A rivalry only begins to feel like one if both schools take turns at winning.

That is not to say that Costa Mesa High School or its crosstown rival Estancia feel much like sharing, especially when it comes to the All-Sports Cup and the prize that comes

Outreach event for homeless slated

Police and task force members will meet the public at various H.B. locations Sunday.

In the six months since Huntington Beach opened the doors of a newly built navigation center — which provides temporary housing and services for individuals experiencing homelessness — hundreds of people have taken shelter from the streets.

While the center can serve up to 174 people, its current population is around 85, city officials report. But for every person residing on site, there are many more who continue to live in unsafe scenarios or have not yet been helped by existing services and programs.

"Every individual is different — there's not one cause of homelessness," said Huntington Beach Police Sgt. Roman Altenbach, supervisor of a citywide task force formed in 2016 to provide a responsive and proactive approach to addressing homelessness.

"It really runs the gamut," he continued, listing addiction and mental health issues as only two of many contributing factors. "Some people are down on their luck. Other individuals want zero help. Getting to know these people is really what helps down the line."

Population counts conducted in 2019 identified 290 unhoused individuals in Huntington Beach. Since the pandemic, complaints about the impact of transient populations on parks and other areas have been on the rise, but that doesn't necessarily mean the homeless population itself has grown, said Lt. Dave Dereszynski, who manages the Homeless Task Force.


"With everybody out of school and at home or not working, we definitely saw an increase in complaints and calls for service," he said.

end a global crisis

Arjun Vij was a freshman at Corona del Mar High when he took a school trip that enlightened him about the global water crisis — and now he's written a book to inspire other young people to action.

Vij accompanied students enrolled in the school's Academy of Global Studies, a program designed to expose participants to geopolitical and cultural issues across nations, as they traveled in February 2019 to the African nation of Eswatini, formerly Swaziland.

The Newport Beach teen visited a village in the district of Hhohho (pronounced HO-how) and was struck when he learned of the hardship many villagers had endured in their daily procurement of drinking water. Women and children often walked several miles, carrying heavy metal cans on their backs or shoulders that, when filled, weighed up to 44 pounds.

And the water they found, often in stagnant ponds, puddles and brown-hued streams, was just as likely to threaten their lives as sustain it.

"They told me how bad the standard of living was with dirty water and how rates of cholera and typhoid fever were sky high," Vij, now 18, recalled

Newport-Mesa graduates ride to the future

With clear skies and a sunny day, there was just no raining on the car parade of Newport-Mesa's graduating seniors.

Car horns honked and pop songs blared over the speakers of cars lined up bumper to bumper. Teenagers screamed and sang along, laughing every so often when one of them got a lyric wrong.

Some stood, their heads peeking out of sunroofs and their arms outstretched toward the sky, while others sat up on the backs of convertibles — an

activity that received light admonishments from police officers monitoring the scene. Windows were painted with the names of high schools and the graduating seniors riding aboard. Banners fluttered, balloons waved.

Compared to this time last year on the same street, the corner of Irvine Avenue and 15th Street teemed with life as ceremonies take place for graduating seniors of the Newport-Mesa Unified School District. Many of the events will take place throughout

Thursday, with the exception of Early College High School, whose seniors graduated on June 3, and Cloud Campus, which held its graduation on Wednesday.

Åbout 1,600 students will be graduating this year, district officials said.

Matt Eimers, who organized the parade and is a parent of a graduating senior at Newport Harbor High School, said planning for this year's event began in March before the district officially announced plans in April to hold graduations in person.

Eimers was involved with planning last year's unofficial graduation car parade, which was organized by parents districtwide in an effort to celebrate graduating seniors. The Newport-Mesa Unified School District last year made the move to pivot all commencement ceremonies to be virtual as the pandemic continued.

"With planning, you just need months to do these things, so I started in March to now and, at that point, you can't tell the kids that 'You can't have a parade now,'" Eimers said. "It was two people, then four people and stuff like that. We had to move forward with the parade."

"This class got screwed more than last year's class because these kids didn't have a prom. They didn't have a prom last year. They've been out of school [physically] for almost a year and a half, where last year they were only out of school for half a year," said Eimers.

"These kids had it harder than any other class, so that's why we need to honor them for this. Next year, it's back to normal," he said, adding that he'd love to make the parade an annual tradition if the cities of Newport Beach and Costa Mesa allowed it and if the schools could be more involved.

Newport Harbor senior Kendall Kelly, 18, said Wednesday she was excited for graduation and had been looking forward to it for the past four years.

"I'm really grateful we get to have an in-person graduation. It's going to be super special with all of our classmates," said Kelly, adding that she was similarly excited for the parade. "I think it's really rewarding for all our hard work and I think it's a super special

tradition for all the graduating classes to have, so I'm super glad we can do it."

Her friend, Lindsey Blanchfield, who is also graduating from Newport Harbor High School, said she felt having an in-person graduation ceremony was like having a hint of normalcy return to daily life. The two rode together in their friend's Jeep and would lead the parade just behind police and firefighters.

"Even the rehearsal yesterday, it was really cool to be with everyone in the whole [graduating] class,' said Blanchfield. haven't been with our whole grade in such a long time. It was really fun. I'm really looking forward to [Thursday]."

Santo Ğezelin, 17, said he was feeling a mix of emotions Wednesday.

"I'm excited to continue with my life and kind of see where the next chapter takes me, but I'm also really sad to see where I grew up and saying goodbye to all of that," said Gezelin, who will be attending the University of Utah this fall to study mechanical engineering. "It's bittersweet. I'm definitely going to be sad to say goodbye to everyone here, and I've be-come so close with so many people.

"It's hard to say goodbye," he added, laughing. Cooper Steck, a graduat-

ing senior from Costa Mesa High School who was toting around a boombox and a shirt of his soon-to-be

alma mater, said he was excited to be graduating.

"It's unfortunate that the beginning of our year started off like it did, but I'm also glad 'cause we get to finish it off like normal as the pandemic is slowing down," Steck said. "It's a bummer that it started out slow, but it's good that it's ending like this. It was fun."

Seniors Jaden Manuhutu 17, and 19-year-old Miles Dwight were riding together in Manuhutu's car. Dwight said he felt the school year had been a journey, but he's looking forward to the summer. Manuhutu said the ceremony was a great way to close the school year.

"We can just worry about having fun and being with each other and spending time together before we leave," said Manuhutu. "I think it's a great way to end the year and end our high school careers.

"Everyone's experience during COVID in 2020 is all different. Some people had really great times. Some people, it was a really bad year for them, but I'd say overall, the experiences we're having especially now in our senior year, everything is just going back to normal and everyone's just focusing on the positives," he continued.

"I think that's a big difference between this year and last year's [graduation]. Everyone's focused on positives," he said.

first eight years.

'The first five years, I don't even think [Costa] Mesa even really kind of understood it because they didn't win it," said John Ursini, Newport Rib Co.'s owner and a 1982 graduate of Estancia.

That changed in the 2018-19 school year, when the trophy crossed town for the first time.

'Now it's on," Ursini said with respect to the rivalry. "This year, it was 80-80 going into the third baseball game, ... and so that was a key win for Costa Mesa to win that because then they went up 85-80."

The rivalry between Costa Mesa and Estancia is known as the Battle for the Bell, and those lining up to fill their plates were encouraged to ring the bell as they went through to grab their food.

Ursini said about 80 pounds of pulled pork, 300 sausages and 40 pounds of coleslaw were brought to the football stadium at Costa Mesa High School on Monday. He added that there were about 60 pounds each of garlic mashed potatoes, barbecued beans and macaroni and cheese brought to the banquet. For dessert, there were chocolate chip cookies.

"Every time we play Estancia, we mark our calendars," said Kyle Anderson, a

confirmed that the number of efforts aimed at preventing residents from becoming homeless also increased during the pandemic.

To provide a bridge of information and resources between the homeless population and the general public, the Huntington Beach Police Department on Sunday will host a daylong "Park Walk-Along" in five different geographic regions of the city and encourages residents to participate.

of meeting villagers. "They actually showed me where they used to collect that dirty water — a little hole in the ground about 6 feet wide. There were plants and weeds all around. It was all brown and murky."

During the trip, students learned how the installation of a clean drinking water well in the village had become a life-changing addition. They learned a mere \$25 could provide access to clean drinking water for one person's lifetime. That a family of four could be sustained for \$100.

"I never would have known there was a global water crisis if I had not tak-

en that trip," the teen said. Upon his return, Vij was compelled to do something to help the 844 million people worldwide who continue to live without a reliable supply of clean water, according to an estimate by global nonprofit Water.org. He shared what he'd seen with his family and friends, raising \$500 for Thirst Project, the nonprofit that had installed the well he'd seen.

But he wanted to do

So, when the coronavirus pandemic closed school campuses last year, leaving students stuck doing studies at home, Vij began to write a book that would convey what he'd seen and learned on his travels. He partnered for months, securing an illustrator and designer to help him complete the project.

The result of months-long effort is "In Bad Water," a self-published, illustrated book for preteens released May 17 and now available on Amazon.

The 58-page book tells the story of a fictional boy named Sanyu, who lives in Uganda with younger sister Masani. One day, the children are tasked by their parents to fetch water instead of reporting to

school. After much effort, the children find the sought-after resource, but with deadly consequences.

Vij said the book aims to convey to young people, many of whom take for granted clean water coming on demand and on tap, the very real perils being faced by children and adults in other nations. In addition to telling Sanyu's story, "In Bad Water" provides tips and resources to empower adolescents to

"I believe preteens are the most powerful societal agents for change," he said. "If they can be educated about this at an early age, they can take action later in

Since the book was released, Vij has been busy trying to promote it through social media, so he can spread its message. He recently appeared at a May 26 virtual flag salute assembly at his K-8 alma mater, Fairmont School, Anaheim Hills, at the invitation of Principal Dr. Iamie Bone.

Afterward, students were encouraged to place a Cougars mascot sticker on their refillable water bottles and be reminded of the global water crisis and the precious resource readily available to them at the turn of a wrist.

"I helped the kids understand we're so lucky if we can turn a faucet in our kitchens and our bathrooms and get water," Bone said. "We're really lucky and it's our job to help other people who are not so lucky. It was a nice moment."

The virtual visit was a watershed moment for Vij - who'd come full circle, from shock to understanding to action — and something he hopes to recreate in the minds and hearts of young people everywhere.

"Collective action is the only way we can affect this crisis," he said.

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
