Newport Harbor sweeps at Wave League finals

For all of its water polo excellence, swimming league titles have been something that have evaded the Newport Harbor High aquatics program.

Coming into Thursday's Wave League finals at Golden West College, the Sailors boys hadn't won league since 2017. It had been even longer for the girls, who hadn't come out on top since 2006.

But a blitz of fast performances made sure Newport Harbor reigned supreme in 2023.

Newport Harbor's boys and girls both eased to the Wave League title. The Sailors boys accumulated 795 points, ahead of Edison (471), Marina (214) and Laguna Beach (210).

The Sailors girls finished with 650 points, surpassing two-time defending league champion Laguna Beach (400), Edison (359) and Marina (223).

Spyglass security concern prompts study

Looking to deter crime, Newport homeowners group wants to install cameras near entrance to the neighborhood.

It may soon be possible for some local homeowner associations to install security cameras in Newport Beach's public right-of-way, depending on the outcome of a pilot program the City Council provided direction for during a study session Tuesday.

Existing council policy states that public right-of-way is reserved only for public uses, which cannot be diminished by private improvements, though there are exceptions that may be granted for fences, parkway resurfacing, raised planters and other items. But the policy does not provide guidance on security cameras that would serve private properties.

This week's study session came about after Mayor Pro Tem Will O'Neil was contacted by the Spyglass Hill Community Assn., which is seeking to install cam-

Volunteers invited to complete canyon trail work

Each week, Stewardship Days allows helpers to connect with nature while improving Laguna Canyon trail conditions.

Stewardship Days at Laguna Canyon gives volunteers a chance to contribute to critical maintenance and connect with one of the most biodiverse habitats on earth each weekend through May and June.

The program hosted by the Laguna Canyon Foundation and OC Parks launched in March and has already seen much needed work accomplished, the foundations executive director, Hallie Jones, said during an interview Thursday. An especially rainy winter in Southern California left paths in far worse shape than they had been in previous springs.

"It's exacerbated the need for maintenance, but it's also a great

Physician faces federal charges of healthcare fraud

An Orange County physician is facing federal charges for his alleged participation in a fraud scheme involving healthcare services that exploited the COVID-19 pandemic and allegedly resulted in false billings to federal programs and theft from federally funded pandemic pro-

grams, officials announced April 20.

Dr. Anthony Hao Dinh, 63, of Newport Coast, allegedly submitted fraudulent claims for treatment of patients who were insured, billed for services that were not rendered, and billed for services that were not medically necessary, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

He is scheduled to be arraigned in Santa Ana federal court on May 22. If convicted as charged, Dinh would face up to 50 years in federal prison, according to federal prosecutors.

"Dr. Dinh is alleged to have stolen from a taxpayer-funded program meant to provide COVID-related healthcare to uninsured patients," U.S. Atty.

Martin Estrada said in a statement.

"We will not tolerate stealing from the American people, and our prosecution of this large-scale scheme demonstrates our continued efforts to stop fraud of all sorts."

Dinh is also charged with two

Restaurant group ready for big summer of food at the beach

Alicia Cox and her Prik Restaurant Group have a 10-year deal in partnership with the California State Parks System.

The first few years of that deal have brought a little bit of everything for the Huntington Beach native, who is tasked with feeding people at both Bolsa Chica and Huntington state beaches.

"Every year, we have to pivot," Cox said. "If it's not COVID, it's Adrian's Kickback, it's a dead whale, it's the oil spill, it's atmospheric rivers in a row. It's crazy. I'm just like, 'Bring it to me, I've got this.' Nothing surprises me anymore."

After a particularly wet winter, the sun is out and Cox is smiling. Six of her beach concessions —

SeaLegs at the Beach, Seasalt by the Beach, Beach City Provisions, the Huntington Beach House, Sandbox Beach Essentials and Sahara's Sandbar & Pizza — are currently open for business.

Pacific Kitchen will open Memorial Day weekend, Cox said. The final property, California Fork and Spoon, will be located at Brookhurst Street and Pacific Coast Highway and is slated to open early in 2024.

"We want to represent the beach for our locals and our visitors, to take away an experience at the beach that's memorable," Cox said. "It has to come with good food, great drinks, good entertainment, this beautiful view and the [merchandise] they can take home. We want it to be a memorable experience when

they go back to their home, whether it be in Yorba Linda, Fountain Valley or maybe it's in Italy."

One emphasis this year will be building a brunch, getting people to the beach to eat even earlier in the day.

"I have brunch promotions going on everywhere," Cox said. "As I started doing Brunch with the Beatles at SeaLegs, that thing built. That's every Sunday at SeaLegs — brunch menu, bottomless mimosas and bubbles. This year, we also started SeaLegs Doggy Dog brunch. It's like, bring your dog to brunch, and we have a DJ who mixes in Snoop Dogg music."

At the Huntington Beach

"What a special day," said Newport Harbor coach Kevin Potter, who graduated from the school in 2001. "Looking up at that [record] board [on deck] and seeing that we only had three league championships for the girls in school history, and to add one, that's special. My grandma and grandpa went to school there and graduated in '33 and '34, so

it's been around a while."

Sophomore club swimmers Aidan Arie and Bobby Wright were both double individual winners Thursday for the Newport boys. Arie won the 200-yard freestyle in 1 minute, 40.91 seconds, and was also victorious in the 500 free (4:32.52).

He's about three seconds off the school record in the latter event but hopes to make a run at it next week at the CIF Southern Section finals at Riverside City College, when he'll be ta-

pered.

The Sailors swept the top three spots in the boys' 500 free, with Gavin McNeal and Mateo Abourjely grabbing second and third, respectively.

"I love the 500 because we have so many swimmers," Arie said. "It's awesome because we learn from each other, I get to help them out and stuff. It's nice to be surrounded in the final by your teammates."

Newport Harbor won all three relays and was aided

by water polo seniors like Finn Genc (first in the 100 free, second in the 200 free) and Finn LeSieur (first in the 50 free, second in the 100 free).

"We have some really strong water polo kids who are just really helping," Arie said. "It's not like they're pulling their own weight, they're pushing the team, and it's really great. I like that aspect of it."

Marina senior Winston Lee won the butterfly, while Edison's Holden Lee, Jacob Chalabian and Anthony Cecco swept the top three spots in the backstroke.

On the girls' side, Newport Harbor was similarly dominant. Sophomore Ariana Amoroso was a double winner in the 50 free (24.67) and backstroke (58.08).

Another Newport sophomore, Harper Price, won one of the most exciting races of the day, out-touching Marina sophomore Jady Chaffins to win the 100 free by four-hundredths of a second in 54.90.

Price was born in 2007, the year after Newport Harbor's last girls' swimming league title.

"We're pretty happy

about it," said Price, who finished second to Chaffins in the 200 free. "It took a lot of practice, consistency, conditioning, hard work."

Newport Harbor's girls did it with just two seniors on their roster — Chiara Amoroso and Samantha Arie.

Edison sophomore Gaby Kelly was a double-winner in her events for the second straight year. She won the girls' 200 IM (2:08.19) and 500 free (5:03.03), and each time was her personal best.

"I'm really stoked," Kelly said. "Back-to-back winner, which is cool. I definitely want to get faster [at CIF]. For my 500, I'd like to get under five minutes. It's tough, but I know I can do it."

Laguna Beach senior Jana Jovic won the breaststroke and swam anchor on the winning 200- and 400-free relays.

Marina junior Alexandra Marumoto touched first in the butterfly (a personal best 59.60) and was second in the breaststroke in 1:07.39. She also helped the Vikings girls to a 200 medley relay win, as they out-touched Newport Harbor.

During Tuesday's Wave League preliminaries,

Marumoto had touched in a school-record 1:06.25 in the breaststroke. This broke Anne Simmons' 1990 record of 1:06.82.

"I was a little upset [Thursday] because I added a second," she said. "During prelims, I was trying to beat the school record ... I'm excited because this will be my first year at CIF. I qualified for sure on the breast, and I think we made it on the relay. I'm excited to go with the team."

opportunity," Jones said of the storms that passed over Orange County. "Because you can't do effective trail work as easily when you don't have any moisture in the soil."

Each week, between 10 to 15 volunteers who preregister on the foundation's website will get a chance to shape trails shared by roughly 4 million people, Jones said. They can also commune with a unique Southern California habitat that is home to 15,000 species of plants and animals found nowhere else in the world, Jones said.

"Laguna Canyon is a global biodiversity hotspot. We have amazing endangered habitats, endangered plants, reptiles, birds. The land itself, the open space, was preserved for its habitat value. Our ability to recreate on that land is a secondary benefit."

Volunteer spots to help improve drainage on La-

guna Ridge trail on May 14 have already been filled. But help remains needed for a similar project along Old Emerald Trail on June 11.

Other Trail Stewardship programs still accepting volunteers include the installation of lodgepole fencing on the Meadows Trail in Aliso & Wood Canyons Wilderness Park on May 27, and drainage and brush clearing on Valido Trail in

the same park June 24.

"It's a great way not only to get some wonderful trail work done but also to connect people to the trails, to connect people to the land, help people start to understand the value of the habitat that we have here and how much work goes into a well-maintained trail system."

others for allegedly submitting over 70 fraudulent loan applications under the Paycheck Protection Program and Economic Injury Disaster Loan Program and

fraudulently obtaining over \$3 million in loan funds, prosecutors said.

The other defendants named in the scheme are Dinh's sister, Hang Trinh Dinh, 64, of Lake Forest, who is currently a fugitive being sought by federal authorities, and Matthew

Hoang Ho, 65, of Melbourne, Fla.

Anthony Dinh is charged in the complaint with healthcare fraud and two counts of wire fraud. Hang Dinh and Matthew Ho are each charged with one count of wire fraud, according to prosecutors.

The U.S. Attorney's Office said Anthony Dinh was the second-highest biller in the country to the Health Resources and Services Administration COVID-19 Uninsured Program. The program was designed to prevent the further spread of the pandemic by providing access to uninsured patients for testing and treatment, and to provide financial support to healthcare providers fighting the COVID-19 pandemic by reimbursing them for services provided to uninsured individuals.

As a result of the scheme targeting the Uninsured Program, Anthony Dinh and his companies were paid more than \$153 million, and he used fraud proceeds for high-risk options trading, losing over \$100 million from November 2020 through February 2022, according to court documents.

More than two hours after it started, and following several plot twists, senior middle blocker Lukas Johnson spiked down the decisive point in a 25-16, 23-25, 25-18, 25-27, 15-12 win for the Sailors on Wednesday night on their home floor.

"I think the emotions were high," Jake Read, a senior outside hitter headed to Loyola-Chicago, said. "It's always a fun one between us and Huntington. I think our rivalry has kind of grown over these past few years because we're both great, great volleyball schools. With our student section and their student section, it always gets rowdy."

Senior outside hitter Luca Curci, bound for UCLA, had 25 kills and 10 digs to lead Newport Harbor (31-2), the No. 2-ranked team in the section and top seed in Pool B. The pool play format keeps the higher seed at home throughout the playoffs, so the Sailors will host No. 7 Mater Dei on Tuesday and No. 3 Manhattan Beach Mira Costa on May 6 in their pursuit of another CIF finals appearance.

Read added 18 kills. Junior opposite Riggs Guy had nine kills and 2½ blocks, Johnson chipped in with nine kills and two blocks, and sophomore middle blocker Jack Berry supplied three kills and three total blocks.

Huntington Beach (22-8), the No. 6 seed,

played with unbridled passion, riding some highs and lows in its play. The Oilers succumbed to an 11-4 run by the Sailors to end the first set — one that saw junior opposite Aidan Dubno exit with a right ankle sprain. He would not return.

"We play at a super-high emotional level all the time," Huntington Beach coach Craig Pazanti said. "Maybe sometimes it our detriment because it takes a lot, all that extra expended energy throughout the match, but my guys don't know how to play any other way. I think they might take a little bit on from their coach's personality."

In Dubno's stead, senior opposite Jay Pearson (five kills, 2½ blocks) and middle blockers Nick Ganier (nine kills), a sophomore, and Drew Bjork (three kills, 2½ blocks), a senior, provided some much-needed production.

"He's come a long way in a short period of time,

and he's just a tremendous athlete," Pazanti said of Ganier. "He played a little travel ball with us ... when he was 14. ... People, I think, overlook him because he's only 6 feet tall, but he jumps almost 50 inches, so it definitely makes up for it."

The Sailors won the first and third sets going away, but the match took another turn in the fourth set. More than once, a fire alarm interrupted play. When play resumed, a scramble led to a ball being chased down near the Newport Harbor student section.

Pazanti said fans made contact with two of his players. An individual was removed from the stands.

"I would have pulled my team off the floor if they didn't kick that guy out because you can't touch players," Pazanti said.

Newport Harbor coach Andrew Mabry said he didn't see the incident occur, but he said he apologized to Pazanti for any

wrongdoing.

After failing to convert a match point in the fourth set, the Sailors put the distractions behind them to close the match out.

"Even though those different variables might come into play, we don't want to back down [and] play passive," said Newport Harbor senior setter Korbin Francisco, who had 55 assists. "We always want to keep going, keep swinging, keep going for blocks, all that. It's just a great part of our game to stay aggressive."

Senior outside hitter Liam Phinizy had 16 kills to pace Huntington Beach. Junior outside hitter Ben Bray had 11 kills and three blocks. Junior setter Jake Pazanti contributed 42 assists, 11 digs and two blocks.

Mabry remarked that the teams know each other well. It was a tough opening match for the defending champions against an

CdM tops Edison to begin CIF run

Corona del Mar came out ablaze to start the CIF Southern Section boys' volleyball playoffs Wednesday night, grabbing a quick advantage on Edison and pulling away in a lopsided first set behind its big, reversed hitters.

Easy night? At first, perhaps, but the Sea Kings' straight-sets triumph in a Division 1 pool play opener required a lot of grit and a little soul searching, leaving them with a bit of work to do and the belief that the toil could lead to good things.

Fourth-seeded Corona del Mar rode youth national-teamers George Bruening and Sterling Foley to a 25-13, 26-24, 25-17 victory in the Pool A clash, but the visiting Chargers, a surprising Division 1 qualifier widely considered overmatched in the battle of Sunset Conference rivals, set the narrative most of the way.

Edison (19-9), the last of eight teams invited to the top-tier title hunt, found some passion after its initial stumble and followed talismanic opposite Brandon Peacock's lead to put

up a real fight. The Chargers forged early leads in the last two sets, nearly pulling out the second and sticking around in the third until their hosts' quality prevailed.

"Edison did a fantastic job of adjusting and kind of flipping what they were doing," Corona del Mar head coach Katey Thompson said. "[Peacock] kind of tore us apart in that second set. That took a lot of battling on our side, of trying to figure it out, and having the boys directly apply it. ...

"We played ugly volleyball. We got the win out of it, but one of the hardest things to do is [win when you] play ugly volleyball. We're going to get back in the gym and try to clean things up."

Corona del Mar (19-8) has at least two more games — at home Tuesday against No. 5 Beckman (29-5) and at No. 1 Los Angeles Loyola (23-1) the following Saturday.

Edison plays at Loyola, then at Beckman — and the group winner heads to the May 13 final.

The Sea Kings started very strong, taking a 5-1

lead on junior setter Ryan Gant's service, steadily building upon it, then finishing with an 11-4 run from net dominance by Bruening, a 6-foot-9 senior opposite, Foley, a 6-5 junior outside hitter, and senior middle blockers Cade Alacano and Kaden Kavanaugh.

"We've been struggling starting with energy this whole season, and we've made that a big point in the past couple of weeks, just getting out with a lot more momentum," said Bruening, who is headed to UC Santa Barbara. "That really came into effect tonight, and part of it was being really ready to go and Edison might not have been as much. But they definitely showed it in the second set, that they were just as ready."

Edison responded behind Peacock — an "emotional" leader, per head coach Elias Perez — who popped up nearly everywhere, ripping holes through CdM's defense, often from the back row, en route to 12 kills, 11 in the last two sets. The Chargers led for early swaths of both,

"They have 400 or 500 people. That might be a little tight in here for a private event, but we can sell putting games out on the sand, putting a bar out there. We can really cater to any group's needs."

eras near entrances to the neighborhood.

Residents from Spyglass Hill appeared at Tuesday's study session to speak on the matter, with Spyglass Hill Community Assn. President Bruce Horn saying the community wants security cameras to deter crime. The association is seeking permission to install eight cameras.

Public Works Director Dave Webb said the Spyglass Hill request to use public right-of-way for security cameras is currently the only one under consideration. The city has received similar requests over the years, though those largely ended with cameras being placed on private property. With the exception of one camera that is operated under a license agreement, Spyglass Hill would be the first homeowner's association allowed to install them in the right-of-way, Webb said.

Webb said there are 61 non-gated residential communities with more than 50 residents and 21 non-gated communities with fewer than 50 residents.

City staff sought council direction on a number of

considerations involved with the potential program, including who would give the approvals, permitting fees, license agreements, community aesthetics and privacy.

Police Chief Joe Cartwright said a number of cities have tried similar programs and the implementation of security cameras has been useful. He said it would be helpful to have cameras at intersections to track those coming in and out.

"We talked about trying to work through maybe a test case. It doesn't have to obviously be just Spyglass Hill; it's just that when they came forward to talk about this, it made sense to at least talk to them in particular about trying to be a test case," O'Neill said. "But in order to get those cameras in properly, they would have to be in the public right-of-way. The question is what do they look like?"

"Does the program work? And given that we really haven't done this much around town, we are going to be talking about whether the city should be doing this as well [after an ad hoc advisory committee on residential crime and burglary returns with recommendations], it made a lot of sense for us to come and

talk about this."

O'Neill said he would prefer to modify council policy to allow for city staff to give approvals and wanted to limit the trial phase to maybe five or 10 homeowners associations, with some geographical diversity. He said that, as part of license agreements, he wanted to explicitly prohibit facial recognition. Nominal fees may be associated with the pilot program, though what the actual fees may look like will be determined later.

Mayor Noah Blom suggested an initial term of a year.

Council members were generally supportive of the idea, though they raised concerns about accessibility to video for police, privacy and whether or not any recorded data would be considered part of the city's obligation to respond to public records requests. City Atty. Aaron Harp said the city would not be held responsible for providing data as it would not be maintained or controlled by the city itself.

City spokesman John Pope said the city is looking to implement the pilot program by early summer.
