FBI searches home of man at Capitol

Huntington Beach resident who previously claimed to have been at the Jan. 6 riot now says he didn't participate.

The FBI on Monday searched the Huntington Beach apartment of a far-right extremist who previously claimed to have attended the riot at the U.S. Capitol.

FBI agents searched an apartment on Viewpoint Lane around 10 a.m., said Laura Eimiller, a spokeswoman for the FBI's Los Angeles Field Office. Eimiller said the search resulted in unspecified items being removed, but no arrests were made.

She did not confirm the identity of the resident of the apartment, but public records show the address is associated with prominent far-right activist Kristopher Martin, also known as Kristopher Dreww, and his hairstyling business, Hair by Kristopher Dreww.

One unidentified person was at the residence and was cooperative, Eimiller said. She said she could not disclose any further information as the search warrant is sealed.

Martin, a supporter of President Donald Trump, posted videos on social media on Jan. 6, claiming to have been part of the riot at the Capitol.

In a video after the Capitol invasion, which left five people dead, including one police officer, Martin appeared to brag about being part of the mob and encouraged other people to join.

"I just got back from storming the Capitol," Martin said in the video. "It was successful. For all you bitches on Facebook going crazy right now talking about it was An-

No test? No problem.

Hoag Memorial Hospital Presbyterian announced on Monday it had opened a COVID-19 rapid testing clinic at John Wayne Airport.



Prospective travelers can now be tested for COVID-19 at John Wayne Airport before they clear airport security, thanks to a rapid testing clinic operated by Hoag Memorial Hospital Presbyterian that opened Monday.

Located in Terminal B on the departure level just before the TSA checkpoint, people will be able to walk up to the testing clinic and request a test without an appointment.

Tests will cost \$139, but the clinic will also take insurance if available. Once paid for, trained clinicians will administer the nasal swab and take it back to an on-site lab to produce results in 15 to 30 minutes. Provided is an antigen test, which detects certain proteins within the virus. This differs from PCR tests, which detect the genetic material of the virus and can take about a week for results.

The rapid testing clinic differs from the Fly



Well Clinic, also operated by Hoag, which was announced in November, and is expected to be able to offer urgent care services by this spring.

"As cases continue to rise here in Orange County and across the nation, it's important that our community has access to COVID-19 testing," Robert Braithwaite, president and

chief executive officer for Hoag, said in a statement. "We are proud to partner with John Wayne Airport to offer this convenient and accessible rapid testing option in the heart of Orange County."

The Orange County Health Care Agency re-

Disneyland vaccine site closed a second day due to high winds, appointments rescheduled

Orange County COVID-19 vaccination plans hit a snag this week, as high winds forced a two-day closure of the Disneyland vaccination site in Anaheim Tuesday and a batch of Moderna vaccine given to more than 5,000 county residents undergoes investigation for causing possible allergic reactions.

With strong winds forecast for Orange County until Wednesday night, Orange County Health Care Agency officials announced

Monday the vaccination super POD (point-of-dispensing) site opened last week at Disneyland would be closed Tuesday. After some deliberation Tuesday, the agency reported the site would remain closed a second day and likely reopen Thursday, based on weather forecasts.

Thousands scheduled to receive the first-round vaccine, including individuals 65 years and older, were notified of the temporary cancellation through the Othena app, recently launched to help residents schedule

COVID-19 vaccine appointments. An OCHA representative confirmed those originally scheduled to be vaccinated Tuesday have had their appointments moved to Thursday.

"Due to high wind warnings issued by the National Weather Service for Orange County, the Disneyland Super POD site will be closed on Tuesday, Jan. 19, 2021," read an OCHA tweet Monday. "Those with appointments for Tuesday will be notified of their rescheduled appointment through Othena

.com."

Jessica Good, a public information manager for the agency, confirmed Tuesday afternoon no appointments had been made for Wednesday due to incoming weather forecasts earlier in the week and said Othena will resume scheduling as soon as the high winds abate.

A high wind warning in effect through 10 p.m. Wednesday across southwestern portions of the state, including Orange

High school fall sports championships canceled

The CIF Southern Section announced Tuesday morning that it has canceled its fall high school sports championships because of the coronavirus pandemic.

As a result, there will be no section playoffs for football, girls' volleyball, water polo and cross-country.

A statement issued by the section pointed to a lack of tier progression with respect to the transmission of the virus in the Southern California region as a primary reason for the decision.

Per the state's youth sports guidelines, cross-country is the only fall sport in the section that can have competitions in the purple tier, and that is contingent on the stay-at-home order being lifted.

The seven counties that comprise nearly the entirety of the section's membership — Orange, Los Angeles, Riverside, San Luis

Obispo, Santa Barbara, San Bernardino and Ventura — are in that most-restrictive tier.

The earliest that competition could be held between two teams under current guidance from the California Department of Public Health is Jan. 25.

A series of "Let Them Play" rallies were seen in Orange County and across the state on Friday as demonstrators pushed for the resumption of high school sports.

In early December, the CIF State office opted to cancel all regional and state championships for fall sports.

By removing the playoffs from the fall sports calendar, the window has been expanded for section schools to potentially schedule and play more regular season and league games during what would have been the postseason dates.

"I just don't believe that today's the day to tell our student-ath-

Tito Ortiz apologizes after he criticized eatery

Huntington Beach Mayor Pro Tem Tito Ortiz has apologized after posting a video on his Instagram stories Sunday criticizing TK Burgers, a popular Surf City restaurant.

The issue centered around Ortiz's continued refusal to wear a mask during the coronavirus pandemic.

"I'm really emotional right now about a lot of things, and I apologized," Ortiz said Tuesday when reached via phone. "I recanted everything, and that's pretty much it."

He declined to comment further.

Ortiz said Sunday in his Instagram stories that TK Burgers, located on Pacific Coast Highway a block south of Main Street, denied him service because he wasn't wearing a mask.

"Every Sunday I always come to TK Burgers," Ortiz said in the video. "[Today] they won't let me order unless I have a mask to come in. First time all year that I've actually been forced to wear a mask, but I'm not wearing a mask. TK Burgers, you lose my business, you lose H.B.'s business."





Firefighters contend with 3-alarm blaze in Huntington Harbour

High winds fueled a three-alarm structure fire that broke out at a Huntington Harbour residence Tuesday afternoon, sending flames into the attic of the home and causing massive amounts of smoke in the area.

Huntington Beach Fire Department spokesman Eric Blaska said multiple calls came in just after 4 p.m. from witnesses who saw smoke issuing from the house off Venture Drive and called 911.

"With the high winds, we're protecting the houses around it. Blaska said from the scene Tuesday while crews continued to battle the blaze. "We're worried about embers fly-

ing off from the roof — [the fire] is pretty stubborn, and the attic is pretty big."

At one point during the fight, embers from the property were blown onto the roof of a home across the street and had to be immediately extinguished.

Blaska said the fire burned holes into the shake-shingled roof of the first residence, preventing firefighters from climbing atop the structure to provide ventilation and aid them in their fight.

"It would be unsafe for us to put someone on the roof," he added.

All reports indicate occupants of the property were not at home when the fire broke out, and no firefighters or residents

were injured. One housecat was rescued from inside.

The cause of the fire was still being investigated early Tuesday evening as portions of inland Orange County remained under a high-wind warning issued earlier that day by the National Weather Service.

That advisory indicated that northeast winds from 25 to 35 mph could be anticipated until 10 p.m. Wednesday with gusts up to 60 mph and isolated gusts as strong as 80 mph.

Residents were warned of the potential for downed trees or power lines, in addition to possible power outages.

Laguna starts matching grant program for COVID-19 relief

Laguna Beach has launched a matching grant program to provide financial assistance to its residents and people working in the city who have been adversely affected by the coronavirus pandemic.

The matching grant program kicked off Jan. 11 as part of the Laguna COVID-19 Relief Fund. It is being run through the Laguna Beach Community Foundation, and those in need can receive aid in the form of grants of up to \$1,000 per household for those who qualify.

The Laguna Beach City Council included the matching grant to encourage the community to help with the relief effort. All donations to the Laguna COVID-19 Relief Fund will be matched by the city up to \$300,000. Donations are also tax deductible.

The Boys and Girls Club of Laguna Beach is also assisting with application submission and the delivery of the grants, which will be paid out primarily by checks and gift cards.

"Right now, we are in the darkest days of this pandemic and hundreds of local workers and residents have been laid off again," Laguna Beach Mayor Bob Whalen said in a statement.

"They are stretched to the breaking point to pay their rent, keep their utilities turned on and feed their families. I urge our community to do what it always does in times of crisis which is to rise to the challenge and raise \$300,000 to match the city funds. Please dig deep and give what you can to help the cause."

Those looking to apply for a mini grant or wishing to donate can do so by visiting laguna.covid19relief.com.

The Laguna COVID-19 Relief Fund was established in April. The first round of financial relief saw 850 residents and people employed in the city benefit from \$475,000 that was distributed.

ported a total of 3,995 cases Monday and Tuesday. There have been 214,808 cases in the region since March. County officials also reported 46 deaths on Monday and 64 deaths on Tuesday, bringing the death toll to 2,477 countywide since officials began tracking data at the onset of the pandemic.

The location of the rapid testing clinic allows concerned travelers the ability to be tested before they pass security but also allows local residents to stop by if they need to be tested, said Marcy Brown, the senior vice president and chief hospital operations officer for Hoag. She added that officials didn't want travelers to receive a positive result after checking in luggage or holding boarding passes.

"Not only are we servicing these travelers who can be confident before they board but also the community," Brown said. "I can go down there this afternoon and get tested. I could park in the short-term parking, walk in, get my test and walk out."

"It's also serving the surrounding community as a high-quality, branded, rapid COVID testing location," she added. Airport director Barry Rondinella said John Wayne Airport aims to make people feel safer and more secure while they travel, which includes the

rapid testing clinic and the Fly Well Clinic.

"People need to fly. They still have things that they need to do and places they need to go. It's important that folks know that John Wayne Airport is safe; it's clean; we regularly sterilize high touch points and at other places; we have all of the precautions taken," said Rondinella, adding that the airport has also installed 6-foot distancing markers and plexiglass shields.

"Should you want or need to fly, you are safe at John Wayne Airport and we are taking every precaution that we know of to make you feel that way and for that to be the case," Rondinella said.

Brown said the goal of both the rapid testing clinic and the Fly Well Clinic was just to keep the community healthy, whether that was during the pandemic or whenever normal life resumes.

"Think of the business travelers or the families on vacation that plan on going to Disneyland," Brown said.

"What a great, convenient service to have urgent care services right there in the airport for someone who isn't feeling well, who just landed and is coming back to have Hoag right there, partnered with John Wayne Airport, offering these convenient health services," Brown said. "It's a win. It's an absolute win-win."




County, is forecasting winds of 25 to 35 mph with gusts up to 60 mph, the National Weather Service reports. Residents were advised Tuesday to avoid forested areas and are warned of winds high enough to blow down trees and power lines, causing possible power outages.

O.C. Health Care Agency representatives assured Tuesday no vaccine doses would be discarded as a result of the unexpected two-day closure.

Uncooperative weather is just the latest factor throwing a monkey

wrench into Orange County's goal to see most residents vaccinated against COVID-19 by July 4.

The Health Care Agency announced in a release Monday it had suspended the use of a batch of Moderna vaccine being investigated by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and the manufacturer for causing a possible allergic reaction.

At least 5,217 individuals in Orange County are thought to have received a vaccination from the batch in question — lot 041L20A — according to information provided by the state's immunization registry.

Residents are advised to

check their vaccination cards to see if they received a vaccine from that lot number and to report any adverse reactions to their doctor or primary care provider.

"To date, the HCA has received zero notifications of allergic reactions requiring medical attention due to any Moderna vaccines," the release stated.

Technical problems are also making it difficult for locals to sign up to receive a COVID-19 vaccine, as the system struggles to meet unusually high demands.

Orange County Board of Supervisors Chair Andrew Do said in a Jan. 13 news conference held shortly after Othena was launched more than 10,000 people

attempted to book appointments in one two-hour period.

"I know people may have a hard time getting through because the volume of people trying to get appointments is so high that the system can be overloaded," Do said, adding that an IT team was working to increase the system's bandwidth. "Be patient — [and] if it's not available today, please try again."

The county estimated as of Tuesday more than 250,000 individuals have so far registered for a vaccine appointment through othena.com.

tifa, and saying it wasn't us, it was us. We proudly took back our Capitol."

Martin said in the video that he was in his hotel room to "get some gear on" and planned to go back, presumably to the Capitol. "They brought the National Guard out for us. We had the ... cops running, they ran from us," Martin said. "Not because they are bitches but because they are smart.... We did it. God,

it's so exhilarating!"

Martin could not be reached for comment. In an interview Jan. 9 with the Southern California News Group, Martin denied any role in the violence that took place during the riot and said he only watched from afar.

letes that we're done fighting for them, that we're going to give up," CIF Commissioner Rob Wigod said of keeping regular season games on the table. "As long as there's time remaining, then we need to keep that in mind and hopefully try to keep them focused and staying positive towards what's in front of them."

The fall sports of football, girls' volleyball and water polo were all placed in the orange tier for "moderate transmission," which would necessitate counties to progress from purple to red, and then into the orange tier, for those sports to be allowed.

Orange County has had 110 coronavirus deaths over the last two days, per data provided by the Orange County Health Care Agency on Tuesday.

There has been 2,477 fatalities countywide because of the virus. An additional 3,995 cases were reported to take the cumula-

tive case count to 214,808.

Reports surfaced of a football game played between Orange County private schools in Calvary Chapel and Capistrano Valley Christian last week.

Wigod said that he has spoken to the administration of four high schools alleged to have held games, adding that the section is continuing the "process of getting all of the information that we need."

The CIF State office distributed a letter to its member schools Tuesday entitled, "Mandatory Compliance with CIF Bylaws and CDPH Guidance." The communication warned that any school that did not comply could be subject to penalization.

"Any school determined to have participated in or to be conducting interscholastic athletics events in violation of the State's orders or CIF rules may be subject to CIF Article 22 sanctions including, but not limited to, fines, suspension or dismissal from membership," the statement said.

Calvary Chapel football

coach Pat McNally did not immediately respond to a request for comment on the game that was reported to have been played on Saturday.

Huntington Beach football coach Brett Brown said his wife, Brianna, is a nurse at UC Irvine Medical Center.

"Don't get me wrong, I definitely understand that things are bad right now," Brown said. "My wife's actually a nurse, and she's on the front lines taking care of them, but I feel the effects [on] these kids mentally are far worse than the effects of COVID, on teenagers at least."

Brown added that the loss of the playoffs did not change much from his perspective, with April 17 remaining the final date that football games could be played. That leaves about three months for some games to be played if the county were to progress to the orange tier.

"For the sake of the seniors, I would be happy with one game," Brown said, hopeful that his players would get to suit up in uni-

form at least once this season. "The majority of high school athletes don't go on to play their sport after high school anyways, so if they can have one more opportunity, then I'm all for it."

The final date of competition for water polo and girls' volleyball as provided by the section is March 20. The end date for the cross-country season is March 27, and it is April 3 for eight-man football.

That the season was not canceled outright was also a net positive for Costa Mesa cross-country coach Steve Moreno.

"My heart goes out to these athletes and what they're going through," Moreno said. "Just trying to remain as positive as possible and work within the means that are given to us to be able to sustain some sort of a season, especially for fall sports."

"Hopefully by spring, things will be much better, and we'll be able to do more."

Ortiz apologized for the video in a Facebook post on Monday, saying he made a bad decision and that the restaurant is his favorite burger place in Orange County.

"I let my emotions get the best of me," Ortiz said in the Facebook post. "I understand this is a small business and I would never want to ruin that business. I apologize to TK Burgers for my decision." TK Burgers employees on Tuesday referred media to the company's corporate office in Santa Ana. A message seeking comment was not returned.

Ortiz, a former professional mixed martial arts fighter who was elected to the City Council in November with the most

votes in city history, has drawn the ire of community members and fellow City Council members for not wearing a mask.

The lifelong Huntington Beach resident attended a strategic planning and goal setting workshop on Jan. 5 from his car in the parking lot of the Huntington Beach Central Library, instead of putting a mask on.

Huntington Beach Mayor Kim Carr posted pictures of herself and her daughter visiting TK Burgers later Sunday on her Instagram stories, with bags of takeout in their hands and masks on their faces.

"We [love] our local H.B. businesses," the post read, with the restaurant tagged in the post.
