students in the teeth for something they have no control over."

Walter H. Myers III, adjunct faculty member for Biola University's Master of Arts in Science & Religion program, spoke on how critical theory began as an idea that drew from previous philosophies, including Marxism, to explain societal structures of privilege and power.

By the 1970s, academics began looking at American legal systems and racial inequality through a similar lens, considering systems

built and maintained by oppressors and leveraged against the oppressed.

Such theorists, he continued, rejected equal opportunity, merit and color blindness as myths perpetuated by those in power and were antithetical to the civil rights movement.

"CRT argues that America's legal, economic and political systems are inextricably racist," Myers said. "It is no longer an academic exercise, but it is a philosophy with real-life consequences."

Others attempted to distinguish critical race theory from the broader field of ethnic studies.

Brandy Shufutinsky, a social worker, researcher and member of the Alliance for Constructive Ethnic Studies, advocated for a curriculum that was more balanced and inclusive and less politicized.

"Constructive ethnic studies does not put students in the middle of a left-wing versus right-wing tug-of-war," Shufutinsky said.

"Racism and discrimination are approached. However, students are not held responsible for the sins of their foremothers

sure that parents and citizens have a full opportunity to be informed of the education - or possible miseducation — being provided in Orange County." Speaker Wenyuan Wu, invited to the panel after

Mantaño's resignation, is executive director of the Californians for Equal Rights Foundation which, in part, helps parents analyze policies and programs being considered by local school boards.

She advised residents to learn more about what's being adopted by school boards and being taught in local classrooms and advocate for programs they wish to see.

"It is time that ordinary people stand up and demand a public education system to meet the expectations of our communities and the 21st-century global society. We're facing a wellfunded and well-organized battlefront of ideologs, activists, corporate elites, political establishments and unions. However, we are on the right side of history."

Tuesday's forum was the first of two — another panel discussion is scheduled for Aug. 24.

"If I had felt that tonight was going to open the door to meaningful dialogue, and a meaningful exchange of how to implement ethnic studies, whether I was the only voice, or more than one voice, I would have attended," said Montaño, who teaches Chicana and Chicano studies.

"I'd like to state publicly that the so-called expert panel of people who will be speaking at the O.C. Board of Education hearing later today are not speaking from the experience of ethnic studies," said Jose Paolo Magcalas, a trustee for the Anaheim Elementary School District and assistant professor at Cal State Los Angeles.

"They want to spread misinformation, they want to spread lies. Shame on

them and shame on the organizers of this public hearing. I highly urge the public to seek the truth, empirical research from the actual researchers who study ethnic studies in schools, and of educators the course who've

The state approved the ethnic studies model curriculum in March after almost two years of discussion. It's meant to provide students with an opportunity to learn about the history, cultures, struggles and contributions of historically marginalized groups of people.

"I can tell you that there was a great deal of work and care that goes into creating a welcoming and safe environment for all students, whether they are white or students of color,' Santa Ana teacher Roselinn Lee, who was on the 2020 ethnic studies model curriculum advisory committee, said at the news conference. "No one is made to feel that they are responsible for the ills of the past but, rather, are inspired to address the ways to move

The board also approves the annual budget of the Orange County Department of Education, which is distinct from the board. The department held its own forum last week to dispel rumors about ethnic studies and critical race theory.

Experts, university researchers and superintendents shared the benefits of the curriculum.
