Official targets exposed power lines

Laguna Beach mayor says the catastrophe in L.A. County emphasizes a need to move such utilities underground. **BY ERIC LICAS**

Laguna Beach Mayor Alex Rounaghi called for the replacement of above-ground power lines — which have been linked to the cause of past wildfires with underground infrastructure to reduce the chances of sparks igniting Laguna Canyon during a news conference Monday.

His comments followed reports of a downed Southern California Edison conductor near the heart of the Hurst fire, which charred almost 800 acres near Sylmar last week. And, although investigators were still looking into the cause of the Eaton fire, which had scorched over 14,000 acres and damaged or destroyed about 7,000 homes as of Wednesday, at least four lawsuits have been filed claiming the utility company's equipment may have been involved.

When strong winds threaten to damage above-ground lines in remote areas filled with potentially flammable vegetation, power companies may conduct

History prompts 'ample supply' of water

After learning from the 1993 Laguna Beach fire, the city has built sound infrastructure to douse flames, officials say.

Local officials highlighted ongoing efforts to ensure Laguna Beach has enough water getting to hydrants so firefighters can do their jobs during a news conference Monday, after returning from a visit to fire-ravaged Pacific Palisades.

Mayor Alex Rounaghi and City Manager Dave Kiff checked in with firefighters stationed in the Huntington Palisades neighborhood over the weekend before hosting a Zoom session with reporters. They were joined by Laguna Beach Fire Chief Niko King and Laguna Beach County Water District General Manager Keith Van Der Maaten.

"I was just struck by how much it looks like Laguna Beach," Kiff said of the community on the edge of the Palisades fire's reach. "Parts of it, especially areas where we drove through, you could picture it being Skyline [Drive in Laguna Beach]. I mean, just the structure of the road, how narrow it is, how much vegetation is around."

2 H.B. residents continue effort to overturn air show settlement

Two Huntington Beach residents continue their attempt to overturn the city's controversial 2023 settlement with Pacific Airshow LLC.

Former Huntington Beach Planning Commissioner Mark Bixby and former Mayor Connie Boardman filed a lawsuit in Orange County Superior Court on Friday, seeking to cancel the settlement and refund money already paid out to the air show operator.

"As a Huntington Beach resident and taxpayer, I've been paying close attention to City Hall for more than 20 years and this is the most outrageous abuse of taxpayer dollars that I have ever seen," Bixby said in a statement. "The city could have easily defended against the air show operator's lawsuit over cancellation

erator's lawsuit over cancellation due to the oil spill, but instead chose to settle without a fight by paying millions of dollars to a close political supporter of the City Council majority and the city attorney. This cannot be allowed to stand."

The settlement, announced in May 2023, was to bring an end to

a lawsuit filed against the city after the cancellation of the final day of the 2021 show due to an oil spill off the coast of Huntington Beach.

Bixby and Boardman allege in their lawsuit that the city's settlement with Pacific Airshow LLC is without merit, amounting to an illegal gift of public funds. They filed their action under a section of a state code that allows a resident taxpayer to file suit to enjoin a waste of public funds.

The full settlement not only stipulated that the city would pay Pacific Airshow LLC a total of \$4.9 million over the next six years but also include terms that could lock the operator into that

State attorney general, secretary of state file appeal in voter ID suit

California leaders filed a notice to appeal on Tuesday, the latest step in a battle with Huntington Beach over voter identification.

State Atty. Gen. Rob Bonta and Secretary of State Shirley Weber are seeking to reverse an Orange County Superior Court decision from November, where a judge ruled that the matter was not yet "ripe for adjudication."

Measure A, passed by Huntington Beach voters last March, allows the city to require voter identification be shown when voting in person during munici-

Dwight's Beach Concession, landmark since 1932, closed after fire

Dwight's Beach Concession which since 1932 has sold "world famous cheese strips" from a snack stand and beach rental business near the Huntington Beach Pier — is temporarily closed after a fire broke out in the structure Monday evening.

Huntington Beach Fire Department spokeswoman Jennifer Carey said the initial call came in at 6:20 p.m., radioed in by a nearby lifeguard on duty. The business was not open at the time of the incident.


"While we received calls from the public, it was actually sighted by one of our lifeguards, who saw smoke coming out of the top and called it in over a radio to the fire department," Carey said Tuesday of the two-alarm blaze. Fire crews from Newport Beach and Costa Mesa assisted at the scene, and the flames were quickly extinguished. One firefighter sustained minor injuries and was transported to a nearby hospital but was soon after released, according to Carey.

While the cause of the fire is still being investigated, officials are expediting their arson report procedure, given the fire's placement and the scenario observed at the site.

Building inspectors surveyed the damage and yellow-tagged the structure, allowing business owners to retrieve items from the property, but barring Dwight's from immediately reopening.

"As far as reopening or running the business, it's not at that place

Laguna officials addressed a variety of concerns raised in the wake of multiple fires that consumed large swaths of Los Angeles County. Among these were reports that fire hydrants went dry as crews battled flames.

Los Angeles' fire hydrants are supplied by three water tanks that each hold about one million gallons. Amid the fires, local water infrastructure faced four times its normal demand for 15 hours straight.

As water ran low, it became difficult to maintain enough pressure in lines to pump against gravity into communities in the canyons. Former Los Angeles Department of Water General Manager Martin Adams told the Los Angeles Times the system was made to douse individual house fires, not meant to handle kind of massive blazes that have become increasingly common in California.

By comparison, Laguna Beach's current water infrastructure was designed with lessons of the 1993 Laguna Canyon Fire in mind, Van Der Maaten said. He

noted that during that disaster, which scorched 16,684 acres and destroyed 366 homes, six of the reservoirs supplying the city at the time ran out of water.

Since then, the Laguna Beach County Water District has added two reservoirs, bringing its total number up to 21 with a combined storage capacity of 33.5 million gallons. In addition, numerous pumps with generators to power them have been incorporated into the system to ensure water gets to where it needs to be in an emergency. Two heli-hydrants, facilities set up in remote areas so water-dropping aircraft can resupply faster, have also been created near Laguna Canyon, Van Der Maaten said.

He and Rounaghi also highlighted progress on the Doheny desalination plant and plans to drill a new well in partnership with Newport Beach and Fountain Valley, further improving Laguna Beach's water resiliency moving forward.

Van Der Maaten said "right now we have ample supply," and "we can rely on our pumps, our generators, to function they way they're supposed to."

However he noted that no municipality's water

supply is limitless and "every water system at some point will run out of water." Meanwhile in the face of climate change, devastating fires capable of pushing infrastructure to its limits are becoming part of what Rounaghi called a "new normal."

"We plan based on modeling," Van Der Maaten said. "We have modeling that shows our system's in good shape. It's based on certain criteria. But I think the question coming out of this is do we need to increase that planning to more extreme situations?'

Meanwhile, emergency response teams in Orange County are are closely monitoring conditions and responding immediately with as many resources as can be spared even on small hot spots. On Saturday, county and city firefighters stamped roughly 20 square feet of smoldering vegetation on the 31100 block of Coast Highway and responded to a patch of hot coals that may have been used as a warming fire near Soka University in Aliso Viejo. Crews stayed behind to make sure there were no lingering embers.

Longtime Orange County football coach Mitch Olson has landed in Fountain Valley.

The Fountain Valley High football program introduced Olson as its new head coach on Monday, pending approval from the Huntington Beach Union High School District Board of Trustees.

Olson, 64, previously served as head coach at Kennedy and Loara high schools, before resigning from Loara prior to the 2021 season. He takes over at Fountain Valley for David Gutierrez, who resigned after four seasons.

"I'm really excited to be here and excited about the possibilities of what Fountain Valley High School has to offer," he said in a statement. "I can't wait to work with the young men and do some good things on and

off the field." The Barons finished 1-9

overall last year, and 0-5 in the Foxtrot League. Olson's teams in 21 years

at Kennedy won eight league titles and the 2006 Southern Section CIF Southern Division title. He then coached Loara for six years, helping the Saxons share the Garden Grove League title in 2019 and advance to the Division 14 semifinals.

A decorated running back, Olson played football at Los Alamitos High, Orange Coast College and Whittier College. After getting drafted by the Chicago White Sox in baseball, he played that sport professionally for two years before earning his teaching cre-dential and beginning to teach and coach.

– it's not possible," Carey said Tuesday.

The Huntington Beach landmark was launched during the Great Depression by proprietor Dwight Clapp, an "oil field roustabout convinced that tourism, not oil, was Huntington Beach's future," the Los Angeles Times reported in 2002.

Clapp reportedly per-suaded the City Council to build a lifeguard tower on newly acquired land south of the pier and to rent him a corner of the tower for \$100 a year.

There, he and wife Fae

worked seven days a week and late into the night, forming ground beef patties by hand and chopping potatoes.

In the years that followed, the concession stand became famous for cheese strips, essentially tortilla chips topped with cold shredded cheese and served with "Dwight's One and Only Strip Sauce."

The original building was replaced seven years later, then was rebuilt in 1967 and underwent a plumbing renovation in 2021. A call to the business was not answered Tuesday.


