California Nurses Assn. rallies for patients and community

It has been nearly five months since the health crisis that is the novel coronavirus was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization in March.

Those treating patients for COVID-19, the disease caused by the virus, rallied for better safety protections for nurses, healthcare workers and patients on Wednesday at Kindred Hospital Westminster, one of a handful of protests held during the day outside of medical facilities in Orange County.

The protests came as part of a national day of action in which the California Nurses Assn. said it was fighting for patients and the communities it serves. It was the second protest to be carried out at Kindred Hospital following a demonstration of about 30 employees there last month when 16 workers had reportedly contracted the coronavirus.

Clarissa Cruz, 51, of Cypress said nurses in the hospital have had to treat both COVID and non-COVID patients on the same shift.

"We believe it is really unsafe to do that," Cruz said. "We could spread the infection from one patient to another patient, and also, the nurses, if they don't have the proper [personal protective equipment] for the COVID patients, then they could also get it. They could get exposed."

Non-reusable N-95 masks are among

the equipment the nurses are seeking, Cruz added. The hospital currently provides a new N-95 mask daily to staff members who enter a patient's room.

Jewell Russell, 55, of Anaheim, said she has not slept in the same bed as her husband since the start of the pandemic and spoke of the abundance of caution she takes just to be around her family.

"Sometimes I come home at 3 o'clock in the morning after working a double shift,

and I literally have to [take off my clothes] in the garage, and I put my clothes in a special area," Russell said.

"Then I walk upstairs, I get into a scalding hot shower, cleaning every orifice in my body, [and] go to bed. Then when I wake up in the morning, if I have to come back to work, I take another shower, but if I'm not, I take another shower just to be

Huntington Beach shelter set to open in November

The Huntington Beach City Council voted 6-0 on Monday night to take action to begin operation of an expanded 174-bed homeless shelter facility.

The facility, located at 17631 Cameron Lane and 17642 Beach Blvd., would be larger than the original 75-bed proposal.

City Manager Oliver Chi said that city staff has been negotiating to lease the Beach site to

facilitate the larger facility, which would meet U.S. District Court Judge David O. Carter's ruling that 60% of the current homeless population — estimated at 289 people in 2019 — have shelter beds before the city can enforce anti-camping, anti-loitering ordinances.

Councilman Erik Peterson was absent from the meeting, but several of the other council members in attendance praised Chi and city staff for

their work on establishing the shelter.

It would be run by Mercy House Living Centers, with an estimated first-year cost of \$2.6 million, and is scheduled to open on Nov. 2.

The city can afford it, as it has received about \$4.2 million of restricted COVID-19 funding, though Community Development Block Grant and SB2 funds would also be used for the contract with Mercy House.

Huntington Beach has been trying to seriously assess homeless-related issues since late 2013, Chi said in a presentation to the council, and has considered 35 different shelter sites over the last several years.

"We've been looking at all of these options and trying to find a fit, trying to find the right solution," Councilman Patrick Brenden said. "I think none of us would disagree with

School district lays out a game plan

Newport-Mesa officials provide scenarios for online learning in 2020-21, but also share protocols for possible in-person learning.

As the Newport-Mesa Unified School District inches toward the Aug. 24 start of school, officials are sketching a clearer picture of what instruction will look like as students return to distance learning and how those plans would shift if in-person classes were to resume.

Interim Supt. Russell Lee-Sung, district staff and administrators attempted to address a flood of questions posed in 223 public comments submitted to the board Tuesday before a 9 a.m. deadline. Topics raised included special education lessons to teacher sick time to the suggestion of pushing the start of school back to September.

"We will try and answer as many questions as we can today," Lee-Sung assured. "There may be things that change, and there are details that still need to be worked out."

To help address an overflow of inquiries, Newport-Mesa officials scheduled a public forum Wednesday night and promised to do their best to respond to specific questions. They referred parents to a 2020-21

NMUSD board promotes Lee-Sung

Members approve two-year contract to hire him as superintendent, but some question the move and its timing.

Newport-Mesa Unified School District board members agreed Tuesday to hire Interim Supt.

Russell Lee-Sung as superintendent through June 2022, overriding concerns from the public about the prudence of the decision and a claim from the teachers union the move violates board policy.

According to a contract approved in a 6-1 vote, Lee-Sung will serve in the position from Aug. 1 through June 30, 2022, and earn an annual salary of \$298,000 plus benefits.

A provision in the agreement states the administrator could receive up to six months' pay should the district

Fountain Valley finding ways to keep the community involved

The coronavirus pandemic has kept people in their homes for much of the warm-weather months.

The city of Fountain Valley is not lacking creativity in keeping its community involved during these unprecedented times.

A drive-in showing of "Sonic the Hedgehog" was held at Mile Square Park to open the month of August last Saturday. The event was \$20 per car and allowed families to partake in a favorite pastime that has been missing — going to the movies.

"I think, for me, it was cool because I have lived in the city so long," said Jason Ross, 49, who graduated from Fountain Valley High School in 1989. "When we

moved to this city, one of my first movies was at the Fountain Valley Drive-in, the original one, and it was the re-release of 'The Jungle Book,' back in 1978.

"I was probably 6 or 7, and I had never been to a drive-in movie with my kids, so it was really neat to be able to take my daughter and her friend and just share some of that history and nostalgia."

Rob Frizzelle, Fountain Valley's community services director, said that a production company was hired to put up a 60-by-40-foot screen. Cars registered with the size of their vehicle, and they were accordingly arranged on the grass for visibility.

Moviegoers had to wear a mask when using the restroom, and they were asked to stay in their

vehicles at all other times.

"Our goal all together is trying to find ways to enhance quality of life and community connectiveness during this pandemic because that sort of thing is important," Frizzelle said. "It's difficult to do these days because obviously you can't bring people together in traditional ways, but we're just looking to amend our service delivery model and find creative ways to ultimately enhance the quality of life here in Fountain Valley for our community."

Up next, the city is putting on the "FV Campout at Home" this coming Saturday. Campout kits will be provided to the first 200 residents who sign up for the vir-



Entrance to Newport Harbor in line for a dredge and repair

The entrance to Newport Harbor is due for a dredge and jetty repair this winter.

The city of Newport Beach will work with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to reinforce the nearly century-old concrete-and-rock jetty on the eastern, or Corona del Mar, side of the harbor entrance and scoop out enough accumulated sediment in the entrance channel to make the waterway 20 feet deep. The project should cost about \$3 million.

City public works manager Chris Miller, who oversees infrastructure projects in the harbor, said the work to repair chipped concrete is relatively easy but there's a lot of it, covering a work area about 700 feet long and 12 feet wide with a 15-foot footing, from the base seaward. The large rocks armoring the breakwater will also be replenished, with

stone trucked in from a quarry in Riverside County.

The tremendous force of the ocean, especially when it churns during heavy winter storms, can knock the stones loose, Miller said.

"They're designed and engineered to resist movement as much as possible, and when [workers] place them, they don't haphazardly place them. They try to interlock them," he told the city Parks, Beaches & Recreation commission Tuesday during a presentation on the repairs. But "you can see the rocks have sloughed down."

The entrance to Newport Harbor has been calmed by jetties since 1918, starting along the western side at the Wedge. The eastern jetty came along in the late 1920s to early 1930s, and both legs have been extended and repaired over the years, although the last documented repairs to the east side were in 1948, Miller

said. In addition to the jetty maintenance, crews will remove about 70,000 cubic yards of sand from the entrance channel floor and deposit it back into open ocean just outside the surf zone near Balboa Pier, allowing it to naturally return directly to the beach.

The project will go out to bid next week and work should begin in November, with an estimated completion in March.

Miller said any leftover money could be used to dredge farther north into the harbor's main channel. The entrance channel dredge is separate of a larger, more complicated and much more expensive anticipated dredge of the main harbor that has been in the works for years. That big dig would remove 17 times more silt, mostly in the western area of the harbor, and could cost \$20 million to \$23 million.

around them. I cover my car seat in plastic. My shoes are always left outside.”

Russell added that her union is nationally supporting the HEROES Act before Congress. She said the legislation would “ensure that we have proper [personal protective equipment] that was manufactured in the United States.”

At a time where social movements and activism have come to the forefront following the death of George Floyd while in police custody in Minneapolis, one protester yelled, “Good trouble,” in homage to Rep. John Lewis, the late Georgia congressman who was recognized as a civil rights leader.

That protester was Ron Herron, 55, of Lake Forest, who has been a registered nurse for 25 years and recently joined the staff at Kindred Hospital Westminster.

“As far as John Lewis, voices need to be heard,” Herron said. “In the end, even though I might not be around to see its fruit, it will bear fruit in the end.”

Herron said he has bought his own personal protective equipment, including a powered air-purifying respirator, which filters the virus. Russell also said she had bought the same device, which she said cost about \$600.

After more than two decades in the healthcare industry, Herron was asked what makes COVID-19 a unique adversary.

“The part about patients dying alone is heartbreaking,” Herron said. “I literally had the first COVID patient in this hospital in the ICU, and I had to call the two daughters, one in North Carolina and one in Florida, and it was just heartbreaking, putting them on speaker phone.”

“Actually, on the second

call to the second daughter, the patient passed away. She was able to get out half of what she wanted to say to him. That one is just heartbreaking for families, not being able to come in. It gets me.”

Westminster City Councilman Sergio Contreras joined the protesters and told them that they were fighting “the good fight.”

“This is really, I think, to me, a life-and-death type of fight,” Contreras said. “When we put these workers at risk, we’re endangering their lives and our community. We’re all connected. If you look at the infection rate, no one’s immune.”

“I think this hospital has to do more to make sure that they have the proper

isolation and staffing to be able to properly care for these patients.”

Contreras added that he believes Orange County needs to show more leadership in fighting the virus, saying that testing is “almost inaccessible for the average person.”

The Orange County Health Care Agency reported 12 COVID-19 deaths and 65 new cases of the coronavirus in its latest numbers released Wednesday.

The death toll due to COVID-19 in the county stands at 665, and the cumulative number of coronavirus cases is 38,131.

Currently, there are 536 hospitalizations due to the virus, with 172 of those patients in an intensive care unit.

The healthcare agency reported an additional 5,075 coronavirus tests in the last day, bringing the total number of tests administered to 444,757. An estimated 27,197 recoveries have been made county-wide from a battle with the virus.

In a statement, Julie Myers, the CEO of Kindred Hospital Westminster, said that all patients who have not previously tested pos-

itive are tested upon admission. She added that testing has been offered to all hospital employees, and temperature and symptom screenings are being conducted for every individual that enters the facility.

Myers added that the hospital has offered “hero pay” premium incentives to employees who care for COVID-19 patients, an offer she said the union has rejected to date.

“Kindred Hospital Westminster’s top priority is to protect the health and safety of our patients and employees,” Myers said in the statement.

“As a long-term acute care hospital, Kindred Westminster specializes in providing ventilator care and weaning acutely ill patients, which is particularly important for patients recovering from COVID-19. With encouragement from the California Department of Public Health, the hospital is proudly providing support to our community by offering care, in specially designated areas of the hospital, to those recovering from the COVID-19 virus, thereby helping to free up critically needed beds in our local ICUs.

“From a clinical standpoint, we are meeting or exceeding all of the CDC’s guidelines and taking every possible precaution to minimize exposure to COVID-positive patients. We remain committed to protecting and supporting our selfless and dedicated teams on the front lines of this health crisis.”

The National Union of Healthcare Workers is expected to hold a protest outside of Fountain Valley Regional Hospital on Thursday.

school reopening plan intended to act as a primer for the year ahead.

At Tuesday’s meeting, administrators provided a progress report to board members and the broader school community on a 100% virtual “Cloud Campus” opening this year and how it differs from the regular distance learning students will be doing in a multilevel learning plan that will transition from online to in-person instruction as coronavirus infection levels fluctuate.

They identified new state guidelines for distance learning, which outline daily live interaction between teachers and students, recommend regular attendance and set minimal daily instructional minute requirements by grade level — 180 minutes for kindergartners, 230 minutes for grades one through three and 240 minutes for grades four through 12.

In a joint presentation on the Cloud Campus versus distance learning, officials walked through two sample days and highlighted similarities and differences. Synchronous learning, where teachers work live online with classes or small groups, and asynchronous, independent study will likely be blocked into different parts of the day in both models they described.

While the Cloud Campus schedule would be more adaptable to individual students, distance learning will need to mirror the traditional school day more closely to allow for a transition to in-person or hybrid-model classes throughout the year, explained John Drake, director of curriculum and instruction.

“The biggest difference is really in the flexibility,”

Drake said. “It will be less flexible in distance learning, because we want to be able to transition back into a scheduled day as would normally be in place when we return back in person.”

Newport-Mesa parents have been issued intent to participate forms and are asked to decide whether they will commit to a full year at the Cloud Campus by Friday.

Officials also shared what safety measures would be put in place if and when students and teachers are allowed to return to campuses. Plans are subject to change, since it is unknown whether a return is likely to happen this year.

School sites would enforce social distancing and mask wearing for students in grades three through 12 at all times except while eating and drinking. Facial coverings would be made available if students or teachers do not have their own, and anyone who refused to wear a mask would be sent home.

Plexiglass dividers would be placed in front offices, and foot traffic would be guided by signs to prevent people from clustering.

Volunteers would have limited access, and high-touch areas like water fountains and playground equipment would be off limits. Additional custodial crews would regularly disinfect surfaces.

In classrooms, smaller student groups would be prohibited from sharing items and would maintain 6 feet of distance. Bus transportation would first go to special education students, and routes would be limited, while recess would focus on activities not requiring physical contact or equipment sharing.

“We will have recess — it’s important for kids to get outside and move around,” Lee-Sung said.

“Initially we have to say that playground equipment may be off limits. At some point, once we develop our routines, I can foresee some of our equipment being reopened.”

Leona Olson, assistant superintendent of Human Resources, walked meeting participants through what health screenings would look like and what would happen if students or teachers came to school with symptoms.

Teachers and students will be asked to perform temperature checks before coming to campus and would perform a brief intake process upon arriving to school. Anyone with a temperature above 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit, or exhibiting virus-like symptoms, would be sent home as an excused absence.

Students with symptoms would be isolated for immediate pickup, Olson added.

NMUSD Health Services Director Merry Graska outlined procedures for reporting and addressing positive coronavirus cases on campus. Anyone who’s been exposed to a positive individual for more than 15 minutes without social distancing will be asked to self-quarantine for 14 days.

If one person in a class tests positive, the teacher and students would quarantine. If 5% of a school’s population tests positive, the entire school will shift to distance learning for 14 days. If one in four Newport-Mesa schools report a 5% or higher positive rate, the entire district would transition to 14 days of distance learning.

“I’m going to ask for a team approach in adhering to this, whether you’re an employee or a student or a visitor,” Lee-Sung said. “We’re all in this together, because what one person does affects others.”

our community that this is the most pressing issue we face, and all of us share the frustration of not having been able to make anything go until now. But you know, sometimes the best solutions take time ... and I think that’s exactly what’s happened here.”

While both the Cameron and Beach locations do have soil contamination present, Chi said the Orange County Public Health Agency found that it would be safe to operate a shelter on the site if an asphalt pavement cover is placed over the soil.

A proposal by Peterson to construct a temporary facility on Gothard Avenue was tabled 5-2 at the last council meeting on July 20.

Chi said that though the Cameron site has been de-

layed since a 75-bed facility was approved in April, getting an alternate site up and running would take as many as 18 weeks.

“Just hearing everyone talk tonight really makes me think about this process that we’ve been through, and how the community has come along so far to understanding how necessary this shelter is,” Mayor

Lyn Semeta said. “We got so much resistance in the early days. The community was frightened about the whole concept, and so I think we’ve come such a long way in helping them understand the necessity of doing this, as well as the humanitarian necessity. If we’re going to be able

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

CITY TO CLOSE THIRD BLOCK OF MAIN STREET

Council members voted 6-0 on Monday to close the third block of Main Street temporarily to vehicular traffic, to support local businesses looking to operate outdoors.

Businesses would be allowed to operate in the

streets on the affected block, between Orange and Olive avenues.

The second block of Main Street is already closed to vehicles after the council voted to close it on July 6, and the program has been well-received, Chi said.

Semeta also announced five recipients of the Mayor's HB Excellence Award, a monthly award which had been stopped since March due to COVID-19.

Winners included princi-

pal civil engineer Debbie DuBow, police Sgt. Jerry Goodspeed, senior administrative analyst Kevin Justen, police Officer Anthony Pham and signs and marketing crew leader Terry Tintle. They were nominated by their fellow employees.

“We asked all of the employees to think about who really stepped up, who went the extra mile during COVID and deserves some extra recognition for that,” Semeta said.

terminate him without cause.

Board President Martha Fluor explained options were considered during multiple closed session meetings. Lee-Sung's selection followed an in-person interview and was vetted through the district's legal counsel.

Fluor said the promotion would provide stability through the continuing coronavirus pandemic. With three board seats up for election in November (Fluor in Trustee Area 3, Vicki Snell in Area 1 and Dana Black in Area 6), it would also save potential new board members from having to add a nationwide superintendent search to an already steep learning curve.

“This two-year contract will give the newly constituted board in November time to adjust to their new roles and responsibilities and understand school board governance, evaluating Mr. Lee-Sung in 2021 and focusing their attention on the ongoing coronavirus,” Fluor read from a board statement.

But nearly 20 people who spoke in public comment prior to the vote questioned the soundness of foregoing a traditional nationwide search for a replacement for former Supt. Fred Navarro, who retired July 31 after eight years helming

the district.

Many urged the board to consider a one-year contract that would give a newly formed board more of a say in its own leadership.

“Allowing a temporary superintendent to be given a two-year contract is ridiculous,” said commenter Martha O'Meara. “Give him a one-year contract and start a superintendent search in the next few months. This would allow the new school board to have some input.”

Tamara Fairbanks, president of the Newport-Mesa Federation of Teachers, said promoting an internal candidate without posting the position publicly could be a violation of equal employment opportunities laws and the district's own policy on superintendent recruitment and selection.

Board Policy 2120 states the board shall establish a search and selection process that considers community input and includes advertising the vacancy and the recruitment of qualified candidates.

“The input of NMFT and other important stakeholders are not being taken into account,” Fairbanks said in her comment. “Board Policy 2120 is being violated by this agenda item. All stakeholder groups should be highly involved in the selection process.”

Legal counsel Spencer Covert explained the board was within its rights to promote Lee-Sung without adhering to the policy, which outlines guidelines but doesn't give mandates.

“One of the guidelines that is in there is the ability to promote from within,” Covert said.

“There is no legal requirement to post and advertise for position of school superintendent —

ultimately, it's going to be the decision of the board how it wants to fill this position.”

Board members largely supported the contract, praising Lee-Sung's leadership and problem-solving skills demonstrated since his arrival in 2015 as Newport-Mesa's associate superintendent and chief human resource officer.

In five years, the administrator has risen swiftly through several high-level positions.

Appointed acting associate superintendent and chief academic officer in July 2016, Lee-Sung was serving as deputy superintendent by the following year.

He remained in that position until this July, when officials announced Navarro's impending retirement and named him acting superintendent.

On Tuesday, Lee-Sung thanked the board and affirmed his “proud record” of increasing student achievement.

“I would love an opportunity to be able to meet people ... and, more importantly, for me to listen and to build those bridges and keep our district not only stabilized, but moving forward and bringing it to higher levels than it's ever been,” he said.

Trustee Ashley Anderson, who cast the lone dissenting vote, said she would have preferred to see a one-year contract.

She also questioned the board's failure to post the position.

“There are other people on staff who may have wanted to apply and could have come in and been stable [for] our district, but they didn't have that opportunity,” Anderson said.
