Newport Harbor boys' water polo rallies to stun JSerra for CIF title.

WALNUT — Lucca Van Der Woude fancies himself more of a soccer fan than a baskethall fan

The Newport Harbor High senior boys' water polo player is only casually aware of the Dallas Mavericks point guard with the first name pronounced the same as his but spelled differently, Luka Doncic.

With time and an opportunity to win a CIF Southern Section Open Division title slipping away Saturday night at Mt. San Antonio College, Van Der Woude stepped up.

Van Der Woude scored the final two goals, including the game-winner from about five meters with 54 seconds left, as top-seeded Newport Harbor rallied for an 11-10 victory over No. 2 JSerra.

"I knew we needed a goal and time was running out," said Van Der Woude, who scored a match-high four goals and also drew four exclusions. "I saw the open net, and I had to take my shot. But it wasn't just me. At

1 killed, 5 hospitalized in chain reaction of crashes on 405 Freeway in Costa Mesa

California Highway Patrol investigators are piecing together a series of collisions Tuesday night on the 405 Freeway in Costa Mesa that killed one motorist, injured several others and resulted in a full-freeway closure lasting six hours.

CHP spokesman Sergio Rivera

said officers were called to southbound lanes of the free-way, just south of Harbor Boule-vard, shortly after 11:30 p.m., regarding a two-vehicle collision. Upon their arrival, they discovered numerous vehicles were involved in what appears to be a chain reaction of crashes.

"There were multiple cars — it was more than just two," Rivera

said Wednesday, estimating there may have been about seven or eight drivers involved in the melee. "We're still investigating the sequence of how it occurred. We believe it is going to be multiple, separate crashes."

One individual, described only as a man possibly in his 50s, was pronounced dead at the scene while approximately nine individuals reported injuries. Of those, five were transported to nearby hospitals for treatment, Costa Mesa Fire & Rescue Battalion Chief Chris Coates confirmed Wednesday.

"With a complex scene, where the accident spanned approximately one-quarter of a mile,

Migrants spotted offshore detained by ICE

Newport Beach Mayor Will O'Neill takes to social media to criticize California's so-called sanctuary state law.

Newport Beach's mayor took aim at California's so-called sanctuary state law after federal officials detained 21 apparent migrants on a boat stopped about a mile west of Newport Beach last Thursday night.

The crew of the Narwhal spotted a 34-foot vessel "acting suspiciously" near Newport Harbor, Coast Guard officials said in a news release. They boarded it at about 7 p.m. and found people allegedly attempting to evade immigration officials and enter the U.S.

Out of the 21 people aboard the intercepted vessel, 18 were residents of Mexico, Coast Guard officials said. Another was from

Senior housing project OK'd by split vote

Huntington Beach City Council passes, 4-3, a zoning map amendment for the Bolsa Chica Senior Care Community.

The Bolsa Chica Senior Care Community project passed a second reading at Tuesday night's Huntington Beach City Council meeting.

The council voted 4-3 to adopt Ordinance No. 4327, which approves a zoning text amendment that changes the land from commercial general to a specific plan, SP-19, for the project.

It was one final 4-3 vote from the highly divided council as it has been comprised over the past two years, though this time conservative Tony Strickland joined with outgoing minority members Dan Kalmick, Natalie Moser and Rhonda Bolton to approve the

Coast Summit panel examines successes of marine protected areas

The Coast Film and Music Festival first came to Laguna Beach in 2019, but the topical panel discussions of the Coast Summit debuted a year ago.

Largely focused on issues of adventure, environmental conservation and sustainability, those conversations returned to town on Nov. 14 at the Rivian South Coast Theater.

A panel focused on balancing marine protection efforts with the needs of coastal communities addressed a situation that had come to life right outside the front door of Laguna residents.

The Laguna Beach State Marine Reserve, which was established in January 2012, totals 6.72 miles and protects 4.4 miles of

the local shoreline, according to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Marine reserves have the highest level of protection, as fishing and collecting are not allowed within those areas. The Laguna Beach State Marine Reserve is one of four consecutive marine protected areas that cover an estimated 14 miles of coastal habitat between Corona del Mar State Beach and Dana Point.

Chad Nelsen, the chief executive of the Surfrider Foundation and a Laguna Beach native, looked back on his youth in the

Restaurant employee killed falling from ladder at South Coast Plaza

A man who fell to his death Saturday while working at Maggiano's Little Italy outside South Coast Plaza has been identified as a 32year-old Santa Ana resident, according to the Orange County coroner's office.

Orange County Sheriff's Department spokesman Sgt. Matthew Parrish confirmed Tuesday the man was identified by coroner's officials as Edilberto Mendoza-Diaz. He was report-

edly an employee of the restaurant, according to the Orange County Register.

Responders from the Costa Mesa Fire and Police departments were called to the restaurant — located at 3333 Bristol St. — shortly before 8 a.m. Saturday, regarding a man who'd fallen from the roof of the building while attempting to climb down a ladder, CMPD posted on social media after the incident.

The individual sustained head trauma from the fall, according to police.

Mendoza-Diaz was pronounced dead at the scene by firefighters. His death was not believed to have been suspicious, and the incident is being considered an accident, according to the release issued Sat-

A request for comment from South Coast Plaza representatives, along with multiple calls to Maggiano's, were not answered

CMFR, with assistance from the Fountain Valley Fire Department, triaged victims and requested an appropriate amount of resources," Coates said of the mass-casualty incident.

Rivera said officers initiated a full closure of all lanes, lasting until nearly 1

a.m., as investigators examined the scene. Because it was not immediately known which part of the collision had involved the fatality, each vehicle and every part on the road had to be meticulously documented.

Several witnesses reportedly saw the incident unfold, but due to the lateness of the hour, CHP investigators Wednesday

morning were still attempting to sort out who saw what.

"The hard part is getting a hold of witnesses and seeing what their statements are, then matching it with what we think occurred," Rivera said. "It's just a big puzzle, and we're trying to put it together."

diving and fishing and spearfishing, and my bud-dies and I couldn't really catch any fish," Nelsen said. "We thought we were just bad at it. We talked to the older lifeguards, guys who had been around here in the '50s and '60s, and they just looked at us matter-of-factly and said, "It's fished out."

Since the creation of the marine reserve, local Nelsen said the area is "unrecognizable" from when he was growing up.

"It is teeming with fish," Nelsen said. "There's lobsters under every rock, and the kelp beds are flourishing, so it's actually a real conservation success story. I raised my kids in town, too, and they grew up in a healthier ocean offshore here than I did. It shows the effectiveness of these marine protected areas. It turns out if you leave nature alone, it does a great job by itself to come back." While important marine habitats are eyed by conservationists and fishermen alike, the panel indicated that a broad spectrum of the public can make a difference in their

communities.

Chugey Sepulveda, director of research and education at Pfleger Institute Environmental Research, emphasized the need for consumers to consider where their fish is coming from.

"I think as a consumer, we need to treat the ocean more like a farmer's market," Sepulveda said. "Up until now, as a consumer, we go into a restaurant and we'd say, 'I'm feeling like having some Chilean sea bass. How about you?' And actually, that sea bass is not local. There's a huge carbon footprint associated with just getting it here, and who knows which nation caught it? ... But what we do know is there's a local fisherman starving. He cannot make

ends meet, and we have some fantastic chefs. ...

"For the consumer, I think that it's really important that we look to our local resources and we try to get away from the mentality of 'I want what I want when I want it.' We need to be more receptive to what's available."

Keith Malloy, a film director and surfer that participated in the discussion, simplified the question of where a fish had been caught.

"I think the most respectful way to eat meat or fish, if you're going to do it, is actually taking the life vourself because vou realize how sacred and special that is," Malloy said.



CdM uses fourth quarter rally to stun Laguna Beach

The Corona del Mar High girls' water polo team had not beaten perennial powerhouse Laguna Beach since 2013.

The teams had played two dozen times since then, and the Breakers had always come out on top.

A thrilling comeback and a cold-blooded freshman helped CdM break the streak Tuesday night.

Camryn Freshman Spruill scored the gamewinning goal with 39 seconds left in regulation from center, as CdM rallied for an 8-7 victory in the season opener for both teams at Corona del Mar High.

In her high school debut, Spruill already showed that she can team with CdM senior Reagan Weir to form a formidable tandem at center. Both players scored three goals Tuesday night.

"I'm really excited, because I've never experienced something like this before," said Spruill, who stands 5-foot-11. "You have game after game, and you have it with this team that you go to school with. It seems so fun and exciting."

"Exciting" described the comeback well for the Sea Kings, who returned the majority of their team from last year's CIF Southern Section Division 1 champi-

Laguna Beach, which got three goals each from senior captains Kara Carver and Presley Jones, led 7-4 headed into the fourth quarter before CdM began its comeback. Senior lefthanded attacker Didi Evans scored a lob goal, then Weir fed Spruill for a backhand goal from two meters, cutting CdM's deficit to 7-6.

The hosts tied the score as senior Piper

botham, last year's CIF finals hero who had three assists, found Evans for a power-play goal with 1:11 left to play. CdM senior Kiana Wells had the drive inside to earn the six-onfive opportunity.

An outside shot from Laguna Beach went off the crossbar, and CdM got possession back. From there, Evans found Spruill inside.

"We wanted to run the clock out, and Camryn was able to spin in and get position immediately," secondyear CdM coach Marc Hunt said. "I could see Didi sort of hesitating, thinking, 'We want to run more time off this clock, but I have the entry, I have to give it to her.' She enters it in to her, Camryn finishes strong.

"As a freshman, [Spruill] is going to surprise some folks this year. Fun to watch her have such success in her first high school game."

Jones got off an outside shot in the closing seconds, but CdM senior goalkeeper Gabby MacAfee gobbled it up for her 14th save, a total that included a penalty shot block.

Fellow freshman Keira

Bethell also figures to play a prominent role alongside Spruill, Hunt said. Sophomore left-handed attacker Morgan Dollander and junior attacker Josie Alaluf, both transfers from Newport Harbor, will each become eligible on Dec. 20. Alaluf has been starting for CdM in the offseason.

Corona del Mar, which has won the Division 1 championship two of the last three years, seeks to compete in the higher Open Division this year. Evans, a four-year varsity standout for CdM, said she believes the team can contend for the title in the top division with the mix of returning seniors and young

"This team is capable of so much," she said. "By the time that we're getting prepared for CIF and in CIF, I think the sky's the limit."

Laguna Beach also got a goal from junior Brooke Schneider, while senior goalkeeper Siena Jumani also played well with seven saves, an assist and three steals.

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Russia and two were from Uzbekistan. All were placed into the custody of U.S. Customs and Border Protection.

"Smugglers consistently put migrants at risk, with disregard for their safety," said Brandon J. Tucker the director of CBP's Air and Marine Operations in San Diego. "The ocean is one of the most dangerous routes to attempt illegal entry into the United States."

On Monday, Mayor Will O'Neill praised federal officials and noted that other small boats stowing migrants have been stopped recently in waters off of Newport Beach. In late October, witnesses told Customs and Border Protection officials 16 people had fled from one vessel that wound up beached on Crystal Cove, according to a news release from the agency. They were all located following a search of the area and detained on suspicion violating U.S. immigration law.

The mayor went on to criticize a state law signed by Gov. Gavin Newsom in 2017 that limits how much local and state agencies are able to cooperate with Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials. SB 54, also known as the California Values Act, prohibits law enforcement in the state from investigating, interrogating, detaining or arresting persons "for immigration enforcement purposes." The law also discourages state and local officials from telling federal agents the release date of incarcerated people wanted by CBP unless they have been convicted of a crime considered violent or otherwise serious enough to result in a pris-

O'Neill and others who have opposed so-called

sanctuary laws like SB 54 argue they harm public safety by allowing people convicted of crimes to be released when they might have otherwise been deported. The mayor referenced a 2020 statement from O.C. Sheriff Don Barnes noting a 38% increase in the amount of people sought by ICE who had been released from Orange County Jail and then arrested again for a later offense.

Supporters of sanctuary laws say police rely on the trust of immigrants in their community. They argue that potentially exposing undocumented people to the risk of deportation for reporting a crime, serving as a wit-ness or providing information that might aid an investigation would ultimately make it harder to

bring offenders to justice. Advocates for undocumented residents America say the majority of them are contributing members of their communities, and driving them into secrecy makes them more likely to become the victims of crime. A study released in September by the Department of Justice analyzing arrests in Texas between 2012 and 2018 found that undocumented immigrants were less likely than documented immigrants or U.S.-born citizens to get booked for felonies and violent crimes.

The most recent case of migrants detained off the coast of Newport Beach comes amid the expected appointment of immigration hardliners to highlevel positions in Donald Trump's administration. He announced that Tom Homan, the director of ICE during the presidentelect's first term, would become the country's "border czar." Stephen Miller, Trump's former adviser and speechwriter who championed controversial policies like a ban on travelers from six countries populated by a Muslim majority and the separation of undocumented children from their families, was reportedly chosen as his deputy chief of staff for policy. Both apparent appointees have signaled plans to pursue mass deportations.

"Best goalie in the country right here," Van Der Woude said of Harris, bound for USC. "We could not have won that game without Luke. Luke saved us in some crucial moments. Not even him just physically blocking it, but knowing he's behind us allows us to trust our own game so much."
