# OCIMA opening draws thousands to new home

County Museum of Art which has officially debuted at its new home in Costa Mesa's Segerstrom Center for the Arts — have been experiencing their own personal "Field of Dreams" moment.

After more than a decade of planning, the 53,000-square-foot structure opened its doors to the public on Saturday evening in a 24-hour ceremony that opened with a drumline procession down Avenue of the Arts and, by the time it concluded on Sunday, had attracted more than 10,000


Although Saturday marked the museum's opening days, organizers, officials and philanthropists have been celebrating in a series of events that began Sept. 27 with a donor dinner and walked up to a Friday morning ribbon-cutting ceremony that drew legislators and local dignitaries, including Costa Mesa Mayor John Stephens.

OCMA chief executive Heidi Zuckerman reminded attendees that admission to the \$93-million museum will be free of charge for its first 10 years, courtesy of a donation from Lugano Diamonds of Newport Beach.

That's just one way officials aim to expand access to the arts to residents throughout Orange County and beyond.

"I am so excited to welcome everyone to the new Orange County Museum of Art. By that, I mean welcome everyone, not just today, but every day," Zuckerman said at Saturday's opening. "I am humbled by the public turn out to celebrate this weekend and the support of our donors and community in the lead up to the opening of our new home."

# L.B. gives update on effort to battle wildfires

The city says a majority of the short-term items in a wildfire mitigation and fire safety plan have been implemented.

Laguna Beach continues to make progress in preparing for and fighting wildfires, according to an update provided on those efforts to the City Council this

The council signed off on the wildfire mitigation and fire safety plan in 2019, a \$23-million commitment that provided a list of 42 goals the city would like to accomplish to protect the community from fire events. The opportunities focus on infrastructure improvements, fuel modification, evacuation and notification.

Jeremy Frimond, an assistant to the city manager, said more than two-thirds of the 29 short-term items identified in the plan have been implemented.

In a report given before the panel on Tuesday, city officials shared that several cameras have been installed in Laguna Beach's open space to assist with fire detection.

"The goal here was to install outdoor cameras, fire detection cameras that are essentially monitoring our open space to make sure we have constant contact, particularly during red-flag

# NMUSD forum focused on safety, pandemic

Candidates running for four districted school board seats discussed their backgrounds and goals if they are elected.

Declining enrollment, parent involvement in public education and the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and its mandates on students and families provided rich talking points Monday for nine candidates vying for four seats on the Newport-Mesa Unified School District Board of Trustees.

A forum hosted by the Harbor Council PTA at Back Bay High School offered an opportunity for Newport Beach and Costa Mesa contenders running for

# Man suspected of DUI among 3 injured after truck slams into 2 C.M. restaurants

Three people were injured Saturday — including a pregnant woman and a driver who was arrested on suspicion of drunken driving — after a truck crashed through the front of one restaurant and into the kitchen of another in Costa Mesa.

Preliminary investigation suggests the truck ran a red light and sideswiped another vehicle along the 2900 block of Bristol Street at about 5:15 p.m., Costa Mesa police spokeswoman Roxi Fyad said. It then went over a curb and into a business lot.

It crashed through the front of Bred's Nashville Hot Chicken and punched through a wall, leaving part of its front end in the prep area of Seabirds Kitchen, according to Instagram posts by the vegan restaurant. They also shared photos of a large metal fridge that had been knocked over and one of their employees being treated by firefighters.

Several tables and about half of the dining space in Bred's were damaged in the crash, an employee working on Monday said. They were able to reopen after initial repairs were made on Sunday, but Seabird's Kitchen remained temporarily closed.

A store manager who was working in Seabirds Kitchen suffered a broken leg, according to the restaurant's post. She was scheduled to go on maternity leave the following day.

A passenger in the car that was sideswiped suffered minor injuries, as did the truck's driver, Fyad said.

No patrons were in Bred's at the time, Fyad said. The truck appeared to careen into the business without stopping in surveillance footage, the owner of

four districted seats in the Nov. 8 election to share about their professional parenting backgrounds, why they're seeking office and what they'd focus on in the next four years.

Incumbents Michelle Barto (Area 5) and Ashley Anderson (Area 7) seek second terms and face challengers. Reina Shebesta is squaring off against Barto, while Vicky Rodriguez and Kristen Seaburn are running against Anderson.

Seats in areas 2 and 4 are open this election, as trustees Charlene Metover and Karen Yelsey have decided not to seek reelection. Candidates Danielle Mills and Michelle Murphy are running in Area 2, while Kristen Valle, Lisa Pearson and Barbara "Barbie" George are competing to represent Area 4.

Only George did not attend Monday's forum, due to a scheduling conflict, organizers said.

After a round of introductions, moderators from the county's Fourth District PTA asked a series of questions in a round robin style that allowed all nine

participants to speak on multiple subjects.

When asked what motivated them to run for office, Rodriguez, a mom who works as a tax preparer, said she was startled by high drop-out rates in the "minority majority" 7th district.

"I would try to help with tutoring of kids who are not doing well and get mental health for parents and teachers and also help for suicide," Rodriguez said.

Challenger Seaburn, an executive assistant for the county and mom of a son with special needs, cited learning loss during the

pandemic as a major area of focus for her campaign. Anderson, the only candidate to graduate from an NMUSD high school, spoke about the importance of bilingual instruction and improving literacy rates.

Murphy, a parent and nonprofit executive, said she hoped to help reverse a trend of parents leaving the district, or favoring private school and charter options for their children. while challenger and fellow parent Mills said she'd aim to restore the loss of parental rights incurred

during the pandemic. "Since 2020, parents have been kept off of campuses, kept out of classrooms and libraries and out of their students' school life," said Mills, a mother of two who volunteers with the Orange County Gun Owners. want to make sure that does not happen again."

Shebesta, a high school counselor, said protection of children's physical safety and mental health had to be prioritized so kids felt safe coming to school. Pearson, who taught for 10 years, said she hoped to maintain the solid reputation NMUSD schools have achieved.

When asked how they would reconcile their personal beliefs with the roles and responsibilities of a school board member to uphold laws and mandates identified by the state and its education code, responses varied.

Seaburn, Mills and Valle said the district abused its power during the pan-

demic and should have stood up to pandemic mandates, like school closures and mask wearing, by passing board resolu-tions and lobbying Sacramento for changes.

"If you want to subject vour child to something like vaccines and masking and whatever else comes up in this crazy political climate we have, go ahead," said Valle, a mom and executive assistant who protested COVID-19 precautions in Sacramento. "I would never, ever compromise and vote to take that decision away from the parents."

Incumbents Anderson and Barto said they swore oaths to uphold the California Constitution. Barto indicated in her remarks that along with passion, a trustee needs to build consensus among and collaborate with colleagues

on the board.

"You are one of seven," she said. "If you can't come to a solution, then you get nowhere."

A series of fun and revealing lightning-round questions brought the 2 1/2-hour forum to a close. Harbor Council PTA Vice President and forum coordinator Martha Fluor thanked all who attended.

"We appreciate all candidates and incumbents for stepping up," Fluor said. "It's not easy to put yourselves out there, but you did."

Bred's, Laura Kearse, 45, said during a brief interview Monday. A thick cloud of dust and shattered glass slowly settled in the dining room in its wake.

# **Meet the** candidates running for Newport **Beach City** Council

Less than a month remains before Newport Beach voters will decide which four of the eight candidates running for the City Council will have a seat at the dais.

Three sitting council members will be terming out this fall, leaving Councilwoman Joy Brenner as the lone incumbent running this election.

While council members are elected by district, they are voted in at-large. Data from the Orange County Registrar of Voters' office reports there are 60,812 registered voters in Newport Beach. The last day to register to vote in California is Oct. 24.

The Daily Pilot sent a questionnaire to all City Council candidates on the ballot to get an overview on their experience, why they are running and what they feel are the biggest issues affecting Newport Beach.

We are presenting their responses by district and by alphabetical order by last name. Some responses have been edited for formatting, brevity or clarity.

and why: • Public Safety: I have knocked on over 3,000 doors to date and the No. 1 issue shared with me is public safety and lack of enforcement. We are a huge target here and gangs from South America have been infiltrating our community. I've met with several residents who shared terrifying stories of home invasions while they were still in the home and having to confront these criminals face to face. Many of us believe our incredible police department needs more officers. We MUST keep Los Angeles out of Newport Beach. Their catch and release program with their D.A. is destroying L.A. and we simply can't allow their criminals to trickle down to our community.

· Homelessness: this is also linked to public safety. I have a neighbor who showed me a photo of a homeless man entering through their front window. I spent five hours at our bridge homeless shelter we share with Costa Mesa. Nate and John are co-directors of this facility and the three of us were able to share some incredible ideas on how we can all work together on improving this crisis. I learned a lot about how the shelter works and was fortunate to spend time interviewing some of our homeless, giving me a better understanding of coming up with solutions, including more church involvement at the "small group" level.

While others are focused on where and how those units could be built, my concern is that voter rejection of the final plan could lead to invalidation of our citizens' hard-won right to approve major development proposals via our 2000 Greenlight initiative. How the Greenlight aspect should be handled needs serious debate.

• The two most serious long-term threats I see to the city are airport impacts and sea level rise. Both have the potential to make substantial areas unlivable. Controlling the former requires constant vigilance, within which my education makes me especially qualified to understand and question noise issues. Coping with the latter requires adopting an attitude of cooperation rather than confrontation with the California Coastal Commission, for they will ultimately have to approve any strategies the city may wish to adopt.

**EIGHT CANDIDATES** are running for four open seats on the Newport Beach City Council this November.

• The issue overarching all other issues is the need to return control of city policy making from the staff to the people. Examples of staff, rather than the people's council, controlling policy making are replete. In recent times, these include a lobbyist registration system adopted with fanfare, then totally ignored; trash fees imposed through a staff interpretation of voter-enacted legislation prohibiting them; a Museum House clone recommended for approval on land voters approved only for a hotel (and which staff would not let me appeal from the Planning Commission to the council); and most recently, council direction for staff to revise the definition of "timeshare" to prohibit the new phenomenon of fractional homeownership turning into a staff recommendation to legalize it.

• Crime: Soft on crime policies from Sacramento increasingly bring crime right to our doorstep. With many of these homes planned for the airport area, we must have an appropriate master plan to protect our city's character. Those with mental illness and addiction problems must be taken off our streets and placed into effective treatment programs located in commercial areas, not residential ones.

# Fighter Tito Ortiz lists H.B. house after break-in

Longtime UFC fighter Tito Ortiz is asking \$4.8 million for his Mediterranean-style home in Huntington Beach, the city where he served as mayor pro tempore last year.

The listing arrives a few months after the house was burglarized. In June, reported that thieves ransacked the Davenport Island residence and stole a safe while Ortiz was away.

A Huntington Beach native, Ortiz became politically active in the community when he ran for City Council in 2020 and won an open seat. He

briefly served as mayor pro tempore but resigned in June 2021, citing personal attacks after a controversial stretch that saw him speak out against mask usage during the pandemic and file for unemployment against the city despite not having his hours cut.

The residence boasts a waterfront spot on Huntington Beach Harbor and takes advantage with a 50-foot private dock. Inside are four bedrooms and 3.5 bathrooms in nearly 4,000 square feet, including a pair of primary suites complete with balconies.

Other highlights in-

clude a wine cellar and dramatic foyer with a sweeping staircase under 20-foot ceilings. Out back, a column-lined patio hovers above the wa-

Nicknamed the Huntington Beach Bad Boy, Ortiz made his mixed martial arts debut in 1997 and became the UFC light heavyweight champion three years later. He soon became a face of the sport and was inducted into the UFC Hall of Fame in 2012.

Newport Beach is one of the primary reasons I am now running for City Council. At the last point in time count, the number of people experiencing homelessness in our city had increased by 50%, when neighboring Costa Mesa, Laguna Beach and Huntington Beach saw reductions of 20%, 60% and 35%, respectively. Anyone spending time in areas like Mc-Fadden Square and many of our village centers can be witness to someone shooting-up or urinating on the sidewalk. Multiple people have overdosed near the Newport Pier area. # Edison tops Newport Harbor, improves to 7-0

Perfection is near unattainable, but there are few words that better describe the performance of Edison High quarterback Parker Awad on Friday night.

Awad compiled 346 total yards and four touchdowns, leading the visiting Chargers to a 47-14 win over Newport Harbor in a Sunset League game at Davidson Field.

The senior quarterback threw for 318 yards and three touchdowns, completing deep balls and backhanded tosses alike for Edison (7-0, 2-0). Awad threw his only incomplete pass on the final of his 14 attempts on a shot to the back left corner of the end zone intended for Jackson Irwin.

Edison coach Jeff Grady discussed Awad's work ethic in practice after watching his quarterback complete his first 13 passes.

"Even when he's not in, on video, you can see him going through when someone else is in, he gets a mental rep and he gets a physical rep, and he goes through his drop, goes through his reads and makes his throws," Grady said after watching Awad complete his first 13 passes. "I'm not surprised. He's a special guy."

Awad had a 60-yard touchdown pass to Mason York to open the scoring, and after Newport Harbor tied the score, he answered by airing the ball out again. Ashton Hurley simply had to run under the ball, never breaking stride on an 88-yard touchdown on the first play of the drive.

"I think us taking that shot shows our explosiveness, and it was a fun play," Hurley said. "It was a perfect pass. Unbelievable."

Hurley was especially elusive, turning his five catches into 193

yards. The only one that did not result in a first down was one in which he went in motion to the left, taking the swing pass and being stopped at the 1-yard line. Awad scored on a quarterback keeper on the next play to extend Edison's lead to 21-7 midway through the second quarter.

Newport Harbor (4-3, 0-2) showed staying power with its passing game, Josiah Lamarque making three catches for 59 yards and a touchdown on the next possession — a five-play, 61-yard drive that had begun with a sack by Jake Giles.

Colton Joseph, a transfer from San Juan Hills, threw for 233 yards and two touchdowns. The first energized the Sailors early, as Newport Harbor opted to go for a fourth-and-19 at the Edison 30. Kashton Henjum was the target on the deep ball, making the grab while running to the back of the end zone and getting his left foot down, tying the score at 7-7.

Edison's defense would be heard from in the second half, though. Effective defensive line play, combined with the coverage of Malachi Pierce and Hurley, led to a five-sack night for the Char-

The pass rush was also felt on a pass from Joseph that ended up in the arms of Carter Hogue, who returned the interception 59 yards for a touchdown. Hogue also had a short-yardage rushing touchdown off an option play in a third quarter where the Chargers outscored the Sailors 19-0.

Hunter Venham and Giles both

had 11/2 sacks, and Martin Kai and Irwin each had one. Michael Deliz and Irwin were also among the Chargers who stopped running plays for a loss.

"I think we played good team defense," Grady said. "I think the guys rely on one another to do what they're supposed to do. When you get guys to do what they're supposed to do, it kind of gives others opportunities, and they've been opportunistic.'

Alexe Pappageorge had a sack for Newport Harbor, which takes on Fountain Valley (4-3, 0-2) on Friday, Oct. 14 at home.

Newport Harbor coach Peter Lofthouse said his team was frustrated with its execution in the loss, but he added the Sailors still have an opportunity in front of them.

"This has just become a threegame season," Lofthouse said. 'We've got to win the next three if we want to be able to guarantee ourselves an opportunity and an automatic bid, and if we don't win the next three, then we're going to put ourselves in a position that we must get at least one to give ourselves a shot at an atlarge berth, but when you do that, [applying for] an at-large berth does not guarantee you playoffs."

Edison will play host to Los Alamitos (5-2, 2-0) in a battle for first place in the Sunset League on Thursday, Oct. 13 at Huntington Beach High.

Giles said that the Chargers put an emphasis on not looking ahead to Los Alamitos, but now the clock is ticking down to the showdown with the Griffins.

"I think we'll come out firing in that game," Giles said.

# Huntington Beach earns key victory over Fountain Valley

Huntington Beach High could be headed back to the next three games are the CIF Southern Section going to be tough, we did playoffs for the fourth time in the past six autumns after getting the best of resurgent Fountain Valley.

AJ Vandermade made up for a costly fumble with two touchdown receptions and the Oilers scored points on four of five possessions from the start of the second quarter until the start of the fourth to claim a 23-12 victory in a Sunset League battle.

Huntington Beach (5-2, 1-1) figures to finish fifth in the league. The Oilers' campaign closes against Corona del Mar (5-2, 1-1), Los Alamitos (5-2, 2-0) and Newport Harbor (4-3, 0-2), but its fifth win could provide an at-large berth when the postseason be-

gins next month. The Oilers could find greater success then than in the tough Sunset League. The program won the Southwest Division title in 2013 after going 5-5 and finishing fifth in

league play. "It was big," said Vandermade, Huntington Beach's dynamic playmaker, who was held to just the two

receptions while facing double- and triple-coverage. "We knew our best to come here and get the fifth win now. ... We made the postseason, and that was the No. 1 goal of the season, and now we get through the rest of the [regular] season and then focus on playoffs."

Fountain Valley (4-3, 0-2), which lost its 17th successive league game, likely will miss out on the playoffs for the fourth straight year. The Barons close against Los Alamitos, Edison (7-0, 2-0) and Corona del Mar.

"We've got to win one somewhere," Fountain Valley coach David Gutierrez said. "So we're going to be prepped every week, like we were this week. We've just got to execute.'

Vandermade called it an "ugly" triumph, and it uglier. Nathan Tauanuu, whose late-thirdquarter interception led to Vandermade's second touchdown and a 23-6 advantage, sustained a potentially major knee injury on a post-whistle hit with 18 seconds to play, which led to jawing among the assistant coaches during the postgame handshakes and a brawl among players moments later.

Neither team moved the ball effectively in the first quarter, and Fountain Valley took a 6-0 lead on a fumble recovered in the end zone on the second play of the second quarter. . Vandermade, taking a handoff inside the 5 for a reverse on third-and-9, was wrapped up by Fer-Garcia, then nando seemed to be slipping out of the Barons defensive end's grasp at the 1 when Caine Elroy delivered a devastating blow.

The ball tumbled from Vandermade's hands and was collected in the end zone by Michael Rocha.

"I took it, he swallowed me, took the second hit, fumbled," Vandermade said. "[ I] came back, though. Had two touchdowns later; bounced back quick. I told the team at halftime, said, 'I owe you guys one.' [I] came back and I got one in the second half, too."

Tyler Young quickly took care of the deficit, romping 64 yards — most of his 114 on 13 carries for the night for a 6-6 tie 52 seconds later. Huntington Beach went ahead on its next

possession, going 62 yards on nine plays, with Vandermade grabbing Daunte Bell's throw in the end zone for a 23-yard score on third-and-9.

Jad Othman's 36-yard field goal late in the third quarter made it 16-6, and then Tauanuu picked off Noa Banua at the Barons 40. Bell made two big plays connecting with Musashi Ray for 20 yards and running 10 yards to the 6 on third-and-9 — before Vandermade took a screen pass 11 yards for the final

score on the third play of the fourth quarter.

Banua amassed 78 of his 122 passing yards in the fourth quarter, connecting four times with Nolan Olivares — the last on a 6yard touchdown — on Fountain Valley's only successful drive. The next possession ended Banua, after Brandon Soleau's sack left a fourthand-17, scrambled to midfield and then slid half a yard short of the first down. It capsulized the Barons' night.

Undisciplined, you pay for it." said Gutierrez, who is looking to rebuild the program after multiple fifthsixth-place finishes since 2010. "... I think we're improved, but not good enough, obviously, if we can't win games like this in our Sunset League. the first half. "It's a huge win for us. It's a good team win," Huntington Beach coach Brett Brown said. "I thought we were physical, I thought we played hard defense and we executed when we needed to. Hopefully, we're healthy and we can keep the momentum going.'

season," Frimond said. "The goal here was to install two cameras, and the fire department has gotten six cameras in there this

Mayor Sue Kempf inquired as to how often the open space cameras would be monitored.

"They're not consistently monitored, but the use is if there's a reported fire, we can put eyes on it immediately, and then we can determine the spread and direction of the fire," Fire Chief Niko King said.

Frimond added that Ridge Reservoir and Signal Ridge both have two cameras, and the Moorehead

and Jahrus reservoirs have one camera each.

Laguna Beach installed outdoor emergency

warning system, with 21 speaker sets put up around town. The city has plans to add four more locations to the notification system by early 2023. Bluebird Canyon has been identified as the site for two of those.

The city also received design approval for five utility undergrounding projects, as well as a road-widening project for Bluebird Canyon

In November 2020, Laguna Beach debuted its helicopter refilling tank along the Arch Beach Heights fire road. City officials said they still hope to meet the target of a second helicopter refilling station to aid in fighting wildfires through the air by the end of this year, but the city is looking for a permanent structure, Frimond said.

A presentation was also given on the fuel modification program, which was started by the Laguna Beach Fire Department in 1991. There are 27 fuel modification zones, with 23 of those having been implemented with regular maintenance and vegetation

management. Some have been treated primarily by grazing goats brought in for that purpose. There are also zones subject to the Coastal Act, and in those zones, hand crews work around vegetation that is preserved as valued habitat.

"All of these projects really are just to give the responders some time," King said. "If we have a fire that's progressing up a hillside, once they get to these treated areas, it's going to buy some time and slow the fire because it doesn't have the contiguous fuel to continue to spread. The fuel modification zones, they don't put fires out, they don't prevent fires, but they assist ... the first responders, so that we can get the equipment in place or use helicopters for the extinguishment of the fire."

The city implemented three new zones (Park Avenue, South Laguna and Sunset) this year, Frimond said. They cover about 35 acres of wildland that will now receive the city's ongoing maintenance. The city was on schedule to complete its annual maintenance of all implemented fuel modification zones by Friday.

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
