No uptick in cases from schools

County health officials say campus reopenings have so far not caused a big increase in new incidents of COVID-19.

Despite a spike in coronavirus infections that prevented Orange County from moving to the state's less restrictive orange reopening tier this week, health officials assure recent school reopenings have so far not contributed a significant number of new cases.

"We've really seen minimal COVID activity in the schools in our county," Matt Zahn, medical director for the Orange County Health Care Agency said in a news conference Thursday.

"We know that there's certainly the potential for cases — we're going to have cases in our schools," he continued, "but I think what we've seen so far has been quite encouraging."

Zahn stressed working with schools to identify positive cases and to quarantine those who may have been exposed will be a priority in the weeks ahead.

Orange County was placed in the "substantial transmission" red tier on Sept. 8 and was maintaining relatively low rates of new infections and positive tests, indicating it might move into the lower "moderate transmission" orange tier soon. But on Tuesday, officials reported an increase that thwarted progress.


Frank Kim, the county executive officer, said the shift from an average of 3.6 new cases per 100,000 residents to 4.4 cases this week, when distributed throughout Orange County's total population, amounted to only a slight daily uptick.

"What we're talking about is 30 or so cases spread across 800 square miles and 3.2 million people," Kim said. "We're not seeing a dramatic rise, let's say, in the college population or skilled nursing facility. It is happening broadly across the community."

Starting Tuesday, California counties will be required to meet a new metric to move tiers and expand reopenings, this time focusing on eliminating transmission disparities among those more impacted by the virus, including Latinos, essential workers and the socioeconomically disadvantaged.

To move into the yellow tier, Orange County will have to keep both its countywide positivity rate and the rate for those groups at or below 2%, while also keeping its case rate at or below 2 per 100,000 for

War Heroes on the Water' in Newport Beach honors vets

The third annual weekend-long fishing tournament is typically held in August. It is the first year it has had a boat parade.

Win or cruise for 30 veterans this weekend, the War Heroes on Water third annual fishing tournament is underway as 12 boats sailed out of Newport Harbor following a boat parade Thursday.

The boat parade, which began at the Newport Harbor turning basin at around 4 p.m., kicked off a weekend-long fishing tournament that will end with a military flyover Saturday evening to honor the participating veterans. Veterans come from parts of Southern California in light of travel concerns due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

This is the first year that the tournament has a boat parade, said tournament director Rod Halperin.

"Typically what we would do on the first night, we have a big fundraising party at [Anthony Hsieh's] home and we would have three or 400 people there, a silent auction. Everybody would get together and the community would be part of the event," Halperin said. "We can't have a big gathering like that, so what can we do to get the community involved? 'Well, we'll have a boat parade.'"

The parade included a national anthem salute and Halperin said that organizers wanted a way for the community to participate, whether sailing along in the boat parade with their boats or watching from their porches, and support the veterans.

The War Heroes on Water tournament began in 2018 when Hseih, loanDepot founder

and chief executive officer, decided to organize a tournament after taking seven veterans on a fishing trip to Cabo San Lucas and was inspired by what veterans said about how much the time spent on the water meant to them. The tournament is typically held in August and fundraises for veteran support programs throughout the country

programs throughout the country.

It partners with the Freedom Alliance, a national nonprofit for American veterans. Nicole Carrillo, who is in charge of sponsorships and fundraising for the tournament, said the tournament has raised over \$1 mil-

lion for the Freedom Alliance over the last three years.

Halperin said that organization for this year's tournament began immediately after the 2019 tournament, but that they decided to pivot in March to shrink the event down in favor of a reunion tournament, which includes returning veterans and yachts.

Organizers initially planned for 30 boats and 100 veterans to participate in the 2020 tournament, which was also planned for August but was delayed to October for safety

"The pandemic has been tough on everybody in America. Life is tough for these guys, day-by-day. You stack that on top of each other? Look, they needed it," Halperin said. "We needed it. It's important for continuity. It's important for these guys."

"The last thing we wanted to do, because we'd already planned it, is call these guys and say, 'Hey. We're going to pull out one more rug from under you.' We just weren't going to allow that to happen," Halperin said, adding that the team's taken an "abundance" of precaution in organizing the

Carrillo, who also oversees safety protocols, said that veterans were tested twice for COVID-19, once the week before the tournament and, again, the day of the start of the

Participants are isolated to their hotel rooms until it was start time Thursday afternoon, wherein veterans were then taken to Hseih's home and leave on their respective yachts. Crew members were also tested.

"When we say, 'War Heroes on Water,' the 'on water' part is real. They're going to get on the boat here Thursday afternoon? They're



The questions included anything from what was the last thing the candidates checked out from the Newport Beach public library — everyone reluctantly admitted they hadn't in years — to more serious discussions in the city such as the COVID-19 pandemic and plans from candidates on how to respond in the event of a second wave occurring in Orange County.

The Orange County Health Care Agency reported Thursday

that there have been a total of 1,129 cases and 25 deaths related to the coronavirus in Newport Beach.

All five candidates were in attendance, but only current Mayor Will O'Neill did not participate as he is running unopposed in his district.

Newport Beach council members represent districts, but are voted in at-large. Councilwoman

Wife of Costa Mesa High football coach Jimmy Nolan involved in deadly collision wakes up from her surgery

Costa Mesa High School football coach Jimmy Nolan indicated late last week that the frequency of Facebook updates regarding his family's condition would slow down until he witnessed a "small victory."

Some good news came Tuesday morning, as Nolan posted that his wife, Taran, smiled when he kissed her after she made it through tracheostomy surgery the night before.

Taran and three of the Nolan family's four children were involved in a head-on collision in South Carolina on Sept. 10 that killed their youngest daughter, Micki, and the driver of the other car, Glendora Holmes. The Nolan family's other two children, Jimmy Jr. and Daisy, survived the crash

"7pm was told surgery was
approaching (that could mean
7:15pm or lam) ... gave Tar kiss
and went to neuro icu lobby,"
Nolan said on Facebook, "Did

some pacing."

Nolan wrote that he waited for six hours before checking on his wife and finding out that she had made it through the operation.

"Tar was heavily sedated," Nolan added in the post. "I left to lobby, so I wouldn't get in their way. Paced until I thought her meds might wear off."

The next time he dropped in to see how his wife was doing, Nolan got a pleasant surprise at last.

"Went back in about 4:15am, with a bad feeling ... she was out," Nolan wrote. "I leaned over to give her a real light kiss (not to wake her) — Her eyes immediately popped wide open and she smiled! I honestly thought I was having a heart attack. Horrible day or two turned beautiful ... wife is life. We got this. VICTORY."

As of last Friday, Nolan said on Facebook that his wife had been on a ventilator and un-

not getting off the boat until Sunday. They're living on that boat with them, Halperin said. "Everybody on the boat's passed COVID [tests] twice and they're staying on the boat.'

When participants return Sunday, they'll be taken back to the hotel until the awards dinner, which will be spread outdoors with the exception of those that were on the same yachts together.

Freedom Alliance director of programming Josh Miles said that the organization received a "ton" of interest in the tournament. He said it wasn't difficult to convince returning participants to come.

"The guys just jumped out. It's such a good experience and that's a testament to all the War Heroes on Water folks and the experience the guys get," said Miles, who is also a Marine Corps veteran.

"It's unlike anything I've ever been a part of. We do

a lot of different events throughout the year. Freedom Alliance, rehabilitative retreats and things of that nature, but this is something unlike anything else."

Mike Nares, an army veteran and program officer for the Freedom Alliance, said that he felt the camaraderie on the yachts between veterans was an appeal. Miles added that he felt what made the tournament unique was the bond that it made between the civilian community and the veterans participating.

Miles said that he saw veterans and civilian crew members was like a little "brotherhood," adding that people contact boat owners and captains that they've met or other people that they've met as a result of the tournament to go to lunch.

"Being with your brothers in arms again. We all get away from that because we're civilians again. We don't have that and when we all get together, it's like being back in the service," Nares said.

"They reach out to each other and they feed off of each other," Miles said. "Though we're healing from different kinds of wounds, everybody's got something going on and we can all get together and heal together — civilian and military. It's really cool."



Joy Brenner represents District 6, which includes the estimated 11,909 residents in Corona del Mar.

Seats are currently open on the City Council for District 2, which includes New-Heights/Cliffhaven and West Newport, and

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District 5, which includes Balboa Island. O'Neill is running for reelection for District 7, which includes Newport Coast.

The forum itself was split into three sections, with the first round focused on introductory questions. The second round of questions included inquiries about candidates' experience in local community organizations, fire mitigation, homelessness, the regional housing needs assessment numbers and questions specific to Corona del Mar such as one-way streets, resident parking and traffic.

The third round, so dubbed the "lightning round," asked candidates to hold up signs indicating "yes" or "no" for their opinions on rapid-fire topics. Some questions required elaboration of answers.

Questions for the lightning round included regulation of sidewalks from bikes and e-bikes, view preservation, creation of a traffic commission, adding a beer garden to the Corona del Mar Christmas Walk, changes to the city's campaign financing laws and whether or not the city is doing enough to respond to sea level rise.

The forum closed on a brief debate on Measure Z, which will be on the ballot Nov. 3. The measure, if approved, would amend the city's charter and establish the Harbor Commission as a city-appointed board and commission.

O'Neill spoke in support of the measure, asking readers to read the direct language, while local government watchdog Jim Mosher argued against it, describing the measure as "poorly written and unnecessary."

Other candidates were also asked to weigh in on whether or not they were in support of Measure Z during the lightning round.

COMPLETION OF WORK AND LIQUIDATED DAMAGES: All work is to be completed in a total of THIRTY (30) working days, excluding holidays, from the date specified in the Notice to Proceed, which is anticipated to be January 4, 2021. Liquidated damages shall be \$1,000 per calendar day.

CONTRACTOR'S LICENSE CLASSIFICATION: The Contractor shall possess a valid **Class A, General Engineering**, Contractor License at the time of submitting bids, in accordance with provisions of Chapter 9, Division III of the California Business and Profession's Code.

WAGE RATE REQUIREMENTS: In accordance with the provisions of Sections 1773.2 of the California Labor Code, copies of the general prevailing rate of per diem wages as determined by the State Director of Industrial Relations are available on the Internet at the World Wide Web site of the State Department of Industrial Relations at www.dir.ca.gov under Statistics and Research. It shall be mandatory upon the contractor to whom the contract is awarded and upon any subcontractor under him to pay not less than said specified rates to all workers employed by them in the execution of the contract. All parties to the contract shall be governed by all provisions of the California Labor Code relating to prevailing wage rates; Sections 1770-1781 inclusive

RETAINAGE FROM PAYMENTS: The Contractor may elect to receive 100 percent of payments due under the Contract Documents from time to time, without retention of any portion of the payments by the City, by depositing securities of equivalent value with the City in accordance with the provisions of Section 22300 of the Public Contract Code.

No contractor or subcontractor may be awarded a contract for public work on a public works project (awarded on or after April 1, 2015) unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5. This project is subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the Department of Industrial Relations.
