### Costa Mesa to consider paying center

City has sent wild animals to the Wetlands & Wildlife Care Center for treatment but hasn't paid for its services.

For years, volunteers at the Wetlands & Wildlife Care Center have been treating injured or ill wildlife brought into the Huntington Beach facility by animal control officers, residents and others from Costa Mesa without receiving any reimbursement.

More than 450 wild mammals and birds came into the center in 2022 requiring food, boarding, medical care, rehabilitation and release at a cost of about \$125 per animal. Yet the city historically paid nothing for services rendered.

But all that could soon change, as officials consider entering into a professional services agreement with the nonprofit care center that would provide \$57,000 annually, with an additional 10% contingency for a higher census or unforeseen costs.

The Costa Mesa City Council will be asked to vote on the matter in its regular meeting Tuesday, roughly five months after local resident Sue Lester, a volunteer at the wildlife center, raised it during an April 4 council meeting.

Since then, both Lester and Center Executive Director Debbie McGuire have met with officials at the Costa Mesa Police Department, which oversees the city's animal control services, and city staff to discuss the work being done by one of just a few wildlife nonprofits in Orange County.

"The police department has been absolutely phenomenal in learning the process of what the wildlife center does, asking questions and really trying to get up to speed on what it is that happens

# Viet Film Fest to celebrate 20 years with launch party

hen Viet Film Fest started in 2003, there were only enough Vietnamese films — both from the diaspora and from Vietnam itself — to hold the festival every other year. By 2013, there was a catalog long enough to change to an annual event, and this year, the festival marks its 20th anniversary with several offerings.

To kick off the 2023 festival, the Vietnamese American Arts & Letters Assn. has partnered with podcast host Kenneth Ngu-

yen for a launch party at the Circle OC — a nightclub on Warner Avenue in Huntington Beach, the city where last year the festival's in-person screenings were held at the Bella

The party, which Nguyen says is more akin to a mixer than a party, will begin at 8 p.m. on Sept. 16 and include the official reveal of the festival's set list and its nominees for Best Feature, Best Short, Best Actor, Best Actress, the Inspiration Award and the Spotlight Award. The celebration is ex-

# Packed Huntington Beach council agenda includes possible censure of a member

Tuesday's meeting agenda includes item seeking to censure Natalie Moser for Aug. 1 comments on the dais to Mayor Pro Tem Gracey Van Der Mark.

Huntington Beach City Councilwoman Natalie Moser could be censured by her colleagues on Tuesday night in City Hall.

The agenda item is one of 35 on the docket, beginning at 6 p.m., as the first council meeting in more than a month could again go into the early morning hours.

Mayor Tony Strickland and Councilmen Pat Burns and Casey McKeon brought forward the agenda item for the censure of Moser. It stems from an exchange she had with Mayor Pro Tem Gracey Van Der Mark near

the end of the Aug. 1 meeting.

During a discussion on the city's Declaration of Policy of Human Dignity, Moser questioned Van Der Mark's ability to serve on an ad hoc committee related to the policy given past allegations that she was a Holocaust denier and had associations with the far-right Proud Boys group.

Van Der Mark addressed the issue during City Council public comments in May 2018 and again to the Daily Pilot in an interview on Aug. 3. She said that a since-deleted YouTube playlist had antisemitic videos sent to

"I'm thrilled to see there's an agreement on the agenda, and I'm hopeful the City Council will be in favor of it."

there," Lester said Friday.

Costa Mesa currently pays the Newport Center Animal Hospital \$240,000 annually to treat domestic animals rounded up by animal control officers. The nonprofit Priceless Pets Rescue takes in domestic animals seen by the vet, at a rate of \$25 per animal

Additionally, those entities have the ability to generate some revenue through adoption fees or owners' retrieval of lost animals.

But for orphaned, sick or injured wild birds and mammals found in Costa Mesa, the Wetlands & Wildlife Care Center, opened in 1998, is the only game in town. And the cost of doing business, like most things, has only increased in recent years, according to McGuire.

She said the center was forced to evacuate hundreds of animals to the Santa Ana Zoo after weather forecasts indicated Tropical Storm Hilary could send strong winds

and rainfall toward Huntington Beach. No animals were harmed, but the weather event caused roughly \$33,000 in damage to the center.

"The bright side is at least Costa Mesa is going to come forward and start supporting us," McGuire said. "Because the other option would be we'd have to close our doors, then there wouldn't be anywhere else to go."

Should the City Council approve the agreement with the care center, the nonprofit will be paid retroactively to July 1, the first

day of the current fiscal year. Lester said she'd like to discuss the option of the center's receiving compensation at least back to the start of 2023.

"I don't think that's an unreasonable ask," she added.



her by a colleague. She said she never watched the videos but was planning to question the content, not support it.

In 2018, however, the Anti-Defamation League wrote multiple letters questioning Van Der Mark's ability to serve as a community leader. One letter asked that Van Der Mark be removed from the Ocean View School District's Citizens Oversight Committee for Measure R due to "bigoted and hateful" comments and her participation in what the group called activities organized and led by white supremacists.

Tuesday's censure discussion was introduced because Moser took personal and disrespectful attacks at Van Der Mark, according to the agenda item.

the agenda item.

"This type of challenge by Moser of Van Der Mark during a City Council meeting is disruptive, inappropriate, it undermines professional decorum, and is unacceptable," the item reads. "To that end, Councilwoman Moser should be censured by this City Coun-

cil. While Councilwoman Moser has her First Amendment rights, so does this City Council."

Moser said to the Daily Pilot in an Aug. 3 interview that she agreed with the ADL's initial assessment, which caused her to make the comments she did from the dais

"To me, those things are a red line, especially the Holocaust hoax piece," Moser said. "Those associations, and that history, I think it can be seen as indicative of bias that would compromise her capacity to ensure inclusivity and respect for everyone in the community. In my mind, they undermine her suitability for the role that she was given on that ad hoc [committee], which is what I was speaking to specifically."

#### CHARTER AMENDMENTS TO BE CONSIDERED

Three possible city charter amendments will also be considered and could be sent to the voters in the statewide primary election on March 5, 2024.

The amendments were

first discussed at the Aug. 1 meeting, per the recommendations of an ad hoc committee.

Amendment No. 1 deals with local election issues, including the requiring of voter identification, more in-person voting locations and monitoring of drop boxes. It would also clarify the city attorney's role, as well as update the qualifications for city clerk, and require that alleged malfeasance by a city official be investigated by outside agencies.

agencies.

Amendment No. 2 would provide that the only flags permitted on city property are the U.S., county, state, city, Armed Forces and P.O.W. flags. It would also require the city to adopt a two-year budget and move the city clerk and city treasurer positions to the gubernatorial election cycle.

Amendment No. 3 would require voter approval of any city transaction that forgives, waives or forgoes the collection of property in excess of \$100,000 per year, except acquisition of property for parks and infrastructure. It would also allow certain children's playground equipment, parkrelated utility structures

and public restrooms be built without limitation, and update the procedures to cancel a regular City Council meeting.

#### POLICY ON HUMAN DIGNITY UPDATE PROPOSED

The council will also consider an amended Policy on Human Dignity, which was constructed by an ad hoc committee of Van Der Mark, Burns and McKeon.

The amended document is shorter than the 2021 version, at six paragraphs.

Notably, the third paragraph reads: "The city of Huntington Beach will recognize from birth the genetic differences between male and female and respect the strengths and benefits of each. Each sex carries advantages and disadvantages that warrant separation during certain activities (i.e. sports). We encourage an environment free of hostility and discourage the erasure of either gender's separate accomplishments."

### 'NO MASK AND NO VACCINE MANDATE'

Van Der Mark introduced an item for Tuesday's meeting asking that the city ban universal mask and vaccine mandates.

An exception to the rule would be those who have already tested positive for COVID-19, she wrote in the item, which seeks that Huntington Beach be declared a "no mask and no vaccine mandate" city.

Van Der Mark argues in the item that mask mandates imposed at City Hall and other parts of the city in 2020 and 2021 "unnecessarily limited the freedoms of the citizens of Huntington Beach — even those who were not around anyone who tested positive for COVID-19 or at risk of any exposure."

COVID-19 cases are on the rise in Orange County, according to data from the Orange County Health Care Agency, though hospitalizations remain relatively low.

pected to conclude at around midnight.

It's open to the general public, though Nguyen noted the nightclub has an 800-person capacity. Tickets are available at eventbrite.com/e/viet-filmfest-launch-party-presented -by-vaala-x-the-vietnamese-podcast-tickets-687016263137. Organizers hope to bring out as much of the creative community as possible.

Viet Film Fest organizer Ysa Le said Nguyen reached out to the festival through a mutual friend in May to collaborate. Nguyen said he's held a big party every year for the last three years for Vietnamese Lunar New Year — Tet.

"I am collaborating with the film festival to do this. I am in charge of hosting and calling and inviting all of my guests and the people that I know in my circles. The whole goal is to bring the [Los Angeles] entertainment community and the O.C. entertainment community together," Nguyen said.

'We want to do this event annually, so that we can get the Vietnamese community in Southern California and the U.S. to galvanize behind moving the needle for representation," he said.

As it was in 2022, the Viet Film Fest will largely be presented online but will include in-person screenings at the Frida Cinema in Santa Ana on Oct. 6 and 7. The festival will open with

a screening of "The Spectacular Adventure of Little Prodigy" on Oct. 6 and close with a screening of "The Accidental Getaway Driver," which will make its Orange County and Los Angeles premiere.

The film was principally filmed around Orange County and is based on the real life story of Vietnamese cab driver Long Hoang Ma, who was kidnapped and held hostage by three escaped Orange County inmates in 2016.

"Our mission and [Nguyen's] goals align. He is all about interviewing filmmakers and artists of Vietnamese descent and diaspora," Le said. "He's doing what we want to do too highlighting the achievements of the artists. We joined forces, and I think

we can extend our network and get more visibility for our artists and filmmakers."

With respect to the ongoing Writers Guild of America and SAG-AFTRA strikes, organizers stated that they are not sponsored by any companies targeted by strikers and released a statement in solidarity with both unions on Aug. 10.

'Viet Film Fest [organizers] express our solidarity with WGA, SAG-AFTRA and our community of creatives. Writers and actors unequivocally deserve a living wage, and actors deserve the absolute right to own their likeness, without compromise or exception," the statement reads.

"For over 30 years, VAALA has uplifted artists in screen, literature, music, theater, and visual arts in

the Vietnamese creative community. Through 20 years of Viet Film Fest. VAALA has strived to spotlight and highlight those in both the independent and international spaces. Given our work and the history of Vietnamese people and the Vietnamese diaspora, we understand how important artists are in telling our stories, our experiences, and, most of all, our history. There is no film and television industry without the valuable contributions of writers and actors.'

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A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEWPORT BEACH, CALIFORNIA, DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO CONDUCT A
PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER GRANTING A NON-EXCLUSIVE COMMERCIAL SOLID WASTE AND DIVERTIBLE MATERIALS HANDLING

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Newport Beach ("City") finds and determine that the collection of municipal solid waste and divertible materials, including recyclable materials, food scraps, green waste, wood waste, construction and demolition debris, and all other materials that can be diverted from landfill disposal (collectively "Commercial Solid Waste") generated within the City is a vital public service;
WHEREAS, the City Council further finds and determines that the collection,

transportation, storage, and disposal of municipal solid waste and the collection transportation, processing, and diversion of processable municipal solid waste and divertible materials ("Commercial Franchise Services") is a matter of great public concern because improper control of such matters subjects the City to potential liability, damages and penalties, and may create a public nuisance, air pollution, fire hazard, infestation and other problems affecting the public health, safety and welfare;

WHEREAS, the non-exclusive franchises for the use of public streets to provide Commercial Franchise Services promotes the public health, safety and welfare by providing permanence and stability among those businesses wishing to provide such service and accountability to the City for compliance with current and future state mandates; WHEREAS, on October 22, 2019, the City Council approved a new model franchise

nt in compliance with state law ("2020 Franchise"), that expires in the year 2027; WHEREAS, the City has since received applications from new applicants that wish to

perform work under the 2020 Franchise;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article XIII (Franchises) of the City Charter, Chapter 12.63 (Solid Waste Management) of the Newport Beach Municipal Code ("NBMC"), and California Public Resources Code Sections 40059, 49300, and 49500 through 49523, or any successor statutes, the City is authorized to enter into non-exclusive franchise agreements for Commercial

Franchise Services with private solid waste haulers;

WHEREAS, pursuant to City Charter Section 1301 (Resolution of Intention. Notice and Public Hearing), the City Council, prior to granting any franchise, shall pass a resolution declaring its intention to grant same, stating the name of the proposed grantee(s), the character of the franchise, and the terms and conditions upon which it is proposed to be

WHEREAS, such resolution shall fix and set forth the day, hour and place when and

appear before the City Council and be heard thereon.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Newport Beach resolves as follows: **Section 1:** The City Council does hereby declare its intention to grant the non-exclusive franchise, subject to the following general terms and conditions ("Non-Exclusive

Franchise"): Effective date. October 27, 2023; Franchise fees. Sixteen percent (16%) of gross monthly receipts. Five and one-

half percent (5.5%), shall be earmarked for the purposes of indemnifying and holding the City harmless from environmental liability associated with the franchisee's operations in the City. This portion of the franchise fee shall be paid into the City's Environmental Liability Fund One-half percent (0.5%) shall be attributable to the maintenance and implementation of the City's Source Reduction and Recycling Element;

Term. October 27, 2023 to October 7, 2027; Rates. The City shall not set franchisees' bin rates;

Indemnification, Franchisees shall indemnify and hold City harmless from penalties and damages for failure to meet state recycling requirements with respect to the portion of the Commercial Solid Waste stream collected by franchisees;

Diversion requirements. Franchisees shall divert the minimum amounts required by state law, of all processable municipal solid waste, recyclable materials, food scraps, green waste, and construction and demolition debris collected by commercial franchisees

g. Disposal requirements. Franchisees shall dispose of Commercial Solid Waste, not otherwise diverted, in Orange County landfills pursuant to the City's waste disposal agreement with the County of Orange. City maintains the right to designate disposal facilities to be used by franchisees;

Billing. Franchisees shall be responsible for all billing and collection for its

Termination. Franchise shall not be revoked unless franchisee has defaulted in the performance of any obligation of the 2020 Franchise, and the Franchise may be terminated pursuant to Newport Beach Municipal Code Section 12.63.140 (Solid Waste Management - Termination);

j. Application requirements. Prior to obtaining the 2020 Franchise, franchisees shall designate the specific Commercial Franchise Services for which it desires to apply and shall demonstrate competence in and compliance with the City's insurance, equipment, and diversion requirements with respect to those Commercial Franchise Services; Public education. Franchisees shall meet City's requirements to implement

recycling, diversion, and source reduction public education activities;

I. Recycling/diversion programs. Franchisees shall implement and provide

recycling and diversion programs for all customers subject to California State Assembly Bills 939, 341, and 1826, Senate Bill 1383, and the California Green Building Standards Code, codified in the California Code of Regulations Title 24, Part 11, ("CALGreen"); m. Hauler representative. Franchisees shall designate a representative to assist in implementing State-imposed recycling and diversion programs; and

n. Compliance. Franchisees shall comply with all state, federal laws and regulations, terms and conditions of the franchise agreement, the City Charter and the NBMC.

Section 2: The City intends to grant the 2020 Franchise to Robert's Waste & Recycling

("Proposed Grantee"), which currently holds a 2017 Franchise and is presently licensed and permitted to conduct business in the City.

Should the Proposed Grantee be granted a 2020 Franchise, and accept such 2020 Franchise, the Proposed Grantee's 2017 Franchise shall be abandoned at such time the 2020 Franchise is granted pursuant to City Charter Section 1303.

Section 3: The City Council shall conduct a public hearing on September 12, 2023 at 4:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard, in the City Council Chambers located at 100 Civic Center Drive, Newport Beach, California, to consider granting the Proposed Grantee the 2020 Franchise. Persons who have an interest in or objection to the granting of the 2020 Franchise to the Proposed Grantee may appear before the City Council and be heard at that date and time.

looking for ways to be better," Viloria said. "As a school district, we should be looking for those opportunities, and it was a natural thing for us to open a family resource center for families, and to have this space for kids, based on what we know we're hearing from them [about] what their needs are.

"It's nice to have a onestop shop for folks to be able to pop in and access things. The same thing for kids. There's always going to be a staff member here, so if they need something, they know that they can always pop in and get help. This day and age, access to what folks need is probably the most important thing. There's so much out there that you need to have a point of contact that you can guide kids and guide families to that support."
