# Robyn Grant to run for council seat in Newport

First-time politician announces her bid in District 4, which includes Eastbluff and Big Canyon.



Robyn Grant, a longtime Newport Beach resident and first-time politician, recently announced her bid for a seat in the upcoming 2022 Newport Beach City Council election at a small gathering of her friends and supporters last week.

Grant is running in District 4, which encompasses the Eastbluff and Big Canyon neighborhoods. The district's incumbent is current Mayor Pro Tem Kevin Muldoon, who will be terming out of his seat next year. Muldoon was first elected in 2014 and reelected in 2018.

Seats are also up for the vote next fall in Districts 1, 3 and 6, with at least two of those seats having incumbents Diane

Service men and women were honored in a Veterans Day ceremony attended by a couple of hundred people on Thursday in Heisler Park.

We stand on free soil, we look out on an ocean that is safe for travel, and we stand under crystal blue skies without fear of inva-



"But none of this happens by accident. It exists because of the courage, dedication, sacrifice and bravery of the millions of American women and men who have served their country."



# Operation Open Water's Veterans Day paddle again a success

Thirty-three U.S. military veterans and first responders gathered in a circle in the Catalina Channel on Thursday morning.

Each person held a rock. At 11:11 a.m., on the 11th day of the 11th month of the year, the paddlers dropped them into the

The symbolic gesture, made on Veterans Day, was meant to symbolize mental wellness and letting things go. It meant a lot to Irvine resident Jordan Sisco, a U.S. Army infantry veteran who lost both of his legs in an explosion in Af-

ghanistan in 2012. "I feel like I'm always hitting that wall, trying to fight it," said Sisco, 31. "Just letting go of that rock, letting go of all that weight and then coming onto the shore, it was more than just a physical [thing]. It was way more emo-

The third annual Operation Open Water Veterans Day paddle concluded a few hours later, as the group of paddlers hit land just south of the Huntington Beach Pier. The paddle unites veterans and first responders with the community in the endurance challenge, to promote camaraderie and connection.

Sisco trained for the paddle and completed it with his father, John, a lifelong surfer who also made the crossing last year. Operation Open Water was co-founded by

## Respiratory care therapist charged with assaulting girl for 10 years

A respiratory care therapist pleaded not guilty Wednesday to repeatedly sexually assaulting a girl in Costa Mesa for a decade.

Sergio Arroyo Miralrio is charged with three counts of lewd or lascivious acts with a minor younger than 14, four counts of sexual intercourse or sodomy with a child 10 years or younger, a count of oral copulation or sexual penetration with a child 10 years or younger, three counts of aggravated sexual assault of a child younger than 14 or seven years younger than defendant, three counts of aggravated sexual assault of a child: sodomy, two counts of rape, two counts of sodomy by force of a victim 14 or younger, two counts of lewd acts on a child 14 or 15, and two counts of atforcible tempted oral copulation of a minor 14 or older, all felonies.

The alleged sexual assaults occurred from September 2009 through September 2019, according to court records.

Prosecutors from the Attorney General's Office on Friday filed a motion to suspend Miralrio's license as a respiratory care therapist while his case is pending.

Miralrio entered his plea in the jail courtroom in Santa Ana and was ordered to return to court Dec. 16 for a pretrial hearing at the West Justice Center in Westminster.

were acknowledged while their respective branch's song was played during a performance of the Armed Forces Salute.

Col. Charlie Quilter, who served in the Marine Corps, gave a brief history of the various campaigns that the U.S. military has been involved in since World War II during his remarks as the keynote speaker.

"In a way, our organization, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, exists to preserve the memory of the service of our veterans in these faraway places, and our numbers diminish," Quilter said. "Forty years ago, 18% of Americans were veterans. Today, it's just 7%. In a few months, I will be 80 years old, and I'm acutely aware that as a veteran, I

am a survivor. "In Vietnam, I lost 25 friends, and that was a significant percentage of the people I knew as a young man, and on a day like today, I think about them. Yes, I know it's not Memorial Day, but I can't

Those that were lost in combat, and I lost a few more in Desert Storm and Iraq, were filled with the expectations that

they one day might grow as old as I am today ... I had the dubious honor of being the oldest Marine to serve in Iraq at age 61, and yet, somehow I survived, and I was so lucky.

The Laguna Beach honor guard participated in the ceremony and retired the colors at its conclusion. There were also large American flags displayed prominently along the coastal side of Cliff Drive, where many of the veterans attending the event arrived by car.

"Honor, courage, valor, respect, perseverance are all words that come to mind when I hear the word 'veteran,' " Orange County Supervisor Lisa Bartlett said prior to

presenting a certificate of recognition to the local VFW post. "They are steadfast in their resolve to protect and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies and stand for something far greater than themselves.

'They are proud Americans who are dedicated to the principles which made our country free. Throughout our history, veterans have fought and died to ensure our freedom and protect our way of life. We can never repay the debt of gratitude to those who are with us today and those who have fallen."





# Sex offender pleads guilty to sex assault crime spree in H.B.

sex offender pleaded guilty Wednesday to going on a sexual assault crime spree on his birthday in downtown Huntington Beach.

Justin Wayne Goodgame began his crime spree about 11 a.m. Jan. 5 when he exposed himself in a business, according to Huntington Beach Police Department Lt. Brian Smith.

The victim did not report it immediately, but later called police when she heard about two other assaults against two other women, Smith said.

Police were called at 11:53 a.m. about a woman being groped in another business, Smith said.

Officers arriving on scene saw the suspect walking on the street, but when Goodgame them, he ran away, Smith said.

Police were still scouring the area for the suspect when officers were called again just after 12:30 p.m. when a woman in a third business alleged the defendant grabbed and groped her, Smith said. Several "citizens actively

chased him down and held him for officers, who took him into custody and immediately recognized him as a suspect" in the 11:53 a.m. attack, Smith said.

Goodgame pleaded guilty to a felony count of assault with the intent to commit a sex offense, two counts of indecent exposure, a count of failing to register as a sex offender upon release from jail and a count of touching an intimate part of another per-

son, all misdemeanors. As part of Goodgame's plea deal, felony counts of kidnapping to commit a sex crime, attempted forcible rape and sexual battery were dismissed.

According to the crimicomplaint against Goodgame, he was convicted of indecent exposure as a juvenile, requiring him to register as a sex offender. Sentencing is scheduled

for Jan. 27. — City News Service

Danny Nichols, who is a former professional surfer himself, and Army veteran Kyle Kelly.

The veterans and first responders got a bigger crowd than normal welcoming them on the shore, thanks to an unseasonably warm day that brought plenty of people to the beach.

The conditions on the 32-mile crossing, which started at daybreak, were also ideal, Nichols said, adding that "the universe was looking out for us."

"We're just using water as a medium to bring veterans, first responders and the local community together," Nichols said. "We're all just here to be of service. Some serve our country, some serve our communities and some serve others. There's a lot of gratitude in that. There's a lot of humili-

ty and respect in all of that." Interim Huntington Beach Police Chief Julian Harvey said he enjoyed the paddle, as part of a relay team from the police department.

"I've done some paddling, but nothing of this distance," Harvey said. "It was a wonderful experience. For me, it reminds us that we take a lot for granted. We should be considerate of those who have served our country, and those who have lost every-

thing.'

Bill Cerri, a captain with the Huntington Beach Fire Department, made the trek as part of a four-person team. Each man went as hard as he could for a halfhour shift, he said, before passing off the paddling to a teammate.

"It's a challenge," Cerri said. "That's what it is, it's just a challenge. You only live once. To get that opportunity to do something different with a team, you've got to jump at it."

Sisco said a highlight was

a pod of dolphins that followed the paddlers for much of the journey.

As he got back to the beach, he got back into his wheelchair, still without legs but with a full heart.

"I've never had that experience before, or anything close to it," he said of paddling with the dolphins. "It was really, really freaking cool. Really cool to see Mother Nature just kind of cheer you on, in a way.'



imminent as the city staffer officially announced Tuesday he will retire from the position on Dec. 3.

"Thirty-one and a half years was a much longer run than I'd ever expected," the Mission Viejo resident said in an interview Wednesday. "It was time time to start a new chapter and see what else this life has in store for me. It just felt right."

Hired to work part time on Costa Mesa's still-young cable access channel, Bora segued to a full-time position after three months. At first, his team stuck to the basics — council meetings and city-sponsored youth basketball and flag football games.

But as the years went on, Bora's work brought him out from behind the camera and into the limelight. He covered high school sports and provided playby-play commentary as legions of student athletes graduated, became adults and had children of their own.

"I started seeing a second generation," he said. "We were doing games with the kids of parents who'd been on TV. That was kind of cool and scary." The advent of the inter-

net changed the nature of communications work at City Hall, and Bora and his close-knit staff adapted, repurposing a 30-minute news show called "Community Report" into shorter form videos and focusing on the city's website.

In 2011, the team rolled out "Costa Mesa Minute," a highlight reel of community news and goings-on still popular on social media today.

Since the spots began, Bora has taped 2,229 episodes.

In a city release announcing the news, Costa Mesa City Manager Lori Ann Farrell Harrison called Bora's departure a big loss for not only her department, but for the entire

"He has been the leader of the city's award-winning CMTV team, and his Costa Mesa Minute has made him a familiar face with the whole community, which he has multiple ties and connections," she said. "Dane is a trusted colleague of ours in the city manager's office and he will truly be missed."

City spokesman Tony Dodero, who's worked in public affairs since 2015, said Bora is one of the hardest working people at City Hall.

"He is a mega-talented videographer, writer and communicator, and his institutional knowledge of the Costa Mesa community is unmatched," Dodero said Thursday. "I'm going to miss his humor, guidance and friendship dearly."

Bora said he doesn't know what's next, beyond enjoying the holidays with wife Chris and son Ryan, a freshman at Arizona State University. When he thinks back on how, at 23, he ended up doing municipal work, he feels lucky.

"Like most kids out of college, I was just looking to find work," he said.

"Did I want to be in government? No, I don't think it ever dawned on me. [But] it has been a more fulfilling career than I ever would have dreamed it would be.'
