Could Orange County schools reopen in fall with no masks?

Orange County schools could welcome students back to campus this fall — without social distancing or masks — after the education leaders on Monday approved recommendations that sharply contrast reopening plans outlined by their counterparts in Los Angeles and San Diego.

In a 4-1 vote, members of the Orange County Board of Education, with trustee

Board of Education members say they believe a return to the campuses is the best course for children, in part because science has shown youth are not at great risk of contracting COVID-19.

Beckie Gomez dissenting, said they believe a return to schools is the best course for children, in part because science has shown those in the school-age crowd are not at great risk of contracting COVID-19.

Their guidelines — which call for daily temperature checks, frequent hand washing

and use of hand sanitizer, in addition to the nightly disinfection of classrooms, offices and transportation vehicles, among other measures — oppose orders issued by the Orange County Department of Education.

Lawmakers question board's recommendation

A group of legislators is asking the Orange County Board of Education Tuesday to explain its recent recommendation for the countywide reopening of schools without distancing and masks, expressing concerns about the ramifications of the decision on health and safety.

In a letter issued Tuesday by Rep. Harley Rouda (D-Long Beach), Linda Sanchez (D-Whittier), Katie Porter (D-Irvine) and three other congressional Democrats, lawmakers requested a briefing with board members and Orange County Health Care Agency officials on the guidelines released Monday.

"We are deeply concerned by the Board's decision to not address the health threats that COVID-19 poses to our communities with its recommendations to reopen schools without the use of face masks, social distancing or reduced class sizes," the letter reads.

It went on to point out that as of Monday, a total of 1,382 cases of the coronavirus had been reported among children under age 17.

As of Tuesday, that figure had jumped to 1,436.

Board members approved the recommendations in a 4-1 vote, paving the way for Orange County school districts, should they

choose, to reopen in August without smaller class cohorts and with no 6-foot distancing measures or mask rules in place.

Irvine first O.C. city with drive-up COVID-19 testing

Irvine became the first city in Orange County to open a drive-up testing site Monday, as COVID-19 numbers continued to steadily increase.

Gov. Gavin Newsom announced during his daily news conference that all of California's counties would be closing indoor dining and bars, family entertainment centers, zoos and museums, effective immediately. Most

counties, including Orange and Los Angeles, also will be reclosing gyms, churches, hair salons, malls and other businesses.

There were 865 more positive cases of the coronavirus reported Tuesday by the Orange County Health Care Agency, and nine deaths. That brings the cumulative case count to 26,120, including 1,355 skilled nursing facility residents, 432 Orange County jail inmates and 119 people experi-

encing homelessness.

The cumulative death toll from COVID-19 in the county since the pandemic began in March is now 433. There are 712 cases currently hospitalized, a number that is the highest single-day total during the pandemic, including 237 patients in intensive care units.

Testing has continued to increase, as there have now been 324,479 total tests administered in the county. Roughly 100,000 of those have taken place since June 19.

The testing facility in Irvine, located at Orange County Great Park parking lot No. 6, is offered to people who either live or work in Irvine, whether symptomatic or asymptomatic. It is open from Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and is by appointment only, with up to 260 PCR tests being administered per day via nasal or oral swab before being handed to a medical pro-

Owners try to deal with the latest shutdown

Gov. Gavin Newsom announced statewide restrictions Monday on multiple businesses as coronavirus cases surge.

Susie Smith was forced to shut down her Makin' Waves Salon on Main Street in Huntington Beach at close of business Monday.

Smith is not sure when the downtown Surf City fixture will be allowed to reopen, after California Gov. Gavin Newsom's Monday order rolling back the reopening of the state during the coronavirus pandemic.

Newsom's order halted all indoor dining and closed bars, zoos and museums statewide. In many counties, including Orange and Los Angeles, gyms, houses of worship, hair salons, malls and other businesses were forced to reclose.

"It's indefinite, and that's really scary," Smith said.

Smith said she thought she could take her salon business outside, like many restaurants have, but she received notice from the California State Board of Barbering and Cosmetology stating otherwise.

"We feel like we're being penalized for something we didn't do," she said, speaking for salon owners. "We've been so clean, and we're so careful. We feel like it's unfair for our industry."

"Stylists are just going to do

Bicyclist killed in H.B. crash, driver arrested

A driver was arrested Tuesday in Huntington Beach after allegedly fatally hitting a bicyclist and fleeing the scene, police said.

The Huntington Beach Police Department said it responded to a report of a traffic collision involving a vehicle and a bicycle at 12:25 a.m. Tuesday, near the corner of Beach Boulevard and Sunrise Drive.

Police found a male bicyclist in the roadway, and he was pronounced dead by responding paramedics, HBPD Sgt. Joshua Page said. The involved vehicle was later located and the driver arrested for fleeing the scene.

Police did not release the names of the deceased or the arrested driver.

The investigation is ongoing, Page said, and being investigated by the HBPD Multidisciplinary Accident Investigation Team. Anyone with information is asked to contact traffic Investigator Doug Demetre at (714) 536-5670.

The guidelines — which call for regular temperature checks, hand-washing and sanitizing as well as nightly disinfection of school campus surfaces — were compiled in a white paper published following a June 24 community forum, “Opening Schools in Orange County.”

That document attempted to demonstrate an imbalance between children's low risk for catching and spreading the coronavirus and the harm that widespread lockdowns and isolation are having on young people's learning as well as social and emotional well-being.

“Continuing the shutdown despite new science and data, our experts said, has been a mistake with disastrous implications for children, their families and community,” the paper stated.

An 11-member panel of physicians, educators and

policy makers who spoke at the June 24 forum, including Orange County Health Care Agency Director Dr. Clayton Chau, listened to parents who shared their concerns about the possible continuation of distance learning in the fall — the option selected Monday by officials with Los Angeles and San Diego unified school districts.

Panelist and Los Angeles-area emergency physician Simone Gold said science doesn't support social distancing or masks, the latter of which she likened to “wearing a chain-link fence to keep out a mosquito.”

“It is, therefore, up to you with the consent and advice and pressure of the parents to do what's in the best interest of our children,” she said.

In their letter, lawmakers questioned how the white paper concluded masks may be harmful to children. One meta-analysis study cited by the document, Face Masks to Prevent Transmission of Influenza Virus: A Systematic Review,

was published in 2010.

“What evidence and research are the Board citing with this statement?” the letter posed. “Did the Board review any emerging evidence, especially the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's] emerging evidence cited for the effectiveness of cloth face coverings?”

The letter's authors also sought clarification on metrics for reopening, responding to instances of infection and the involvement of teachers, staff members and union representatives in the decision-making process.


It is unclear what process board members or panelists engaged in while compiling the white paper or if questions posed by the public were ever answered. Board President Ken Williams said he and Vice President Mari Barke convened the forum but could not be reached Tuesday for comment.



The recommendations do not support distancing learners and requiring face masks, two tenets put forth by the county department's “Orange County Together” guidelines.

Board Vice President Mari Barke and colleagues clarified the board's suggestions were compiled from a June 24 community forum that convened an 11-member panel of health and policy experts selected by board members and drew more than 1,000 in-person and online attendees.

“Our constituents expect leadership from us, and so we wanted to present the information to you,” Burke said. “These are simply guidelines to be looked at and to follow according to what's best for your family — take it for what it is and do what you're most comfortable with.”

Following last month's forum, advisory guidelines were compiled in a white paper that called distance learning an “utter failure” that revealed class disparities and inspired irregular attendance, at best, and cast social distancing measures and mask-wearing more of a harm than a help.

“K-12 children represent the lowest risk cohort for COVID-19. Because of that fact social distancing of children and reduced census in classrooms is not necessary and, therefore, not recommended,” the document stated.

“Requiring children to wear masks during school is not only difficult — if not impossible to implement — but not based on science,” it continued. “It may even be harmful and is, therefore, not recommended.”

The white paper suggests if a school district is unwilling to provide the environment parents feel is best suited to their children's needs, that parents be allowed “to send their children to a district or charter school that will provide that education.”

Monday's discussion drew a massive response from members of the public, who emailed more than 2,000 comments to the board. Nearly two dozen in-person commenters addressed the board directly.

Most were parents effusive in their support for the board's “bravery and diligence.” Many of them stressed not only the education component of their youngsters returning to a phys-

ical campus, but also their emotional and mental well-being.

“What we know about online schooling is that it is ineffective,” said a speaker named Leigh. Board policy does not allow broadcasting of last names. She and others worry about disadvantages plaguing children stuck at home, especially among low-income families who may not have online access.

Jennifer, the mother of a daughter who's a special-education teacher, said she's especially concerned about “months of lost services” for kids who receive one-on-one attention in classrooms due to their disabilities.

“Disney World opened this weekend, and their lawyer must know something we don't know,” she added, citing an American Academy of Pediatrics recommendation that advocates “all policy decisions in the coming school year should start with a goal of having students physically present in school.”

Casey, a mother with two children enrolled at Tustin Unified School District, described at-home learning as “a disaster,” adding that her youngsters soon “became addicted to technology” and wrestling the iPad away from their hands was a constant challenge.

Other parents said they had witnessed the transformation of healthy, well-adjusted and active kids, turning completely “opposite” — or that they had drained their children's college savings account to pay for private education after the closure of many public schools in mid-March.

“I'm begging you how to figure out how to keep our kids in school,” said Margo, mom to a rising junior at Foothill High School in Santa Ana. She fears an increase in alcohol or drug abuse among families forced to isolate themselves and their youngsters from a regular classroom environment.

Erica, the mother of special-needs children, called wearing masks “a distraction. They hide faces and they hide smiles. Plus, they are not effective.” Moreover, she said “teaching young developing minds not to socialize is a crime.”

Justin, who has a nephew who's been thriving while studying from home, said he actually appreciates the opportunity for the child to come into his own, away from “social stressors” in class. Out in society now rampant with “white supremacy” and “gun owners,” he asked: “What

happens when you try to reintroduce kids into a world like this, one we're trying to fix?”

Crystal, another speaker, cited the example of 36 countries around the world that have reopened schools “and they have not shown a significant spike” of COVID-19. “My children and dozens of friends will not be attending schools if masks are required.”

Tiffany, mother of a kindergarten, questioned whether it's “reasonable that a child should be denied a proper education ... be denied the opportunity to work on group projects” and go on field trips. She also asked why kids should “be taught to fear the very air that they breathe?”

Monday's summations stand in marked contrast to recent steps taken at Los Angeles and San Diego unified school districts, where leaders announced Monday campuses would not reopen in August and students would return to online learning, due to a worsening coronavirus surge.

It also follows an announcement from Gov. Gavin Newsom earlier that day calling for many counties, including Orange and Los Angeles, to reclose gyms, churches, hair salons, shopping malls and other personal service businesses.

Board member Tim Shaw reiterated Monday the adopted recommendations would hardly count as law in Orange County.

“No one's forcing anybody,” Shaw said. “If you feel very strongly, very adamantly that you don't want your child to attend a public school with other children, there will almost certainly be an online option made available to you.”

Many local school districts say they are moving forward with individualized reopening plans that have been in the works for the past several weeks.

Students in the Newport-Mesa Unified School District, for example, will have the option of attending an online-only school or participating in a program that can shift from in-person classes, to online, to a hybrid model and back in response to shifting health orders. Board members were due to vote Tuesday on the three-phase model, said spokeswoman Annette Franco.

Some schools will likely follow the board's suggestion, after having done their own research. At Pacifica Christian Orange County High School in Newport Beach, Brandon Gonzalez, the director

of athletics and student life, said the private institution plans to return to in-person learning.

He said campus leaders have been meeting each week for the past six weeks to work on what returning to class will look like this fall but haven't yet decided whether to require face masks.

“I fully understand the medical studies, political views and personal preferences on wanting to wear masks or not wear them,” Gonzalez added, “but it seems they may be a necessary step for the time being ... to protect teachers, faculty, staff and those who may be at high risk.”

Luiz Nuñez, a history teacher and the head football coach at Ocean View High School in Huntington Beach, said while it's important for kids to return to school due to the social aspect and their mental health, the Board of Education is leaving out the most important factor.

“There is also a responsibility as an educator and coach to make sure the safety of my students, players and coaches [are] a priority,” Nuñez said. “I want to go back into the classroom, but there has to be a plan of safety that takes care of [the] stakeholders. I want to go back, but I want to do it as safely as possible. I don't believe the [Orange County Board of Education] is taking those measures with their [recommendations].”

Nuñez also teaches at a school where more than half of the student body is Latino. That demographic has been hit hard by the coronavirus in Orange County, as well as in Los Angeles County.

The Orange County Health Care Agency reported Tuesday that out of the 26,120 confirmed total cases of COVID-19 in its county, 6,846 (43.6%) identify as Latino/Hispanic. The cumulative death toll in the county is 433, and 159 of those are Latino/Hispanic.

“Most of our Hispanic [students] at Ocean View have parents who are frontline workers [and] who are constantly exposed to COVID-19,” Nuñez said. “Many of my students and football players were forced to join the labor force and struggled to participate in distance learning. Some had to help younger siblings or shared computers to get their academics duties completed.”

“I am torn with what is happening, because I know safety is a priority, but the challenges they face learning from home make it very difficult for them to engage

in distance learning. That's why a safety plan of kids returning to school is so vital. Allowing kids to return with zero guidelines puts students, teachers and staff at risk with so many of our students and families working on the front lines.”

Huntington Beach's Ocean View School District plans to reopen an online academy as a separate school under the district for families who wish to commit to a year of distance learning.

Others will be brought into smaller classes, with guidelines in place, where they will learn in distanced plexiglass safety corals, according to board President Gina Clayton-Tarvin. She said the district was not interested in adopting the recommendations of the County Board of Education, which she said has “zero authority” over local districts.

“It is, frankly, politically driven,” Clayton-Tarvin said of the board's recent action. “It's reckless and it's causing undue fear among teachers, students and parents alike, for no other reason than to wind people up.”

As coronavirus cases across the nation continue to climb and waning suns set on weary parents, the debate over whether and how to reopen brick-and-mortar schools in the fall is beginning to take center stage in political debates.

Earlier in July, President Trump issued a call for American schools to reopen full time, blaming Democrats for wanting to keep them closed to prevent him from being reelected. He also threatened to cut off federal funding for educational institutions — authority he does not have.

Meanwhile, Education Secretary Betsy DeVos, in a CNN interview Sunday, repeated her mantra that children “need to be back in school,” stopping short of offering a plan for how they can safely return. She has said staggering arrival times for classes and spacing desks 6 feet apart are “flexible” guidelines that may be used as “appropriate.”

Gonzalez, at Pacifica Christian, said politics aside, he is hoping kids can safely return to campus soon.

“Being at school is better than being home, however you look at it,” he said.

fessional. Irvine spokeswoman Melissa Haley said that it took just two days for appointments to be totally booked for the entirety of the monthlong testing program.

However, Haley said the Irvine City Council meets Tuesday night and could vote to expand the program, either by adding more than the three drive-up lanes currently present or making the program last longer.

Irvine resident Tiffany Im drove through late Monday to be tested for COVID-19. She said she has been having respiratory issues lately.

"I'm really proud to be an Irvine resident, that they're doing this to make sure our community is safe," Im said.

"I know that there's also a lot of concern about the schools reopening here shortly, and I feel like this will let us know if we're on track to do that or not."

Im said the spiking COVID-19 numbers are a cause for concern, particularly with a young child at home. Her daughter, Tiyan, is 5 years old and will be starting kindergarten. Im said she and her daughter make sure to wear masks while out and about.

"I don't like [the masks issue becoming political]," she said. "I feel like I've snoozed a lot of people on my Facebook feeds recently for making everything political. I just want those who are educated to make the decisions for us, and just work together to try to protect our families."

Since the drive-up testing is appointment-based, lines rarely got longer than two or three cars. After Im got to the testing station, she asked the medical professional if the test was going to hurt. The response was that she might cry. "Oh, that's fine," Im said. "I've been crying since March."

The city of Irvine partnered with multiple laboratories, including Pangea Laboratory in Costa Mesa, to provide the coronavirus testing.

Alex Hafers, a spokesman for Pangea, said the company's ownership decided to pivot when the pandemic

hit. "We had some capacity, we had some good turnaround times, so we offered our services," Hafers said. "Our ownership just wanted to help the community, and what better place to start than our local community? We were able to reach out so quickly because we're just down the street."

The medical professionals on-site at the Great Park are from Curogram, which was founded in Irvine and provides communications options for the medical profession.

"The City Council has put in place appropriate and forward-thinking safety

measures every step of the way since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic,"

Irvine Mayor Christina Shea said in a statement. "I am very proud that

Irvine will be the first city in Orange County to provide testing to those that live and work in Irvine, regardless of whether they have symptoms. Testing continues to be a critical component for reopening under State guidance, while ensuring the health of our community."

Irvine originally tried to institute a drive-up testing program in May, Haley said, but the chosen vendor "was not able to provide the type of service-level detail we needed." That was when Curogram stepped in.

Curogram Chief Operating Officer Michael Hsu, an Irvine resident whose company has helped develop testing sites in Houston, Atlanta and New York City, said it takes time to develop a drive-up testing program.

"The bottom line is that nobody has ever faced this problem before," Hsu said. "Nobody really knows who's supposed to solve it, how do they solve it ... Everybody across the country is learning on the fly."

house calls. People are still going to work ... [but] it's like we're being forced to work illegally, speakeasy style. We're being forced to act like criminals to make a living to feed our families. It's just ridiculous. I don't know what they think people are going to do. Do they think we're all going to go get a job at Smart & Final or something? We're just not. We're educated in our field, and we're going to work, one way or another."

Many are feeling increased frustration as the state's COVID-19 numbers continue to rise, though Huntington Beach spokeswoman Catherine Jun said the rollback wouldn't affect the city's Surf City Stroll outdoor dining program, which launched Saturday, or the citywide Open Air Dining program.

"Like the governor said, this pandemic isn't going to take a linear course," Jun said in an email. "Our community is learning to adapt and pivot with the changes."

Bella Terra outdoor mall also remains open, spokeswoman Athena Sobhan confirmed Tuesday.

David Housholder, the pastor at nondenominational church the Well at Surf City, said his congregation will be worshipping via livestreams on Facebook and YouTube again after three weeks of meeting in person on Sundays. He added that outdoor worship was another possibility.

Housholder said he felt it was important not to over-politicize the reclosing.

"You just have to be flexible with things like this," he said. "As they say in recovery, in the Serenity Prayer there's a place that says to change the things you can, to relax about the things you can't and the wisdom to know the difference. This is one of those things we just don't have a lot of control over. If we had the same statistics the governor had, we might voluntarily close ourselves."

COSTA MESA

South Coast Plaza closed its indoor mall area at the end of the business day

Monday.

"In accordance with Gov. Newsom's order, we are temporarily closing the enclosed access to boutiques at South Coast Plaza," Debra Gunn Downing, a spokeswoman for the mall, said in a statement.

"Our retailers and restaurants, with their own entrances to the outside, may remain open. In addition, our successful SCP 2 Go curbside pickup service, which began in May, will continue to be available to our customers. We look forward to reopening all of South Coast Plaza soon."

Costa Mesa Mayor Katrina Foley said that the shutdown wasn't a political issue but a public health issue.

"I will say that I was disappointed that we didn't get advance notice," Foley said. "We didn't get an opportunity to be able to justify certain business sectors, businesses like the Plaza, because they are enforcing and complying with the governor's orders. What is causing the massive community spread is not

necessarily activities going on in a hair salon or at Chanel but rather the rampant violation by people going to bars and restaurants, hanging out and not wearing their face coverings and not complying with the prohibition of gatherings. That's what's causing the spread of the virus."

NEWPORT BEACH

Steve Rosansky, president and chief executive of the Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce, took to a video message to chamber members to update them on the setback.

"These actions are another blow to the California economy and will certainly increase the ranks of the unemployed," he said. "This will also put a further strain on state and local governments as tax revenues continue to tumble."

In Newport, where Rosansky previously served as a City Council member and mayor, the initial sudden coronavirus impact in the spring blew a \$13.5-million hole in the city budget in the final quarter of fiscal year 2020.

Sales taxes alone were projected to fall by \$1.3 million and bed taxes from the lucrative local tourism industry were expected to fall by \$5.4 million in the final weeks of the year. Newport followed that up last month with a budget for the current fiscal year that assumed a \$33.2-million gap from continuing pandemic impacts.

Rosansky urged people

to wear masks and practice physical distancing "to help save our economy."

LAGUNA BEACH

Laguna Beach Mayor Bob Whalen said the city was complying with the governor's orders.

"I think it was a prudent move by the government, given the spike in the hospitalization rates and increase in cases," Whalen said. "The only way we're going to get this under control in the short term is more social distancing and more people wearing masks, so everybody needs to get with the program, in my view."

The state mandate has not affected Promenade on Forest, according to Assistant City Manager Shohreh Dupuis.

The city of Laguna Beach launched the program in June after shutting down lower Forest Avenue for the summer. It includes decks for dining, retail display and performances to support the businesses along the street and provide restaurants the space availability to operate at sustainable levels and allow for residents and visitors to interact safely.

"During this pandemic, Laguna Beach has learned how to pivot," said Paula Hornbuckle-Arnold, chief executive officer of the Laguna Beach Chamber of Commerce.

Hornbuckle-Arnold said that 10 Laguna businesses have been issued temporary use permits to have outdoor displays or dining. Six more applications are being processed.
