Owners reflect on 30 years as they shutter décor shop

Kevin Mundt and Dave Thomas plan to move out of the downtown Laguna Beach storefront at the end of February.

After three decades of being a leader in style in Laguna Beach, AREO, a home décor and gift shop in the downtown area, is set to move out of its brick-and-mortar location at the end of February.

Owners Kevin Mundt and Dave Thomas have made the decision to focus on their primary venture, a wholesale business called HomArt.

The duo have worked to design products and then have them produced. Thomas said they now have nearly 4,000 products that they wholesale to other retailers and have show-

Parishioners rally to fund church upgrades

The grounds of St. Joachim Catholic Church in Costa Mesa are modest but well-maintained and fully equipped to meet the spiritual needs of parishioners. The bathrooms, however? Not so much

Church leaders for years had been grappling over how to accommodate a robust church membership with just two unisex, single-stall restrooms built at the Orange Avenue campus in 1965.

in 1965.

"In 1965, the world was very different than it is today," Fr. Mike Hanifin said, explaining how the Catholic faith urged churchgoers to fast each Sunday until receiving communion at Mass. "You had to go to church first, and then afterward

GOP Supes hold tight to reins

Don Wagner, Andrew Do selected to serve as chair and vice chair, bypassing the usual rotation list with no discussion.

With the swearing-in Tuesday of former Santa Ana Mayor Vicente Sarmiento to the Orange County Board of Supervisors, the governing body officially shifted to a Democrat majority for the first time in nearly half a century.

Yet during an annual reorganization during the board's regular meeting, minority Republicans maintained their grasp on leadership of the panel, as supervisors Don Wagner and Andrew Do were narrowly appointed chair and vice chair, respectively.

The motion to nominate the two GOP supervisors together as a slate was made by outgoing Chair Doug Chaffee, a Democrat reelected to a second term in November, and subsequently approved by a 3-2 vote among Chaffee, Wagner and Do.

That act bypassed a seniority-based rotation — intended to offer supervisors from all five districts equal opportunity to serve in leadership roles — that would have seen Supervisor Katrina Foley appointed as vice chair.

"I'm slightly disappointed, but

Newport Beach OKs contract for Gateway Park project

Completed in 1999, the park is intended to announce the entrance between the Balboa Peninsula and Lido Isle.

The gateway between the Balboa Peninsula and Lido Isle is poised to get a face-lift, following this week's approval of a \$540,233 contract by the Newport Beach City Council.

Gateway Park was completed in 1999 after Lido Isle residents Helen Japenga, Gail Rosenstein and Jim Thomson raised \$217,000 to buy a former gas station and, in an effort to create an inviting entrance between the Balboa Peninsula and Lido Isle, converted it into what it is today.

City staff said the park, which is comprised of two stretches of landscaping on either side of Newport Boulevard and Via Lido, has damaged planter walls

Two local elementary schools picked up a significant honor last week as they were named California Distinguished Schools for 2023 by the state Department of Education.

S.A. Moffett Elementary in the Huntington Beach City School District, as well as Urbain H. Plavan Elementary in the Fountain Valley School District, each earned the honor.

They were among 38 elementary schools in Orange County, and 356 statewide, to make the

the 2023 California Distinguished School award," Huntington Beach City School District Supt.

Leisa Winston said in a statement. "This recognition is a testament to the dedication of Moffett's commitment to academic achievement and a positive school experience that prepares our students for middle school and beyond.'

The California Department of Education used multiple measures to identify eligible schools based on their performance on the California School Dashboard. Specifically, schools were selected for the recognition by analyzing data reported through the 2022 Dashboard, including assessment results, chronic absenteeism, suspension rates and socioeconomic data.

Based on the 2022 dashboard, Moffett ranked very high in mathematics and high in English/language arts. It also had a very low suspension rate.

Plavan, meanwhile, ranked very high in the English learner progress, mathematics and English/language arts benchmarks.

"We are so proud of our Plavan

students, staff and families for receiving the California Distinguished School honor," Fountain Valley School District Supt. Katherine Stopp said in a statement. "The students work hard every day to achieve success. Plavan staff regularly engage in professional learning and reflection, which is encouraged and supported by Principal Patrick Ham. The positive partnership and the shared values between Plavan families and the school help create an environment that helps students grow and achieve their potential.

The California Distinguished Schools Program recognizes elementary and middle and high schools in alternate years. Schools recognized hold the Distinguished Schools title for two years.

you could eat or drink. So, bathrooms weren't that important.

But nearly 60 years later, as habits and needs shifted, the restrooms began to underperform.

"They were not attractive or useful and were constantly breaking down," Hanifin said Tues-

Intent on serving the needs of the community, officials set out to build new ADA-compliant bathrooms with enough stalls to meet the needs of a church with a seating capacity of 750 people. Leaders worked with the city of Costa Mesa and an architect to ensure the new complied construction with all the modern requirements.

When construction estimates for the proposed facilities in early 2020 put the project's price tag at \$600,000, members rallied. Officials kick-started a capital campaign called "75 for 75," encouraging parishioners to donate at least \$75 in honor of St. Joachim's 75th anniversary in 2022.

Many chipped in larger amounts, and plans for the renovation were on track until the COVID-19 pandemic forced a pause on the project.

When St. Joachim leaders returned to the Diocese of Orange in February 2022 to rebid the work,

they were stunned to learn the cost had skyrocketed — the new bathrooms were going to cost \$1.2 million.

Undaunted, they got to work. The collection plate began circulating among the pews twice each week during Mass, and members of the largely Latino parish began selling tacos and pozole outside on Sundays, contributing all proceeds to the church.

Despite their best efforts, church officials were still about \$200,000 shy of what was needed and so reached out to neighboring parishes of Our Lady Queen of Angels and Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Newport Beach and St. John Vianney Chapel on Balboa Island, who helped bridge the gap.

On Sunday morning, in between services, a group of leaders and parishioners celebrated the enormous accomplishment in a groundbreaking ceremony. Hanifin said once the ground dries up from the recent rains, the real work can begin.

tremendously "We're grateful, and we've expressed our gratitude for our members and their creativity in coming up with ways to raise money," he added. "All those families who have come to our church and tried to use those bathrooms know this has been a long overdue project."

rooms in Atlanta, Dallas and Las Vegas.

and greeting cards. Another thing the owners enjoyed providing was their complimentary signature gift wrap service, completed with the use of craft boxes, satin ribbon, and a

French gold wax seal. Mundt and Thomas, who moved from Chicago to Laguna Beach, recently held a 30th birthday celebration for their AREO family. A few dozen current and former employees showed up to the store in August to commemorate the milestone.


Golden goal lifts H.B. over Edison in Surf League opener

Most people started to leave the Surf League girls' soccer opener at the end of regulation Tuesday night.

Huntington Beach High athletic director Melissa Vandenbosch hurried over to the stands to let the fans know the situation.

"It's not over," she yelled. "We're going to overtime!"

The confusion was only momentary. Oilers freshman Sienna McAthy did not make the fans wait too

McAthy scored the golden goal in the second minute of overtime, lifting Huntington Beach to a 1-0 win over rival Edison in the league opener at the Oilers'

Huntington Beach (15-2-1), ranked No. 7 in CIF Southern Section Division 1, appears to have one of its strongest teams in recent years. The Oilers are aiming for their first league title since the 2015-16 season.

"Our preseason has helped us to really define what type of team we are,' Huntington Beach coach Raul Ruiz said. "It's allowed us to play tactically different, two or three formations. But I think because the girls apply themselves, there's more that believe that this could be their year to win league again. It brings positive energy to the whole group, and I think we're doing really

McAthy's goal came after a cross from the right from fellow freshman Solana Van Enoo. Edison junior goalkeeper Chloe Pajaro was there at the right post to deflect the ball, but it went to the foot of McAthy, who stuck it in.

McAthy, a midfielder, spent much of the match connecting with the Oilers' **USC-committed** striker Jaiden Anderson. But like Anderson, she also has shown a knack for finding the back of the net. Tuesday's goal was her 11th of the season.

"It's been surreal," McAthy said of playing a key role as a freshman. "It's been so fun. I love the girls. Everyone's so nice. It's just been the best high school experience I could possibly ask for."

Huntington Beach beat Edison (5-6-4) for the second time this season. The Oilers also won 3-0 in the finals of the Best in the West Winter Soccer Classic.

Last year, the teams split two meetings in the last week of the regular season, but Edison won a tiebreaker match to earn the second place in league designation and an automatic trip to the playoffs.

Every team's special in our league, but there's nothing like that rivalry between Edison and H.B.,"

it's not going to stop me from doing the work voters elected me to do," Foley said Wednesday. "I also think we missed an opportunity as a county board to show the community we can serve in a bipartisan capacity."

Although it is ultimately up to supervisors to determine who will serve as chair and vice chair for the following year, most bodies adhere to a rotation schedule. Speaking in comments before the vote, Sarmiento attempted to nominate Foley as vice chair based on that reasoning.

"For most public agency bodies, when it comes to rotating leadership, it is based upon courtesy, it is based upon making sure everybody has an opportunity to represent the board as chair and vice chair," he said. "It's the logic I've used as a mayor and council member and in most of the other agencies I've served."

Until Tuesday's vote, that logic governed the leader-

ship appointments of supervisors as well. Wagner served as vice chair last year, and Chaffee was vice chair in 2021 before being

appointed chair in 2022. Do, who served as the board's chairman in 2021, was also vice chair in the year prior.

But Chaffee, after explaining he would open the floor to all nominations before taking a vote, left no room for Sarmiento's alternative, instead nominating

Wagner and Do together and calling for a vote.

The supervisor explained his decision in a statement following Tuesday's vote, declining to offer further

comment. "I voted for Supervisor

Andrew Do to be our vice chairman because he began the large county projects that are currently underway," Chafee's state-ment read. "In his last years in office, I hope he can continue to lead us in our efforts. I also look forward to working with all my supervisor colleagues on these joint initiatives going

forward." Ada Briceño, chair of the Democratic Party of Orange County, said Republi-

cans trying to hold onto the

reins of a majority Democrat body does not reflect the will of the voters.

"I think it was an attempt to remain the same, but that's not what Orange County voters wanted," she said Wednesday. "This is the first time we have a Democratic majority on the board since 1976 — we're going to work hard to make sure Democrats represent our values on that board."

and is in need of repairs to its existing electrical system. Its landscaping is also in need of refreshing and new signage is needed.

The City Council on Tuesday approved the contract to the second-lowest bidder, Armstrong Cal Builders, Inc. as the lowest bidder did not have the license necessary to complete the work.

The contract is roughly 8% higher than the \$497,700 that had first been projected by city engineers, according to staff.

This does not include the construction contingency, which is \$54,000. That brings the total cost of the work, which is expected to get underway in coming weeks, to nearly

\$596,000.

The scope of the project includes the removal and replacement of old or overgrown plants; installing new palm trees; adding new lighting and replacement signage and painting the walls. All existing donated trees and

palms will be maintained.
Additionally, a walkway that was previously closed on the north side of the park will be reopened between Lido Marina Village and Newport Boulevard.

Ruiz said. "That's what makes it unique."

Edison coach Kerry Crooks has a younger team this year, with just three seniors. But the Chargers did well in Tuesday's match, which was fairly even in the run of play.

Edison's best scoring chance came early in the second half, when a cross of junior Harlee Thomas found sophomore Olivia Green in the box. The shot sailed over the cage.

"She's a sophomore, she's just not used to playing at this speed of play," Crooks said. "It's a little bit faster, but she's getting there ... We had our chances. We're really young, I have quite a few sophomores who start. Huntington's one of the top teams in CIF, so for them to compete, that's a bright future right there. I think we had just as many great chances on goal as they did"

Defensively, the Chargers often marked Anderson with Crooks' daughter, sophomore Riley Crooks, who is on the same Slammers FC club soccer team as Anderson. Edison junior center back Hailey Clingan, who recently committed to UC Irvine, also stood out with her play, and Pajaro made six saves.

Huntington Beach senior

goalkeeper Reese Doyle made three saves. A defense that also included senior center back Charlotte Landis, seniors Isabelle Walsh and Hannah Petteys and junior Julianna Upstill helped the Oilers pitch their eighth shutout of the season.

"It's good to be a part of this team, carry that pride," Doyle said. "We haven't had this opportunity, had this ranking in a while, so it's good to be a part of that."

Edison plays at Newport Harbor on Thursday, while Huntington Beach travels to defending league champion Los Alamitos.
