Officials break ground on library lecture hall

Cost of the long-awaited Witte Hall project, at an anticipated \$23.4M, will be split between the city and the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation.

In the footprint of what will eventually be the 299-seat library lecture hall, city officials and staff welcomed a small crowd of onlookers to the groundbreaking of Witte Hall late Tuesday afternoon.



Site of former TBN HQ to see new life

6.19-acre parcel once home to Christian TV network is set to be resurrected as an upscale event center.

Seven years after Christian media company Trinity Broadcasting Network shuttered its Costa Mesa headquarters — an ornate palazzo-styled structure south of the 405 Freeway — the 6-acre site may finally be ready for its resurrection moment.

City planning commissioners on Monday gave their blessing to a proposal to use the newly renovated property, located at 3150 Bear St., to host events inside the 65,924-square-foot structure, which was built in 1978 and contains a domed atrium with a ceiling mural, ballroom and dining room, as well as on the grounds.

Local real estate proprietor Manny Khoshbin, owner of the Irvine-based Khoshbin Co., purchased the property in 2021 for a reported \$22 million, after previ-

Laguna Beach Gelson's to close

Public works director Dave Webb described the project as the next "jewel" in the crown for Newport Beach. The lecture hall, which is named as a result of a \$4-million commitment from Bill Witte and Keiko Sakamoto, was first proposed in 2019. It will be located next to the library courtyard, near the offices of the library staff and the Friends Room, which opened with the library in 1994.

A construction bid for the project was approved in January this year by a divided City Council.

The total all-in cost of the facility — \$23.4 million — will be split between the city and

Tesla driver injured in Newport Beach shooting

Newport Beach police are investigating a shooting early Wednesday as a possible roadrage incident.

Initial reports said Newport Beach police responded at 12:22 a.m. Wednesday to a Shell station in the 1600 block of Jamboree Road, where they found the victim — the male driver of a Tesla — suffering from a gunshot wound. The driver, who spoke with police, said road rage led to the shooting.

Sgt. Steve Oberon said the incident appears to have happened in the west Oceanfront parking lot near Newport Pier.

The two parties engaged in a verbal altercation, according to Oberon. Four individuals were standing around the suspect's ve-

hicle when one of them pulled a handgun from his waistband and fired five times into the Tesla, striking the victim once in his left shoulder.

Details are unclear of what took place between the time of the incident and when the victim flagged down police in the area of San Joaquin Hills and Jamboree roads.

The victim was transported to

a nearby hospital, treated for his injuries and released, Oberon said.

At least one passenger was confirmed inside the Tesla. No information on the identity of the suspect is available, according to Oberon, nor is a description of the shooter's vehicle.

President of grocery chain cites a limited number of local customers and a rising cost of doing business.

Gelson's will close its South Laguna Beach location permanently at the end of business on Saturday, the supermarket chain has announced.

The announcement was made in a news release on Feb. 16. The Laguna Beach store is located at 30922 Coast Highway.

"The limited population of the area coupled with challenging economic headwinds for grocers in California has unfortunately made this decision necessary," Gelson's president and chief executive John Bagan said in a statement. "Despite an amazing and dedicated team, Laguna Beach has been unprofitable."

Huntington Beach residents cry foul after election signs vandalized

Linda Purtill left her central Huntington Beach home to tutor Wednesday morning.

She was met with an unpleasant surprise after walking out of her front door.

The large sign in the planter of her corner lot, asking Huntington Beach voters to vote "No" on Measures A, B and C, had been vandalized. A green "Yes" sticker had been placed on top of the red "No."

When Purtill tried to peel it off, the paint underneath went with it, leaving the sign unusable.

"I felt so violated," she said. "I was so angry ... but they're very

strategic. They knew what [the stickers] would do to the signs."

The sign was one of dozens of signs against the charter amendment measures that were apparently vandalized overnight around town, leaving the Protect Huntington Beach members who produced and hung the signs frustrated.

Protect Huntington Beach volunteer Carol Daus said a police report was filed, which city public affairs manager Jennifer Carey confirmed Wednesday afternoon. Under California Penal Code 594, defacing or stealing political campaign signs is a criminal offense.

Newport Beach Public Library Foundation board of directors chair Kevin Barlow said the lecture hall will be a valuable resource and provide many literary, cultural and intellectual programs for the city.

Barlow noted the foundation's role in the project was the same as when residents wanted a central library in 1994 — "to advocate on the behalf of the greater Newport Beach community for this construction and to help fund it by reaching out to those who believe in its significance and ask them for their support."

Construction of the library is expected to take close to two years, with completion slated for 2026. The library's parking lot was partially closed earlier this month so the work could begin. If parking is not immediately available, city staff encourage library patrons to use the Civic Center parking.

"It's very frustrating," Daus said. "This is a form of vandalism, and this was a planned effort. These stickers were just the right dimensions to cover up the wording, and they're all over town. They spent some money doing that."

Election Day is Tuesday, though voters received their mail-in ballots weeks ago the first in-person vote centers opened last weekend.

Measures A, B and C would approve city charter amendments that have been hotly debated in Huntington Beach. Measure A deals with Hunting-

ton Beach running its own municipal elections and requiring voter identification, while Measure B seeks to codify into the charter the city's flag ordinance that limits the flying of flags on city property to government flags, the POW/MIA flag and the six flags of the U.S. military.

Measure C is more administrative and would move the city to a two-year budget cycle, as well as update the processes to fill a council vacancy and cancel meetings.

The conservative City Council majority, including Mayor Gracey Van Der Mark and Mavor Pro Tem Pat Burns, have been in favor of the charter amendments. A group of residents against them formed Protect HB late last year.

Daus said some members went around trying to remove the green stickers on Wednesday.

"These signs cost thousands of dollars that people raised, residents of Huntington Beach," she said. 'It's a heated election coming down to the end, and the last few days are critical, because there are still a lot of ballots that haven't been mailed and we don't know what the in-person voting will be like. These signs can't be repaired."

According to a daily report by political data company PDI, about 13% of Surf City voters had voted by mail as of Tuesday. on

Van Der Mark Wednesday called the vandalism of signs "shameful" and "rude" but added that it's been happening on both sides.

She pointed to a video circulated on social media on Feb. 13 that showed a man removing campaign signs for "Yes on Measures A, B and C," as well as for conservative City Council candidates Chad Williams, Don Kennedy and Butch Twining.

"That is not one of our people," Daus responded. "Our group is not like that. We don't resort to those tactics. They rely on political theater and stunts, and we rely on facts and educate the public about these measures. That's how Protect HB has been handling

it from the beginning."

Williams, Kennedy and

Van Der Mark said her own City Council candidate signs were repeatedly defaced or stolen in past elections, to the point she put an electronic tracking device on them.

"To me, it was cheaper to buy a tracker, put it on the sign and then go find my signs than to constantly keep having more signs made," Van Der Mark said. "I know what it feels like to have people deface and de-

stroy your property. You kind of feel violated when people do that. I would not wish that upon anyone." Carey said Wednesday

that representatives from the "Yes on A, B and C" campaign, Max Ukropina for Congress, as well as Williams, Kennedy and Twining, had filed their own police reports on Feb. 13, indicating they had signs that were damaged or stolen.

"There's four different groups that have filed complaints with HBPD regarding damaged signs," she said. "[The police department] is investigating all of these instances.'

Khoshbin shared his hopes for the project with commissioners Monday.

"We've spent over \$1 million improving the site, beautifying it, and I think the neighborhood really enjoys seeing some life [come back] into the property," he explained. "We've been getting a lot of requests for events, weddings and birthdays, because it's such a beautiful landscape.

"I wanted to do this event center to add an amenity to the neighborhood and generate some revenue as well as create some jobs — that was the plan.'

City staff have placed some conditions on the site's use, allowing no more than 225 people on the grounds at once, including support staff, and capping operations at 9 p.m. during weekdays and 10 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. No amplified sounds are allowed outdoors, and no more than four musicians may play acoustically during any outdoor event.

Free valet parking will be offered, and access to the property will be restricted to a single entrance on Bear Street. A currently unfinished third floor is not to be used as office or event space without approval from the city, and while the building contains a kitchen, no cooking or food preparation may take place on site

Operators can apply for up to four special event permits annually, to host one-off events such as outdoor car shows or open houses, but are not to use the site as office space while events are taking place.

A handful of residents, particularly those who live in neighborhoods directly east and south of the property, expressed concerns about the potential for noise and traffic, particularly during the busy holiDon Leach | Staff Photographer

day season. "I think the location, as far as what they're trying to do is pretty good," said neighbor Gary Marshall. '[But] Bear Street does get a little busy. My concern is about valet parking with cars lining up on Bear Street. There's only one entrance in and out of that property.'

City staff noted the project was not estimated to incur more than 100 peak hour trips so did not trigger regulations requiring a parking study to be performed ahead of approval. They also explained that while a deviation from the city's parking requirement

was being sought, which would have mandated 664 spaces for the behemoth structure, the cap on attendance would keep park-

ing demand in check. Still, some commissioners were not convinced that what appeared to be a relatively modest use of such a palatial space would not creep to include more events with higher capacities in the years ahead. Jon Zich said he was concerned the panel was being asked to approve "a camel's nose under the tent."

He cited a portion of Khoshbin's valet parking plan indicating the infrastructure could support up

to 401 vehicles and wondered whether the third floor might someday be used for more.

"Why would we contemplate that? Because somewhere down the road, it's likely to be that and, at that point, it's a different project than what's in front of us today, and different from what residents have had the opportunity to consider," Zich said.

'There's a project in front of us, then there's the project that represents the entirety of the camel that isn't in front of us, and I'm concerned about that."

Marina breaks through for first CIF title

Marina threw up a lot of threes and hit enough of them to spot itself a halftime lead of a dozen points.

By the midway point of the third quarter, that lead had vanished entirely — and the game was on.

The Vikings responded to that challenge, never relinquishing the lead again, going on to claim a 53-49 victory over third-seeded Long Beach Poly in the CIF Southern Section Division 2A boys' basketball final on Saturday at Edison High.

Marina won for the first time in its five championship game appearances, the most recent of which had come in its home gym against Glendora on a June evening in 2021 following the resumption of high school athletics from the coronavirus pandemic.

In doing so, the Vikings spared their coach from delivering a runner-up speech he felt he could not bear to deliver.

"We were in [the CIF finals] three years ago, and I think our coaching staff's mindset was different than it was then," Marina coach Nick Racklin said. "We really didn't want to go back to the school with another speech of, '... Still a great season by getting to the finals.' I was not that prepared and ready to give that speech again. That was why I felt pretty emotional about holding that [championship] plaque."

Barak Simon had 19 points for Marina (26-8), matching Jovani Ruff of Poly (24-10) for the gameleading mark. They were matched up against each other throughout the game.

"I was in eighth grade when it happened, when [Marina] went to the finals and lost [to Glen-

dora]," Simon said. "We were up 12 [points], and we came back, and I did not want to face that talk. [Racklin] didn't want to give that talk. We didn't want to face that talk. We decided to get the win."

A deliberate approach on the offensive end saw the Vikings swing the ball around the perimeter, forcing the Jackrabbits to defend for full possessions, some of which they maximized.

Marina made six of 17 attempts from the three-point line in the first half. The conversions included a pull-up three from Simon off a steal in the front court, as well as a buzzer-beater from the left corner by Dylan Gomez to end the second quarter.

"In this type of game, we don't

really care who scored," Gomez said. "We just wanted to win, and we trust each other. Guys were open, we found them, and shots went in that second quarter."

Mark Yeager finished with nine points and eight rebounds for Marina. Luke Pratali added four points and nine rebounds. Jared Palacio and Ryan O'Rourke each recorded two blocked shots.

Poly needed just four minutes to turn a 34-22 halftime deficit into a new game, a 12-0 run being keyed by two three-pointers from Giovanni Ofoegbu.

Yeager's only points of the second half — a baseline floater plus the free throw — put Marina back in front 37-34. Gomez drained another corner three to double the lead. The score remained within two possessions for all but the first two minutes of the second half. Marina made critical effort plays to stay on the right side of the scoreline.

As the teams jostled for momentum, O'Rourke made a steal under his own basket and a block the next time the Jackrabbits had the ball. Those contributions canceled out potential momentumshifting blocks by Ruff and Austin Unegbu. All four possessions happened within a minute midway through the fourth quarter.

"We were never going to step our foot off the gas," said O'Rourke, who added eight points and six rebounds. "... It's just the next play. If you mess up, [commit] a turnover, just go to the next play. If you make a shot, it's next play. Don't think about it too much."

The Jackrabbits beat visiting Corona del Mar 57-54 in the semifinals. Poly coach Shelton Diggs noted that the Vikings received more balanced contributions than their Sunset Conference counterparts, who saw Maxwell Scott put up 33 points for the Sea Kings on Feb. 16.

Racklin was still in disbelief as the press conference ended, saying it would take a couple of days for reality to set in.

Poly was seeking its 20th section title in boys' basketball, and it was that history that Racklin used as a rallying cry for his team.

"We had zero [CIF titles]," Racklin said. "I think that was motivation enough for our guys to just say, 'Why not? Why not Marina?' We played San Gabriel Academy in the semis, and we talked about how we had to be the best box-out team on the planet and how we had to be the toughest team on that floor.

"I'm all about our guys not settling for success, and so my challenge to them today was could we box out better than we did against San Gabriel Academy and could we be tougher, and we certainly met both of those goals today."

The CIF State Southern California Regional Division II playoffs got underway on Tuesday. Thirdseeded Marina was upset by Los Angeles King Drew 55-46 at home, ending the Vikings' historic season.

Poly, which was placed in the bracket as the No. 5 seed, was also eliminated after a narrow 51-49 defeat to visiting Bakersfield Christian.

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BOYS' SOCCER Newport Harbor hangs on to win CIF Division 2 title

ORANGE — The Newport Harbor boys' soccer team edged Foothill 4-3 on Saturday to win the CIF Southern Section Division 2 championship at Fred Kelly Stadium.

Harutyun Kelyan, Eduardo Hopkin and Olivier Renard scored for Newport Harbor (20-5-1), which was also the beneficiary of an own goal in the first half.

Newport Harbor won its second section championship and its first outright CIF title. In its previous CIF finals appearance, Newport Harbor shared the Division 1-A crown with Corona Centennial after a scoreless draw in 1991.

"It was just an amazing Renard said. buildup," "Freshman year, we came, we didn't play varsity. Sophomore year, we understood what varsity was. Junior year, we went to the [Division 3] semifinals, we understand what CIF is, we understand the stakes.

"This year, we understand, even though we didn't really think about it

coming into preseason that we were going to make CIF, you just never know when things happen. There's always a Cinderella story."

Possession and chances favored Foothill leading up to that point, the back line of Hayden Baker, Jack Davey and Landon Baker being forced to play clean defensively as a number of balls were played into the Newport Harbor box in front of goalkeeper Jack Shepherd (two saves).

The Sailors led 3-0 at halftime, an explosive run of play that included a bicycle-kick finish by Hopkin for the third goal in the 20th minute. Hopkin, a senior transfer from Corona del Mar, then provided the service on Renard's scoring header in front of the goal in the 49th minute.

Kelyan opened the scoring, running onto a throwin by Jake Shubin toward the offensive goal line and finding the angle from the left wing in the 11th minute. In the 17th minute, Shu-

bin served a cross in from the right corner flag, which Renard redirected on goal. Trent Samaha reacted to play the ball off the line, but the clearance went off the back of Foothill goalkeeper Joshua Picker (eight saves) and into the net.

Hopkin's bicycle kick followed three minutes later, making the clock, as much as the score, an ally of the Sailors.

"I just saw Beck Brosnan heading the ball," Hopkin said. "... I'm a striker, so I play with my back to the goal a lot, so I kind of knew where I was. I flicked it and hoped for the best, and the best happened."

Foothill (16-6-8) fought back to strike fear into the hearts of the Sailors and their supporters, Lucas Regan providing goals 11 minutes apart before Brock Chapman streaked up a seam, his rising finish cutting the Knights' deficit to one goal with nine minutes remaining. second goal Regan's

came in the 66th minute, as he rolled a free kick under the player wall in front and inside the left post before second-half goalkeeper Rocco Villarreal (three saves) could get to the shot.

The offensive exploits of the Knights came after they failed to produce a goal in consecutive matches, advancing via penalty-kick shootouts against Redondo Union in the quarterfinals and versus Redlands East Valley in the semifinals.

For Newport Harbor, the late stages of the final largely mirrored its semifinals experience, when the Sailors were made to sweat out the closing moments against Los Angeles Loyola after jumping out to a 3-0 lead.

"We can't stop putting our foot on the pedal," Renard said. "Gladly, we were able to scrape that one out, even though we should have won 4-0."

Ignacio Cid, the sixthyear coach of the Sailors, hoisted a CIF championship trophy for the first time. He had been to a CIF final as a player at El Dorado in 1999, when the Golden Hawks lost to Santa Margarita 3-1 in the Division III final.

"Guys playing injured, guys limping on the field, I think that's the thing I'm going to remember," Cid said. "[Oswaldo Portillo] taking a foul that he knows he could get out of the way of, and he gets fouled, things like that. Those are all choices that a player can choose not to do. I think that's the culture that we bring, and that's why those guys don't think twice about those decisions."

Newport Harbor is the top seed in the CIF State Southern California Regional Division III playoffs. The Sailors defeated visiting Spring Valley Steele Canyon 1-0 on Tuesday to begin the tournament. Steele Canyon (11-4-8) was the Division 1 champion from the San Diego Section.

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GIRLS' WATER POLO Newport Harbor Sailors bow out in regional semifinals

The CIF State Southern California Regional Division I girls' water polo tournament fell during "ski week" in the Newport-Mesa Unified School District.

This presented a unique challenge for Newport Harbor. Not only did the Sailors have to gear up for another tournament after falling by a goal to eventual champion Orange Lutheran in the CIF Southern Section Open Division semifinals, but they were unable to head out of town during their week of vacation.

"If they wanted to get in and splash around, have some fun, they had the option," coach Ross Sinclair said. "We didn't have any practice, though ... We had put all of our eggs in one basket for [the Open Division title]. To do it again is something that's really difficult to do.'

Newport Harbor was competitive for a half but lost to Orange Lutheran 9-1 in a Southern California Regional Division I semifinal match Friday night at Mt. San Antonio College, ending the Sailors' season.

Orange Lutheran (31-0) finished off a perfect season with its 8-4 win over Mater Dei in the regional final on Saturday.

The Sailors were nearly shut out in the regional semifinal, with senior Sofia Del Villar scoring the team's only goal with 1:08 left in the contest. Freshman Valery Verdugo had the assist.

"Their goalie [Kyla Pranajaya] is good, but I thought we made her look really, really, really good today," Sinclair said. "We threw the ball at her about eight or

nine times, so that makes it easy for her to do her job."

Newport Harbor (19-10) did battle throughout a bizarre first half which saw just one total goal scored — Orange Lutheran's Jailynn Robinson netted it on the counterattack in the final minute. But the Lancers could not convert four power-play chances in the ĥalf.

Sailors junior goalkeeper Lydia Soderberg made three player-down blocks before junior Harper Price came up with a steal on the fourth possession.

"I just think our first half really showed our defensive skill," Soderberg said. "I didn't think that half was going to happen, but it really set the game for us and gave us a lot of energy and fight. I was definitely more pumped up."

Robinson ended up leading Orange Lutheran with three goals, while Allison Cohen and Samantha Kim each scored twice.

Of the Sailors' 10 losses this season, Friday's result was the only defeat by more than two goals.

Newport Harbor will lose

seven seniors — including key contributors like senior center Ryan Chalupnik, Del and Ângelena Villar Peterson — but will begin to rebuild for next year.

"We had a very new group, a couple of freshmen playing, sophomores," Soderberg said. "This was mv first CIF ever, and it was a big step up for me as well. I thought it was a great experience, and I hope to come back next year and do even better."
