### Huntington Harbour closed to swimmers after sewage spill

The waters of Huntington Harbour were closed Wednesday, but only to swimmers and aquatic recreational activities due to what is estimated to be a 250-gallon sewage spill that occurred Tuesday.

City spokeswoman Jennifer Carey said officials were notified at around 1 p.m. of the spill, which the Orange County Health Care Agency said was caused by an accidental release of a boat's holding tank in the harbor.

Waters are closed in only 100 yards north and south of the Warner Public Dock in Huntington Beach.

"It's a fairly minimal impact. It's essentially just that one isolated area and they've closed it out of precaution," Carey said Wednesday. "Boats can still go through freely."

At the site Wednesday afternoon, waters were still as boats remained largely moored in private docks and there were no signs of swimmers, surfers or paddleboarders. Bright yellow signage was posted at the railings adjacent to the docks.

Carey said sewage spills in Huntington Beach are relatively uncommon, but do occur once every few years.

No other areas in the city were impacted. County supervising environmental health specialist Lauren Robinson said the affected spill location will remain closed until water sample results meet California Ocean Water Contact Sports Standards issued by the state department of public health. The first sample was taken Tuesday.

### Shelter stops taking on more people

When a few clients tested positive for the coronavirus, the Costa Mesa facility shut its doors to newcomers.

For the first time since the pandemic began, the novel coronavirus that can cause COVID-19 has been detected inside a Costa Mesa homeless facility, causing a temporary suspension of new admissions at the Airway Avenue bridge shelter, city officials confirmed.

Assistant City Manager Susan Price said Wednesday one client at the facility — where 36 individuals currently reside — initially tested positive for the coronavirus in August.

"We test both the shelter staff and clients every Wednesday," Price said. "If we come up with any positive tests, we have to get two weeks of no positive results in order to resume intakes."

The infected client was sent to isolate at a nearby motel as part of a county-run program that provides non-congregate emergency shelter for impacted and at-risk homeless residents during the pandemic.

However, before the Costa Mesa

## Huntington Beach City Council approves sale of former Gisler Middle School site to developer

The Huntington Beach City Council on Tuesday night unanimously approved the sale of the site that formerly housed Gisler Middle School and Brethren Christian School.

Both schools have since been discontinued, and the Huntington Beach City School District is in the process of selling the property to Brookfield Homes, which plans to build an 85-unit residential property on the 13.9-acre property at 21141 Strathmoor Lane.

The deal, which would create two-story single-family residences and net the district \$42 million, is in escrow.

Coaches, administrators and players from AYSO Region 56, which serves south Huntington Beach, showed up to the chambers to protest the decision. The site currently holds the only two full-sized and lighted soccer fields in the region.

But Brookfield has promised to sweeten the deal for the region, pledging \$500,000 — double the originally proposed \$250,000 to find an alternate site with lights. City Manager Oliver Chi said the money would be required to be paid to the city before the building permits were issued.

The replacement fields could be put at nearby Edison Park, which is currently undergoing renovations and recently installed a temporary skate park.

"There are options here with

the city, and we are really excited about those options because we already started going down this path earlier this year," Mayor Kim Carr said. "To have AYSO be a part of that discussion, as far as

creating these lighted fields at Edison Park, really to me seems like the natural solution. But in the short term, we have opportu-

### drilling ban

It votes 5-1-1 to approve a resolution put forward by Mayor Kim Carr and Councilwoman Natalie Moser.

The Huntington Beach City Council voted Tuesday night to support a ban on new offshore oil drilling and similar activities off the coast of California.


Mayor Kim Carr and Councilwoman Natalie Moser brought the item forward after the Oct. 1 oil spill a few miles off the Huntington Beach coast, believed to be caused by a ship anchor that dragged an underwater Amplify Energy pipeline that subsequently dumped an estimated 25,000 gallons of crude oil into the water.

Carr, Moser, Mayor Pro Tem Barbara Delgleize, Rhonda Bolton and Dan Kalmick supported the item. Councilman Mike Posey voted against it, while Councilman Erik Peterson was absent.

Carr emphasized that the city receives nothing from the oil platforms off the coast. City spokeswoman Jennifer Carey said Huntington Beach makes just \$632,000 a year in oil well license taxes and pipeline franchise fees - less than 1% of the city's general fund

### Laguna addresses noise complaints

The Laguna Beach Police Department has made loud exhaust enforcement a focus recently. The department participated in a joint effort with other coastal Orange County law enforcement agencies in May to address loud exhaust and speeding violations. Police Chief Jeff Calvert said his department again teamed up with the Huntington Beach and Newport Beach police last week for a loud exhaust enforcement exercise. "We definitely hear the community and understand the concerns," Calvert said. "We've deployed message boards, police decoy vehicles, and officers did an outstanding job issuing 2,200 speed and loud exhaust citations in 2020, and they've issued nearly 850 ci-



tations this year."

pher holes,' " he said. "It's a miracle that we haven't had a broken ankle yet. We need not just fields, but quality fields.'

Ann McCarthy, the District 56 commissioner, told the council that the Gisler fields become impacted as there is less and less daylight available. She asked for a "concrete assurance" from the city that it would assist in replacing the lighting and full-size fields.

"I believe in creating communities in Huntington Beach, and I believe that additional housing can be a positive," she said. "But I fiercely believe in Region 56 and other youth sports programs. "Fortunately, the oil spill was a lot less than [a previous high-end estimate of 144,000 gallons], but it was still thousands of gallons that reached our shoreline," Carr said. "In a lot of ways, we dodged a bullet with this one, but we can't be naïve and think this won't happen again.

"It's really disturbing to learn that there were a lot of safety precautions that were not taken, there were a lot of corners that appear to have been cut. A lot of the alarms that should have gone off didn't go off, so I think we need to be more forward-thinking.'

Carr said she believes it makes sense to look at alternative forms of energy that don't include drilling.

"I think this resolution is a good first step," she said.

Moser shared a story about how her late father, who had Parkinson's disease and dementia, had totaled his truck after hitting a pole.

'We were really lucky because he was safe and he didn't hit anybody," she said.

"He decided in that moment not to drive ever again ... and it came to me when I was thinking about this. We experienced this tragedy, and it's an opportunity in this moment to put our foot down and acknowledge the value of our coastline, our environment, our sensitive ecological areas here, our businesses, and say 'no more' moving forward."

Members of San Clemente-based nonprofit Surfrider Foundation attended Tuesday's meeting, bringing with them signs and a banner supporting the ban.

They joined many other environmental local groups, including Amigos De Bolsa Chica and Orange County Coastkeeper.

dents have been isolated as clients and staff continue to undergo weekly testing. It is unclear whether transmission occurred inside the shelter or if the virus may have been brought to the facility from outside. Before the first case was

identified, the city had not logged a single incident of the coronavirus among shelter clients, even after opening the 12,285-square-foot facility in April.

"The fact that we've had some folks turn up positive, that's just part of the deal," Price said Wednesday. "Despite your best effort, somebody is going to come down with it."

The individuals in isolation may be cleared to return later this week to the facility, where staff and clients were tested on Wednesday and waiting to find out their results and whether the in-

take process could resume. Through an inter-city agreement, the 70-bed bridge shelter at 3175 Airway Ave. traditionally accepts unhoused individuals from both Costa Mesa and Newport Beach. Census figures indicate, as of Tuesday, 15 of the 36 individuals being housed on site were referred from Newport Beach.

Price said while there is no policy requiring shelter clients to be vaccinated, local nonprofits and the county's public health department have appeared regularly to offer testing, vaccination and education.

"We've protected everyone — not everyone, but just about everyone," Price said.

"That's as good as it gets in a global pandemic."

Since the bridge shelter opened in April, 12 clients have transitioned to stable permanent housing, or while another 20 individuals have been housed through the efforts of a street outreach team.

munity to pass a resolution officially opposing the ex-pansion of offshore oil and gas drilling.

"The Surfrider Foundation has fought long and hard to stop offshore drilling and we are pleased to celebrate this meaning-ful victory," said Bill Hick-man, Surfrider Southern California regional manager, in a statement.

"As oil is still washing up on our beloved coasts in Southern California, we are witnessing first-hand the devastating repercussions of offshore drilling off our coastlines. The decision made by the city of Huntington Beach to oppose offshore drilling shows leader-ship, and we commend their efforts to avoid the same disaster from happening again."

Posey, the lone dissenter, said he cares deeply about the beach and the ocean. However, he said, the city has no jurisdiction over the waters off its coast.

"I think as [renewable energy] technology evolves, the demand for fossil fuels will decline all on its own, driven by the marketplace," he said.

"I'm also concerned with acknowledging in a resolution economic impacts and putting that in writing, with the threat of potential litigation."





IF YOU OBJECT to the granting of the petition, you should appear at the hearing and state your objections or file written objections with the court before the hearing. Your appearance may be in person or by your attorney

IF YOU ARE A CREDITOR or a contingent creditor of the decedent, you must file your claim with the court and mail a copy to the personal representative appointed by the court within the later of either (1) four months from the date of first issuance of letters to a general personal representative, as defined in section 58(b) of the California Probate Code, or (2) 60 days from the date of mailing or personal delivery to you of a notice under section 9052 of the California Probate Code.

Other California statutes and legal authority may affect your rights as a creditor. You may want to consult with an attorney knowledgeable in California law.

YOU MAY EXAMINE the file kept by the court. If you are a person interested in the estate, you may file with the court a Request for Special Notice (form DE-154) of the filing of an inventory and appraisal of estate assets or of any petition or account as provided in Probate Code section 1250.
