Body of missing teen found Monday

Officials said Thursday 15-year-old Aayan Randhawa was found and retrieved near H.B.'s Lifeguard Headquarters.

The body of a Huntington Beach teenager who went missing July 28 during a night swim with a friend in the Pacific was discovered Monday by a lifeguard stationed nearly 2 miles away from where he was last seen, near the city's lifeguard headquarters, officials reported.

Huntington Beach Police Department spokeswoman Jessica Cuchilla said Thursday the body was spotted floating in the waters near Lifeguard Tower 3 — a short distance from the city's pier — at around 10 a.m. Monday and retrieved.

Officials from the Orange County coroner's office on Tuesday confirmed it was the body of the missing 15-year-old, who was publicly identified by family members as Aayan Randhawa, an incoming sophomore at

Weiss, Whalen to seek reelection in Laguna

Longtime City Council incumbents will face at least 3 challengers for their seats. The deadline to file papers is today.

Incumbents Bob Whalen and George Weiss have each announced they will seek another term on the Laguna Beach City Council in the general election in November.

Four candidates have qualified for the ballot, including challengers Hallie Jones and Judie Mancuso. Local attorney Jennifer Zeiter also pulled nomination papers on Thursday.

Laguna Beach residents interested in running for the City Council have until 5 p.m. Friday to file nomination papers. The

Noted list of names added to Surfing Walk of Fame

Sally Fitzgibbons surfs her first heat of the U.S. Open of Surfing on Friday.

A day before entering the water, the Australian surfing veteran earned a big honor just a stone's throw away — on Main Street, in front of Jack's Surfboards.

Fitzgibbons was one of several standouts inducted into the Huntington Beach Surfing Walk of Fame on Thursday morning, as it celebrated its 30th anniversary.

Fitzgibbons, named as the Woman of the Year inductee, is now 33. She was emotional during her speech, noting that she would typically greet the ceremony's attendees with a "G'Day, Huntington Beach."

"I'm going to give this a whirl, 'Aloha, Huntington Beach!'" said

Take a tour in CdM of the Narwahl, an active U.S. Coast Guard cutter

The U.S. Coast Guard invites the public to tour the Narwahl, an 87-foot cutter, and learn what it's like to live and serve aboard the vessel on Saturday in Corona del Mar.

The event will be hosted at the Coast Guard's station in Newport Harbor, 1911 Bayside Drive. Guided tours of the Narwahl are scheduled to take place between 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

When the 87-foot cutter isn't responding to emergencies along Southern California's Coast, it conducts inspections and patrols, Coast Guard officials said in a news release. The vessel's commanding officer, Capt. Annabella Farabaugh, will be on hand to

talk to visitors about what it's like to serve at sea and share insights from her career in the military.

Members of the public can also learn about volunteer opportunities with the Coast Guard.

Saturday's event was put together with support from the military branch's Auxillary Division 6, which is made up of over 200 uniformed volunteers in six flotillas serving Dana Point, Newport Beach, Orange Coast, Huntington Harbor, Seal Beach and North Orange County.

Street parking will be limited, so visitors are advised to arrive early to ensure a spot on a tour.

Fitzgibbons, who counts the 2011 U.S. Open among her 12 World Tour wins and is a three-time world runner-up.

She got emotional when talking about the Collins family, who she said really embraced her as she often came to the Southern California shoreline.

Sean Collins, Surfline founder, died in 2011 after a heart attack.

"It was those long drives from Seal Beach up here to the Surfline offices where I talked story with Sean," Fitzgibbons said. "Half the time, he wouldn't understand me at all ... but I would camp out on the balcony out there and run over and surf, warm up in the sun and try to learn about forecasting in-between."

"It was at every turn, though, you guys, the community and the people of Huntington Beach would stop and take care of me ... It's not a scary town anymore. I don't cry when I come here."

Jeff Deffenbaugh, a Huntington Beach local who was inducted into the Surfers' Hall of Fame last week, got the double celebration as he was the Local Hero inducted into the Surfing Walk of Fame. Longtime surferboard

shaper Bing Copeland was inducted as Surf Pioneer, with Peruvian Felipe Pomar inducted as Surf Champion. Doug Warwick and Brian Singer, the founders of popular surfing brand Rip Curl, were inducted in the Surf Culture category, while surfer, shaper and "The Endless Summer" co-star Mike Hynson earned an Honor Roll nod.

Copeland opened Bing Surfboards in Hermosa Beach in 1959, before licensing the brand and moving with his family to Idaho. However, South Bay shaper Matt Calvani has been creating replica Bing surfboards, with Copeland's blessing, since 2000.

"The first time I surfed Huntington was probably 1950," Copeland said. "In those days ... we were riding Simmons boards. The board I had was 10-foot long, 24-inches wide, 4 inches thick. It weighed 40 pounds. I weighed not much more. With those boards, you could fall down, but not off."

Pomar, the 1965 World Surfing Champion, encouraged attendees to surf until they were 100 years old. He founded Surf Till 100 with Tom Woods and Jeff Hakman.

"Health is wealth," said Pomar, 80. "Surfing gives us great health and great happiness. There have already been exceptional people who have been

surfing into their late 80s and 90s, and there is no reason why we can't do better."

Sanoce "Sunny" Kazama from Hawaii was also recognized as the recipient of the MacAllister award as a collaboration between the Walk of Fame, the Huntington Beach International Surfing Museum and the

National Scholastic Surfing Assn. Kazama earned the MacAllister, in memory of Don MacAllister, as the outstanding high school

surfer for her service to the community. She received a scholarship of \$4,000.

Huntington Beach High School.

Multiple agencies, including the U.S. Coast Guard and the Orange County Sheriff's Department, assisted divers from the fire department's Marine Safety Division in the search for Randhawa, employing a vessel with sonar scanning capabilities, as well as a helicopter that provided aerial support to rescue watercraft down below, Cuchilla said.

"They were searching from above for any detection of a person in the ocean," she added. "Our divers, if they spotted something, went in there for whatever was [appearing in scans] to determine if it was what we were searching for."

The Coast Guard on the night of July 29 officially suspended its search efforts, which included the deployment of a boat from Station Los Angeles-Long Beach, a Jayhawk helicopter and the Coast Guard cutter Blackfin, the Los Angeles Times reported.

However, local first responders continued their search for Randhawa's body until Monday's discovery, Huntington Beach Fire Department posted Thursday on Facebook.

"Our deepest condolences go out to the family and friends of the young swimmer during this incredibly difficult time," the post read.

During a July 30 vigil at the Huntington Beach Pier, near the spot where the teen's body would later be discovered, friends and family members recalled his love of the ocean.

"He loved to come to the beach all the time. That was his favorite place," his mother, Sana Randhawa, said at the vigil. "Every time I'd say I want to go for a walk on the beach, he'd say, 'Mama, why are we going just for a walk? We should go in the water.'"

The teenager was reportedly at a bonfire with friends shortly before 8:30 p.m. that Sunday, when he texted his mother, she told a Daily Pilot reporter at the vigil. Less than one hour later, police called to inform her the teen had gone missing in the water.

Officials said waves of 3 to 5 feet and strong rip currents were reported in the area the night Randhawa was swept out to sea.

deadline would have been extended to Aug. 14 had either incumbent decided not to run.

Whalen, who was first elected to the council in 2012, has served as mayor five times. His public service also includes four years on the Planning Commission and an extended stay of close to 10 years on the Laguna Beach Unified School District Board of Education.

A call to action has come from residents to address growing visitor impacts, and Whalen counted that as one of the challenges facing the city going forward.

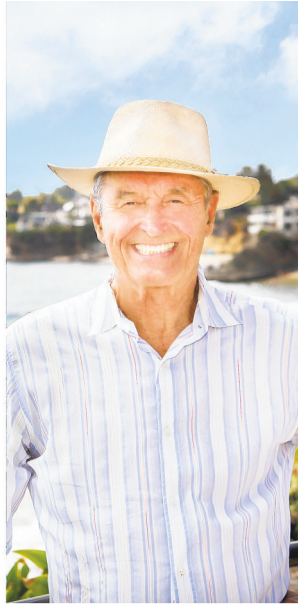
“Residents are feeling overwhelmed by visitors and we have begun, but need to do much more, to implement programs and strategies to better manage the impact of visitors on our beaches, neighborhoods and parks.”

“We also need to develop plans to upgrade our aging public buildings and other infrastructure, implement our climate action and adaptation plan, and find affordable housing solutions for local artists, workers and seniors.”

Whalen remarked that his top priority remains public safety. He helped roll out the wildfire mitigation and fire safety plan in 2019. The city has since made strides in that area, including the installation of an emergency outdoor warning system, as well as the addition of cameras and helicopter refilling tanks in open space to help detect and fight fires.

The council has leaned on Whalen, who is now the senior member of the governing body. He served as mayor four times in a span of five years between 2019 and 2023. That included three consecutive mayoral terms from 2019 to 2021, much of that time as the city navigated the coronavirus pandemic.

“It was a challenging time, but I believe the city

did an outstanding job of protecting the health of our residents and helping our business community to survive,” Whalen said.

Weiss came into office with a promise of putting the interests of residents first. He has continually advocated for fiscal responsibility and transparency in local government.

His public service includes time on the Laguna Beach Beautification Council and the Housing and Human Services Committee.

The first-term council member was a founding member of Laguna Residents First, a group that sought to give residents a say in the fate of major development projects with a ballot initiative in 2022.

“I think keeping the essential character of Laguna is difficult because there are forces that want to monetize it so much,” Weiss said.

While Weiss acknowledged that the city needed to generate more revenue, he suggested it could be more judicious in its spending.

“Mistakes have been made, decisions have been made that we’re spending too much money on things that aren’t necessary, consultants in-

cluded,” Weiss said. “That’s part of my running again. I do want to see us be more responsible.”

Since being elected in 2020, Weiss has not been appointed to the positions of mayor or mayor pro tem by his fellow council members. He brought an item for a mayoral rotation in November 2023, but it was abandoned due to a lack of support among his council colleagues.

At the time, Weiss said such a policy change would be “fair” and “democratic,” while adding that he would also support an election for mayor every two years. When reached for comment this week, Weiss said he had no ambition to be mayor but rather to influence the council to make the right decisions.

“I’ll continue to speak out because we do have too much secrecy and not enough transparency, and we have to shine a light on government,” Weiss said. “That’s when it better responds to the people and their needs, and I don’t think they’re being met. We’re spending way too much on other things.”

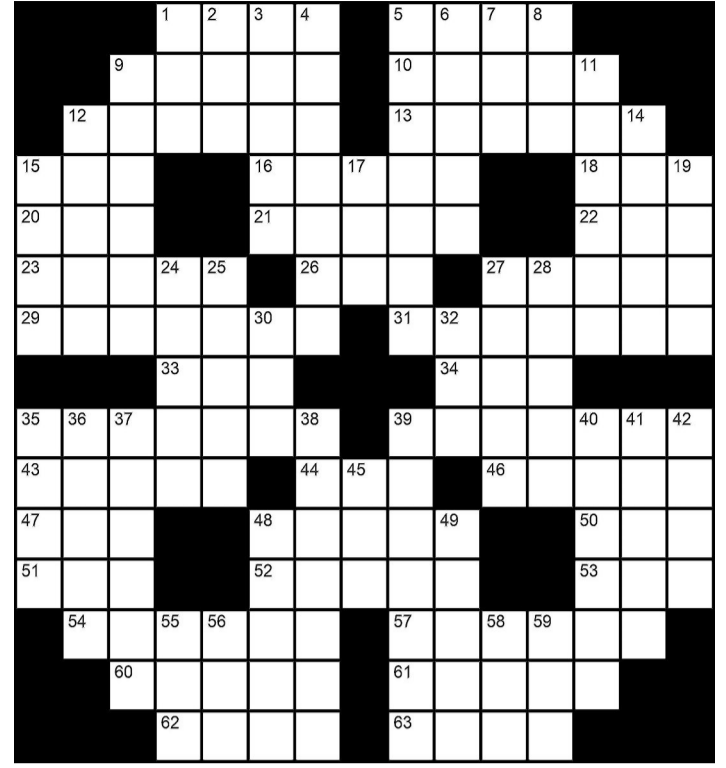
