### U.S. Rep. makes Senate pitch in Īrvine

Rep. Adam Schiff, vying for a Senate seat against fellow Democrat Rep. Katie Porter, shared his goals to potential voters.

#### **BY ERIC LICAS**

U.S. House Rep. Adam Schiff welcomed potential voters in support of his bid for a Senate seat during a meet-and-greet Wednesday in Irvine, a city represented by one of two fellow Democrats running against him, Rep. Katie Porter.

As of Thursday, Schiff, Porter and one other member of the House, Barbara Lee of California's 12th Congressional District, had begun campaigns to fill the position held by Sen. Dianne Feinstein since 1992. Last Tuesday, the senior stateswoman said she plans to retire when her term ends at the beginning of 2025.

Schiff and Porter declared their candidacies for the Senate in January. Lee went public with her campaign a week after Feinstein announced she would not be seeking reelection. Rep. Ro Khanna of the 17th District has reportedly been considering enter-

### Laguna council unites in support of Dupuis

Resolution condemns harassment, bullying and vandalism after city manager's home was targeted on Feb. 9.

Following an act of vandalism earlier this month at the home of Laguna Beach City Manager Shohreh Dupuis, the City Council unanimously passed a resolution in a show of solidarity with the city's top executive.

Mayor Bob Whalen brought the resolution, which condemned acts of bullying, harassment and vandalism against any individual, before the council Tuesday night in response to what officials have called a targeted incident.

### C.M. pot shop denied for proximity to drug recovery, counseling services wins appeal

When South Coast Safe Access came before the Costa Mesa Planning Commission in November seeking to open a cannabis dispensary at 2001 Harbor Blvd. they were denied, largely because drug counseling services were already being offered at the site.

Commissioners deemed a re-

tail cannabis store would be an incompatible use for three ground floor suites at the property, given that Yellowstone Recovery was operating on the sec-

ond floor. They further claimed the dispensary could be materially detrimental to clients served by Yellowstone as well as First Step House, a sober living facility for men on Charle Street, directly behind the building.

That Nov. 28 determination was the first retail cannabis enterprise to be denied in Costa Mesa, where voters approved Measure Q two years earlier.

But the ruling did not stand. On Tuesday, the Costa Mesa City Council overturned the commission decision, granting an appeal filed by South Coast Safe Access and allowing it to move

forward with plans for a 3,720square-foot retail operation.

The operators of Yellowstone Recovery have since been informed they must relocate as of April 30, after being notified by the building's landlord the business' lease would not be extended past a Dec. 31 end date.

### Legendary volleyball coach remembered as community leader

FOR MORE than 30 years, Rocky Ciarelli, seen coaching for Newport Harbor against Huntington Beach on March 23, 2018, coached a number of local high school volleyball programs. He died at age 66 on Tuesday.

The Orange County volleyball community has lost a titan, as Rocky Ciarelli died unexpectedly on Tuesday. He was 66.

Ciarelli suffered a heart attack during a round of golf with friends at Mile Square Golf Course in Fountain Valley, his family said.

A longtime fixture in the local volleyball scene, Ciarelli coached high school volleyball for 32 years. He spent 24 years at Huntington Beach (1985 to 2008), which he graduated from in 1974 and went on to teach social studies. Ciarelli also coached at Edison from 1982 to 1984.

After taking some time away from the game, Ciarelli returned to the bench in 2015 to head the Newport Harbor boys' volleyball program, where he spent five seasons and had the chance to coach his nephew, Dayne Chalmers, who is currently an outside hitter at UC Santa Barbara.

At Huntington Beach, Ciarelli won back-to-back CIF Southern Section Division I boys' volleyball championships in 1993 and 1994. He then led the Huntington Beach girls' volleyball team to the CIF Division IIAA and the CIF State Division II titles in 1996.

It was a victorious swan song for Ciarelli at Newport Harbor, as the Sailors captured the CIF Division 1 and the CIF State Division I boys' volleyball championships in

Tony Ciarelli, the son and

youngest of two children raised by Rocky and his wife Cammy, viewed his father as a community

leader, adding that his communi-

ty was volleyball.

"There is a massive coaching tree around my dad, who he influenced, because he was a community leader," said Tony, who was named national player of the year by the American Volleyball Coaches Assn. while at USC in 2012. "He was the guy who allowed people to be his assistant coaches and taught them how to love the game and taught them how to love coaching. He was an influencer of men and women alike, and there's an insane number of people who touched him in the volleyball world."

Huntington Beach High has seen three generations of the Ciarelli family walk through its doors. The boys' and girls' volleyball programs at the school are currently

representing owner David DeWyke and partner Robert Taft Jr., challenged the commission decision on the grounds that Costa Mesa never designated sober living homes or drug counseling services as sensitive uses, for which a distance buffer from a dispensary would be required.

Such protections exist only for K-12 schools, playgrounds, child daycare centers and homeless shel-

"Your planning commissioners got really hung up on the existence of Yellowstone," Munoz told the council Tuesday. "[But] it is not a sensitive use under your ordinance, so it's not something that was focused on when the project was before the commission."

Munoz claimed South Coast Safe Access — the first enterprise to open a legal retail cannabis store in Santa Ana in 2015 would benefit the largely vacant property, offering a stable tenancy and \$2 million in site improvements.



gagement, the fact that parents showed up and gave us their feedback shows that they care about their kids," Singer said. "We care about their kids [too]. When it comes down to it, we're here for kids. I was very happy to see so much participation in this process.

"To me, this is a pause, because we do know that we need to continue these conversations. These are imperative, but I do think it's important to engage our community, listen to them and look at different options and what that would mean for our students, for our staff, all the way across. We had parents telling us, 'We want to share more input with you,' and I think it's valuable to hear that."

With the pause, meetings that were scheduled for Spring View on Thursday

14

and Golden View on Monday have been postponed until a later date, district spokeswoman Trish Montgomery confirmed.

Singer noted the numbers presented by Conroy that showed the district lost 2,600 students over the past decade to its current enrollment of 6,809. It is the largest enrollment decline in the district in 40 years, Conroy said. It is expected to continue with birth rates dropping within district boundaries, and the median age in the community at 55 years old.

"The numbers are the numbers, but can we change the way we approach it?" Singer said. 'Can we look at different options? Absolutely. I think everything should be on the table.

An email from Singer sent to Ocean View parents on Thursday afternoon said she has asked Conroy to work with staff, parents and community members to

develop a range of future options for the board to consider, relating to the district's ongoing declining

enrollment. The district serves primarily Huntington Beach, but also has campuses in Fountain Valley, Westminster and Midway City. All of the four affected campuses are in Huntington Beach.

The district has previously closed just one school during the decadelong enrollment drop, Sun View Elementary, which now serves as an alternate

Parents from each of the schools have banded together, creating a Facebook group called Huntington Beach Save Our Schools. Many of them wore neon Tshirts with that branding on Wednesday night.

"We are special, as all of our Ocean View schools are," Village View Parent Teacher Organization President Brandy Moore said af-Wednesday

meeting. "We have such a high special [education] number here, and I really feel like that helped them see that these are humans that you're doing this to. It was just paperwork, just another number, until they see that they're affecting real people.

"We're safe for one year. That doesn't mean the fight is over. We're all in it together. I support Circle, Golden Spring, schools]. I think they didn't realize, this board, how strong of a community they have here."

Parents at the Village View meeting expressed frustration both that they weren't involved earlier on in the process, and that it was moving so quickly. Some said the district needs to market itself more effectively, as it is continuously losing students to other options like Huntington Christian School and Kinetic Academy charter school.

A couple of parents suggested the district could move sixth-graders to the elementary schools. And Village View students like Abby Jimenez and Santiago Medina even offered their

input.
"What other options did you guys consider before deciding to consolidate our school?" Santiago asked. "We are a tight community.

I walk to and from school without worrying about something happening to me, because everyone knows everyone. We take care of one another."

Crystal Mayer is a parent at Circle View, which has the highest enrollment in the district and was named a National Blue Ribbon School in 2019. Each of the elementary schools possibly affected has its own highlights; Village View has an ambitious marine science program while Golden View offers its students a working farm with animals.

Mayer spoke at Tuesday night's Circle View meeting and felt compelled to speak again at Village View.
"I take it as a win," Mayer

said after Wednesday night's announcement. "Ít bought us a year, and the fight continues. I think this is what they should have done from the beginning, and they didn't, and they caused a lot of upheaval for a week.'

She said she is afraid that school closure and consolidation will continue being brought up, and admitted she's not confident that they can be avoided. Still, Mayer added that California is expanding its universal Transitional Kindergarten (TK) program, which could help increase enrollment.

'There's a lot more that

needs to be discussed," she said. "Maybe closing four schools didn't need to be the answer ... but I think it's amazing that something that seemed like a done deal for fall is not a done deal. Our kids know where they will be going to school in the fall, which is a comforting place for any parent

Melissa Overton has had three children already go through Golden View, and her last two are currently in second grade and fourth grade at the school.

She said Thursday that she would like to see the district go back to 20:1 class size ratios, which she sees as one way it can compete with local private schools.

Community Development Director Marc Wiener read a statement before the public was invited to speak on the resolution.

"The city's executive team condemns the recent act of vandalism directed towards our city manager," Wiener said. "We believe the act was intended to intimidate and harass her by personally attacking her home. Laguna Beach is a wonderful community filled with many caring and intelligent individuals, and this act was uncharacteris-

tic of our town. "While many staff do not live in town, we are still very much a part of the community and take pride in serving it. We were saddened by the recent acts directed towards our leader, and on some level, feel it was also directed towards the entire organization."

On Thursday, Feb. 9, Laguna Beach police responded to a report of vandalism at the city manager's residence. Authorities found a substance

with the appearance of feces or sewage smeared on the house, frontyard, planters, stairs and the path leading up to the home.

"I want to really thank ... the council majority for supporting the resolution condemning the vandalism on my property," Dupuis said. "This has truly been a very difficult time, and I've been stressed and anxious, but also I have felt really overwhelmed with the support that I received from the community."

Widespread community support has followed the incident, including the offering of a \$5,000 reward by the Laguna Beach Police and Community Foundation for information leading to an arrest and conviction related to the act of vandalism. Laguna Beach resident Jacob Cherub pledged another \$5,000 in reward money during

Tuesday's meeting.
Cherub found himself among a group of speakers who wished to know more about the ongoing investigation. Some also wondered why more had not been done to maintain civility during former council member Peter Blake's term.

"We really need to get to the bottom of this, and I really think before you do any kind of a resolution that is not completely generic that you should have reports from the police department," Cherub said. "I, as an individual, believe so strongly about this that I will put up an additional \$5,000 for the arrest and conviction of whoever did

this, so find these people." Council members addressed the need to differentiate between disagreement and acts of violence.

"As to the comments about prior inaction on my part, shortcomings, fostering the environment, ... if those are past omissions and failures, so be it," Whalen said. "That does not undermine or limit the need for this resolution now. ... [I] hope that we can move forward, as several have said, dial down the rhetoric, deal with the issues before us, and have good debate, good dialogue, and fewer personal attacks all the way around."

# Man accused of breaking into 2 C.M. homes pleads not guilty to charges

A 42-year-old man pleaded not guilty during an arraignment hearing Thursday to the charges of first-degree burglary and indecent exposure.

Prosecutors charged Jorge Antonio Henriquez-Trigueros, who is associated with addresses in both Anaheim and Santa Ana, with one count of assault with the intent to commit sexual offense, one count of first-degree burglary, two counts of indecent exposure with priors and two counts of attempted burglary of an inhabited dwelling.

All six charges are felonies.

Henriquez-Trigueros, arrested on Feb. 5, is alleged to have broken into two Costa Mesa homes on the 500 block of Fairfax Drive at around 3:15 a.m. that same day.

One victim was sexually assaulted, while Henriquez-Trigueros is alleged to have exposed himself to two others, according to a City News Service report.

Court records indicate that Henriquez-Trigueros has previously been to court before on other misdemeanor charges, including petty theft, shop-lifting and being in pos-

session or under the influence of a controlled substance for incidents between August and November last year.

Henriquez-Trigueros is expected to be at the West Justice Center in Westminster on April 13 for a pretrial hearing and again on April 27 for a preliminary hearing.

Schiff described himself and his current competition for the Senate as "good progressive candidates," during an interview following the event. But, he added, "What I like to think distinguishes me is my ability to get things done, to work with others on behalf of Californians."

Schiff told supporters his platform centered on "three existential challenges facing our state, facing our country and, indeed, the rest of the World. They are the economy, our democracy and our planet," he said.

He shared that when he was growing up, his family had been able to afford a house and an education for him and his brother on a single traveling salesman's salary. But now, many households with two people working full-time struggle to make ends meet.

"My Republican friends would like to believe, I suppose, or have others believe, that the challenges people face in the economy are just the result of impersonal market forces and Adam Smith's invisible hand," Schiff said. "But in fact,

they're the product of very discreet decisions, policy decisions we make that have structured the economy in a way that just doesn't work for millions of people."

He argued that even in the face of rising employment, elements of tax code that favor hedge fund managers and America's wealthiest citizens were contributing to inequality.

The congressman went on to note that when law-makers more than doubled the child income credit during the pandemic, the number of kids living in poverty in the U.S. fell by 40%. He said he would work toward other measures focused on providing relief to working class families.

Schiff later said he would like to see an end to the filibuster. He came out in favor of protecting natural resources and investing in green infrastructure in hope of stemming the effects of climate change. He also spoke in support of reproductive rights and gun safety legislation, as well as oversight over cable news networks to prevent the reporting of misleading theories or untruths as facts, specifically citing segments aired by Fox television host Tucker Carlson as exam-

"This is what I want to fight for in the Senate, and I will take on the Mitch Mc-

Connells and the Ted Cruzes and Josh Hawleys and anyone I need to to get these things done," he said.

He also said he would pursue accountability for what he characterized as abuses of power by the past administration. The congressman representing California's 30th Congressional district, which includes Hollywood, Glendale, a portion of Pasadena as well as the communities of Sunland and Tujunga, played a prominent role in the House Jan. 6 Commission.

Schiff described Donald Trump as a "demagogue" as well as a threat to democracy on Wednesday, and throughout a large portion of the former president's term in office. But despite his vocal opposition to the past administration, he said he has worked with Republicans before to pass meaningful legislation and will continue to seek common ground with colleagues on the other side of the aisle.

"People, Pre-Trump, viewed me as an expert on foreign policy, on national security, as very non partisan," Schiff said. "I don't think I've changed. What I saw was a president bent on tearing down our democracy, and I wasn't going to stand still."

seys.

"The program that we know today is there because of him," Pazanti added. "I'm just doing my best to keep it going. He just made Huntington Beach volleyball a family, and that was kind of the whole idea. When you left, you were a part of something."

Cammy said it was the same side of him that she saw when they were alone. His grandchildren were often seen crawling around him after matches in his days at Newport Harbor.

"He's a big, brown intimidating man, but he's tender and soft like a teddy bear," Cammy said. "Everyone is attracted to that. Kids are attracted to that. They don't look at him like this big, brown intimidating person. Kids see immediately [through] to his heart."

Cammy added that Rocky placed an emphasis on a common goal of team success.

"Everyone who's ever been coached by him would say that the depth of the experience of being coached by Rocky is that you exist at a very deep level if you're on one of his teams," she said. "There's no hierarchy of team members. It's a miracle the way he's able to do that."

Family and friends noted

that Ciarelli was a big fan of the rock band Grateful Dead. Dan Glenn, who coached with Ciarelli at Edison and then again at Newport Harbor, said he had been listening to their music since learning of Ciarelli's passing. Glenn said he remem-

Glenn said he remembered Ciarelli first as a teacher and then as the ultimate family man.

"There is some Zen to it and stuff like that," Glenn said of Ciarelli's nature. "That's kind of the magic of it — the patience and the ability to let kids fail, let them have their successes and failures on their own, and not just telling them what to do and getting them to figure out what to

do.

"The thing I love about Rock, and that's how I always measure a great coach: It's not how the players feel about them when they're playing for them. It's five years down the road. There's so many people who have reached out to me in the last two days, and he just had an impact on so many people."

The Ciarelli family would get together on Sundays for dinner. Rocky's older brother, Tony, who enjoyed a great deal of success as a throws coach in track and field, remarked that the weekly gathering was the last time he saw his brother.

They shared joys and sorrows over those dinners, and they shared similar coaching philosophies.

"It was always whatever it took — time, effort, emotions — trying to get the kids to buy in to understand that it takes that all-in type attitude to be successful because there's just a lot of competition," Ciarelli's brother, Tony, said. "It's really tough to win, even just on your own abilities, somebody who has a lot of abilities but doesn't know how to put it together, or a team that doesn't know how to work together as a team.

"Those are the kinds of things that obviously Rocky, especially, did a great job of getting them to work together as a unit and understand the effort that all of them had to make to be successful."

Ciarelli is survived by his wife Cammy, brother Tony, sister Paula, daughter Felicia, son Tony and three grandchildren — Camden, Ella and Maia.
