H.B. to increase campaign contribution limits

The City Council votes to raise the limit from \$620 to \$4,900 per person or business, matching the state limit. The item was one of several to pass by a 4-3 vote Tuesday, pushed by the body's new conservative majority.

One of the first 4-3 votes of Tuesday night's Huntington Beach City Council meeting was to increase the salary of City Atty. Michael Gates.

But it was not the only 4-3 vote that the newly divided council made. Not by a long shot.

The panel also voted to increase the campaign contribution limits, amend the city's code enforcement process to bar anonymous complaints and authorize Gates to challenge the city's Regional Housing Needs Assessment numbers.

They also approved Mayor Tony Strickland's Council Liaison list, requested a CEQA review for the Great Pacific Air Show and voted to waive the attorney-client and closed session confidentiality privileges for meetings on an age-discrimination lawsuit that was against the city and Gates.

All came by the same 4-3 vote, with the newly elected conservative majority pushing the items through.

The increase in the campaign contributions limit would be from \$620 to \$4,900 per person or busi-

ness, which matches the state limits of the state Legislature for Senate and Assembly candidates.

Strickland, who served in both of those state bodies, introduced the item. He said when he considered running for City Council, people told him no one typically won the first time because of small donor limits.

"You're not going to get rid of money out of politics, but what you are going to do is empower candidates, where the money goes directly to them," he said.

Shots fired in mall's parking structure

Gunfire rang out at South Coast Plaza Thursday evening, but there were no immediate reports of anyone being wounded.

It happened in the mall's northeast parking structure, Costa Mesa Police Sgt. Mike Manson said. An officer who was on the opposite side of the property heard the shots at about 8:30 p.m. and was the first to reach the scene. The officer found an abandoned vehicle, but anyone who might have witnessed the shooting had apparently left.

"By the time they got there, those suspects were in the wind and all that was left there were the car and bullet casings," Manson said.

Detectives obtained grainy surveillance footage showing at least one person opening fire Thursday evening. That person and one other were in the car, got into a collision in the parking structure and then fled the scene on foot, Manson said.

A detailed description of either of those people was not immediately available. Detectives were attempting to determine the motive for the shooting as of Friday.

"As people spend more time indoors and with loved ones, these viruses will spread. We know it's frustrating to continuously hear about the preventive measures, but they work when followed and can help to protect each other from serious illness, Chinsio-Kwong said.

"The citizens know who that money goes to, then they can make their educated choice ... This brings about more accountability in our candidates and campaigns. Most cities do go along with the limits of the state of California, and that will allow us to have a more

informed citizenry when it comes to elections here in Huntington Beach."

"The strongest hit pieces are the ones done by outside groups, not by the candidates, because the candidates have to put their name behind that. If you want to see less negative campaigning, you pass this measure.'

Strickland noted that Westminster, the city im-

mediately to Huntington Beach's north, has no campaign contributions limits. Mayor Pro Tem Gracey Van Der Mark, who unsuccessfully ran for the Ocean View School District Board of Trustees in 2018, added that OVSD also does not have contributions limits.

'This is not wildly outrageous," she said. "We're trying to just give the control back to the candidate, instead of having to rely on independent expenditures to be in a successful race."

Councilman Kalmick said he was not against raising the limits but still voted against the

"I'd like to get some context on a per capita basis," he said. "A state Senate race is a million people. We're one-fifth the size of a Senate district, so \$1,100 or \$1,200 seems like a good trial to go. I just question why we need to do this today. No one's going to start raising money for a year and a half, usually, before we start running for elections [in 2024].'

Councilwoman Natalie Moser also voted against the item. She said that when she ran for council in 2020, she had 244 itemized contributions averaging just

\$161 each.

"Personally, I want people who are your regular residents to feel like they have power and can make a difference," she said. "I believe that we should not be adding and increasing our campaign finance contributions at this time because I think it does the opposite of that."



a prize beneath it. But in a dining room full of smiling faces, it was the youth who appeared pensive, occasionally scanning their surroundings as if they were afraid some sort of trouble was just around the corner, who stood out to Anthony Nobles as he looked around the restaurant Wednesday. He, possibly like them, can remember what it's like to go without presents while his classmates checked items off their Christmas lists, and he used to be terrified whenever the police came

to his childhood home. The family of one student from the Ocean View School District who took part in the event Wednesday had been unable to find any housing they could afford and were living out of a motel at the time, OVSD Board Presi-

dent Patricia Singer said. "Yeah," Anthony Nobles said, holding back a tear. "When I was young this time of year was very sad, not very happy, many times. And I see that in their eyes, for some of them. That little girl sitting over there in the booth who's not really communicating, she's scared. Last year we had a kid who was so afraid to buy a gift for themselves because they thought they would get into trouble."

His experiences growing up and later on as a father of eight children are part of what inspired him and his wife, retired microbiologist Rhonda Nobles, to start Shop With a Cop events with officers in Fountain Valley. They brought the idea to the Huntington Beach police about seven years ago

when they moved to a home in Sunset Beach. The couple also heads the Nobles Foundation, a major sponsor of the event.

The students chosen to participate were recognized by teachers and principals for exemplary work and behavior throughout the school year. They were awarded a \$275 shopping spree at Target on Adams Avenue.

'This is a good opportunity for them to feel the holiday spirit, forget about those struggles they're going through and give back to their families,"

Singer said. Some, like 9-year-old Bethany Alcantara of Star View Elementary, grinned from ear to ear as she scooped potential gifts into carts. Bethany would later throw her hands up in a playful display of frustration while debating what items to keep or return to the shelves with

Officer Trevor Jackson.

Agnes L. Smith Elementary student Jaxon Seidl, 9, came prepared with a list to prevent him from leaving out any of his loved ones. His haul included board games to play with his family, costume jewelry for his mother and sister, as well as a gaming headset for himself. Other children grabbed linens, dishware, pressure cookers and other appliances for their parents.

"They're not so worried about themselves," Singer said. "They're worried about giving to others. It's inspirational to see these kids be leaders in their own little worlds, y'know, and being thoughtful toward others.

The event also gives police a chance to change young people's perception of law enforcement, especially those who might have faced the kind of challenges Anthony Nobles overcame while he

was growing up. He said some of the students at the event might have only ever encountered officers in situations that led to trauma until sharing a meal with them on Wednesday.

"When you're in bad situations sometimes they're going to knock on your door to pick up your parents," he said. "There can be things that they experience, and that just embeds in their mind."

"I can tell you from experience that when someone does something nice for you, when you really have nothing, doing something like this will stay in your mind and heart forever," he added.

Some who have taken part in Shop With a Cop in the past have gone on to become officers and volunteers for the police department, Anthony Nobles said. He and Huntington Beach Police Chief Eric Parra would like to see the annual event grow to invite even more kids and teens.

"These students were on the good list, but it doesn't mean the others were on the bad list," Parra said Wednesday. "It just means some got lucky this time. Hopefully next year we get to spread the joy even further."

Additional sponsors for the event include the Huntington Beach Police & Community Foundation, the Huntington Beach Police Officers' Assn. and Nuvision Credit Union.
