## Newport Beach moves to address crime

An ad hoc committee will examine a rise in residential crime and burglaries in the city, make recommendations.

Residential burglaries and crimes are becoming increasingly concerning to the residents of Newport Beach, who have raised the alarm to sitting members of the City Council as well as to candidates in next month's election.

In response, the City Council voted this week to form a citizens' ad hoc committee to address those issues and report back to the dais with recommendations on how to help prevent or deter residential crime and burglary in the city.

While serious crime in the city dipped in 2021, according to a report Newport Beach Police Chief Jon Lewis presented to the City Council in February, residential burglaries increased by 17.2% during the same year.

A burglary occurred in the Harbor View Hills neighborhood as recently as last week when an unknown suspect accessed the residence by breaking a window at the rear of the home. The suspect ransacked the master bedroom, master bathroom, office, spare bedroom, spare bathroom and a storage room. The total value of the items taken during the intrusion is unknown.

Another burglary took place in the Back Bay community on Oct. 18, and another was reported in Newport Harbor between Oct. 17 and 18 while the residence was tented for fumigation.

"The [Newport Beach Police Department] is aware of the residential burglaries occurring in the city and throughout Orange County," said department spokeswoman Heather Rangell. "This appears to be a regional is-

## It's full steam ahead

Seated atop tiny steam engines and other rail-worthy vehicles, members of the Orange County Model Engineers lined up on the newly rebuilt Hank Hornsveld Memorial Trestle for a ribbon-cutting ceremony that culminated in a "Big Toot" — a simultaneous sounding of horns and whistles.

OCME members offer free mini-train rides to thousands of kids and adults on the third Saturday and Sunday of each month (weather permitting) and hosts train-themed

For three decades, Laguna Beach dog owners and their pets have had a dedicated outdoor space where they can wander and interact with others like themselves.

Community members, some accompanied by their furry friends, gathered to celebrate the 30th anniversary of Laguna Beach Dog Park on Saturday morning.

The celebration saw the Laguna Beach Chamber of Commerce recognize Friends of Laguna Beach Dog Park, a group that has worked to preserve and enhance the park for the enjoyment of the animals and their owners while also advocating for responsible dog ownership.

"We're delighted to celebrate 30 years of this local gem, one of the first and best dog parks in Orange County," said Marc Buchan, president of Friends of Laguna Beach Dog Park, in a statement. "It's an amazing hub

for so many Laguna Beach dog owners and their fur families, providing a safe place to play and socialize in addition to growing a responsible, engaged community of dog people.

"The Friends of Laguna Beach Dog Park have been advocating for the park and working with the city to enhance and improve

## Vanguard University holds groundbreaking ceremony for center

Earlier this year, Vanguard University said goodbye to its gymnasium of 80 years, known as "the Pit."

Students, faculty and administration gathered Tuesday afternoon to celebrate what will come next.

Vanguard broke ground on the Freed Center for Leadership and Service, a 60,000-plus square foot athletic and academic hub set to be built in the heart of campus.

Construction on the three-story building, the latest in the campus' 30-year master plan, is set to be completed in 2024.

The new Freed Center, located adjacent to the Vaughn Student Center, will feature a

gymnasium that seats approximately 2,000 people and include men's and women's locker rooms, athletic training rooms and offices. It will also have more than 10 technology-equipped workstations and conference rooms, among other opportunities for peer mentorship and meetings.

The construction was made possible by the Freed, a local philanthropic family who donated a \$10-million gift in March. As a result, Vanguard was able to reach its funding goal of \$15 million earlier than planned.

Fundraising efforts will continue through the construction of the facility.

# Six birds test positive for avian flu in O.C.

Six birds in Orange County have tested positive for avian flu, according to the county's Health Care Agency.

"Avian flu is present in Orange County and while the risk of transmission to humans is low, residents should stay away from any dead birds," Dr. Regina Chinsio-Kwong, the county's public health officer, said in an advisory. "Bird flu

head, wattles or combs; a discolored or bruised comb, wattle or legs; and stumbling or falling.

The Orange County announcement comes less than a week after Los Angeles County's first avian flu cases of the year were reported as birds migrate south for winter amid a global wave of the deadly virus, known as H5N1.

Public health officials warn that while avian flu is not typically a threat to humans, people should take steps to avoid infection and help stop the spread of the virus.

The state Department of Fish and Wildlife advised hunters in particular to take action to limit their potential exposure to the virus, which has wreaked havoc among avian populations this year.

In the U.S., nearly 48 million birds in 43 states have died this year as avian influenza has proliferated across the country, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Experts have said that number is likely a significant undercount because many bird flu deaths are not detected or reported.

Poultry farms have euthanized entire flocks of chickens and turkeys this year in response to the threat, and thousands of wild birds have been killed by the virus across the U.S. As fall migration gets underway, experts say an "unprecedented" wave of death among domestic and wild bird populations is spreading south, including to Southern California.

is very contagious among birds and can sicken and even kill certain domesticated bird species including chickens, ducks and turkeys."

Authorities advise people and their pets to avoid wild birds — whether dead or alive — and surfaces that may be contaminated with bird saliva or feces. They are advised to contact a healthcare provider if they or their pets become sick after being exposed to ill or dead birds and to report sick or deceased birds to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's website.

Signs of the disease among domesticated and wild birds include sudden death; respiratory distress; clear discharge from the eyes, nose or mouth; lethargy; disinterest in food or water; swelling of the eyes,

Katie Crisman said it was her first pageant.

Crisman will be Surf City's 110th queen. Her court includes Princesses Roslyn Brown-Bilyeu, 18, and Coral Gangitano, 24. The three young women will receive scholarships to further their education upon the completion of their reign.

The pageant Saturday was held at Huntington Beach Central Library Theatre, where five judges critiqued nine candidates' poise, grace and public speaking. Contestants, who could range in age from 18 through 25, also shared their involvement

with causes and community service groups.

Crisman and her court will attend and represent Huntington Beach at various functions throughout the year, starting with events like the Christmas parade and the Surf City Splash on New Year's Day.

The new Miss Huntington Beach is a third-generation local, and the granddaughter of Assistance League of Huntington Beach member Linda Crisman.

"Growing up in Huntington Beach, I was always hanging out down on Main Street, and I believe it was the Christmas tree lighting," she said. "I must have been 10 years old, and I remember seeing Miss Huntington Beach and thinking how cool that was. I never afterwards thought that would be something I'd have the opportunity to do, but I do vividly remember that moment and thinking, 'That's so cool and special to Huntington Beach.' I never thought I would have this opportunity, but it was definitely on my radar."

Crisman graduated summa cum laude from Huntington Beach High School and was captain of the varsity cheer team for three years. She is currently studying at San Diego State University, pursuing a double major

in political science and French studies with a minor in history.

Brown-Bilyeu is a senior at Huntington Beach High on target to graduate magna cum laude. She is a third-year council member of Huntington Beach Academy for the Performing Arts, where she is a principal ballerina also studying and performing in dance, broadcast media, choreography and videography. She plans to study broadcast journalism and international relations at Syracuse University.

Gangitano is a Cal State Long Beach graduate who now teaches math at Marina High School. She plans to return to college next year for a master's degree and was voted "Miss Spirit of Huntington Beach" by her peers.

"We had nine contestants, and any one of them could have won and I'd have felt happy," said Love Lee Ghione, Sand Dollars vice president of marketing and management. "I feel any one of them would have represented Huntington Beach exceptionally well. I was so impressed and overwhelmed with all of their successes already at such a young age."

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
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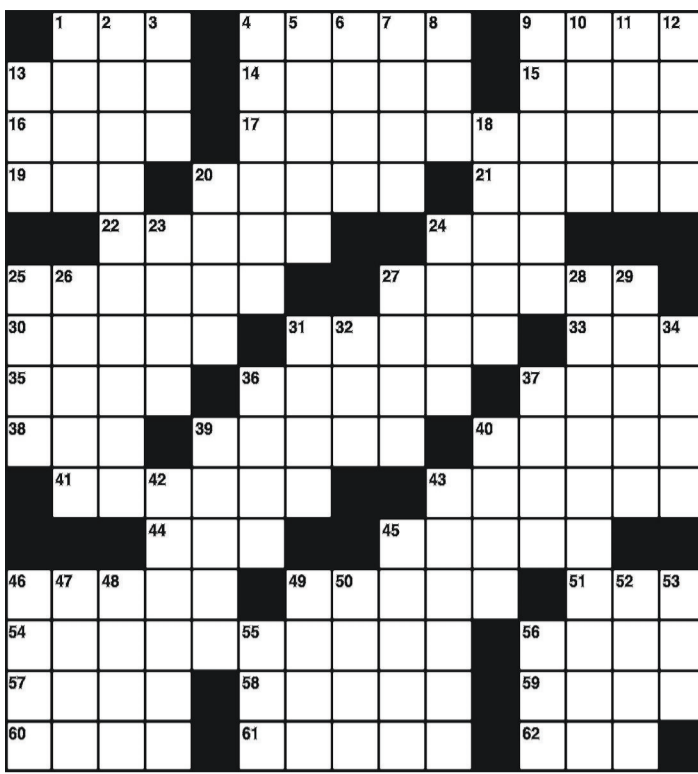

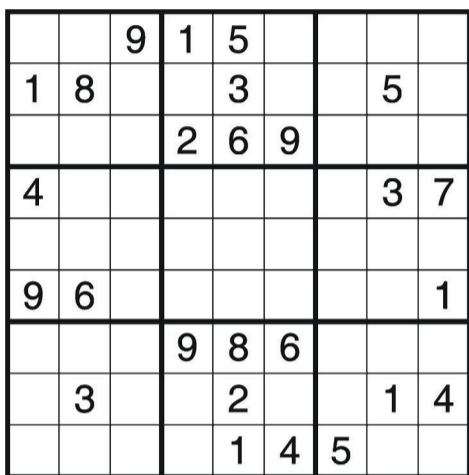

it for 17 years, and we look forward to doing so for many more."

Shade trees and fencing are among the improvements the nonprofit organization has helped bring to the city-owned park.

Saturday mornings are a popular time for dog walking. Rusty Lamboley, a board member for Friends of Laguna Beach Dog Park, remarked that he often sees familiar faces who have gotten into the habit of walking their animal companions at a certain time.

"It's a great place not only for dogs to play and interact with other dogs and learn socialization skills, but it's a great place for people to get together," Lamboley said of Laguna Beach Dog Park. "What I've noticed in my experi-

ence, generally people show up at the same time whenever they go.

"There are some people like myself who get there at 7 o'clock in the morning. I see many of the same faces day in and day out, so you form friendships with the people."

As a new addition to the location, the group intro-

duced an art banner along the fence on the east side of the park. The original photograph of a sunset taken from Heisler Park was produced by Lamboley's wife, Diane, who has exhibited at Art-A-Fair.

The hope is that the "Art in the Park" enhancement can eventually be turned into an outdoor gallery that incorporates additional pieces.

"We would be paying for that," Lamboley said. "We would pay the artists the production costs. ... That wouldn't be funded by the city. We would do it in cooperation with the city."

Laguna Beach Dog Park, located at 20672 Laguna Canyon Road, is open daily from 6 a.m. to dusk. It is closed on Wednesdays for maintenance.

## World-class wrestler to lead Ocean View

Petros Petrosyan enters his first year as the Seahawks' head coach with a goal to revitalize the wrestling program.

Wrestling may not be one of the first athletic programs that one thinks of at Ocean View High, but the Huntington Beach school recently hired a coach who has put the sport first his whole life.

Petros Petrosyan, 59, a decorated wrestler on the world stage, is about to embark on a new adventure, as he approaches his first season as the head coach of the Seahawks.

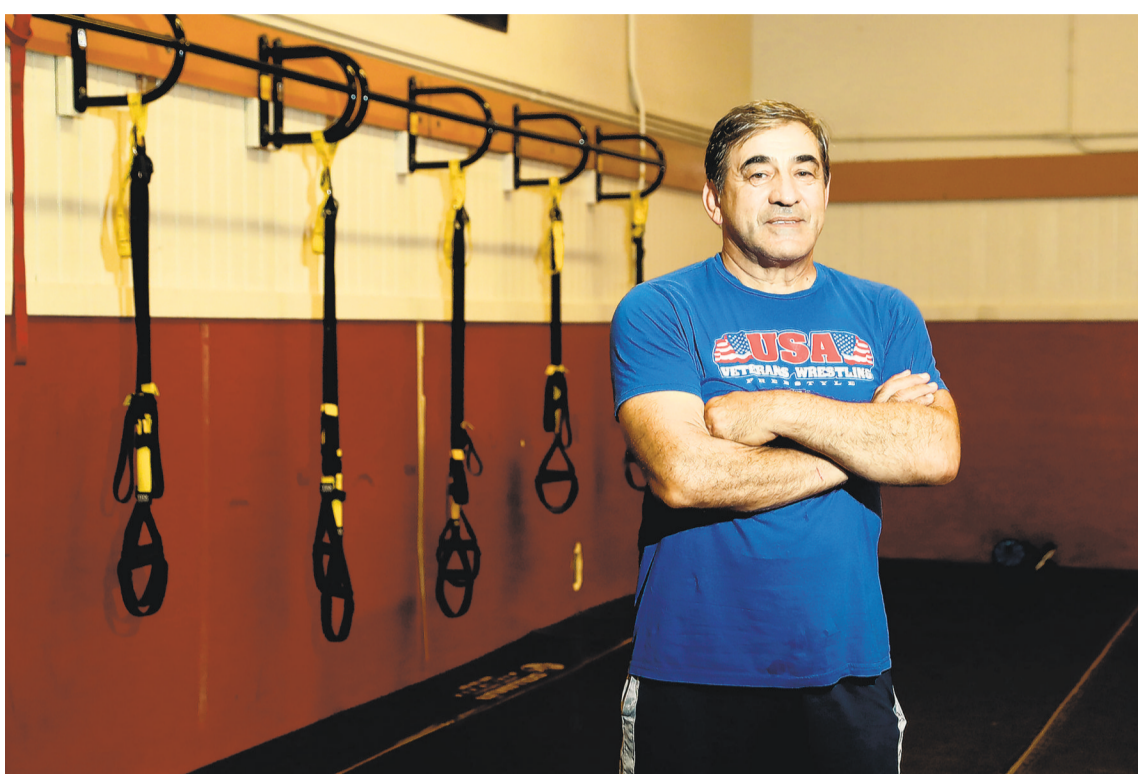
Earlier this month, Petrosyan won the gold medal in the 88-kilogram freestyle division of the United World Wrestling Veterans World Championships in Bulgaria. It marked the second time he has won a title at the tournament.

Petrosyan now takes over a program that has struggled to bring students into the wrestling room, at times working with single digits in terms of the number of participants. The Los Alamitos resident said he was looking for a program close to home that he could build from the ground up.

Some students have told Petrosyan that they are looking to place in the Golden West League, but Petrosyan is intent on helping them to exceed that goal.

"Most are looking at placing in league, while I'm looking at going much, much further than that," Petrosyan said. "Confidence is built through hard work slowly. I know how to build this. I will help them, as I remember starting as a young village boy in Vanadzor, [Armenia], then moving up to national and international levels of competition."

Tim Walsh said that sports like wrestling that did not have built-in youth leagues feeding into the high school suffered because of the coronavirus pandemic. Walsh is excited about welcoming Petrosyan onto campus.

"He exudes an incredible passion for wrestling," Walsh said of Petrosyan. "Frankly, we're at a spot with our program where we need that. We've had a situation the last few years that it's been super inconsistent, and he's so invested in wrestling."

"... I get a great vibe from him. He's a great human, just talking to him about life, in general. This guy that's such an incredible wrestler himself, that's had so much success — who I'm confi-

dent could destroy me if he wanted to — is such a mild-mannered gentleman. ... You wouldn't guess he's this incredible, tough human being just because of the way he carries himself."

Sol Pool, a senior wrestler for the Seahawks, said that Petrosyan has taught the wrestlers new moves and reinforced them in the days that followed. Pool said he has been able to learn up close from Petrosyan, who has served as his sparring partner at times.

"I hope to show them that I am not just [a] competitor [and] coach, but someone they can come to like a second father, or at least an uncle," Petrosyan said of what he hopes to provide his students. "All wrestlers on a team are

automatically family — your teammates are your brothers and sisters.

"The highs, the [lows], the camaraderie, mutual respect built, sweat, blood and tears of training in the world's hardest sport binds us together. They will see that the accomplishments they achieve through wrestling will redefine them into better versions of themselves. When they go to college, learn their trades, start their own businesses, they will be vastly more successful because they were wrestlers and champions before."

A 10-time Armenian national champion and an eight-time U.S. Open Masters national champion, Petrosyan moved to the United

States two decades ago. He is now the head wrestling coach for Orange County Grappling.

That relationship began when Petrosyan and Brian Jones, a multi-time world medalist himself, walked into a gym for a workout. Gene Patiño, a co-founder of Orange County Grappling, knew then it could be a one-time appearance, but it turned out not to be so.

"He was working out here and wrestling, coaching some of the guys, and the guys liked him coaching," Patiño said. "They were like, 'Man, I've never seen this style.'"

"This is a different style that he coaches than the American-style wrestling. ... Way more foot sweeps, throws, there's integration with judo. The European style is not as full-force aggressive as the American-style wrestling, and it's more technical."
